Second Farm Home Damaged By Fire

Another farm home, this time in the town of Kewaskum, was damaged by fire on Tuesday morning. It was on the William F. "Billy" Schaefer farm located several miles southeast of the village. The home is occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Ervin "Chesty" Ramthun and family. Last week Tuesday the Chester Dombrowski farm home in the town of Auburn was damaged in a similar blaze.

Firemen were summoned to the scene shortly before 10 a. m. after fire started in the wall around a stove pipe running through it. The blaze was in the kitchen part on the west side of the house. When firemen arrived smoke was pouring from the roof and walls. The smoke ejector was put to use and holes were chopped in the roof to allow the smoke to escape and get at the source of the flames.

Fortunately the home was insulated and this kept the blaze from spreading through the walls. After much of the smoke was removed the fire was extinguished in a short time. A hole was burned in the west wall of the building next to the chimney, the roof was damaged, and two rooms were damaged from the water and smoke. Firemen used smoke masks at first to enter the house.

Shortly after the firemen returned to the fire station and while some of them were still in the building getting the equipment in shape for another run, the siren sounded again and the department was called back to the Schaefer farm. A minor blaze was discovered in a small attic part above the kitchen and the firemen made a repeat run over the icy roads. Ramthun had the blaze out when they arrived but firemen doused the area to make sure the flames wouldn't break out anew. It was after 12 noon when the equipment returned the second time.

BULK MILK COOLING MEETING FEB. 16

Since bulk cooling has been about as potent a subject in these parts as farm prices, one of the adult farmer meetings will be devoted to a good round table discussion. To head the discussion will be Carl Neitzke, University of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture engineer and Charlie Geiger and Walter Van Veen of the Heinemann Dairy plant in Kewaskum.

Also two bulk tank truckers and a couple of bulk tank producers will give their experiences and opinions. A bulk tank manufacturer will also be contacted.

This should be interesting, as quite a few farmers have asked me to have a program on bulk cooling with the aid of a few people connected directly in the field.

All farmers, young and adult, and other people interested in bulk cooling are invited to attend the meeting at the high school on Feb. 16, at 8 p. m.

I'll have a complete program outlined in next week's article.

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Indians Surprised By Brandon, Beat Dalers

Underdogs upset the leaders in Tri-County conference basketball play the past week. The Kewaskum Indians were surprised at Brandon Friday night when they were nosed out by a 49-46 score. The same evening Campbellsport was upset by Hustisford, throwing the championship race into a three-way tie. Brandon's win over the Indians gave them a tie for first place with Kewaskum and Campbellsport, each of whom won 3 and lost 2.

Then on Tuesday night Brandon was upset by Lomira, dropping them back to third place, as a result of Kewaskum and Campbellsport both winning and regaining their two-way tie for the lead. The Indians shaded a stubborn Rosendale five, 66-62, in a close one here while the Bells were defeating North Fondy.

Brandon trailed Kewaskum for most of the contest Friday but pulled the win by three points out of the fire in the closing minutes. Both of the Indians' setbacks this season occurred when their opponents rallied from behind to win the last seconds. Kewaskum led by an 18-12 margin at the quarter and had a slim 23-21 advantage at half-time. The Indians scored 14 points to the Red Men's 13 in the third period to gain another point but the real difference came in the final period when the Brandonites outscored the locals, 15-9. Jon Molien led Brandon's scoring with 19 points and De Boer was runnerup with 14. Stenman was tops for the Indians with 14 and Peterson rack-

ed up 13.

Kewaskum's 63-62 victory over Rosendale on the home floor Tuesday was a real barn-burner. The Indians were out in front all the way but were outscored in the second half by the Dalers. Each team netted 19 points in the first quarter. The winners scored the same number in the second stanza while holding Rosendale to 14, making it 38-33 at halftime. Kewaskum outpointed the Dalers again in the third quarter, 12-10, which made it 50-43 starting the last chapter. Then Rosendale bested the Indians 17-14 to bring the final count to 66-62. Peterson was the leading scorer with 20 points for the winners, while Mertzig hit for 15 and Stenman 14. Morgan was the big gun for Rosendale with 18 points, and Mossberg added 14.

On Friday evening of this week the Indians play at Oakfield against the league's tail enders.

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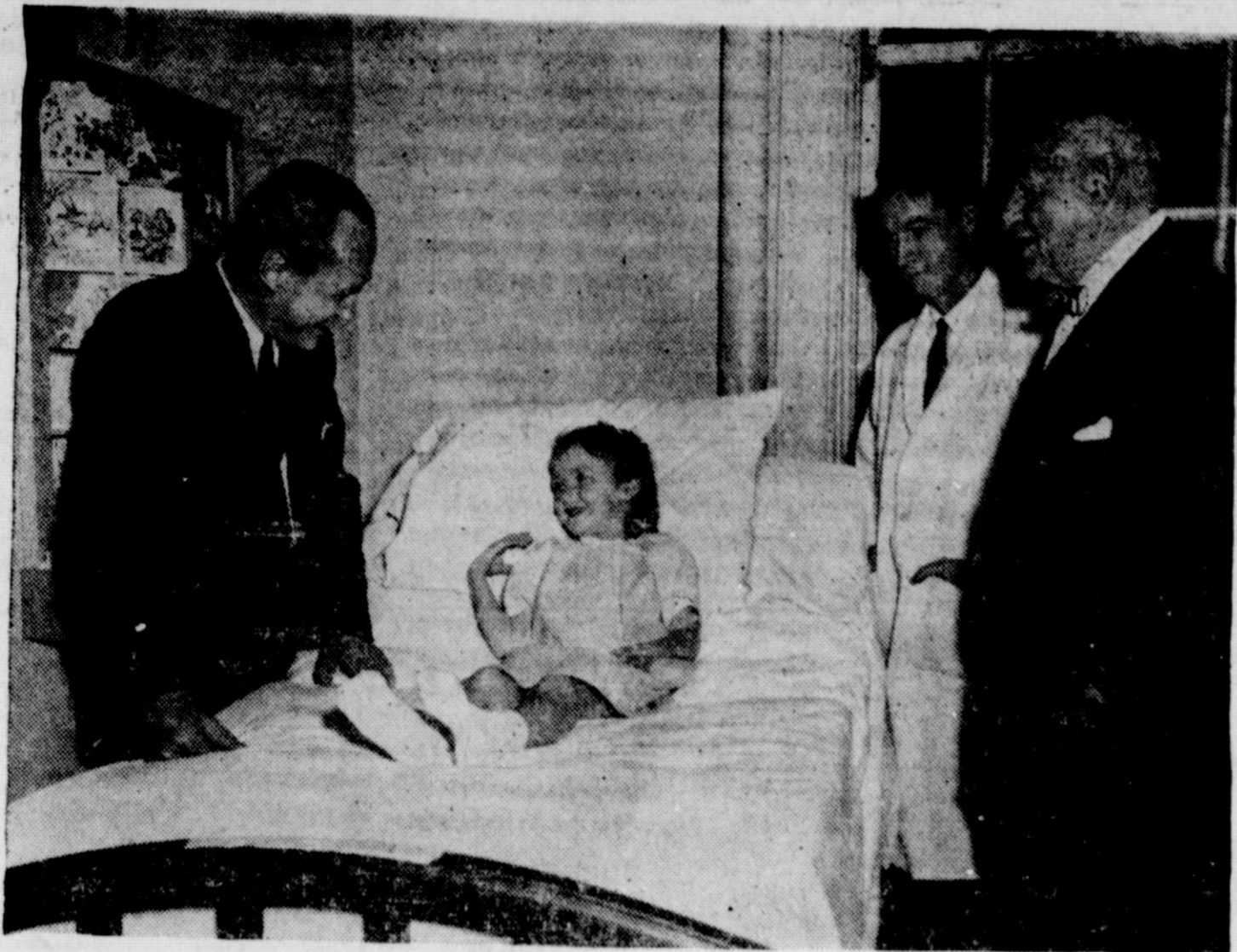

Dr. Edwards Chairman of Heart Fund Appeal

ADVISES OVERWEIGHT ONE OF CHIEF CAUSES OF HEART DISEASE

Men who are "nudging 40" should have yearly checkups and watch diets. That is the information passed on from the Wisconsin Heart association to residents of Kewaskum by R. G. Edwards, M. D., chairman, who will conduct a letter appeal campaign here for the association in February.

Reason for the advice: during the last 20 years the curve for heart disease in men has been swinging upward and many experts believe that diet accounts for this trend. Heart and circulatory diseases are currently the cause in two of every three deaths in men over 40.

Women have weight problems too, but as a group they are much more careful about what they eat. In the nation as a whole, it is estimated that 25 to 30 percent of the adults are overweight. That would mean there are upwards of 40 million people carrying around excess pounds.

A man of 50 in good health and of average weight has a good chance of living to age 70, according to the Heart association. However, if in the next year or two he adds 25 pounds, he has cut five years off his life.

It might be said that many women are making widows of themselves by just overfeeding their husbands!

The best way that a woman can keep from being widowed is to curb the urge to overset the table and show off her cooking talent. If her husband is susceptible to cake, pie

and cookies, she can help him on his weight control project by keeping these and other calorie-laden foods out of sight.

A man or woman can lose about one pound a week if he or she will cut only 500 calories a day from their present diet and take a little mild exercise regularly. Snacks should be avoided if a trimmer figure is desired. Only ten potato chips, for instance, are loaded with 108 calories.

But if calorie intake is to be chopped down, one should remember that a good breakfast is important. It is better to cut the 500 calories from the noon and evening meals, and snacks, rather than skimping on breakfast, the Heart association says.

Just by by-passing only one slice of bread and butter, one level tablespoon of sugar, a small danish pastry and a dish of icecream, 500 calories can be eliminated.

Town Wayne Farmers Form Watershed Group

Farmers in the town of Wayne have indicated a real interest in expanding conservation of soil, forests and wildlife in their area. Interest is such that a group of these farmers are working together to form a watershed. A watershed is the area drained by a given stream of water.

In the Kohlsville creek area about 66 farms are affected. These farms are all drained by the Kohlsville creek. A close look at the farms in the Kohlsville creek area show definite signs of erosion taking place on the upland soils. A certain amount of red color is showing on the upper slopes. This red color means loss of topsoil and

organic matter which makes it necessary to farm the less productive subsoil.

Likewise, on the flat areas next to the creek are areas showing tremendous amounts of deposition which means the soil has been accumulating for years and now is several feet deep.

Recognizing these signs of erosion is prompting these farmers to want to do something about it. In the spring, tours on the lowland will be conducted for the groups to inspect the damage done. They will also tour the farms now with soil conservation plans and wildlife areas now planted to see the effect of these areas on the overall conservation plan.

The first of a series of Farm Bureau leaders' conferences was held at Roth's hall, Slinger, on Jan. 17. Dave Guse, regional fieldman, Farmco Service, was moderator instructor.

The main points brought out at the meeting were that the farmers needed a better income and that Farm Bureau should speak for farmers.

Elmer Mittag, town of German-town representative, stated that not big business, not labor, and certainly not the politician should speak for the farmers but the farmers themselves through their own organization, Farm Bureau. Because the farmers know their problems better than anyone else.

The federal government was criticized by John Youngbauer, a representative from the town of Farmington, because of the importation of surplus items like butter and pork from other countries when there is a surplus of this commodity in this country. This he said is certainly a cause for lower farm prices.

Frederick Schroeder, a representative from the town of Trenton, stated that the farmers would have a better income if there weren't too many restrictions placed on the farmers. He said that he believes in selling an excellent product and good care in preparing a product for the consumer but that the health department goes overboard on the regulations and restrictions, so it costs the farmer too much money to produce the product.

There was discussion of the land bank program. Most farmers attending the meeting agreed that it would not affect Wisconsin farm income too much, one way or another.

Art Watry, town of West Bend and Tom Wiedmeyer, town of Trenton, praised the National Farm Bureau for taking a stand on elimination of the federal gas tax on gasoline used off the highway.

The meeting was adjourned until the last week in February.
