Kewaskum Civil Defense Group In Second Meeting

BATTAGLIA ACCEPTS HOUSING, FEEDING COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN; PLAN AUX. POLICE, FIRE DEPT. OPERATING UNITS

The second meeting of the Kewaskum Civil Defense organization was held Tuesday, Jan. 31. The meeting was called to order by Marvin Martin, Civil Defense director.

Robert Kroneke from Rosenheimer Malt and Grain reported that the company has two auxiliary power units which are in operating condition and are capable of generating considerable power should they be needed in an emergency.

John Battaglia accepted the chairmanship of the Housing and Feeding committee. John is to set up an organization and records showing the number of people who could be housed and fed, with the water and cooking facilities available at the different locations. These locations were named as possible housing areas and the name of the person to be contacted regarding the facilities is also listed.

Holy Trinity church, John Battaglia; Peace church, Clifford Rose; St. Lucas church, August Bartelt; Kewaskum Community Grade school, Clifford Stautz; Kewaskum Community High school, Eugene La Marche; Holy Trinity Grade school, John Battaglia; Woodman hall, Lloyd Teeslink; American Legion house, Al Muckerheide; Kewaskum Mutual Insurance Company, Ted Schmidt; Heinemann Creameries, Inc., Morrie Hammer; Opera House, Walter Dei; Regal Ware, Inc., G. Walz.

Marvin Martin suggested that Battaglia could contact Miss Jaehning, executive secretary of the West Bend Chapter of the American Red Cross for additional information on emergency housing and feeding. It was also suggested that he contact the Milwaukee Restaurant Operators association since they have held special conferences and instruction courses on this subject.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl is in charge of the protection division of the Civil Defense organization. He reported that he is going to try to organize a class of ten men to be trained as auxiliary police officers. It is hoped that this will be the first of several classes. He pointed out that the auxiliary officers should be over the armed forces age limit since anyone under that limit would undoubtedly be drafted in a case of national emergency. No men from the fire department or other Civil Defense groups should be included since they will not be available in case of emergency.

Chief Pledl also advised the group that some arrangements should be made for a temporary jail. In the case of emergency, there would undoubtedly be some persons who would get out of hand and it would be impossible to deliver each one to the county jail in West Bend. It was suggested that he inspect the facilities at Regal Ware, Inc. to determine the availability of a temporary confinement area in one of their buildings.

The fire department should take steps to break their facilities down into operating units that can be dispatched to different sections of the community and effectively combat fires. The whole department cannot be dispatched to one fire. Steps should be taken to instruct the men in the handling of different types of fires and burning materials.

Mrs. Roland Pledl has accepted the chairmanship of the first aid department of the group. It will be necessary to have an emergency aid station available with convenient water, toilets and kitchen facilities. The first aid group should have a list of places where they can immediately pick up cots, blankets and other bedding as well as medical supplies.

Marvin Martin pointed out that ten new persons have signed up for the first aid instruction class he is teaching.

The director advised the group that if an effective Civil Defense organization is to be set up the help of many people would be needed. He asked that the committees work on the different assignments during the next six weeks or two months and be prepared to report on the progress they made at the next meeting.

G. Walz has been appointed permanent secretary for the organization.

No date was set for the next meeting; however, the group will be called together when information is received from the state Civil Defense department or some other important matter presents itself.

Klein Gets One Year Probation In Death Case

SENTENCED ON MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE IN OTTO RAMTHUN DEATH FOLLOWING TAVERN ALTERCATION

After he pleaded "nolo contendere" (no contest) to a fourth degree manslaughter charge in Washington county court Monday, Fred Klein, Jr., 39, of Route 1, Kewaskum, was sentenced to a year's probation to the Washington County Welfare department probation board.

Klein's plea was entered as a result of the death of Otto Ramthun, 42, of Kewaskum on Sept. 30, 1954 following a tavern altercation between Otto Ramthun, his brother, Ervin, and Klein. Ramthun was fatally injured when he either fell or was knocked down in front of a local tavern in Kewaskum and apparently struck his head on the pavement, according to authorities.

The state was represented by District Attorney Leroy Goring of Washington county. Attorney K. William Haebig of Kewaskum represented the defendant. In sentencing Klein Judge William C. O'Connell stipulated that Klein is not to frequent any taverns during the probation period and is to defray all court costs of the action.

Otto Ramthun operated farms and a trucking business and was also a cattle dealer in the Kewaskum area. He is survived by his wife, three children, his mother, four brothers and three sisters.

Indians Rout Oakfield, 64-36; Play for Title

The Kewaskum High school steamroller flattened last place Oakfield there last Friday night by a one-sided 64-36 score. Campbellsport bested Lomira the same evening to remain in a first place deadlock with the Indians. In an upset Friday North Fondy beat third place Brandon to knock them out of the championship running.

Kewaskum had an easy time at Oakfield as Coaches Ernie Mitchell and Walt Bade used every player on the squad (11) to keep the score down. The Indians waited to a 14-5 lead in the first quarter and outscored the Oaks even worse, 23-5, in the second period to take a lopsided 27-10 advantage at half-time. Kewaskum continued to pour it on in the next stanza but with some substitutes in the game they only outscored Oakfield by four points, 12-8. This made the count 49-18. Second and third stringers played the final quarter and they were outpointed 18-15 to make the final score 64-36.

The Kewaskum scoring was pretty evenly divided with Mertzig copping top honors with 14 points. Stenman and Peterson each chipped in 12 and Yahr added 10. Shady was high for Oakfield with 11 followed by Redman with 10.

The most crucial contest of the season takes place this Friday night at Campbellsport where the Indians play the Bells. This game

will break the first place deadlock and no doubt determine the conference championship. After Friday each team has only one game left against weaker opponents and the winner at Campbellsport this week should clinch the title. Next Tuesday the Indians play at Oostburg against the unbeaten leaders of the Kettle Moraine conference in a non-loop tilt. Oostburg is rated as one of the strongest teams in this section. 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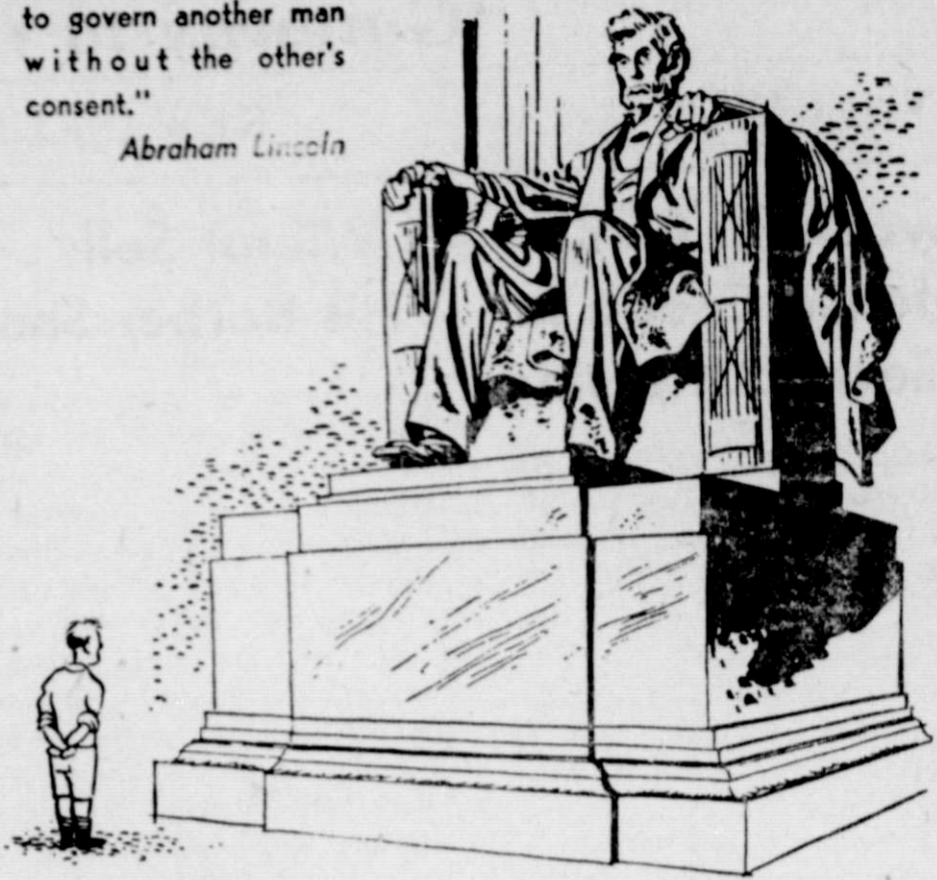

Annual Heart Fund Letter Appeal on During February

ASSOCIATION LISTS CARE OF MENTALLY ILL AS ONE OF TOP PROBLEMS

Care of the mentally ill—at the cost of billions in public money—was listed as one of the top problems of the states at the 1956 governor's conference in Chicago. This, according to the Wisconsin Heart association, helps point up the importance of medical research into the causes and cures of heart and blood vessel diseases.

To back this statement up the Heart association cites the fact that cerebral arteriosclerosis—hardening of the arteries to the brain—is the second leading cause of first admissions to state mental hospitals. The disease ranks just behind schizophrenia, with more than 60,000 patients in the various state hospitals.

Hardening of the arteries, along with hypertension and rheumatic heart disease, is responsible for 90 per cent of all heart trouble. It is also one of the major fields of research being carried on by heart specialists.

Though hardening of the arteries is a disease of old age, it is important says the Heart association, to avoid the popular misconception that heart disease in general is confined only to people in their twilight years.

In the last half generation the greater increase in heart disease mortality has been in white males between 35 and 65 than in those over 65. Added to this is the sobering knowledge that heart disease is the greatest crippler of children. It is estimated that there are now over 500,000 children in the country with rheumatic heart disease.

It is against rheumatic fever that the Heart association directs much of its energy. At the request of county medical societies, rheumatic fever "clinics on wheels" have visited 39 of the state's 72 counties.

Because the knowledge is at hand today to make rheumatic fever a rare disease, the Heart association has sought to educate both the public and the medical profession in recognizing its symptoms. This has

been done by conducting rheumatic fever institutes for nurses, display of exhibits in strategic places, movies, lectures and literature.

But as important as education and community services are in the fight against rheumatic and other heart diseases, the main emphasis is on research into causes and cures. For the period, July 1, 1955 to June 30, 1956, the Wisconsin Heart association has granted \$108,542.00 for 22 research projects at the two state medical schools, Marquette university and the University of Wisconsin.

The American Heart association, which receives 25 per cent of all money collected by Wisconsin Heart, spends half of that amount for research work, some of which is carried on in this state.

In order to obtain the necessary money to continue with research, physician and public education, and community services, the Wisconsin Heart association holds an annual heart fund drive during the month of February.

In Kewaskum a letter appeal drive is being conducted by R. G. Edwards, M. D., who is area heart chairman.

Carl Nietzsche agricultural engineer at the University of Wisconsin, will speak on the advantages and disadvantages of the two important types of cooler.

Mr. Engelke of Engelke Engineering, Inc., who is a member of the National AAA Sanitary Bulk Cooling Tank committee, will relate some of the standards bulk tanks should measure up to and briefly describe the construction of the tank and direct expansion types. Charles Geiger and Walter Van

Veen of the Heinemann Dairy plant in Kewaskum will also speak briefly about how bulk cooling has affected their plant and patrons. Two adult farmers and two bulk tank truckers have agreed to talk

on their opinions of bulk cooling and hauling.

The program is being conducted by the Vocational Agriculture department and all farmers in the area are invited to attend.



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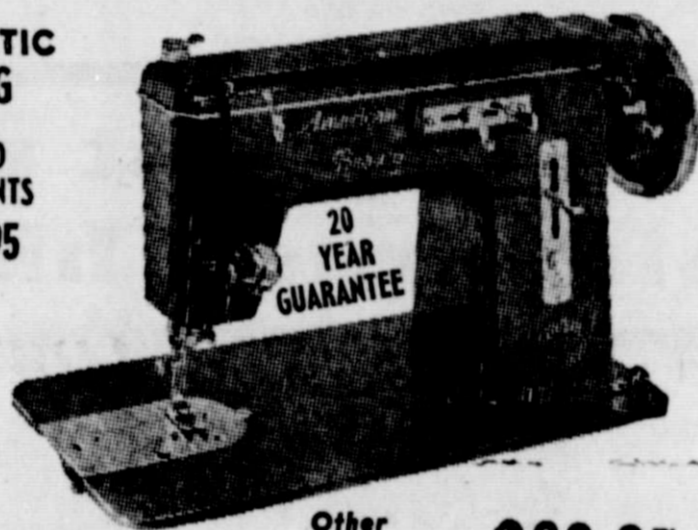

Hearing Conservation Program Being Held In Schools of County

MRS. BRUCE KOTH CHAIRMAN FOR KEWASKUM AREA. SPECIAL MEETING HELD HERE TUESDAY

The Hearing Conservation program for Washington county will be held during the month of February. This program is under the direction of the State Department of Public Instruction. It is carried out locally through the cooperative planning of school and health personnel.

The major objective of a hearing conservation program is the early discovery of hearing problems in children in order that serious handicaps may be prevented.

The program is carried out in four phases:

1. Trained lay volunteers will screen all school children—grades one through eight and the eleventh grade of all high schools—with an audiometric test. This testing will be done within the schools.
2. The children who have failed the initial test will be re-checked by hearing consultants from the State Department of Public Instruction at special centers.
3. Children who are found to have serious hearing problems will be examined by an ear specialist approved by the County Medical society at a special clinic.
4. The public health nurses will

work with the physicians, families and schools in an effort to meet the needs of each child who has a hearing problem.

Special meetings were held on Feb. 7 and 8 at Kewaskum, West Bend, Goldendale and Hartford to instruct the volunteers in the use of the audiometer. The Kewaskum meeting was held Tuesday morning in the Holy Trinity church hall. Testing began in various parts of the county immediately following these meetings and the tests in schools of the Kewaskum area were completed this week.

A large group of women throughout the county have volunteered their services to this program. In the city of West Bend the various school organizations have recruited the workers. Area chairmen of the volunteers in the county are as follows:

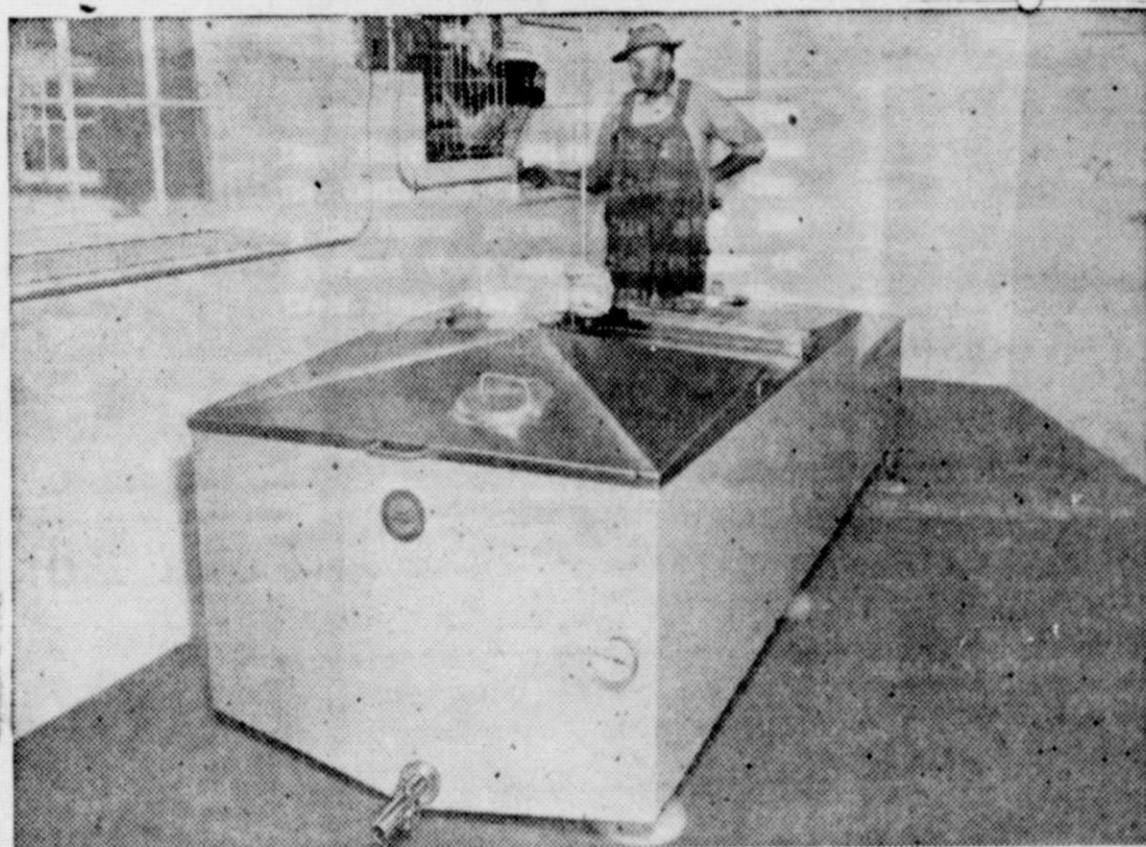

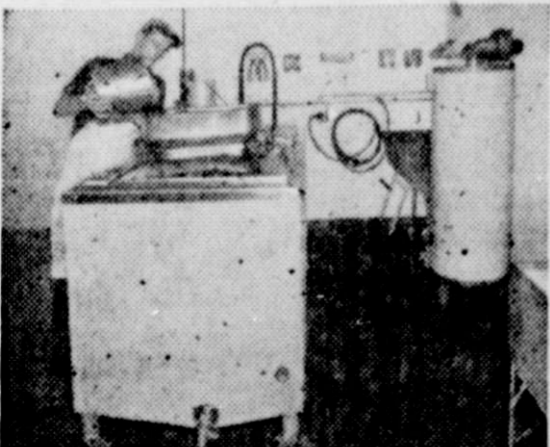


