And Tavern at St. Kilian Sold

Sunday, January 1, was the date of change of ownership of the St. Kilian store and tavern, the former owner and operator, Orville Strachota, selling to Lambert Jacak, a well liked and known resident near St. Kilian, who previously was engaged in farming.

Orville Strachota will con inue with his seed and wool business which he operated along with the store and tavern since taking it over from his late father, Simon Strachota, in 1940. It is his plan to further expand the seed business and processing plant at St. Kilian, with the installation of additional cleaning and seed testing equipment in the very near future.

Strachota also operates a licensed and bonded seed warehouse in St. Kilian. In 1952 he had the only such licensed seed and bonded warehouse in Wisconsin approved to process and store seeds for the U. S. Government, He is a member of the Wisconsin Seed Dealers' association, and in 1955 was admitted to the ASTA, the American Seed Trade association, a national organization in the seed trade with high ethical standards.

In addition, Strachota also operates the St. Kilian cheese factory which he reopened in the fall of 1951, having leased it until July 16 1955 when he took over active erations of the plant. Present operations are at the rate of over one million pounds of cheese annually.

Almost 3500 Acres of **Soil Inventories Made In County During 1955**

Almost thirty-five hundred acres of detailed soil inventories were made during the 1955 mapping season in Washington county according to James C. Meschnick, district conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service at West Bend.

These land inventories were prepared by Soil Scientist Bruce Watson, assigned to the area office at Waukesha. The maps were made of farms and groups of farms in the Washington County Soil Conservation District.

The inventory, continued Mesnnick, includes a determination of the soil type, the slope of the land, and degree of erosion on each portion of land. Areas delineated vary in size from one acre to several acres depending upon soil and slope changes on each farm.

After the soil inventory maps have been inked by Soil Scientist Watson, they are sent to the cartographic section of the Soil Conser- er does a \$250,000 business annualvation Service in Milwaukee for ly: nearly half of this amount is in processing. Individual farm maps feed sales.

The inventory provides basic information for determining proper land use, namely cropland, pasture, woodland or wildlife. Soil problems such as wetness, droughtiness, and erosion are analyzed and conservation practices are recommended according to needs. Most adaptable crop rotations are determined.

Plans individually fitted to each farms needs will be worked out jointly with the farmers by the soil conservationist in the Washington county district.

DATE FOR GRAIN PRICE SUPPORT IN THE COUNTY


