Three West Bend Youths Arrested For Larceny Here

Three West Bend youths were fined \$100 and costs each or given the alternative of spending 30 days in jail by Justice Herbert Matenaer in justice court Monday for attempted larceny of parts from an auto in Kewaskum at 1:15 a. m. Sunday.

The youths are John Vernon Clark, 21, and Bernard Mathew Klumppan, 19, both of R. 3, West Bend, and Arthur LeRoy Norton, 18, R. 5, West Bend. Clark and Norton both have previous police records according to Chief of Police Roland Pledl, who made the arrest with County Traffic Officer David Backhaus of Kewaskum. The trio was arrested in a 1951 Mercury coach, with no license plates, driven by Clark.

The youths were removing parts from an auto owned by Arlett Kaiser, Kewaskum. His car was parked on Fond du Lac ave. in front of the E. Bowe building. Kaiser, who lives in one of the upstairs apartments in the building, heard the commotion and saw the trio removing parts from his auto. He dashed downstairs and attempted to stop them but the youths jumped in their car and took off. Kaiser hung onto the outside of the car door with one arm and grabbed the driver's hair with the other hand in an effort to stop him. He clung to the car all the way to Rahn's service station at the north village limits before he got the driver to stop, minus much hair.

In the meantime Cal Bowe, who also resides in one of the apartments in the same building, jumped into his car and followed the other vehicle. Together with Kaiser he brought the youths back to the scene of the attempted theft and called police. When the officers arrived, with quite a few spectators gathered at the scene, they searched the trio for weapons and after questioning removed them to the county jail.

FORMER GREEN BAY BACK BOB FORTE TO APPEAR AT ANNUAL BANQUET MONDAY. SHOW BRAVES FILM

Bob Forte, a recent great defensive back of the Green Bay Packers, and now associated with the Miller Brewing company in the sports promotion department, will be the main speaker at the second annual Kiwanis father-son night on Monday, March 5, at the Republican Hotel. The 1955 Braves Story film will also be shown.

Forte earned three letters in football, three in baseball and one in basketball at the University of Arkansas from 1939 to 1942. He was captain of the football and

baseball teams in his senior year and made the all-conference team in 1941 and 1942. Forte was named to several All-American teams in 1942 and was selected to play in the College All-Star game in 1943 but was in the army and could not get his release to play.

After three years in the service, during which he served in the European Theater with Patton's Third Army as a 1st lieutenant, Forte joined the Packers in 1946 and played with them for five years. Immediately after the 1950 season he was recalled to active duty where he spent 15 months—six of them in the Far East. He rejoined the Packers in 1952 and was team captain in 1952 and 53.

Forte retired from pro football after the 1953 season and became a member of the Miller Brewing company's sports promotion department. He was considered one of the most outstanding defensive backs in the National league. Bob is now a member of the Miller High Life broadcasting team and assists in all of the Packer broadcasts and also some Milwaukee Braves games.

Mr. Harter was born in the town of Auburn Dec. 16, 1876, and spent most of his life farming in that township on the farm now occupied by his son-in-law and daughter. His marriage to the former Margaret Schiltz took place May 13, 1919, at St. Michaels. The couple retired from the farm and moved to their present home in the village seven years ago. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Harter.

Catholic Charities Drive Opens in Local Parishes on Sunday

HOLY TRINITY QUOTA \$1,500; COUNTY CAPTAINS LISTED FOR ANNUAL APPEAL

Pastors of the 272 parishes comprising the Archdiocese of Milwaukee have appointed their parish captains in the 1956 Catholic Charities and Seminary Fund campaign. The parish captains act in a supervisory capacity under the pastors in the drive for \$750,000, which begins on March 11 and ends on March 25.

Because of many changes in the services for Holy Week this year and much extra work during the last days of Lent, Holy Trinity parish in Kewaskum and St. Bridget's mission at St. Bridget's will begin their drive a week earlier this Sunday, March 4. Donations and pledges will be accepted after the masses Sunday and parishioners who do not appear will be contacted personally.

The Holy Trinity quota is again \$1,500, the same as last year, when the parish went far over the top by collecting \$2,017.30. The St. Bridget's quota is again \$500. That parish also exceeded its quota last year by collecting \$586.00. To meet the quotas the parishes will have to average donations of \$6.00 from each adult.

The appointed captain for the drive at Holy Trinity church is Ralph Rimmel and at St. Bridget's Harold Westerman.

By the end of the third period the Chevs had regained their 5-point advantage, 60-55, but their opponents came within 2 points of tying it up at the end of the game.

Luckily Augie Bilgo had one of his best nights and sparked the Kewaskum attack on offense and defense. He took scoring honors by pouring 25 points through the hoops. Frank Krueger was next best with 18 and league leading scorer John Tessar was "held" to 13 by the crack Mayville guards. Van Fleet stood out for the losers with 22 points and was great on defense. Genzmer added 15 and Wild 13.

Indians Win Sub-District Tournament, Lose In District Finals to Hortonville High

Beat Lomira For Honors But Lose At Winneconne

The Kewaskum High school Indians, Tri-County conference champions, gained more honors by winning the W.I.A.A. sub-district tournament at Campbellsport last Thursday night. The Indians defeated Lomira, 57-42, in the sub-district finals to advance to the district finals at Winneconne Saturday night. There they were dropped from further state tourney competition by losing to a good Hortonville team, 61-46, giving Hortonville the district title and Kewaskum placing second.

Kewaskum advanced to the sub-district finals by beating Campbellsport in the meet opener Tuesday. The same night Lomira won over Oakfield. The Indians then went on to defeat Lomira in the finals while the Bells were wining over Oakfield for consolation honors. The win gave the Indians the right to play for the district championship at Winneconne, where the Bells also lost to Rosendale, 78-64, for third place in the first game Saturday night. Hortonville downed Winneconne, 61-54, in the sub-district finals at Winneconne to reach the district finals.

Hortonville was presented with the first place trophy and award, Kewaskum the second place award and Rosendale the consolation. Winning Hortonville advanced to sectional competition at Berlin where they were scheduled to meet Randolph. The championship finals were broadcast over both radio stations KFIZ, Fond du Lac, and WBAY, Green Bay. Kewaskum had a very large following of fans for each of its tourney games.

At Winneconne the Indians were shooting for their second district championship in succession and fourth since 1944. They took the crown in 1946, 1949 and 1955. They were runners-up in 1944, 1948, 1952 and 1956.

In the sub-district championship tilt at Campbellsport Thursday Lomira proved more stubborn than was expected by the Indians. At one time in the contest, the Lions came to within seven points of catching up with the Indians with less than five minutes to play. But

Kewaskum cut the rally short and poured on the steam to finish up with a 15-point margin.

Tom Peterson, leading conference scorer, led Kewaskum with 20 points. Bob Stenman added 18 points. High scorer for Lomira was Ken Reimer with 15 points, followed by R. Iskin with 12. The Indians led all through the game and outscored the Lions in every period but the third. At halftime Kewaskum was on top, 30-19.

Playing on a larger, strange floor at Winneconne, Kewaskum couldn't find the range in the opening quarter of the championship game against Hortonville. Their attempts fell short and they missed many free throws before finally hitting their stride late in the half. This gave Hortonville, which had already played two tournament games on the floor, an early lead which the Indians couldn't overcome.

Hortonville went ahead, 16-9, in the first quarter and led, 36-22, at the intermission. The Indians played them on even terms in the second half, but it was too late then. The Indians cut Hortonville's lead to 39-28 at the end of the third quarter by outscoring them in that period but that was as close as they could get.

Peterson and Stenman again carried the brunt of the scoring with 18 points apiece for the losers. Magadanz, giant beanpole forward, topped the Hortonville point production with 23.
