Mrs. Joseph Theusch, 75, nee Anna Pesch, of Kewaskum, passed away at 11:30 a. m. Saturday, May 19, at her home on East Water st. Although she had been ailing for several years, her death occurred quite unexpectedly.

A daughter of the late John and Angeline Pesch, she was born Mar. 1, 1881 in the town of Auburn. Her marriage to Joseph Theusch took place Apr. 12, 1904 in Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum, the late Rev. Phillip J. Vogt officiating. Floating Island At Kettle Moraine Lake Towed Away

The unwelcome floating island which blocked the harbor of Joseph Fahn's resort at Kettle Moraine Lake (formerly Round Lake) near Dundee since May 15, was successfully towed away Wednesday from its resting place. This three-acre brush and tree-covered island attracted national attention and publicity in newspapers and on radio and television.

After being foiled Tuesday by unfavorable, 30-mile-an-hour west winds, boat crews received an assist from the weather Wednesday and, with the aid of 2,000 feet of tow lines, hauled the island across the lake to the west shore. Six boats were used for pulling while three others pushed. The boats were powered by outboard motors supplied by the Kiekhaefer Aeromarine Corp. of Fond du Lac, which also provided boats and men.

About a dozen boats tried to tow away the island Tuesday. They moved it about 10 or 15 feet but the ropes tore in the strong winds which blew the island back into its position. Two attempts were made before giving up the job until the wind died down Wednesday. Among the boats participating in the maneuver was the big Mercury two-motored, cabin boat owned by Henry Rosenheimer of Kewaskum. Hundreds of persons were attracted to the scene Tuesday and Wednesday to watch the moving attempts. Thousands of others viewed the island earlier.

The only job remaining Wednesday was to drive posts into the west shore for securing cables by which the island will be anchored into a permanent site. The island drifted to the east shore following rains which raised the lake level to an all-time high. It threatened to ruin Fahn's beach and the frontage for cottages and many small fish were killed by the run away island.

two daughters, Valeria (Mrs. Chas. Greget, Jr.) of Hartford and Nancy Ann, age 9.

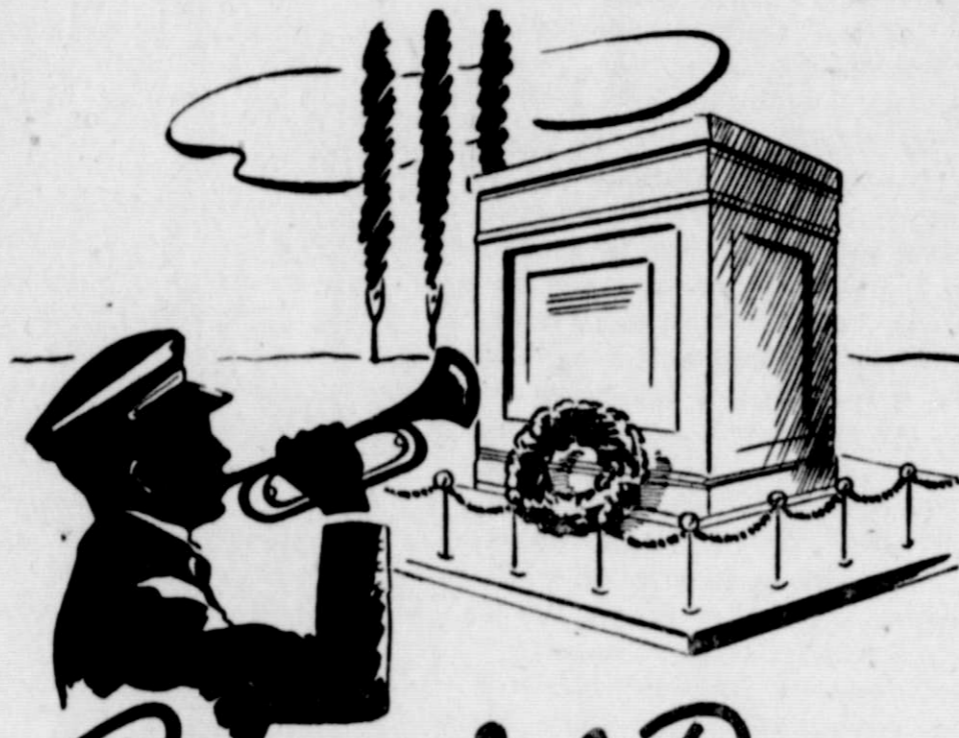

4-H Club Members to Paint Rural Mail Boxes

In observance of National Mail Box Week, members of the Kettle Moraine 4-H club will paint rural mail boxes. Anyone desiring to have their mail boxes painted should contact either Mrs. Lorina Petermann, chairman of the drive to improve mail boxes, or Alice Odekirk, both of R. 2, Campbellsport, or Carol Heberer, R. 1, Kewaskum. No charge is made but donations are accepted.

It's spring! We paint our houses, fix our lawns and make lots of improvements, so please don't neglect your rural mail boxes. Mail boxes may be painted either white or silver and your name in neat black letters about one inch high on the side of the box. The boxes should be easily accessible to the carrier. They should be attached atop a strong post, 3 1/2 or 4 feet above the ground, and erected on the right side of the road as traveled by the carrier.

Mail boxes should be regular ones authorized by the Post Office Department. They must be in good condition, with a door that opens easily, and a flag. An arm should be extending out from the post. Ruts in the approach to the mail box should be filled; the carrier is not required to leave his vehicle to serve the box. Where mail boxes are improved mail service is also improved. Remember, look at your mail box, everyone else does.

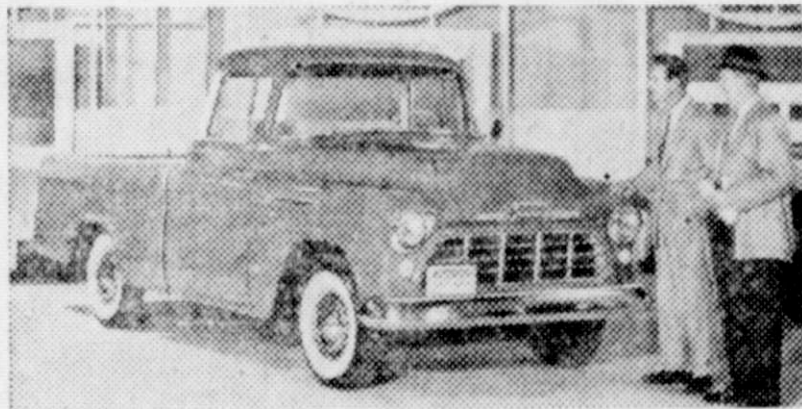

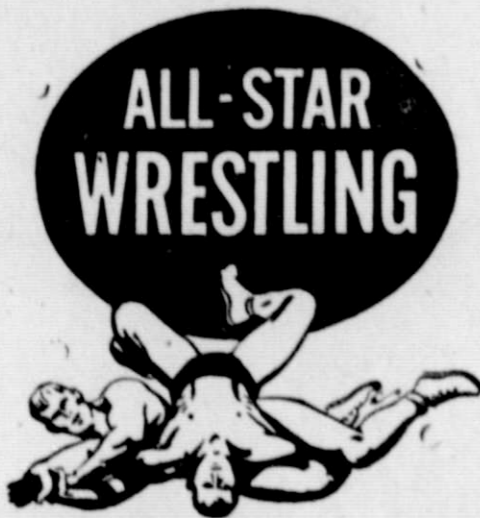

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Local Girl Scouts Will Have Chance to Attend Day Camp this Summer

Kewaskum Girl Scouts will have an opportunity to attend a day camp this summer as a result of plans made by the new Wau-Bun council.

Local girls may register for a session of the Washington neighborhood's day camp which will be held July 16 - 20 in the West Bend park. This camp will accommodate Brownies and Intermediates from Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Guldendale, Richfield, Hartford, Barton and West Bend. Mrs. Gordon Finck, Hartford is chairman of the Washington neighborhood day camp committee. Other members of the committee are the Mesdames Harold Marx, Ernie Mitchell and Marvin Schaefer of Kewaskum.

Day camp folders with detailed information for parents and a registration blank have been distributed to the girls by their troop leaders. Girls may register for day camp by returning the registration blank with the day camp fee to their troop leaders by June 1.

The council will conduct other day camps in Mayville for girls in the Dodge neighborhood, and at Camp Canahiti, a troop campsite near Fond du Lac, for girls in the two Fond du Lac neighborhoods.

The day camps will be directed by a person trained for the post who will also give pre-camp training to the volunteer staff of mothers who will serve as leaders of the four units at each camp.

About 160 girls can be taken care of in the two five-day sessions. Four units of 20 girls in each session will need two adult leaders each. Units will come together for all-camp activities that they all share in planning.

Girls will be grouped by age levels. The cost per girl from Kewaskum will be \$3.25 for the five-day period and this will include her program activity materials, most of her food for the noon lunch which will be prepared by the girls each day and bus transportation.

Camp will be in session each day from 9:30 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. Train-

ing will be given the volunteer leaders at the campsite in June. Any women who would like to volunteer to assist as camp leaders should contact Mrs. Harold Marx. Previous experience is not necessary.

At day camp girls carry out a program very similar to that at an established camp except that they do not sleep at the camp and are there for only one meal each day. Intermediate Girl Scouts, however, will have an opportunity for one "overnight" at day camp.

Day camps give younger or inexperienced girls an introduction to camping without taking them completely out of their homes. It is excellent training for troop camping—when the entire troop and its leaders go to a troop campsite together for one night or longer. Day camp also prepares girls for a happier experience at an established camp where they will live with other girls away from home for 12 or more days at a time.

Wierman Hurls 1-Hitter In Debut As Chevs Nip Grafton in Opener, 3-2

KEWASKUM TO CLASH WITH WEST BEND HERE SUNDAY FOR LEAGUE LEAD

Not yet out of high school, little Doug Wierman made his debut as a pitcher in the fast Land o' Lakes league with flying colors by setting down Grafton on one hit here Sunday as the Kewaskum Chevrolets won their opening game in 10 innings by a close 3-2 margin. Wierman, one of two regular Kewaskum High school pitchers, will graduate next week.

As a result of Wierman's fine performance the Chevs got started on the right foot and moved into a first place tie with five other opening game winners. With four other experienced pitchers on his squad, Manager "Cisco" Backhaus named Doug as a surprise starter. This was a shrewd move by "Cisco." None of the other hurlers had much throwing practice because of the wet, cold weather which postponed the first two scheduled games in the loop, while Wierman has been throwing regularly with the school team.

Wierman had a potential no-hitter going until the eighth inning when Dennis Haas of Grafton doubled to spoil his chance for a perfect game. Two Chev errors in the same frame gave the visitors their two runs. Wierman shut them out in the nine other innings. Doug walked four batters and struck out nine in his masterpiece.

Kewaskum's three runs were spread out over three innings. The first came in the initial frame when G. Wierman walked, John Tessar singled, and the right field let the ball get past him for a run. The team next hit pay dirt in the seventh with a button on Dick Edwards' single, walk to Bob Dreher, stolen base and passed ball. Grafton's two unearned in the eighth knotted the score. Neither team scored in the ninth and the contest went into extra innings. The Chevs pushed over the winning marker in the 10th without a hit on an error, two walks and a sacrifice.

Not all the credit goes to Wierman as Zahn, the Grafton twirler, also did a very commendable job. He gave up only two hits in holding the Kewaskum bats powerless, walked six, and set down 16 Chev hitters (?) on strikeouts. It was a tough one for him to lose.

This Sunday the Chevrolets will be host to the heavy slugging West Bend Lithias, who lashed out 23 hits to wallop Newburg last Sunday, 23-5. The Lithias also have sound pitching and Kewaskum will have their hands full trying to stop this powerhouse. This will be the feature game of the week end

and the winner will take over first place. See this battle at 2 p. m. Other tilts Sunday are Saukville at Mequon, Port Washington at night. Newburg and Germantown at Grafton. Cedarburg was scheduled to play at Plymouth Thursday. Other scores in the league last Sunday were: Cedarburg 7, Port 3; Mequon 2, Germantown 0 (10 innings); Plymouth 6, Saukville 3.

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
