## Dimes Drive Here Cast Selected for Nets \$2293, Over **Double of Last Year**

FINAL RESULTS SHOW RE-CORD AMOUNT COLLECTED IN VERY SUCCESSFUL DRIVE IN VILLAGE

Wayland Tessar, village of Kewaskum chairman in the recent March of Dimes drive, reported this week that a total of \$2,293.10 was collected locally during the campaign. This total is a record high for the village and more than doubles the amount collected last year when \$995.31 was solicited.
