N. W. Rosenheimer Member of UW Half Century Club

Newton W. Rosenheimer, Kewaskum, is among the 224 surviving members of the Class of 1906 of the University of Wisconsin who will be inducted into Wisconsin's Half Century club at one of the high-light events of the state university's annual commencement-reunion weekend calendar June 14-17.

The surviving members of the class who received their degrees from the university 50 years ago will become members of the Half Century club at a luncheon in Great Hall of the Memorial Union on the university's commencement day, Friday, June 15. The graduates of '06 will be presented with golden jubilee certificates in recognition of their 50 years of loyalty to their alma mater.

This year marks the 16th in the history of the university and its alumni association that the certificates have been presented to Wisconsin graduates of a half century or more, beginning with the Class of 1891, and brings total membership in the club to over 1,600 over the past 15 years. Gordon R. Walker, Racine, president of the Wisconsin Alumni association, will present the golden jubilee certificates to the members of the Class of 1906.

Climax of the university's commencement-reunion weekend will be the solemn commencement ceremony at 5 p. m. Friday, June 15, in historic Camp Randall stadium, at which some 2,300 students will be given their first and higher degrees and five honorary degrees will be conferred by the university.

Car in 2 Mishaps Half Hour Apart

Hard luck followed a Fond du Lac driver on his visit to Kewaskum last Friday when his auto was involved in two accidents within a half hour's time.

The driver, Andrew C. Brown, 50, of R. 2, Fond du Lac, is no relation to the Andy Brown of the Amos and Andy show. At 1 p. m. Friday his car collided with a pickup truck, driven by Aloys J. Pflueger, 55, of Elkhart Lake, and owned by H. Ramthun & Son of Kewaskum, at the intersection of Railroad and First sts. Pflueger, an employee of H. Reconstruction of Hwy. 45 Through Here Authorized

URBAN PROJECT WITHIN VILLAGE LIMITS WILL ALSO BE CARRIED OUT

Plans for improving several highways through Washington county are rapidly progressing through the efforts of Assemblyman Elmer J. Schowalter of the town of Jackson.

Plans indicate that surveys and plans for U. S. Hwy. 45 between West Bend and Kewaskum have been authorized with construction contemplated for 1957. Actual work on the survey is expected to begin within the next month or two.

The highway commission has authorized an urban project for reconstruction of Hwy. 45 within the corporate limits of the village of Kewaskum and it is anticipated that this project will also be carried out in 1957.

The contract for the bituminous concrete resurfacing of STH 145 to the south limits of West Bend was awarded to the White Construction Co. of Milwaukee on a bid of \$245,892 for 13.245 miles. Work should begin in June. The highways will be kept open to traffic.

Good progress has been made on the preparation of plans for the second lane of USH 41 from USH 45 at the Richfield interchange to a point just north of the junction with STH 60 at Slinger. It is also possible that a contract will be awarded on the second lane on USH 41 from STH 60 to STH 33 at Alenton.

Wierman Hurls Chevs To Six-Hit 3-1 Win Over Port Sluggers

NINTH INNING HOMER SPOILS SHUTOUT FOR YOUNG PITCHER IN WELL PLAYED GAME; GERMANTOWN HERE THURSDAY NIGHT

Doug Wierman, fresh out of high school, mastered the heavy hitting Port Washington team to give the Kewaskum Chevrolets a surprise 3-1 victory in a game played at Port Sunday. It was one of the best, all-around games seen in a long time and the win was the Chevs' second in three starts.

Pitching a 6-hitter against Port's sluggers, whose lineup includes such able stickmen as Sauer, Doug Ritchie, John DeMerit, Rich Ruskart and Pat and Mike Monahan, Wierman was deprived of a shutout on a ninth inning home run by Ritchie. Little Doug pitched eight scoreless frames and was ahead 3-0 until Ritchie got hold of one in the last inning. Wierman had beautiful control and didn't walk a single batter, while fanning four.

The young twirler deserved a five-hitter but a gift double was given to John DeMerit by a very lenient home score marker. DeMerit is the same fellow who starred on the University of Wisconsin varsity team this spring. DeMerit was a sensation on the Wisconsin team as a sophomore this year with his heavy hitting. Batting cleanup, he led the Big Ten conference in home runs, was second in runs batted in, and was named on the all-Big Ten team. The powerful hitter also led the Badgers in batting and stolen bases. Wierman had the slugger eating out of his hand, forcing him to pop up three times and ground out once.

Kewaskum also garnered six hits off of the Port hurlers, Busch, who threw for eight innings, and Welland, who came in in the ninth. Busch whiffed four and Welland one. Busch walked six and Welland none. The Chevs crossed the plate with single runs in the second, third and ninth stanzas. John Tessar paced the winners in hitting with 2 for 5, one of them a double. Ruskart was the only Port batter with 2, both singles.

Credit must be given to the Kewaskum team for their excellent defensive play. They did not commit an error and played heads-up ball

in handling everything within reach that Port hit at them. This provided a big lift for Wierman in gaining the victory. On the other hand Port was charged with five miscues.

On Thursday night of this week the Chevs were host to Newburg under the lights here. This was the first night game of the season and another one is in store for the fans next Thursday night, June 14, when Germantown comes to town.

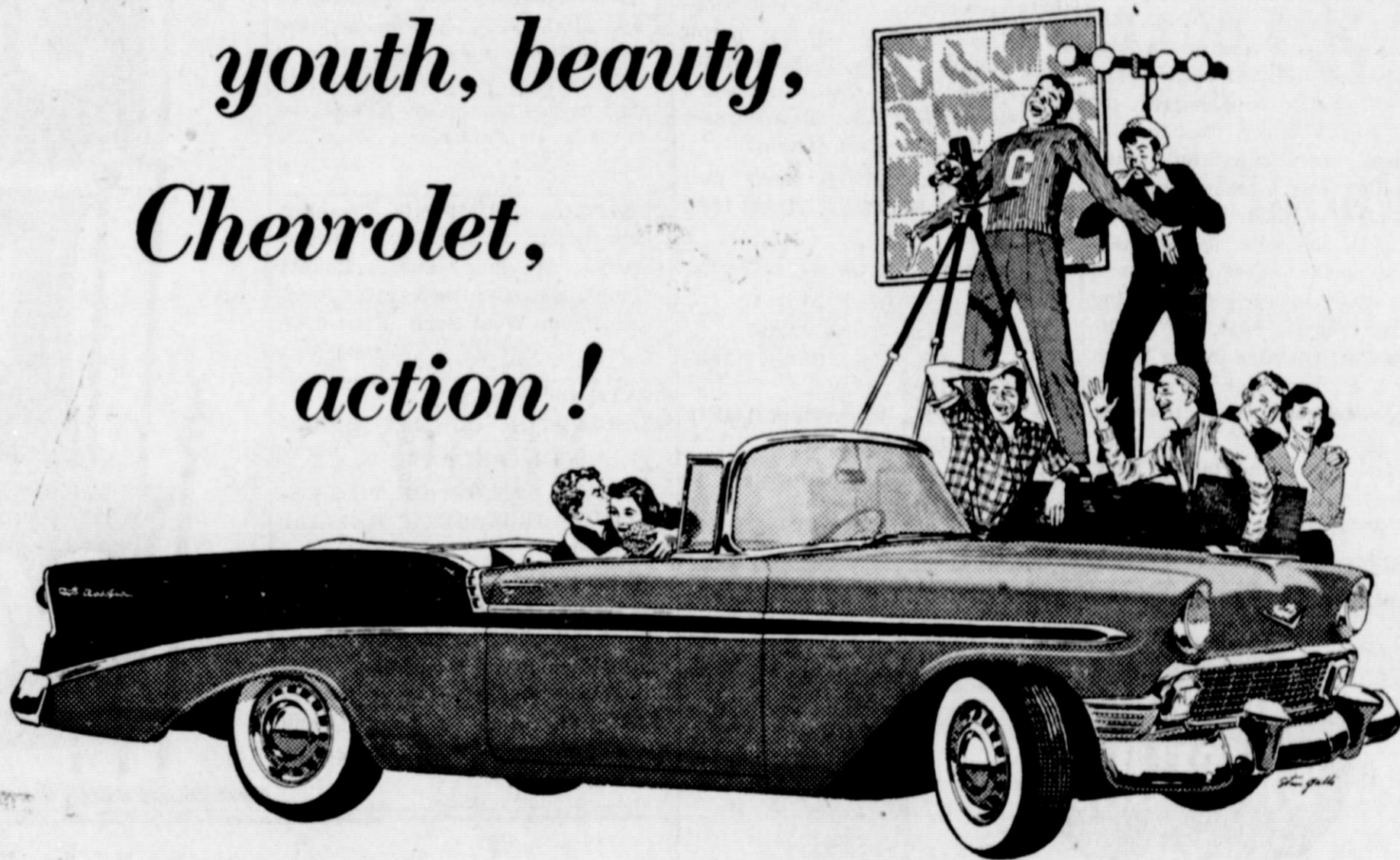
