Slinger 1st in State Land Judging Contest Here; Kewaskum Third

Augie Kirchner of Kewaskum 1st in Individual Placing

The Slinger FFA team took first place in the state land judging contest held at Kewaskum Tuesday, May 8.

Ten teams participated in the contest, and a total of 172 students were present for the forenoon instructional period and participated in either the educational tour or the contest conducted in the afternoon.

West Bend's FFA placed second with 1,181 points, Kewaskum FFA third with 1,169 points, Plymouth FFA fourth with 1,160 and Fall River FFA fifth with a total of 1,156 points. Slinger, with 1,250 points, repeated as contest winner, having won at West Bend last year.

Augie Kirchner of Kewaskum topped the individual scoring with 332 points from a possible total of 400. The next three places were won by Slinger boys, Larry Gruenberger was second with 331 points, Willie Fassbender third with 328, Fred Moser fourth with 327. In fifth place was Jerome Feckter from West Bend with 321 points.

Other contestants besides Kirchner for Kewaskum were Kurt Pamperin, Ken Blank and Ray Falk.

Other schools participating in the contest were Wisconsin Dells, Campbellsport, Reedsville, Bear Creek, and Sheboygan Falls 4-H.

Judges for the contest and instructors for the morning session were Jim Meshnick, Washington county soil conservationist; Dean Livingston, Sheboygan county soil conservationist, and Howard Haas, head soil conservationist for the ten county district.

Helping conduct the educational tour were Maurice Hovland, Washington county agent; Bob Stodola, county 4-H club agent, and John Murdock, university extension soil conservationist.

The Vocational Ag. Dept. wants to thank the four tractor dealers in Kewaskum for the use of their tractors for the tour and August Bilgo for permission to dig a couple of pits in his land.

And certainly a great deal of praise should be given the Kewaskum Kiwanis club for helping to sponsor this land appreciation program.

Buy 18 Acres of Land for New 110 By 190 Foot Unit

Construction is now underway on a 110 by 190 foot addition to the Regal Ware, Inc. plant in Kewaskum. The aluminum cookware manufacturing plant has purchased approximately 18 acres of land adjacent to its present factory to build the new unit.

The land for the new building was acquired from August Bilgo and is located at the southeast corner of the present plant. Actual work on the new building got underway on May 1 and is expected to be completed some time next fall.

The new addition is the tenth major such undertaking since J. O. Riegle purchased the Regal Ware firm. It will be of concrete block, steel and brick front construction.

Floor space in the new unit will be used for manufacturing purposes. A warehouse on the site will be moved to make room for the new building.

The John Bruecker and Sons firm of Milwaukee is the architectural firm in charge of the building project. The present addition to the Regal Ware plant is larger in size than the original building in which the firm began its operations when the firm was first set up for manufacturing of kitchen utensils.
