Truck Breaks Off Light Standard

A truck owned by Milaeger Well Drilling, 1245 N. 62nd st., Milwaukee, and driven by Daniel Cavanaugh, an employee, backed into a street light standard in front of the L. Rosenheimer store on Fond du Lac ave. and broke it off about three feet from its base at 8 p. m. last Wednesday, Apr. 25.

Cavanaugh was backing the truck away from the curb when it struck the light standard which fell to the sidewalk and broke along with the street lamp. The driver failed to report the accident and was apprehended later by local officers who investigated. The case was continued until May 8. Damage was estimated at \$285.00.

Formerly managed by its owners, the theatre was taken over by Wayne Heiskanen of Milwaukee on Mar. 30. Because of poor patronage he discontinued the operation after only a couple of weeks and the theatre reverted back to the owners again until being taken over now by Honeck and Edwards.

Honeck has taken over the operation of the theatre in a final attempt to keep it in operation. It is not being operated to make a profit but it must break even to keep running. We feel sure that all persons in this community wish to keep a theatre going in Kewaskum. The only way this can be done is by supporting it. Unless patronage at the theatre is improved it will be closed permanently and the building will be disposed of. We don't want this to happen.

Funeral of Mrs. Nicholas Mertes

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Monday, Apr. 30, at the Peace E and R church for Mrs. Nicholas Mertes, 86, nee Amelia Groeschel, of Kewaskum, who died at 3:45 p. m. Thursday, Apr. 26, at her home. Although she had been ailing her death was unexpected. The Rev. F. L. Rodenbeck presided at the last rites and burial was in Union cemetery, West Bend.

Prior to the services the body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Sunday until 11 a. m. Monday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of the funeral.

Mrs. Mertes was a charter member of the Ladies' Guild of Peace church and also of Royal Neighbor Camp 969 of Kewaskum.

The deceased was born Sept. 11, 1870, at Fillmore, a daughter of the late Michael and Minna Groeschel. She was married to Nicholas Mertes on June 9, 1889, at Fillmore and the couple moved to Cheeseville where they lived a few years. In 1894 they came to Kewaskum and for many years operated the Central Hotel here. Mr. Mertes predeceased her in October of 1932.

Thirteen Green Hands were initiated after the business meeting.

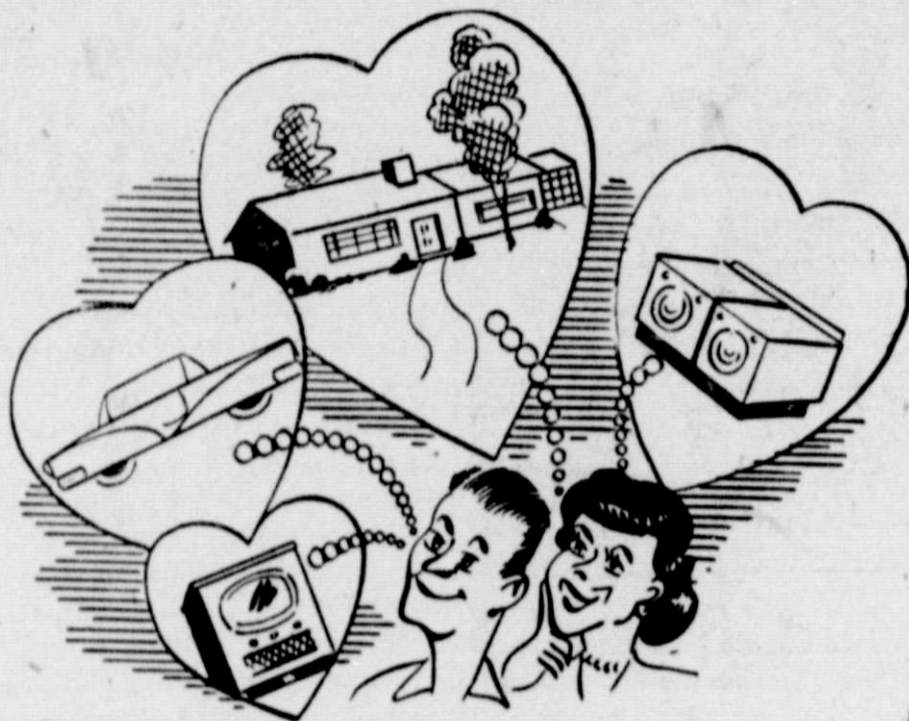

County Joins Observing Of Mental Health Week

This is Mental Health Week. Throughout the nation network radio and television stations are devoting time to mental health education. Local stations are featuring, as guest speakers, persons who are specialists in mental disease. Newspapers are setting aside space for informative articles.

Our own governor, Walter J. Kohler, has stated that he believes mental illness to be the most serious health problem confronting the nation.

Dr. Charles Bridgman of Madison, president of the Wisconsin Association for Mental Health, has stated that mental illness is responsible for more patients in our hospitals today than polio, cancer, heart disease, tuberculosis and all other diseases combined.

Nationally and locally, the folks who know, are trying to get through to us. Has the impact of this knowledge reached us? Has the truth become a reality?

The American people have long been known for their generous nature, sympathy, and understanding. Yet, to date, unknowingly, we have turned our backs on ten million of our own people. These are the people who fill our mental hospitals, our juvenile courts, criminal courts, divorce courts. These are the people who fail in their jobs, in their studies, in their families. They need help, they need understanding. Few of them can get it, so they must continue to live their wasted lives, twisted and ruined. Why is this true? Because you and I have turned our backs on their problem.

I don't want to be that kind of an American, do you? I want to join the fight against mental illness, don't you? Then let's get in touch with our local mental health association, today!

Let's see that adequate hospital facilities are made available to our own community. Let's get that hospital well staffed. Let's get ourselves over the hum-bug that mental illness is something to hide or something to be ashamed of. Let's put it in the column where it belongs, with tuberculosis, polio, and heart disease. Let's face the fact that with help and proper treatment the large percentage of mental illness cases can be cured. Let's learn to recognize the symptoms so that treatment may be started early.

Our own county helps to sponsor the Washington-Ozaukee Child Guidance Center. This is a center realized through the efforts of citizens of both counties who spent six years in active preparation for it. The Wisconsin State Board of Health provides a clinical psychologist and a psychiatric social worker for at least a two year period. The Washington and Ozaukee Boards provide quarters, secretarial help, and the part time services of a psychiatrist.

It is here, that you and I, can bring our children if they show some particular problem in the nor-

mal striving to grow up. Such difficulties as temper tantrums, extreme shyness, sleep disturbances, faulty learning, etc. It is here that we can protect them against possible later hospitalization. It is a simple procedure. If our child cuts himself we apply a suitable protective medicine, if symptoms of appendicitis are present we consult our family doctor as a precaution, if emotional disturbances are present we protect them by consulting the Child Guidance Center.

The services of the Washington and Ozaukee counties Child Guidance Center are available to us without cost. As a parent, nurse, teacher, doctor or clergyman, we need only to phone the center for an appointment, and we will be given the appointment for the first hour that is available.

It is our center. It is our first step toward participating in the fight against mental illness. But, in taking the first step, let's not turn our back on the ten million forgotten people. It isn't too late for them. Let's join the citizens army for more and better facilities. Let's bring our neighbors out of the darkness and into a life of usefulness and peace.
