## 77 at Woman's Club Founder's Day Dinner Sat.

### GUESTS TAKEN ON IMAGINARY TRIP TO SOUTH AMERICA BY SPEAKER

A group of 77 Woman's club members and husbands attended the annual Founder's Day dinner at the Republican Hotel on Saturday evening, Jan. 21. After words of welcome by the club president, Mrs. Clyde Smith, and a prayer by the Rev. F. L. Rodenbeck, those in attendance enjoyed an excellent dinner.

As the guests found their places at the banquet tables, their place cards told them they would be taken on an imaginary trip to South America, a trip that the speaker of the evening had made last August. On the tables were geranium plants for in South America the geranium grows wild. The tables also held miniature traveling bags and airplanes to indicate the trip had been made by plane. Mrs. Henry Rosenheimer then led the group in singing several songs that lent a South American atmosphere.

Then into the room came the guest speaker, Walter Bussewitz of Horicon, wearing the authentic, colorful attire of a South American Aztec Indian. He proceeded to describe and name the articles of clothing he was wearing. He had for display many items he had brought home for souvenirs including hand made dolls, belts, slippers, skirts, and beautiful lace mantillas which are worn by the women when attending church. He also displayed some llama dolls.

He showed many colored slides and pictures taken on the 30 day trip that took him and 45 others on a chartered plane from Milwaukee to Miami, through the Panama Canal region, down the west coast of South America to Rio de Janeiro, reported to be the most beautiful city in the world, then up the eastern coast of the country, back to Miami and Milwaukee. ## John Kral, 80, Dies Suddenly

John Kral, 80, well known retired carpenter of Kewaskum, died suddenly of a heart attack on Friday morning, Jan. 20, at the home of his son Alfred, next door to his own residence. Mr. Kral had taken his usual walk to the post office for his mail when he complained of feeling ill. There he met a neighbor who accompanied him home and he became worse on the way. When almost there he collapsed on the street and was helped to the home of his son where he passed away.

Mr. Kral was born Nov. 10, 1875, at St. Killian, a son of the late John and Mary Kral. He resided there until 29 years ago when he moved to Kewaskum with his wife and family. His marriage to the former Mary Wiesner took place June 13, 1899 at St. Killian and she predeceased him on March 2, 1941.

Eleven children were born to the couple, two of whom preceded their father in death. One child died at birth and a daughter, Mrs. Theresa Uelmen, died several years ago. Surviving are six sons and three daughters, Killian of West Bend, Catherine Skalitzky of Crystal Lake, Ill., John, Jr. of Montello, Arnold of Milwaukee, Alfred and Roman of Kewaskum, Sylvia Kral of Michigan, Virginia Schill and Paul Kral of Milwaukee. He is further survived by 14 grandchildren, 11 great-grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Catherine Wiesner, of Milwaukee, and one brother, Peter Kral, of Milwaukee.

The deceased was a member of the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity parish, Kewaskum.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 10 a. m. Sunday until 9 a. m. Monday. Funeral services were held at 9:30 a. m. Monday at Holy Trinity church, the Rev. F. C. La Buwi officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery.

## Town Auburn Farm Home Is Damaged By Fire On Tuesday

Fire caused extensive damage to the interior of the Chester Dombrowski farm home in the town of Auburn, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Link and family, on Tuesday afternoon. The rural home is located about one-half mile west of Gage school. Dombrowski, the owner, does not live on the farm. He resides southwest of Kewaskum.

When Kewaskum firemen, who were called shortly after 1 p. m., reached the scene smoke was pouring from second story windows and the blaze had a good start. Because of the thick smoke, firemen had to use their new smoke ejector machine to suck the smoke out of the building before they could get at the source of the flames. Then firemen donned smoke masks to enter the second story and direct those with hoses on ladders on the outside where to play the water through the windows. Later hoses were taken inside to get between the walls.

Believed to have been caused by an overheated stove pipe, the fire started in the ceiling and walls above the stove. A hole was burned in the ceiling and the flames spread between the walls which were burned and charred in the area above the stove. A dresser was destroyed, mattress burned and other household furniture damaged. There was also extensive damage from smoke and water.

Firemen fought the blaze for more than an hour before getting it completely out. A Regal Ware, Inc. tank truck loaded with water stood by at the scene but the fire department had sufficient water in their truck to extinguish the flames.

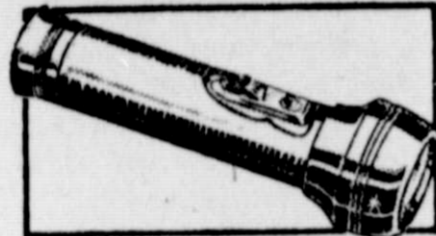

### Three Injections of Polio Vaccine Needed Dr. Edwards Reports

The full benefits of the Salk polio vaccine can be realized only after many more children have received their complete series of three injections.

This is the view of Dr. R. G. Edwards, Kewaskum, chairman of the Medical Advisory committee of the Washington County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

There is evidence that three injections of the vaccine, spaced as now recommended, give far greater protection than one or two shots, Dr. Edwards said. "The first injection lays the groundwork, the second creates more polio fighting antibodies, but the third provides greater and longer-lasting protection."

Dr. Edwards pointed out that the polio vaccine is different from the smallpox vaccine in that the killed polio virus does not multiply within the human body. Only one application of the smallpox vaccine is given, he explained, because that virus, after entering the body, reproduces itself.

"Even so," he continued, "smallpox vaccination has to be repeated every few years if the immunity is to be long lasting."

Following a study of early production difficulties, Dr. Edwards explained, the U. S. Health Service, in consultation with leading polio authorities, revised and expanded the series of safety tests required for release of polio vaccine. The result, Dr. Edwards said, is that the Salk vaccine used since the one difficulty of last spring has a perfect safety record.

Some mother's, Dr. Edwards commented, are inclined to delay taking their children to be vaccinated because polio is not on the upswing at this time of year. He pointed out that every unvaccinated child is a subject to some risk each summer through likely exposure to the polio virus but the time to prepare for this risk is eight months before exposure takes place.

Please register with your family doctor at once so that he may obtain the vaccine.

Nominations may also be made from the floor Tuesday night. A slate of six names will be presented for the election of a five-member nominating committee whose job will be to present suitable candidates as the need arises in the following year.

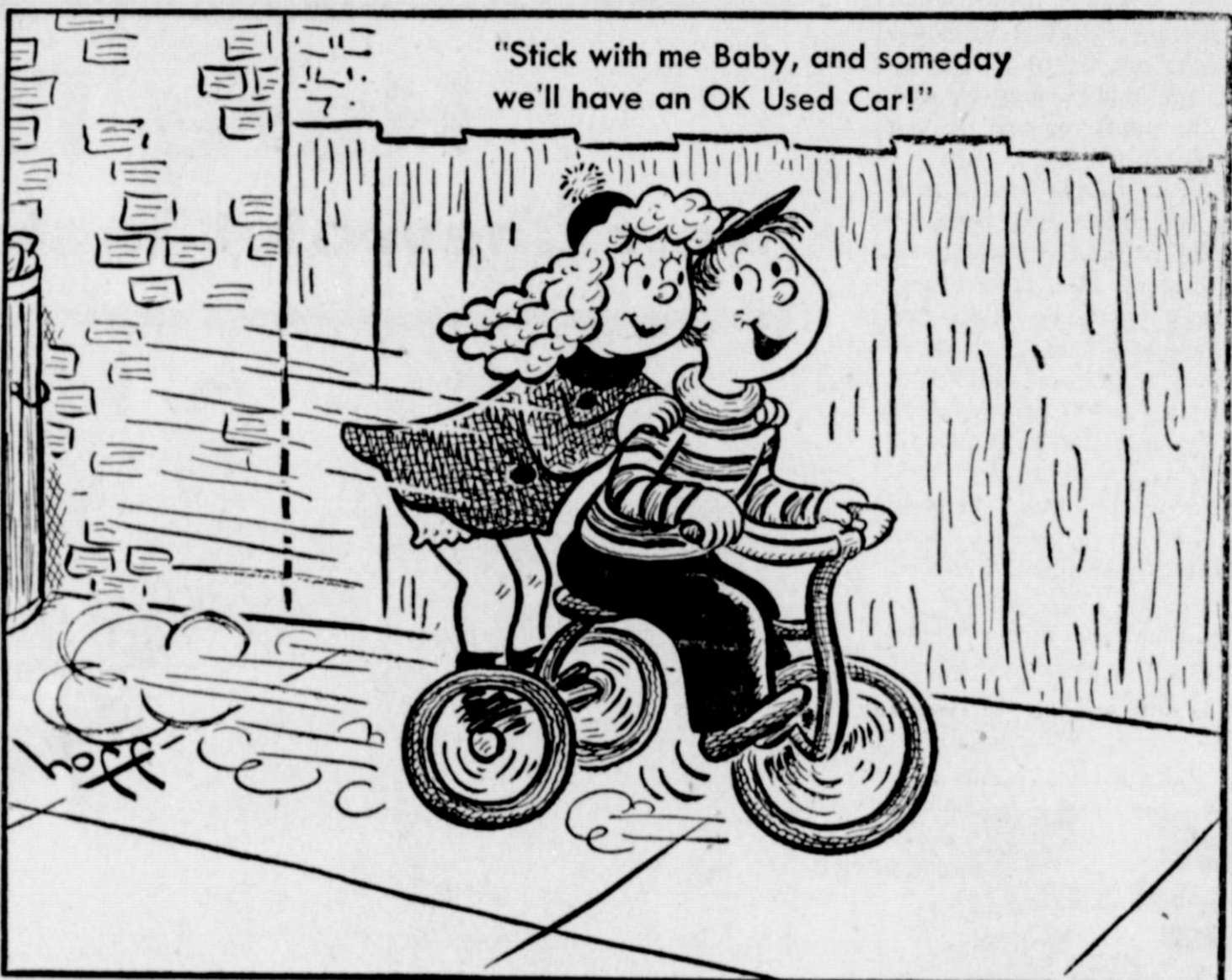

The Indians had to come from behind in the third quarter to pass up North Fondy and iced the win with a big rally in the final period. The Orioles gave a good account of themselves in the first half and surprised Kewaskum. Fondy was ahead at the quarter 16-13 and still led at half-time 26-23. The Indians caught on in the third stanza and finally went ahead by two points, 41-39, before the period ended. With new incentive Coach Mitchell's charges staged a big rally in the last quarter, scoring 22 points to North Fondy's 10, to pull well ahead.

Again taking scoring honors was Kewaskum's center, Tom Peterson, the conference's leading scorer, with 25 points, made on 11 baskets and 3 free throws. His performance again was the best around the conference that night. Forwards Mertzig and Yahr connected for 15 and 14 points respectively. Guard Arenz had 16 points for the losers, followed by Andrews with 13 and Johnson with 10.

Free throws played a big part in the Indians' win. They made good on 19 while the Orioles sank only 9.

Kewaskum has two tough assignments coming up in conference play in the next few days, especially Friday night when they travel to Brandon, Brandon is the defending champion and holds down third place in the loop with a record of 7 and 2. The Indians defeated the Redmen here earlier this season but can expect a hard game on Bran-

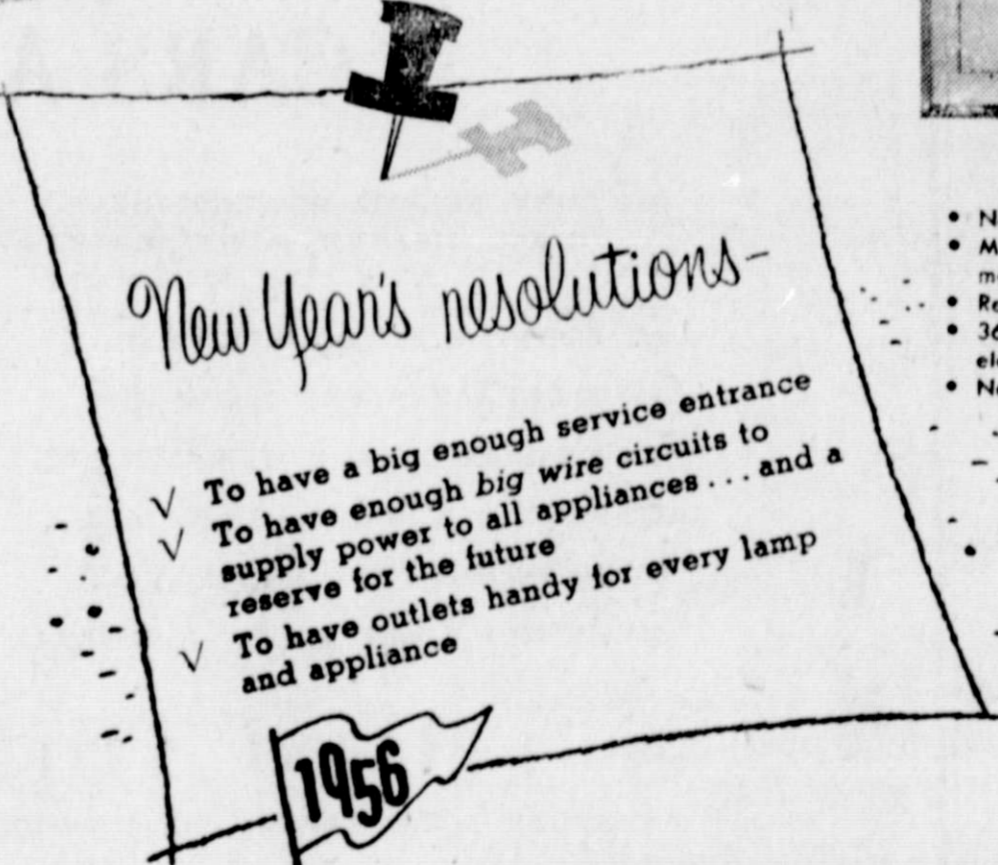

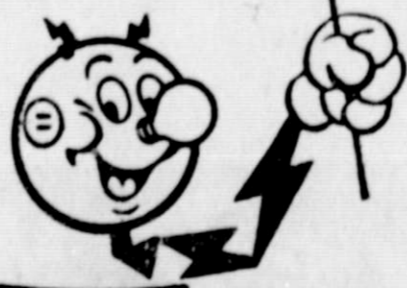

### Chevs Trounce Horicon 108-67, Take Undisputed Lead in Second Half

The Kewaskum Chevrolets ran wild over Horicon there Sunday night, drubbing them by 41 points, 108 to 67. The victory was the third in succession in the second half and the eighth in a row for the season for Kewaskum's first half champs. The Chevs took over undisputed first place as a result of West Bend losing to Beaver Dam.

This was the fourth time this season that Kewaskum has scored over 100 points in one game. Their high for the year is 110 scored against Campbellsport and they almost beat this record at Horicon. The team has scored 882 points in 10 games to date for an unbelievable average of 88.2 points per game. That is really burning the nets.

Horicon was a hot team in the first quarter and at the same time Kewaskum's machine couldn't get into high gear. Horicon took an early lead but the Chevs had enough to gain a 24-24 tie when the period ended. The difference in the teams began to show in the second stanza, in which Kewaskum moved into a 49-39 advantage. The boys swished in 26 points in the third quarter and held Horicon to 10. This made it 75-49. Manager "Cisco" Backhaus used all his players in the final period but his steam roller still ran wild, tallying 33 points to the losers 18.

John Tessar, who has really found himself of late, again was the scoring star of the contest. Although he was closely guarded and received a little rough treatment, the best Horicon could do was hold him to 30 points. Don Meisenheimer had his hook shot working to perfection and he dropped in 18 points, the same number scored by always reliable Augie Bilgo. Dick Edwards was next best scorer with 11 points. Giant George Hanrahan, who has been out the past few weeks with an injury, broke into the lineup again Sunday. Although a little rusty he showed his skill of old by dropping in three neat buckets in the short time he played.

Top point man for Horicon was forward Rehse, a little guy who found the nets for 15 points. Guard Lange was next in line with 13.

This Sunday Kewaskum again plays away from home when they invade Rosendale for an afternoon game. The Dalers are second last in the standings but usually prove troublesome. The Chevs are a little

worried about this tilt as Rosendale is no pushover on their home court. Remember, game time is 2:30 p. m. And don't forget the big one here a week from Sunday night, Feb. 5, when the strong Hartford team comes to town with its stars.
