## Father La Buwi to Observe Silver Jubilee Sunday; Mass, Dinner, Reception Mark Event Over 60 Priests, Monsignors and Bishop to Attend

Rev. Father Frank C. La Buwi, pastor of Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum, and the St. Bridget's mission, town of Wayne, will observe the silver jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood with a solemn high Mass of Thanksgiving on Sunday, April 22, at 11 a. m. in Holy Trinity church. A jubilee dinner in the hall at 12:30 p. m. for priests, relatives and invited guests will follow the mass. Adult members of the two churches and friends will attend a supper reception in Fr. La Buwi's honor from 5:30 to 8:00 p. m. in the church hall.

More than 60 priests and monsignors have made reservations for the mass and dinner and Bishop Atkielski of Milwaukee will also attend.

Assisting Fr. La Buwi as celebrant in the celebration of the anniversary mass will be: Fr. Raymond Kastner, chaplain of St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, deacon; Fr. Henry R. Langenfeldt, pastor of St. Charles, Burlington, subdeacon; and Fr. A. M. Klink, chaplain at St. Joseph's convent, Milwaukee, master of ceremonies. Fr. Klink will also serve as master of ceremonies at the jubilee dinner. Msgr. Theodore F. Thome, pastor of Immaculate Conception church, Portage, will preach the sermon.

Father La Buwi is the son of Mrs. Pauline La Buwi of Kewaskum and the late Charles La Buwi. He was born at Rubicon on May 17, 1903 and received his elementary education at St. John's parochial school there. He studied for the priesthood at St. Lawrence seminary, Mount Calvary, and St. Francis seminary, Milwaukee. Fr. La Buwi was ordained May 30, 1931 by Samuel Cardinal Stritch in St. John's Cathedral, Milwaukee. He offered his first solemn mass on May 31 in St. Kilian's church, Hartford.

Following his ordination he was assistant at St. Frederick's parish, Cudahy, for a year. From June, 1932 until 1937 he was assistant chaplain at St. Aemilian's orphanage, Milwaukee, when he was appointed pastor of St. Mary of the Lake church, Westport, Waunakee, Wis. and chaplain of Mendota State hospital and Veterans' Administration, Mendota, Wis. on May 5, 1937. Since October of 1941 he has been pastor of Holy Trinity parish and its mission at St. Bridget's.

Besides the 11 a. m. jubilee high mass, low masses will be read at 6:00, 8:00 and 9:30 a. m. Sunday at Holy Trinity church.

## Firemen Answer 6 Calls, 3 in 1 Hour

The Kewaskum firemen were kept running in the past week when they answered six fire calls in six days, three of them in less than an hour's time on Saturday morning. Five of the calls were to the town of Kewaskum and the other one in the village. All but one were grass fires.

It all started shortly before 10 a. m. Saturday when the firemen put out a grass fire in a field on the Edgar Kumrow farm east of the village. While the firemen were at the scene another call was received from the village park where a hollow tree burned and toppled to the ground. Two firemen who were available took care of this blaze with Kewaskum's other truck. Shortly after returning to the fire station and dispersing the firemen were called again at about 10:45 a. m. to the village dump east of Kewaskum. A high wind blew burning materials from the dump across the road into a woods where grass and leaves caught fire.

The fourth call was on Sunday evening when grass fires broke out at several places along the railroad tracks north of the village. At 7 p. m. Wednesday another grass fire started along the railroad tracks north of town, a short distance South of Sunday's blaze, and again the firemen extinguished the flames.

The final call at 2:30 p. m. Thursday was to the village dump again. It was the same kind of fire as that Saturday morning. Burning debris blew across the road, ignited the leaves and grass, and spread into the woods. Persons at the dump had the fire just about out when firemen got there.

## Many Attend Civil Defense Meeting; Theo. Noe Speaker

TEN LOCAL AUXILIARY POLICE OFFICERS GRADUATE, RECEIVE CAPS AND BADGES

Many people from Kewaskum and surrounding area, more than 50 in number, came to the Kewaskum Municipal building Monday evening, Apr. 16, to learn more about civil defense.

Marvin Martin, civil defense director of Kewaskum, introduced the principal speaker for the evening, Theodore M. Noe, from the health division of the State Civil Defense organization.

Mr. Noe very much stressed the need of well organized civil defense groups in every city and village throughout this entire county of ours. He said, "Yes, until now we have been fortunate not to have had any bombs dropped on any of our cities, but this does not mean that it could not happen. Russia is building a great air force and in the event of an attack on this, our country, there is the possibility that 7 out of every 10 planes attacking could slip through our defense lines. Knowing that Milwaukee is classified as a critical target area and that Kewaskum is only a short distance from Milwaukee, in the event of an air attack on Milwaukee, it could be that in a short few hours our population in Kewaskum would be increased 10 fold. That would create a number of serious problems. Law and order would have to be maintained. The people would have to be housed and fed. The sick and wounded would have to be cared for. All of this requires a lot of planning and the time to do it is now. That is where civil defense comes in and civil defense is everybody's job."

One of the highlights of the meeting was the graduation exercise of the following men as auxiliary civil defense police officers: Sylvester Terlinden, August Koch, Wayland Becker, Lloyd Teeselink, Raymond Casper, George Eggert, Jr., Wayland Tessar, Edward Hinn Marvin Schaefer and Herbert Backhaus. These men have been selected and trained by our own Chief of Police Roland Pledl.

Mrs. Roland Pledl, R. N., who is in charge of the civil defense health service under the direction of Dr. R. G. Edwards, explained her planning pertaining to first aid in case of an emergency here in Kewaskum. Mrs. Pledl is assisted in her work by Mrs. Marvin Schaefer, R. N., Mrs. Jerome Schwartz, R. N. and Mrs. Buswell, T. P. N.

Miss C. B. Jaehrig, executive secretary, West Bend chapter of the American Red Cross, told the audience of the good work that has been and is still being done by the police department with the aid of their auxiliary police force, the American Red Cross and other relief agencies in Berlin, Wis., the small city that recently suffered great tornado damage.

James D. Reigle, president of Kewaskum, congratulated all of the people who are now active in civil defense. He expressed the wish that many more people from the large audience present at the meeting, as well as others not present,

## Home Burglarized Of Over \$300 in Cash, Valuables

TONY FELLEZ HOME BROKEN INTO FRIDAY NIGHT; CASH, JEWELRY, COAT TAKEN

Kewaskum experienced its first night house burglary in years last Friday evening when the Anthony J. "Tony" Fellenz home on East Water st. was broken into and more than \$300.00 in cash, jewelry and a valuable coat were stolen.

The burglary occurred between the hours of 7:15 and 8:50 p. m. while Mr. and Mrs. Fellenz were out of town. Entrance to the home was gained by forcing the kitchen door joining a breezeway. A screwdriver or small pinch bar was used to force open the lock. The Fellenzes discovered the burglary when they returned home shortly before 9 p. m.

The loot in the burglary amounted to approximately \$315.50. The following cash and valuables were taken: \$25.00 cash from a metal box, man's black wallet containing \$5.00, another man's black wallet containing \$5.50, a black picture viewer, Stereo Realist, valued at \$20.00, man's ring, yellow gold with red stone, valued at \$25.00; ladies' pearl, yellow gold ring, valued at \$50.00; ladies' lavalliere with tiny pearl and blue stones, valued at \$10.00; man's white sapphire yellow gold ring, valued at \$25.00, and a ladies' brown sable fur coat with Powells label, valued at \$150.00.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl, assisted by Washington county traffic officers, has been working on the case ever since the burglary. About ten suspects have been questioned so far but none of them was involved in the burglary. It was evident that the job was done by amateurs.

Anyone having information on someone disposing of stolen articles is urged to kindly notify the police. This information will be kept confidential.

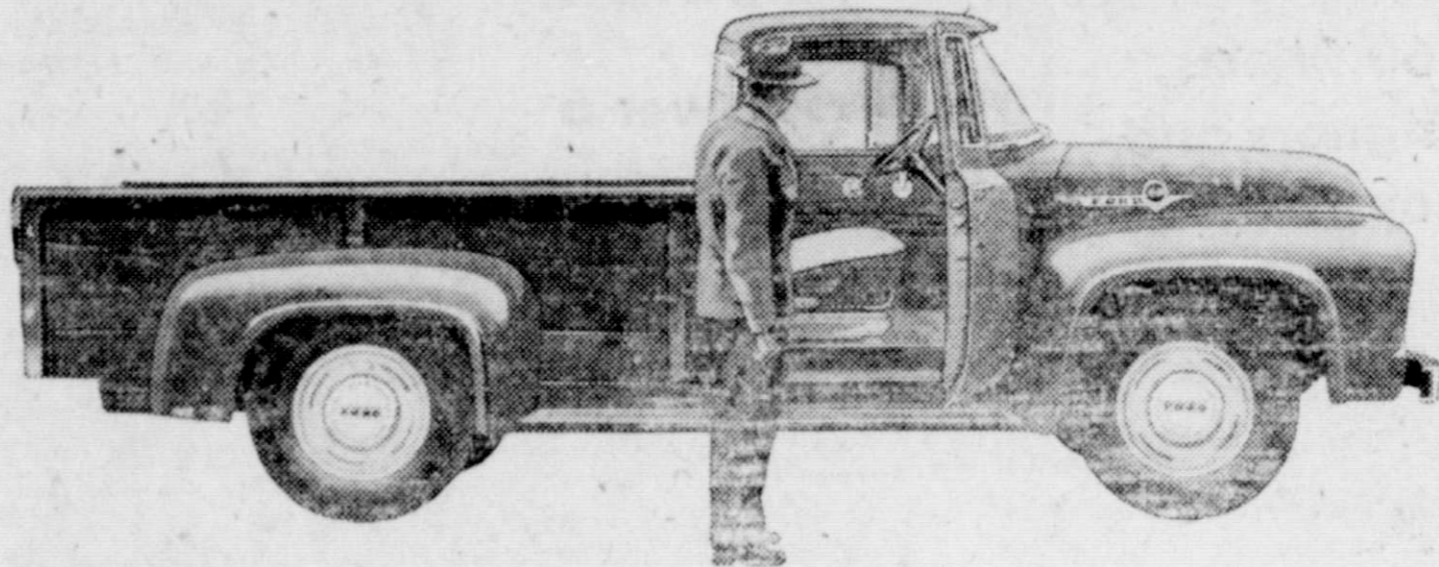

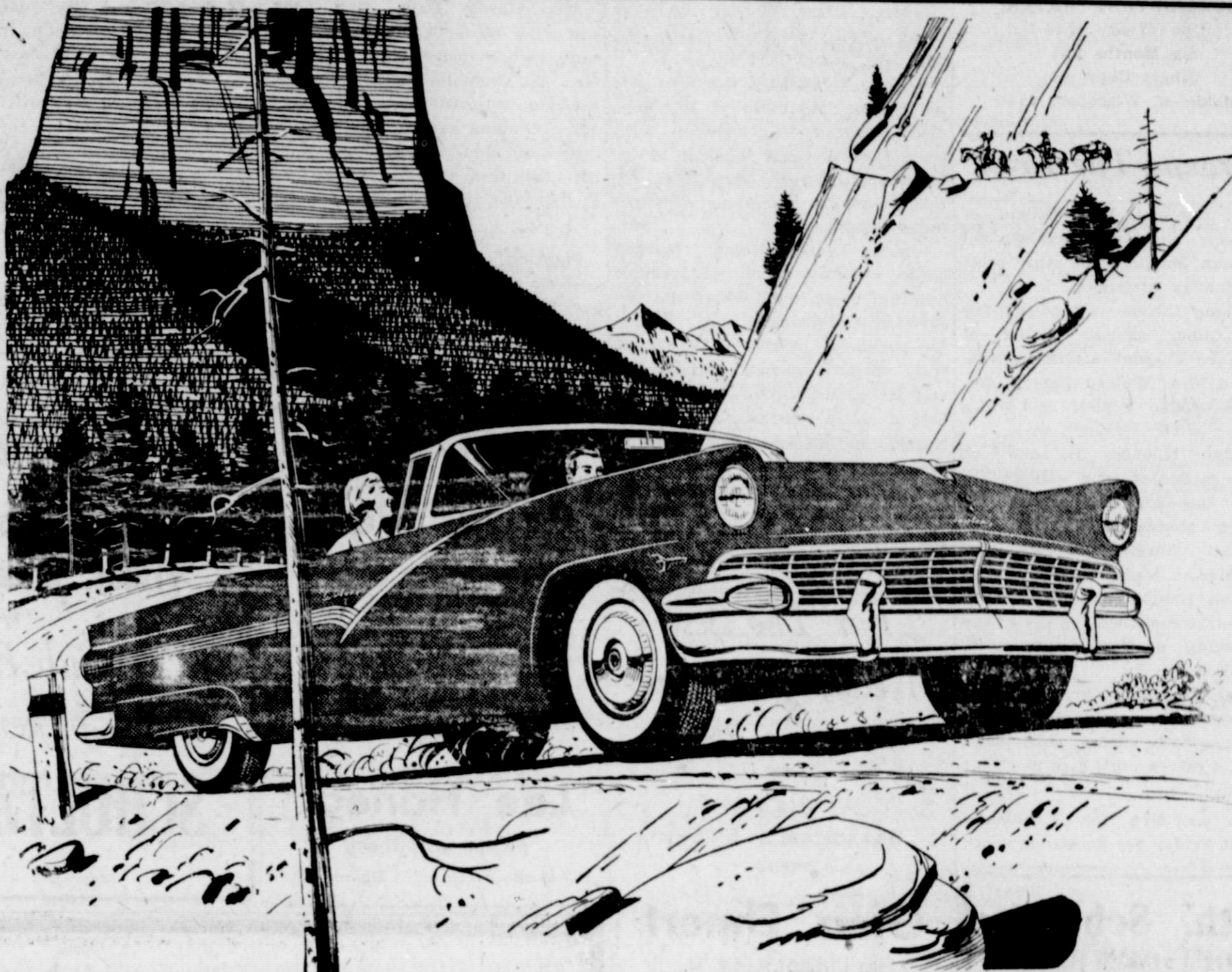

## Kewaskum Vo Ag and FFA Flashes

### DEMONSTRATION PLOT ON ETTA FARM

The Earl Etta farm will be the site for a small grain varietal adaptation demonstration plot. The Etta farm is located one mile north of Kewaskum on County trunk G, and the plot will be located east of the highway.

The purpose of the demonstration plot is to give farmers and other interested persons an opportunity to see the different varieties growing side by side under the

same conditions in their own county, making it easier for them to decide the variety best adapted to their particular locality.

The seed is furnished by the State of Wisconsin Department of Agronomy through the request of the county agriculture agent's office and the Kewaskum vocational ag department.

Ten varieties of oats were plant-

ed: Clinton, Beedee, Clintland, Nemaha, Rodney, Sauk, Fayette, Ajax, Branch, and Vickland. The five barley varieties are Montcalm, Kindred, Fox, Oderbrueker, and Moore. All plots will be marked with stakes and a field demonstration will be made just before harvest time.

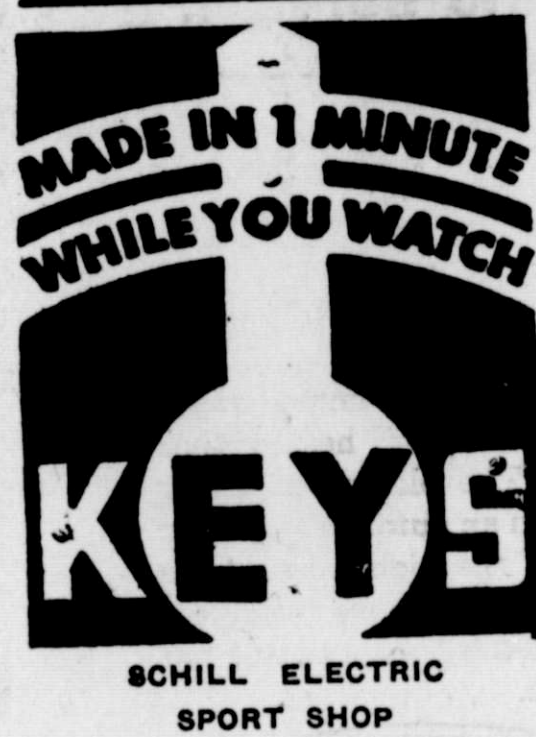

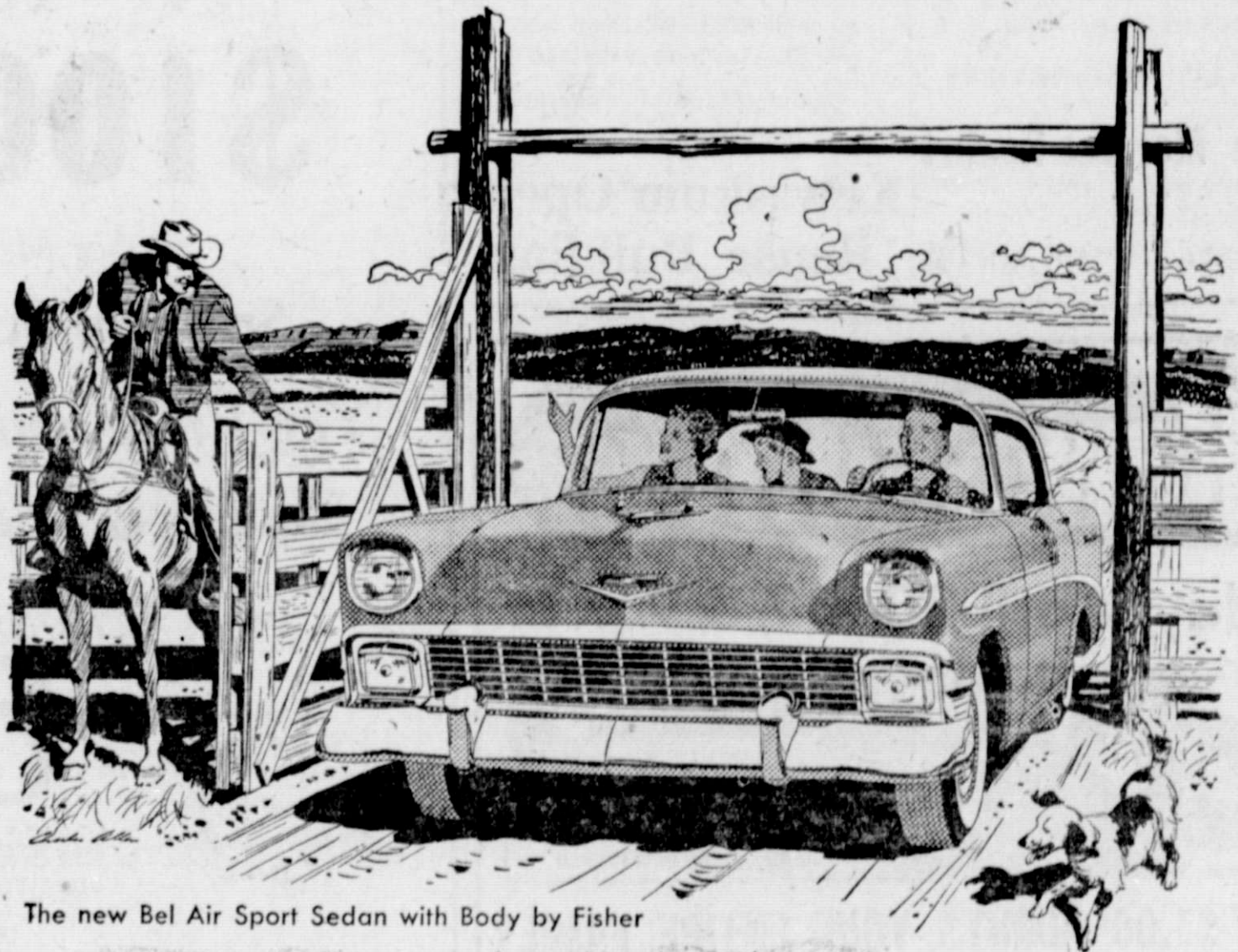
