March of Dimes Drive Opens In County on Tuesday, Jan. 3

WAYLAND TESSAR AND ED CAMPBELL CHAIRMEN FOR VILLAGE AND TOWNSHIP

Scores of polio fighters in Washington county will join forces with thousands of volunteers throughout the nation next Tuesday, Jan. 3, when the March of Dimes launches its 1956 campaign. As in the past, the main objective for the 1956 drive is to raise funds needed for polio patient aid, scientific research and professional education.

The names of village, town and city chairmen who will direct the campaign in Washington county were announced this week by Herbert Matenaer, county campaign chairman. In making public the names of his volunteer assistants Matenaer said:

"Thousands of men, women and children—some of them our own neighbors—still are suffering from the cruel aftermath of polio. Only a successful March of Dimes will enable us to meet their needs. This is true not only in the nation as a whole, but in Washington county as well, which in 1955 suffered one of the most severe polio epidemics in its history."

Matenaer named the following to assist him in the 1956 campaign:

F. W. Bucklin, former county court judge, who will contact industries; Harry Sheski, county superintendent of schools, who will direct fund raising activities in county schools, and Fred Holt, city superintendent of schools, who will direct similar activities in city schools. Members of the county council will again distribute coin collectors throughout the county, and all dimes deposited in parking meters in West Bend during the period of the drive will be turned over to the Washington County chapter for Infantile Paralysis.

City chairmen—Mrs. Robert Haebig, West Bend, and F. S. Clausen, Hartford.

The names of chairmen for the north half of the town of Polk and for the town of Jackson will be announced at a later date, Matenaer said.

The task of distributing the coin collectors throughout the county will be under the direction of Edward Duenkel of Barton. Legionnaires working with Duenkel expect to complete the distribution this week or next.

The campaign also disclosed that additional volunteers are needed. He requested anyone wishing to assist the 1956 March of Dimes to contact their local town, village or city chairmen immediately.

Kewaskum Vo Ag and FFA Flashes

As 1955 draws to a close and is recorded as history, the members of the Kewaskum FFA chapter and Vocational Agriculture department feel that "55 was really alive."

Looking back at the year's accomplishments, in March Delbert Haack and Carl Meyer were made the first Wisconsin farmers from this chapter because of outstanding farming programs and chapter participation. Also in March the first annual FFA Father and Son banquet was held in the gym with

the FHA doing the serving.

In April the second annual FFA Green Hand initiation party took place and the second honorary chapter member, Paul Landmann, joined our club. Jerome Nigh was honored as the outstanding senior agricultural student and along with that honor received the first Bank of Kewaskum short course scholarship to attend the University of Wisconsin for the 15 week winter course.

Fifty-eight members made a tour of the Milwaukee livestock yards and the Plankinton Packing company in March, and later in the month watched a double-header of professional basketball featuring the Harlem Globetrotters and the

Milwaukee Hawks.

In June the senior FFA members took the first annual senior FFA trip to the north woods of Wisconsin. During the summer the FFA boys kept active by entering a softball team in the slow pitch league, holding monthly meetings, and entering livestock in three county fairs and the state fair.

In October 48 members attended the International Dairy show at the Union Stock Yards in Chicago.

Financial arrangements will be made to include cost of room, board, clothes, personal allowance, school costs and medical attention.

Kewaskum Civil Defense Group Has Organizational Meet

The organizational meeting of the Civil Defense group in Kewaskum, called by Marvin Martin, the newly appointed civil defense director, was held Tuesday evening, Dec. 13.

James E. Reigle, village President, reported on the necessity of a Civil Defense program and on the present law.

Martin asked that everyone present who represented a group or business concern make every effort to get the following information before the next meeting:

1. Number of square feet available for housing.
2. Kitchen facilities, if any.
3. How the cooking would be done.
4. How many people would be fed.

It is especially important that the churches and schools make this information available.

Martin pointed out that while we hope that the organization would never be needed, in case of national emergency there would be no question about whether an individual or group wanted to turn over their facilities. They would have to be turned over in the interest of public safety and welfare.

The question of additional auxiliary power units was brought up and if any are available in the community, the civil defense group would be so informed by the next meeting. They should know how many, how big, and where these units are located.

In connection with the power problem it was suggested that we investigate the possibility of having an additional feeder line come into the community in case one should be knocked out.

It will be the duty of our chief of police to train auxiliary police to control traffic and vandalism. Chief Pledl reported that he had been informed by the state civil defense director's office that he should have no fewer than 100 men on the stand-by list.

Of major importance in any major catastrophe are the people trained in first aid. A number of people in the community were authorized instructors at one time, however, their cards have elapsed. Refresher courses should be taken so that they are in a position to train more people. The Red Cross is going to sponsor a first aid course for the fire department shortly after the 1st of the year and the public will be invited to participate.

A major part of the civil defense training program can be best

handled by the school systems. All children should be trained to protect themselves should the necessity arise.

Bartelt, St. Lucas Lutheran church, Rev. F. L. Rodenbeck, Peace Ev. and Ref. church; Mrs. Marvin Schaefer, Nurse; Al. Muckerheide, American Legion; Mrs. William Guenther, St. Lucas Lutheran church; John Battaglia and Mrs. Ione Honeck, Holy Trinity church; Eugene La Marche, Kewaskum High school; Clifford C. Stautz, Kewaskum Grade school; Walter Stenman, Wm. H. Heinemann Dairy; Lloyd Tesselink, UAW-AFL Local 849, Kewaskum.

The next meeting will be held the later part of January.

COUNTY WELFARE DIRECTOR LISTS EXPENSES FOR MONTH

General relief costs for the month were \$2,032.28. Of this amount \$1,204.04 was for assistance granted; \$570.25 for medical and hospitalization costs and \$257.99 for non-residents.

Reimbursements from other government units were \$51.03 from other counties; \$119.67 from municipalities and \$102 from other sources for a total of \$272.70.

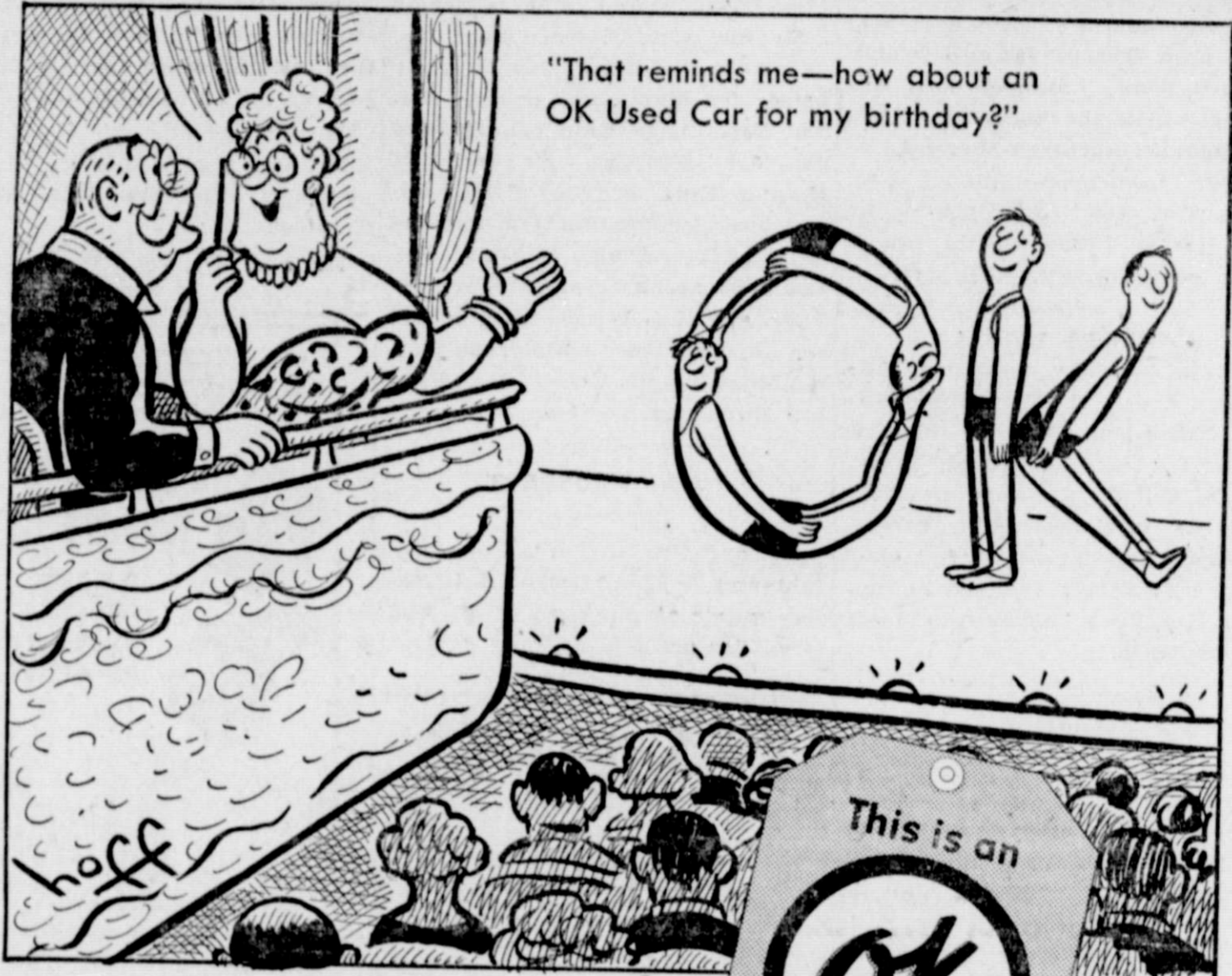

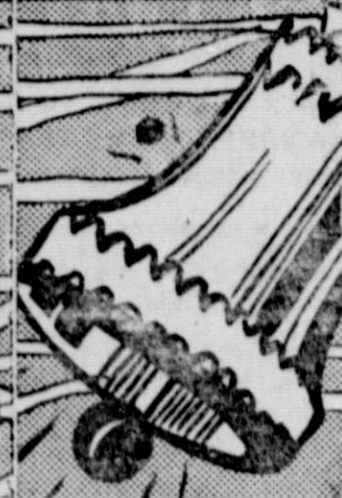

Chevs Beat Campbellsport and West Bend to Cop First Half Title in Land o' Lakes League

TEAM SCORES 110 POINTS, HANRAHAN MAKES 38 TO SET HIGH SCORING MARKS

The Kewaskum Chevrolets beat Campbellsport, 110 to 87, on the home floor last Friday night and also won over West Bend on the Lithias' floor Wednesday night of this week, 73 to 56, to win the undisputed first half championship in the Land o' Lakes league. The Chevs finished play in the half with a record of six wins and only one defeat.

In wheeling to their win over Campbellsport, the Chevs set a new season's scoring high by making a total of 110 points. Big George Hanrahan, who had one of his sharpest nights ever, consistently hit the baskets for a total of 38 points, also a new high individual mark for the season. The towering center popped in 16 field goals and six free throws on his spree, as many points as entire teams get in some games. In two other contests this season, the high scoring Kewaskum cagers ran up 106 points and broke their own record Friday. In three tilts they tallied 322 points, showing sensational scoring punch.

Although trailing all through the game Campbellsport made a battle of it and rallied to come within a few points of the Chevs at one stage before Kewaskum pulled away to a 23-point advantage in the last quarter. The Chevrolets had a big advantage in height over the Tigers and this enabled the big boys like Hanrahan, John Tessar and Don Meisenheimer to pour in points.

Next in line behind Hanrahan with his 38 points was Tessar who also did all right with 22. Meisenheimer collected 18 and Frank Krueger added 14. Top man for Campbellsport was Fred Bleck with 19, while Dave Wondra chipped in 16. Kewaskum was ahead at the half, 48-33.

In the all-important game at West Bend Wednesday night the Chevs were without the services of

their scoring ace, Hanrahan, who was out with an injured knee. We were told he hurt the knee trying to pull a big walleye through a hole in the ice on Winnebago. This was a tremendous loss to Kewaskum but the Lithias also had two players missing, Rauon and Meyer, which evened matters up some.
