# Chevs Beat Mayville in Playoff Indians Win Sub-District Tilt To Cop Lakes Championship Tournament, Lose In District

# Win Both Halves For Clear Title In

The Kewaskum Chevrolets repeated as Land o' Lakes northern division basketball league champions by nosing out Mayville Sunday night, 78-76, in a second half playoff game at Campbellsport, The Chevs also won the undisputed crown last year.

After copping first half honors this season, Kewaskum was unbeaten in the second half until upset by West Bend in the final tilt of the campaign. This dropped the team into a tie for first place with Mayville and forced them into a playoff for the second half title. Sunday night's victory on a neutral floor gave the Chevs the crown in both halves and grand championship. Had Mayville won, they would have taken the second half and another best two out of three series would have been necessita-

The Chevrolets had a 6-1 record in both halves. Sunday's playoff win gives them an overall season record of 13 games won and only 2 lost. This Sunday at Mayville, Beaver Dam and Mayville will clash in a game to decide the second place trophy for the season, A game between the northern division Lakes all-stars and the champion Kewaskum Chevs has been scheduled to be played at Beaver Dam the following week end, More details will be announced next

Sunday's game was a typical Mayville-Kewaskum battle. Every tilt between these teams this season was very close. The Chevs were ahead all through the game but seldomly by more than a few points. Their biggest lead was by 9 points at one stage in the tussle, At the end of the quarter Kewaskum led by 5 points, 21-16, and by halftime Mayville had closed the gap to 1 point, 37-36. By the end of the third period the Chevs had regained their 5-point advantage, 60-55, but their opponents came within 2 points of tying it up at the end of

Luckily Augie Bilgo had one of his best nights and sparked the Kewaskum attack on offense and defense. He took scoring honors by pouring 25 points through the hoops, Frank Krueger was next best with 18 and league leading scorer John Tessar was "held" to 13 by the crack Mayville guards. Van Fleet stood out for the losers with 22 points and was great on defense. Genzmer added 15 and Wild 13.

The Kewaskum High school Indians, Tri-County conference champions, gained more honors by winning the W.I.A.A. sub-district tournament at Campbellsport last eral home, Fond du Lac, and burial Thursday night.
