FOUR WHEELS TO SURVIVAL





Individual high scorers in a single game were Renzaglia, Hartford, 52; Miller, Beaver Dam, 46; Belling, Rosendale, 43, and Tessar, Kewaskum, 42. Kewaskum placed two men on the Lakes All-Star team, namely Forward Tessar and Guard Augie Bilgo, another of the outstanding players and high scorers in the circuit. Genzmer and Miller (tied). 
