Explosion at New Sewage Plant Causes Much Damage

BLAST MONDAY KNOCKS OUT WINDOWS AND DOORS; MEN KNOCKED DOWN BUT NOT INJURED

Extensive damage was caused by an explosion at the new incinerator and sewage disposal plant at the south end of the village Monday morning. The blast occurred at about 11:30 a. m. and is believed to have been caused by the accumulation of gases in the incinerator.

Harry Schaefer, plant superintendent, and his brother, Carl Schaefer, a member of the village board, were making a tour of the building at the time with Oscar Egerer of the State Board of Health, Fond du Lac office, and another representative of that department whose name was not given. The force of the explosion knocked the men off their feet but none of them was injured.

The blast was so severe that windows and doors on all three floors of the building were blown out or damaged. A large window and complete frame in the coil filter room adjacent to the incinerator was entirely blown out and the south window in the same room was broken and "bowed" out. On the floor below the ground floor the windows and frames were "bowed" out. Garage doors on the basement ash pit were damaged. The overhead door on the ground floor and smaller doors were also damaged and splintered.

No damage to the floors, ceiling or walls was detected and it is believed no damage was caused to the incinerator although it was not inspected after the explosion because of being too hot from burning garbage at the time.

Apparently the blast was caused by a blanket of wet garbage and combustible refuse being placed on top of dry and partly burned garbage, preventing gasses from escaping and causing them to explode. Harry Schaefer was burned about a month ago when a backfire occurred at the plant.

The blast occurred on the ground floor of the charging room. The loss is reported to be covered by insurance. According to Village Commissioner William Martin no estimate on the loss was available as yet but insurance adjusters and the building contractor, the Bloomer Truck and Shovel Co. of Bloomer, Wis. have been notified and will make repairs.

POSTAL RECEIPTS UP \$13,371 IN 1955 AT LOCAL POST OFFICE

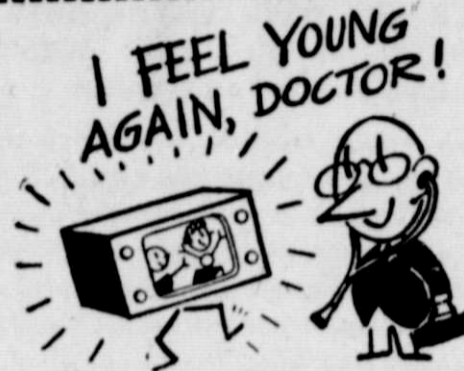

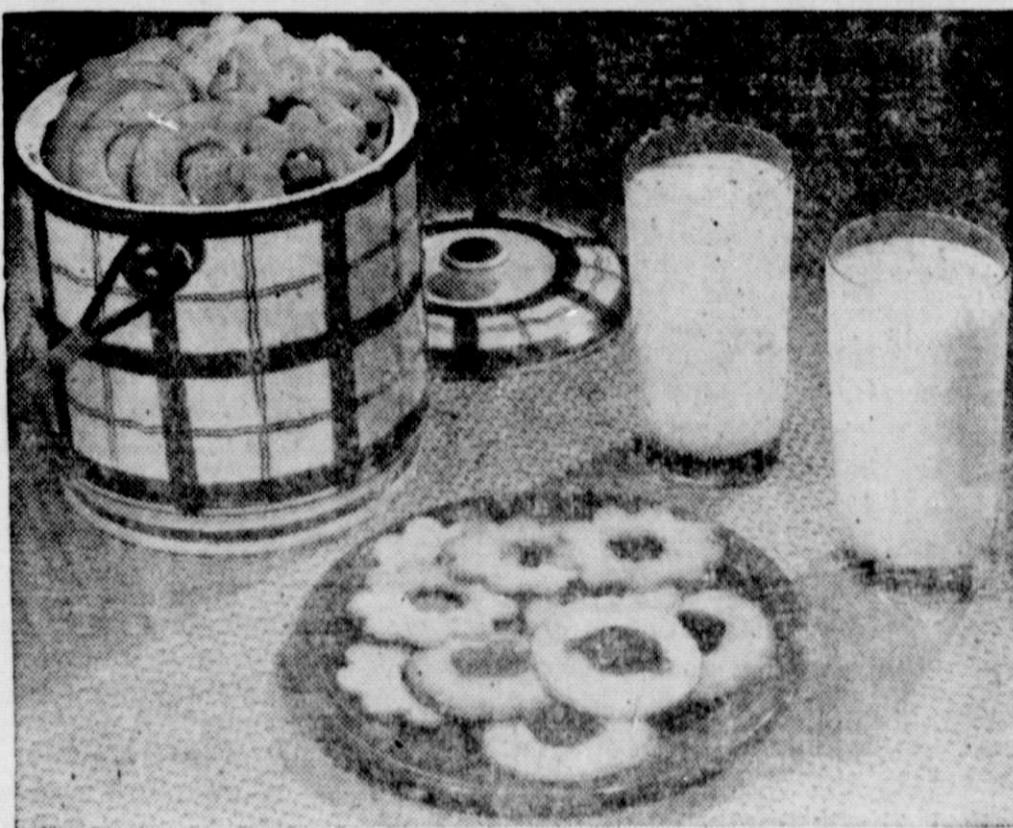

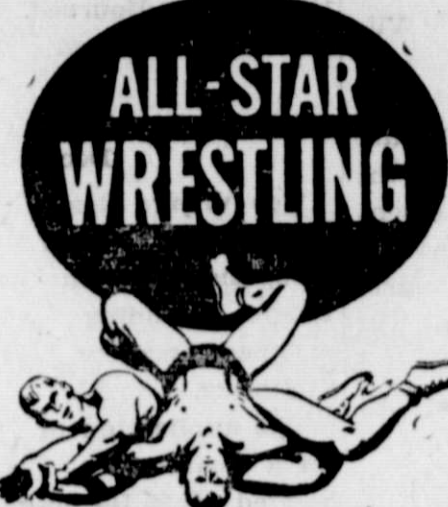

Indians Hand Bells First Defeat, Gain Tie For First Place

The Kewaskum Indians snapped previously unbeaten Campbellsport's five game winning streak here Tuesday evening, 66-62, to throw the Tri-County conference cage race wide open. The victory enabled the Indians to move into a first place tie with the Bells and Brandon. All three teams now have 5 and 1 records in the heated pennant chase. Brandon won over Hustisford Tuesday.

Campbellsport had held the undisputed lead with a clean slate until Tuesday but did not face Kewaskum or Brandon, two of the strongest teams, up until that date. The Bells play Brandon this Friday in the feature game and the loser will drop out of the three-way tie for first.

Kewaskum was ahead of the Bells throughout the contest here. The Indians moved into a good lead in the first quarter, 16-9, and increased their advantage to 11 points at the half, which ended 36-25. But the Bells rallied in the third period to outscore the Indians, 21-13, and come within a few points of overcoming the lead. Kewaskum regained a 10-point lead in the final quarter and held it until the final few minutes when the Bells caught fire suddenly and spurred for six quick points to come within four points of tying the score at the game's end. The Indians had to fight hard to stave off the Bell threat.

They might have held their big lead and coasted to victory if they would have played a possessing type of game by controlling the ball. That way they would have forced the Bells either to foul them to get the ball or draw their de-

fense out of position to make room for sure, lay-up shots. Instead Kewaskum tried to match them toe to toe in scoring and the hot Bells almost closed the gap.

Game scoring honors went to Tom Peterson, who led Kewaskum to victory with 25 points on 12 baskets and a free throw. Bob Stenman also did a good job for the winners and dropped in 18 points. Steve Van de Zande and Joe Dreikosen paced the Campbellsport point production with 16 points each. Dreikosen was perfect at the free throw line, making 10 for 10, and putting the pressure on the Indians.

Kewaskum was also victorious last Friday night when they easily trounced sixth place Oakfield, 69-47, on the home court. Campbellsport

barely nosed out Lomira, 49-46, the same night.

The Oaks matched the Indians in the first quarter and played them to a 16-16 tie but Kewaskum ran away from them in the second stanza, outscoring them 17-5, and making the halftime count 33-21. The Mitchellmen poured it on even more in the third period, netting 24 points to the visitors' 4. This brought the score to 57-25. Substitutes finished the last quarter as the Indians coasted to victory.

Peterson also had a big night in this win, dropping in 29 points for top honors. His was the best individual scoring mark in the conference Friday. Stenman hit for 17. Forwards Redman and Shady paced the Oaks with 24 and 20 points respectively.

This Friday Kewaskum plays at Hustisford and next Tuesday evening Lomira invades the Indians' teepee.
