Only 62 Ballots Cast in Village, 21 in Township

FAIRCHILD AND DIETERICH NOMINATED AS CANDIDATES FOR STATE SUPREME COURT

One of the smallest votes on record in recent years was cast in the village Tuesday in the state judicial primary election. Only 62 persons cast their ballots, including members of the election board.

With only one ballot and three candidates for the same office being voted on to eliminate one for the spring election April 3, there was a general lack of interest in Tuesday's election. Inclement weather which included thunder, fog, rain and snow also helped keep the vote down.

Thomas E. Fairchild, Milwaukee attorney and former state attorney general and U. S. district attorney, and Atty. William H. Dieterich of Hartford were nominated in the state-wide judicial primary. Clair L. Finch, Madison, was eliminated from the race.

Fairchild and Dieterich also received the nomination in Washington county, where Fairchild polled 849 votes, Dieterich 444 and Finch received 136 to finish poor third. The vote was very light throughout the county and state. Only 1,450 voted in the county.

In the village Fairchild received 34 votes as compared to 20 for Dieterich and 8 for Finch.

Only 21 votes were cast in the town of Kewaskum for another low. There Fairchild polled 17 votes, Dieterich 4 and Finch 0.

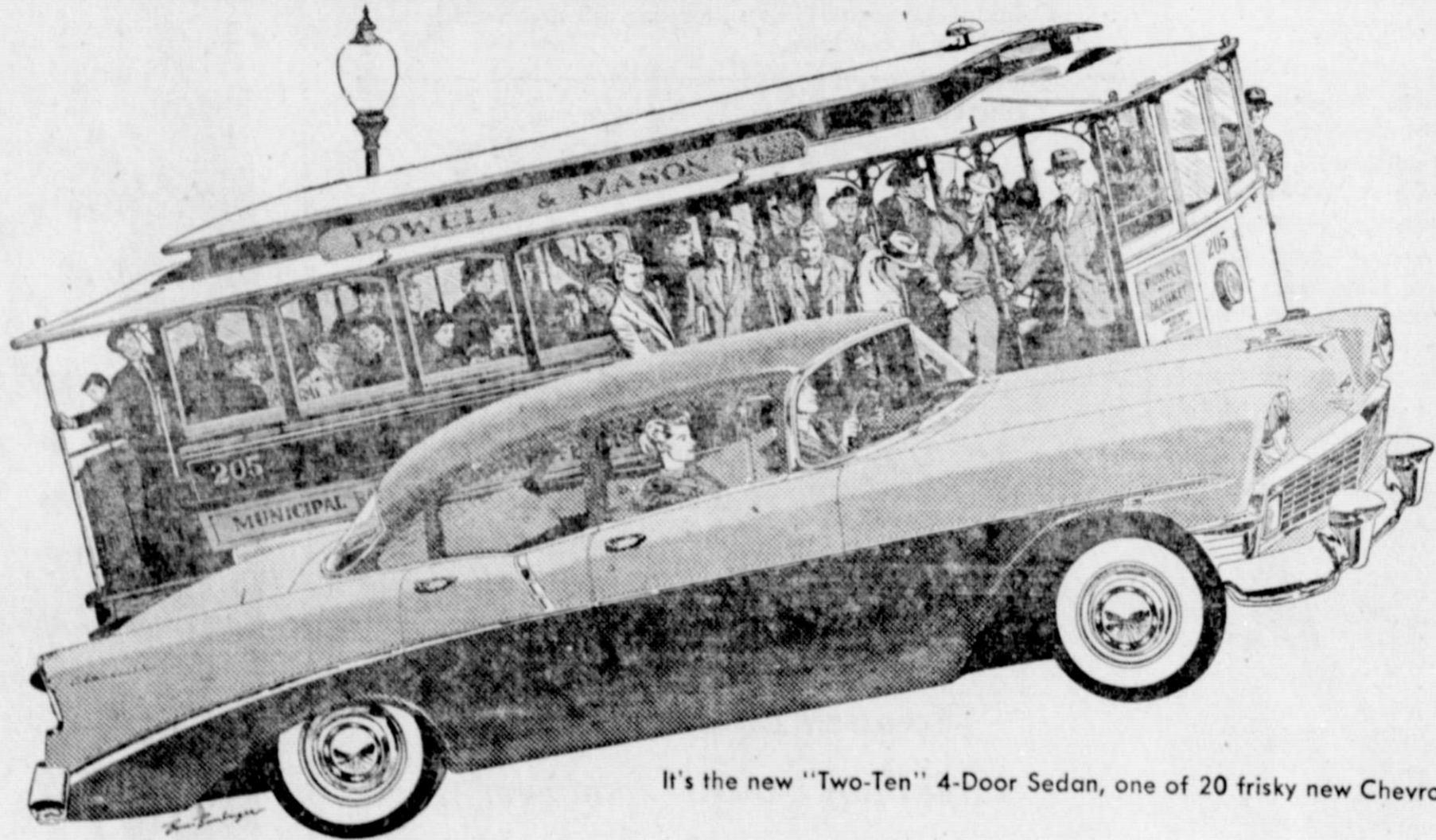

Civil Defense Notes

Editor's Note—This is the first of a series of brief articles on civil defense from Marvin A. Martin, director of the Kewaskum Civil Defense organization, which the Statesman is publishing as a public service. More articles will be published in succeeding issues.

FOUR WHEELS TO SURVIVAL

Your car can be "four wheels to survival" for you and your family in a civil defense emergency. How well your car serves this purpose depends on a few commonsense advance preparations—things which may spell the difference between life and death for you and your family.

Many civil defense actions, especially pre-attack evacuation, depend on your ability to move away from a probable area of danger. Properly used, your car can move you and as many others as can be comfortably seated many times as far as the strongest of you could go on foot. To do this:

Keep your car in the best possible mechanical condition.

Keep your tires properly inflated. Be sure the battery is always in tip-top shape.

Keep your gas tank more than half full at all times.

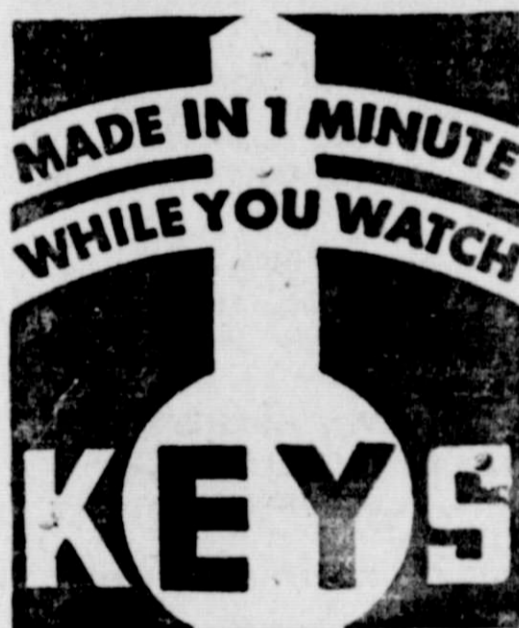

Kewaskum's Champs, John Tessar Cop Lakes Scoring, Other Honors

Final statistics in the Land o' Lakes basketball league, released by Director Carl Kuss of West Bend, reveal that John Tessar, star Kewaskum forward, copped individual scoring honors in the loop and the Kewaskum Chevrolets, league champions, had the best offensive record in the circuit. Kewaskum also had the highest team total with 110 points in one game. Beaver Dam was second with 107. Individual high scorers in a single game were Renzaglia, Hartford, 52; Miller, Beaver Dam, 46; Belling, Rosendale, 43, and Tessar, Kewaskum, 42.

Kewaskum placed two men on the Lakes All-Star team, namely Forward Tessar and Guard Augie Bilgo, another of the outstanding players and high scorers in the circuit. Genzmer and Miller (tied), Belling and Frank of West Bend round out the All-Star selection. The second team consists of Cloyd and R. Wrucke, forwards; Herman, center, and D. Wondra, Hagen and Renzaglia (tied), guards. Tennes, West Bend, Meyer, Beaver Dam, Stracka, Hartford, and Bleck, Campbellsport received honorable mention.

Mike Monahan of Fillmore's second half champions won individual scoring honors in the Land o' Rivers league with 330 points. Syl Hawig of Kewaskum ended up ninth with a total of 170 points. Hawig

was also named to the Rivers All-Star second team. Hustisford won first half honors and that team and Fillmore will playoff for the championship. The first game will be played at Hustisford Friday night.

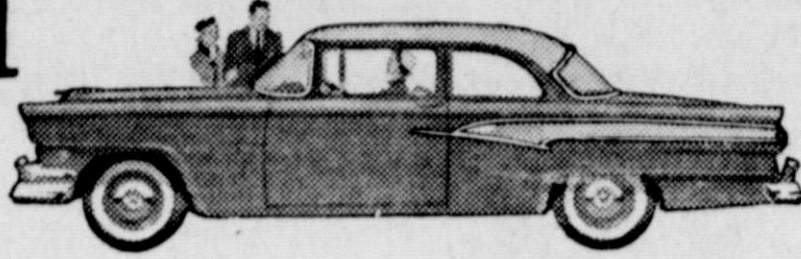

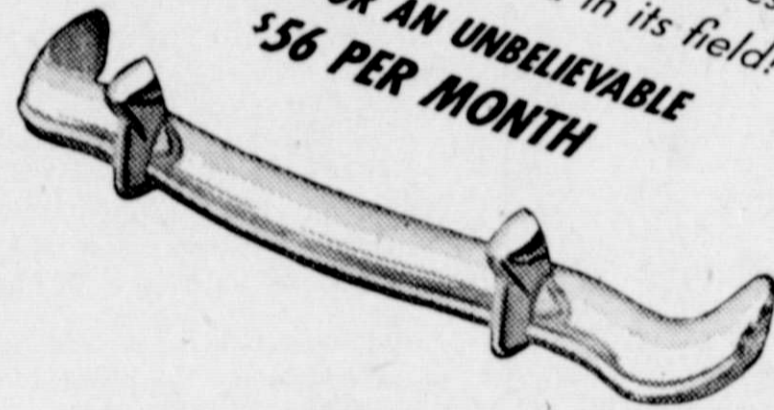
