Louis Bunkelman, Mrs. W. Schneider, Others Pass Away

Louis Bunkelman, 68, widely known Kewaskum resident, who was in the contracting business with his son Edward, passed away suddenly of a heart attack at his home at 8:15 a. m. Sunday, May 27. He had not been ill previously.

Mr. Bunkelman was a great hunting enthusiast, especially fox hunting in late years, and whenever he could get away from the many duties of his trade he followed this sport. Several years ago he and his son formed a partnership in carpenter and contracting work, and his son will now carry on the business.

He was born on Dec. 18, 1887 in Fond du Lac county, a son of the late Louis and Frederica Bunkelman. Mr. Bunkelman came to Kewaskum 35 years ago and resided here ever since. His marriage to the former Lorinda Meinecke took place on Sept. 16, 1922 in Kewaskum.

Surviving are his wife and two children, Edward C. and Bernice (Mrs. Robert Scannell), both of Kewaskum; one son-in-law, one daughter-in-law, four grandchildren, Lee and Larry Bunkelman and Susan and June Scannell; four sisters, Mrs. Lena Seeger, Hulda (Mrs. John Koepke), Mrs. Clara Vogel and Norma (Mrs. Walter Fah) all of Milwaukee; a brother, Arthur Bunkelman, Sr. of the town of Auburn, and his father-in-law and mother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Meinecke.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Wednesday until 11 a. m. Thursday when it was removed to the Peace E and R church to lie in state from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. The Rev. F. L. Rodenbeck officiated and interment was in the Peace cemetery.

Mrs. Walter C. Schneider, 58, nee Vionelda Geidel, of Kewaskum, passed away at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, on Thursday morning, May 24, following an illness of several months. Mrs. Schneider and her late husband conducted a tavern business at the intersection of Main st. and Fond du Lac avenue now operated by their son Marlin.

Born Sept. 23, 1897 in the town of Kewaskum, she was a daughter of the late Herman and Elizabeth Geidel. She was married to Walter Schneider in 1920 and the couple moved to the village in March of 1920. Her husband preceded her in death on July 19, 1955.

Surviving are two sons, Marlin H. and Ray, both at home; two sisters, Lorinda (Mrs. Henry Fick) of West Bend and Verona (Mrs. Roy Zuehlke) of Kewaskum; a brother, Wallace Geidel, of Kewaskum, and many other relatives and friends.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home after 2 p. m. Saturday and at the Peace E and R church from 12 noon until the time of funeral services at 2 p. m. Sunday. The Rev. F. L. Rodenbeck officiated and burial was in the church cemetery.

ALFRED VAN DE ZANDE

Alfred Van De Zande, 62, of Campbellsport, prominent Fond du Lac county, Republican, who retired last October as state insurance commissioner, died at his home Thursday, May 24, after ailing with a heart condition.

He was a former Fond du Lac county assemblyman and state senator from the 18th Wisconsin district, and was also president of the Campbellsport Mutual Insurance company.

He formerly served as president of Campbellsport for two years and was a member of the village board of trustees for two years. He also was a former Fond du Lac county sheriff and was an undersheriff for one term.

During the past two interims he was chairman of the motor vehicle committee of the Legislative Council.

Mr. Van De Zande was a member of the Masonic order, the Tripoli Temple, the Scottish Rit Bodies of Milwaukee, the Knights Templar, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, the Fond du Lac County Historical society and the Brotherhood of the Reformed church at Campbellsport.

Surviving are his wife, three daughters, Iris and Mrs. Paul Theisen of Campbellsport and Mrs. Robert Gonnering of Milwaukee; two grandchildren, three sisters and a brother.

Funeral rites were conducted at the Campbellsport Reformed church at 2:30 p. m. Saturday. Burial was in the parish cemetery.

ALFRED YOOST

Funeral services were held last Thursday for Alfred Yoost, 219 S. 8th avenue, West Bend, a former resident of Kewaskum. He died at St. Joseph's hospital on Monday after ailing for several months.

Born in Riga, Latvia, July 12, 1885, he came to this country when only two months old. The family settled in Milwaukee and later on lived in Kewaskum. Then they lived on a farm near West Bend before moving to that city in 1934.

Mr. Yoost was married to Ida Benicke in West Bend on Feb. 9, 1910. She predeceased him. They were the parents of five children, two of whom survive, namely Clarence and Wilmer, both of West

Harvey Techtman Buys Kapfer-Gehl Business

Announcement was made this week that Harvey Techtman of Hilbert, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Techtman of Kewaskum, has purchased the Frank Gehl (Kapfer-Gehl) funeral home at West Bend and Barton as well as the furniture business operated by Gehl in Barton. Mr. Techtman formerly conducted a funeral home in Kewaskum before going to Hilbert.

Mr. Gehl stated that he had been anxious to dispose of the business for some time and may spend about a year in Florida before deciding what he will do later. The Gehls will retain their home in West Bend and rent it to the Techtman family until they secure a residence of their own. The sale includes the business and real estate at the funeral home in West Bend, but only the furniture business in Barton. Ole Myrhum, who is presently associated with Frank Gehl as assistant, will be retained under the new setup and will have an interest in the business.

Gehl started working for Andrew Kapfer in 1926 and later became a partner in the business. In 1948, upon the retirement of Kapfer, Gehl took over the business. The sale of the business becomes effective June 18 and Gehl expects to be closed from June 14 to wind up his business before turning it over to the new owner. 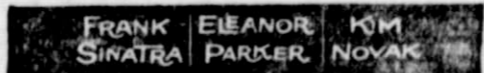

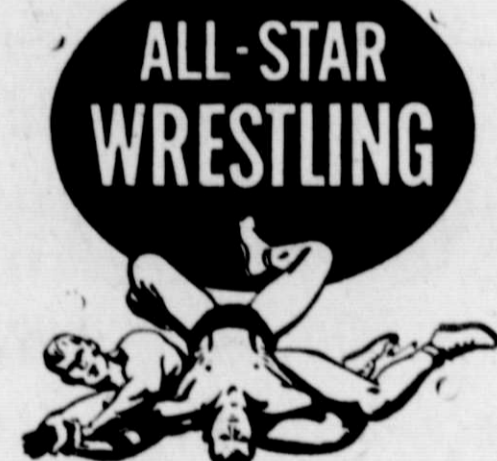
