2 Year Old Boy Wanders Off, Is Object of Extensive Search By Police, Firemen & Neighbors

Found Safe Mile From Home After Missing 3 Hours

A great deal of excitement was stirred up and an extensive search was made when a two-year-old boy wandered off from the rural home of his parents late Wednesday afternoon and was reported lost.

The tot, Glen Eichstedt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Eichstedt of the town of Kewaskum, wandered from his home located about two miles southeast of the village.

Little Glen was outside playing with two other of the Eichstedt children at about 4 p. m. When Mrs. Eichstedt went to look for the children later she spotted them on a hill in a field some distance from the house. She called and two of the children returned home but Glen was missing.

Mrs. Eichstedt started searching for him but could not find the tot. She notified her brothers residing some distance away and neighbors and they joined in the search. When the boy was still not located at 6 p. m. the sheriff's department was notified and Sheriff George Brugger radioed all available traffic and police officers from Kewaskum, West Bend and the northern part of the county to the scene. Then he put in a call to the Kewaskum fire department which sent the ambulance, equipment truck and all firemen who responded to the siren to the rural home.

All of the police, firemen, and spectators immediately joined in the search. A large crowd was attracted to the scene as the word spread around and they also began looking for the child. There is much swamp and woods surrounding the Eichstedt home and searchers combed these areas many times. Every pair of boots that the firemen had were put into use to search the swamps.

Others without boots searched the woods, high land and farm buildings for about a mile in every direction from the home. Every inch of the buildings on the Eichstedt property and two neighboring farms were covered over and over but to no avail. Police in squad cars patrolled the roads and kept in contact with the searchers and other squad cars via radio. They also hauled searchers from one place to another in the area.

When no trace of the boy was found up to the time it got dark every available searchlight and flashlight was put into use. It was after 7 p. m. when David Schaefer, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Schaefer, neighbors, found the tot in a ditch aside of the road on Hwy. H about a mile east of his home. The little fellow must have just arrived aside of the road when he was discovered because cars patrolling the roads there earlier did not see him.

Glen was returned safe and sound and had a pair of rosy red cheeks to show for his experience as he saw him peer from behind a chair in the house.

Roselin Smith, R. Wollensak Dead

Miss Roselin D. Smith, 34, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roman Smith of 669 Wolcott st., West Bend, who was born in Kewaskum and spent most of her life here, died at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, at 7:10 a. m. Tuesday, April 3, after having been ill for some time.

She was born in this village on June 15, 1921 and spent her earlier years here receiving her education in the Kewaskum schools. In 1944 she moved to West Bend with her parents to make her home. Miss Smith had been an employee of the West Bend Aluminum Co. from 1944, until the time of her illness.

Surviving are her parents, a sister Dorothy (Mrs. Nick Leb) of Lomira, five brothers, all residing in and near West Bend, namely Raymond, Harold, Armond, Robert and Lloyd Smith.

Deceased was a member of St. Mary's sodality of Holy Angels church, West Bend, and the Catholic Order of Foresters.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Schmidt Funeral home, West Bend, at 9:30 a. m. Friday and at Holy Angels church at 10 a. m. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Stehling will officiate and burial will be in the parish cemetery.

CHARLES WARDEN

Charles Warden, 76, of New Fane died Saturday morning, March 31, at his home after a six-month illness.

Mr. Warden was born Aug. 3, 1880, at New Fane. He lived on a farm until he moved to the village of New Fane several years ago.

He is survived by two brothers, William of Campbellsport and Daniel of New Fane, and one sister, Mrs. David Hanrahan of Kewaskum, along with several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at the Twohig Funeral home, Campbellsport. Burial took place in the Warden cemetery in the town of Scott.

Three Trustees Are Re-elected; Only 201 Ballots Cast

FAIRCHILD, EISENHOWER WINNERS; REFERENDUMS WIN AND LOSE IN ELECTION TUESDAY

A comparatively light vote was cast in the village in Tuesday's spring election when only 201 ballots were marked. Although there were tornado warnings out for this area the weather was real warm and in the 70's. But a lack of opposition for the village trustee offices kept the vote down.

Three trustee offices were the only ones voted on Tuesday. The rest of the village officials hold over in office until next year. Re-elected without opposition were Arvin Merwin, Carl F. Schaefer and Marvin Schaefer. Merwin polled the largest number of votes with 19, followed by Marvin Schaefer with 18 and Carl Schaefer with 18.

In the state supreme court race Thomas E. Fairchild won out locally by a margin of better than 3 to 1 over William H. Dieterich. Voters gave Fairchild 149 votes to Dieterich's 47. On the state level Fairchild was conceded the victory with an unofficial total of 280,796 votes to 86,067 for Dieterich with 2,289 of the state's 3,321 precincts reporting.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower won in the race for the Republican nomination for president in the state. John Chapple, the other candidate for the GOP nomination, ran a poor second. Estes Kefauver, the Democratic candidate, compiled a heavy vote. State returns also bore out the trend of the vote in Washington county and the village. In the county Eisenhower polled 4,427 votes to 2,076 for Kefauver with Chapple finishing a very poor third with 142. Locally Eisenhower received 130 votes compared to only 6 for Chapple and 65 for Kefauver.

Voting on the four referendum issues in the county and village also ran like that throughout the state. The first two referendums were victorious and the last two were voted down. The referendum to increase pensions for teachers won out in the state. The county vote was 2,906 for and 2,273 against and the village vote 95 for and 76 against. On the referendum to permit communities to devote land received on grants to their particular needs when given for a specified purpose the "yes" votes won. The county vote was 3,147 for and 1,655 against and in the village it was 120 for and 38 against. But the referendum to permit sheriffs to hold office for more than two successive terms was defeated. The county vote was 2,357 for and 2,966 against and locally it was 57 for and 111 against. On the final referendum which would liberalize the legislation for railroad passes and other privileges for persons in public office the issue was defeated. The county cast 3,377 against and 1,314 for. In the village the "no" votes won by a 106 to 50 margin.

A total of 81 votes were cast in the town of Kewaskum. There were no township officers elected but the trend on the presidential, supreme court and referendum tickets mainly ran true to form to the state and county. On the judicial ballot Fairchild was given 59 votes to 19 for

12 People Hurt In Accidents In Area

Twelve persons were injured in three traffic accidents in the surrounding area during the past week.

An auto driven by Mrs. Emil Yeadeke, Kewaskum, was badly damaged in a mishap on a town road in the town of Auburn about a mile west of Five Corners last Friday afternoon. Mrs. Yeadeke was traveling east on the road and lost control of her car as she was crossing the railroad tracks. The vehicle ran into a ditch and struck a tree. Mrs. Yeadeke suffered cuts and bruises. Three passengers in the car were also injured. They were her son, head injury; her daughter, bruises and cuts, and her brother, Earl Manthel, severe hand laceration.

Three young Milwaukeeans were injured at 3 p. m. Tuesday when an auto driven by Lee Freund, 16, of that city went out of control on County Trunk S on the sharp curve at the south limits of New Fane and came to a stop 160 feet away against a farm driveway. William A. Ruhl, 16, sustained a bruised side; Barbara Mirr, 15, received a head injury, and Lee Wanta, age not listed, suffered fractured ribs and arm. They were brought to a Kewaskum physician for treatment. Freund said that he was driving southerly at approximately 35 miles an hour when he entered a sharp curve. His car struck loose gravel and went out of control. The right side, front and undercarriage of the auto, owned by Mrs. Rachel P. Ruhl, Milwaukee, were damaged. The group was returning from Mauthe lake.

The Kewaskum firemen's ambulance was called out at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday following a collision at the intersection of Hwys. 28 and 41, eight miles west of Kewaskum. Five passengers in one of the cars involved in the crash with another vehicle, all of whom were injured, were taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the ambulance. They were Mrs. Dan Peterson and son, Pat Peterson, Mrs. Lyle McGuire and child all of 2262 So. 15th Place, Milwaukee.

No injuries were reported in a two-car collision last Thursday morning on Hwy. 67 in Dundee. Drivers involved were Harold O. Mills, Jr., 19, of Random Lake, and Roger J. Wierman, 24, R. 1, Kewaskum. Wierman told Fond du Lac county traffic officers he had parked his car and that it was struck from the rear.

Dieterich, Eisenhower received 50 votes to only 4 for Chapple while Kefauver polled 24 votes. Results on the referendums were 29 for and 32 against on the first, 32 for and 24 against on the second, 20 for and 42 against on the third, and 12 for and 42 against on the last.
