Annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale Opens

The Girl Scouts of Kewaskum, together with the 2,300 other Girl Scouts of the Wau-Bun Council, will begin taking orders on Saturday, April 14, for the annual cookie sale, according to the council's sale chairman, Mrs. Wallace E. Petri, Fond du Lac. Mrs. Petri is a member of the council's finance committee.

The sale has three objectives. Since the Wau-Bun Council does not receive Community Chest support for the capital expenses of camp development, the cookie sale profits will be used to buy needed equipment for the new day camps to be set up for the first time this summer in Dodge, Green Lake and Washington counties; and to provide a well and latrine at the Red Granite camp site which will make it suitable for day trips and primitive camping.

The sale will also enrich the troop treasuries, since each troop will receive 5 cents per box on the cookies its members sell. Troops may use this money for the girls' annual national membership dues, or to buy materials for service projects or troop activities.

The sale also provides a practical learning experience, according to Mrs. Petri.

The girls get to practice accuracy and courtesy in their taking and filling of orders, collecting money, making change, and keeping records.

Advance orders will be taken for one week, April 14-21, for the chocolate and vanilla sandwich-type cookie that will sell for 40 cents per box. Girls will collect the money when they deliver the cookies, May 12-15. The advance order sale insures no left-overs and gives the girls some business experience, points out the chairman.

The local chairman of the sale, who will collect the advance orders from troop leaders, supervise the delivery of cookies, and send receipts on to the central office, is Mrs. Harold Marx.

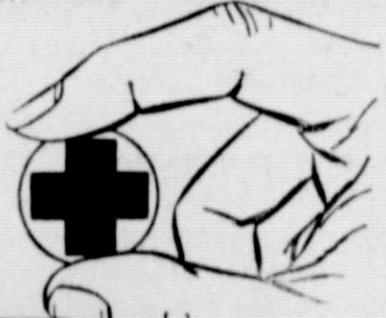

Local Residents View Berlin Tornado Damage

Mr. and Mrs. Aloysius Voim and family, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Hirsig and family, Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Bunkelman and family, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Harbeck and daughters, Sharon and Lana, and Lynn Ann Rimmel were among the hundreds of thousands of persons who drove to Berlin Sunday to view the tornado damage.

The tornado struck Berlin last

week Tuesday and the area had been closed to visitors until Sunday when an estimated 300,00 sightseers converged on the battered city, causing one of the worst traffic jams the state has ever witnessed. Green Lake county and state police, who had urged motorists to stay clear of the stricken area, were unable to cope with the situation. All available county police from neighboring Sauk, Dane, Winnebago, Waushara and Fond du Lac counties, about 100 in all, were sent to assist.

Streets and highways were so badly jammed that traffic remained stalled for lengthy periods. One deputy reported nearly 2,500 cars on the road between Berlin and Green Lake only nine miles apart. The number of cars was estimated at

100,000 and they were lined bumper to bumper. It took us 1 1/2 hours to move three miles. Four minor mishaps and one injury resulted from the jam.

Seven persons were killed by the tornado, scores of others injured and hospitalized, 21 homes were completely destroyed and about 25 homes and other buildings seriously damaged, to say nothing of the other damage. One cannot realize how terrible the damage was until he sees it, although most of the rubble has been cleaned up and removed by now.

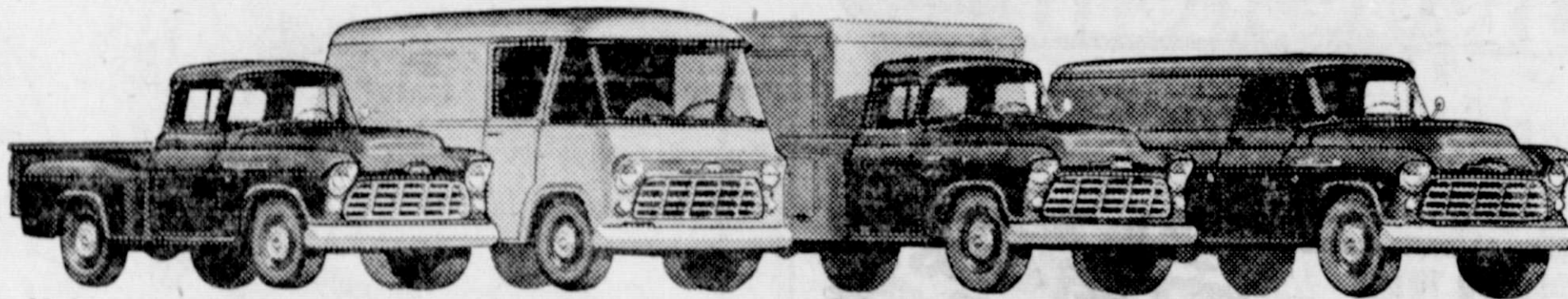

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Final Report on Very Successful Dimes Drive

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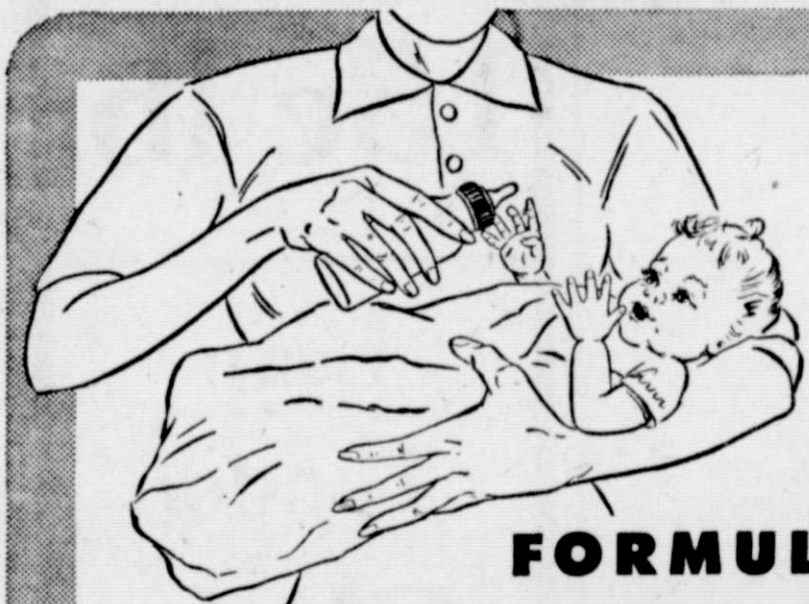
