Reconstruction of Hwy. 45 Through Here Authorized

URBAN PROJECT WITHIN VIL-LAGE LIMITS WILL ALSO BE CARRIED OUT

Plans for improving several highways through Washington county are rapidly progressing through the efforts of Assemblyman Elmer J. Schowalter of the town of Jackson.

Plans indicate that surveys and plans for U. S. Hwy, 45 between West Bend and Kewaskum have been authorized with construction contemplated for 1957. Actual work on the survey is expected to begin within the next month or two.

The highway commission has authorized an urban project for reconstruction of Hwy. 45 within the corporate limits of the village of Kewaskum and it is anticipated that this project will also be carried out in 1957.

The contract for the bituminous concrete resurfacing of STH 145 to the south limits of West Bend was awarded to the White Construction Co. of Milwaukee on a bid of \$245,892 for 13.245 miles. Work should begin in June. The highways
