## Solicit Proposals for Local Post Office Quarters

Proposals are hereby solicited, to be received in the office of Post Office Inspector Perry McIntyre at Milwaukee, Wisconsin up to and including May 19, 1956, to furnish quarters suitable for post office purposes at Kewaskum, Wisconsin under a lease subject to the provisions of the standard form of lease used by the post office department, at a stated price per annum, including heat, light, power, toilet facilities, and plumbing, heating, and lighting fixtures, for a term of five or ten years from date of occupancy. Floor space of about 1600 square feet is desired.

Important considerations are a reasonably central location, good daylight, and accessibility to rear or side entrance for mails. General building requirements, equipment specifications, and form of proposal, together with information concerning the provisions of the lease, may be obtained from the postmaster or the inspector whose name and address are indicated above.

Diagram of the rooms offered, showing inside dimensions, offsets, doors, windows, etc., and any adjoining ground for light areas, driveways, or parking areas, must be submitted with the proposal. Proponents may also submit photographs of their property and its surroundings if they so desire.

The post office department reserves the right to negotiate further with proponents for better terms, to reject any or all proposals, and to readvertise for new proposals.

Proponents may be required to show whether the property offered is mortgaged and to furnish a concurring agreement by the mortgagee. Detailed information will be furnished by Perry McIntyre, Room 232, Federal Building, Milwaukee 1, Wis.

Appointment of the remaining precinct chairmen for the 1956 fund campaign of the West Bend chapter of the American Red Cross were announced Monday by Jos. F. Huber, West Bend, fund chairman for this year's drive now underway.

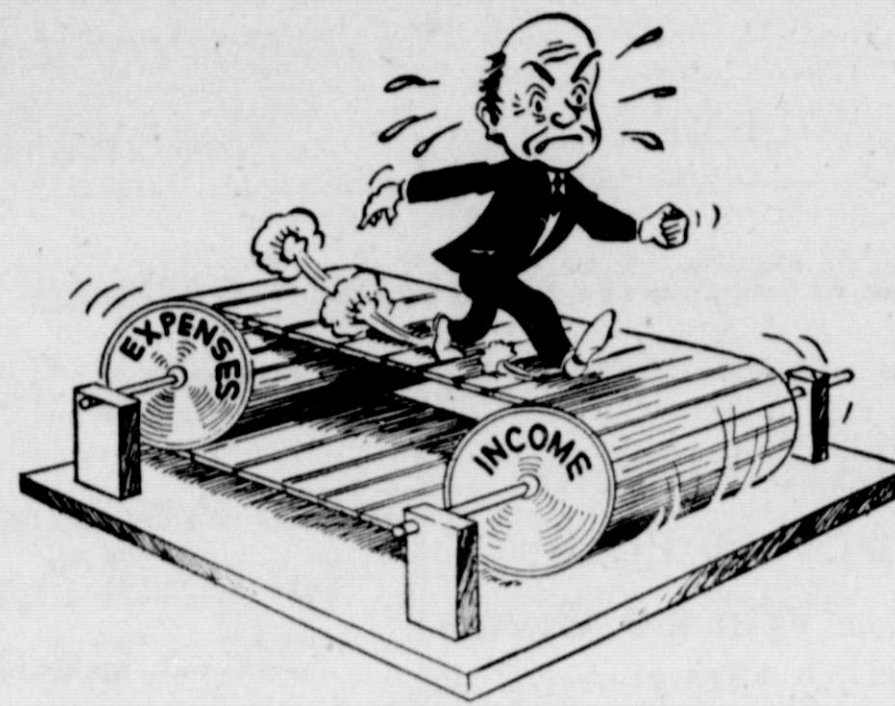

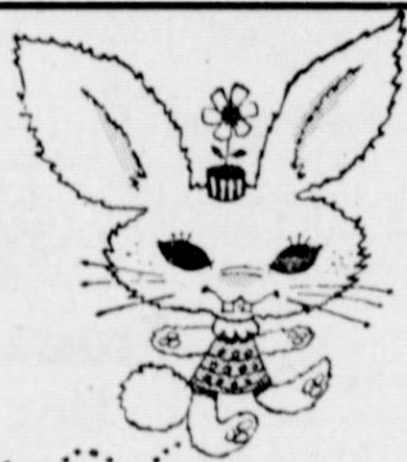

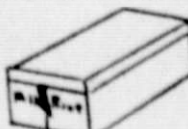

## Civil Defense Notes

### FOOD SUPPLIES FOR EMERGENCY FEEDING

It is the policy of the Federal Civil Defense Administration to encourage each family to maintain at all times for current use an average, normal three-day food supply on its pantry shelf. Current knowledge, especially concerning radioactive fallout, makes it necessary to enlarge this concept to a seven-day food supply, maintained in a sheltered area.

Following an enemy attack, it is assumed that in and around target areas public utilities, such as gas, electricity, telephone, water and sewage, would be inoperative. Persons for whom evacuation is not immediately feasible would probably have to depend, at least for the first few days, wholly upon their own food and resources for survival. Therefore, persons who must be evacuated should be equipped with at least a minimum of basic food and water supplies on which to subsist until other assistance is made available.

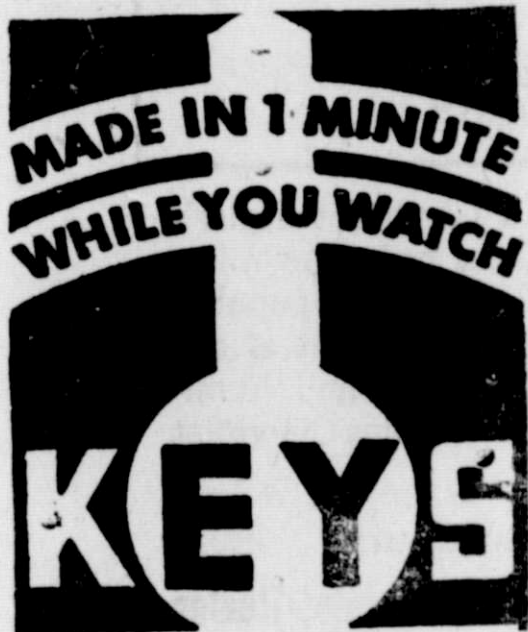
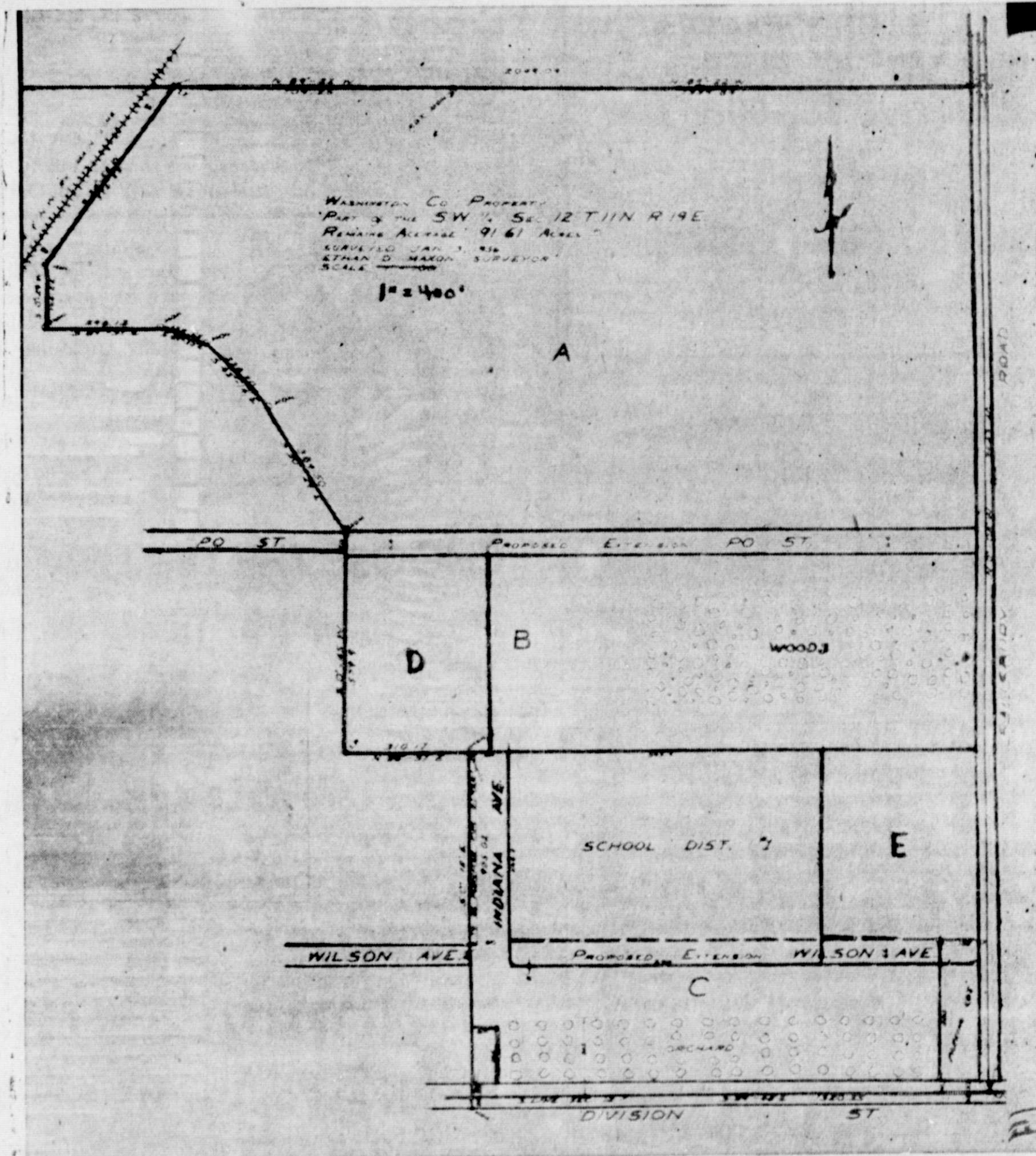

### Alice in Dairyland Princess Contest for 1956 Now Underway

The entry dates for this year's contest are from March 15 to April 15. Any Wisconsin girl who is 18 and has not reached her 25th birthday by March 15, 1956, unmarried, and a resident of Wisconsin for one year, is encouraged to enter. No photograph is needed with the entry blank.

The 1956 Alice in Dairyland Princess contest presents four opportunities for the girls who enter. They may become one of four Alice Princesses who will be selected from among the 26 regional winners competing in the state contest during June 1 and 2 in Eau Claire. They may be chosen as the 1956 Alice in Dairyland from the four Princesses at Dairy Day, August 22, at the Wisconsin State Fair to serve as a full-time state employee for one year.

One of the four Princesses will also become Wisconsin's candidate in the National Dairy Princess contest of the American Dairy association. She may be selected from among the Dairy Princesses of other states to go on to win the honor of being the American Princess.

The four Alice in Dairyland Princesses selected at Eau Claire will be employed by the State Department of Agriculture during the months of June, July and August to make appearances at dairy days, fairs, festivals and community celebrations. They will also do dairy product merchandising work throughout the state to assist local communities in their sponsorship of Wisconsin food product festivals and promotions especially June Dairy Month activities.

Wisconsin's now famous Alice in

Dairyland program is enjoying nationwide recognition as a part of the intensive marketing campaign carried on by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture.

The current Alice in Dairyland is Miss Barbara Brown, 20, of Independence. To date she has made over 400 appearances in Wisconsin and travelled extensively in other states promoting Wisconsin dairy products. Recently she made appearances in Little Rock, Ark., Holland, Mich., Washington, D. C., Baltimore, Md., Great Falls, Mont., Oklahoma City, Okla., and Amarillo, Texas.

As Alice, Barbara Brown has presented boxes of gift cheese to governors, mayors, baseball stars, the Vice President of the United States, congressional leaders, and other notable dignitaries. She has been hostess at many national conventions and fairs as well as being the state's hostess at the Wisconsin State Fair and reigning over the Alice in Dairyland building there. She has appeared hundreds of times on television and radio.

Every Alice contestant should have a desire to meet people, to travel, and to do her part in encouraging greater use of the many tasty and nutritious foods produced here in Wisconsin.

The new Alice need not be an experienced speaker. If she has enthusiasm, she will learn quickly to be Wisconsin's Goodwill Ambassador.

The contest this year is held on a regional basis with thirteen regional contests planned. These will be held in the following cities:

- District 1—Darlington; 2—Union Grove; 3—Westby; 4—Sauk City; 5—Mayville; 6—Mondovi; 7—Manawa; 8—Sturgeon Bay; 9—Woodville; 10—Rice Lake; 11—Medford; 12—Gillett; 13—Spooner.

The state contest will be held at Eau Claire on June 1 and 2.

At both the regional and final contest girls are honored at luncheons, ride in a colorful parades of bands and floats, and are feted at evening coronation ceremonies. The enjoyment and experience gained as a candidate in the Alice contest and of course as Alice will be in-

valuable in future years.

Remember the entry dates for this year's Alice in Dairyland Princess contest are from March 15 to April 15. Entry blanks can be obtained from the county extension offices, newspapers, dairy plants, radio and television stations, the ADA office and fieldmen, and the Wisconsin State Department of Agriculture.
