Annual Meet, Budget Hearing Of Local High School District

Total Budget Of \$134,325.00 Is Presented

M. RILEY, C. STAUTZ UNANIMOUSLY RE-ELECTED DIRECTOR, CLERK RESPECTIVELY; 31 ELECTORS ATTEND

The budget hearing of Kewaskum Community High School District No. 2 was called to order by Melvin Riley, director of the Board of Education, at 7:00 p. m. on Monday, June 25, in the high school auditorium.

The proposed budget was read and explained to the electors. There was considerable discussion concerning the cost of equipment for the new building and the most feasible plan of raising the money to pay for same. It was suggested that the board investigate the possibility of borrowing additional funds on a long-term basis to finance the cost of equipment.

It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by Theo. R. Schmidt to alter the budget in the amount of \$5,000.00, increasing the amount to be raised for capital outlay from \$10,000.00 to \$15,000.00. Motion carried.

It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by August Koch to present the budget, as changed to total \$134,325.00, at the annual meeting. Motion carried.

Budget hearing was adjourned.

Mr. Riley called for nominations for chairman of the meeting. Marvin Martin nominated Melvin Riley. It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by August Koch that nominations be closed and that the clerk cast a unanimous ballot for Melvin Riley. Motion carried.

Minutes of the previous annual meeting and the special meeting of Sept. 26, 1955, were read. It was moved by Theo. R. Schmidt and seconded by Ralph Erdmann to approve the minutes as read. Motion carried.

The auditor's report prepared by the firm, Kannenberg and Marx, was read by Ralph Marx. It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by Donald Koerble to accept the auditor's report. Motion carried.

It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by Marvin Martin to dispense with the reading of the clerk's report. Motion carried.

It was moved by Ralph Marx and seconded by Ray Schaefer to dispense with the reading of the treasurer's report. Motion carried.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Motorcycle Gang On Rampage Here

A group of 14 motorcyclists from Milwaukee, all youths and young men, roared into Kewaskum Saturday night with the mufflers open on their cycles, caused a great deal of disturbance and ran into trouble with the law, leading to the arrest of eight members of the party.

The cyclists reached here about 10:30 p. m. and drove around town with their cut-outs open, waking up many people and scaring others with their terrific noise. Not satisfied with this, the drivers did trick riding on East Water st., played tag on the streets, failed to stop for arterials and exceeded the speed limit.

From here they sped to Mauthe lake where they drove around the beach and camping ground, causing more disturbance. The group rode over the lawn of Clyde Smith, Kettle Moraine area supervisor, and used abusive language when he attempted to stop them. Smith then drove into Kewaskum to notify and summon police officers.

When the motorcyclists entered the village on their return trip at about 12:50 a. m. police were waiting for them. Chief of Police Roland Pledl spotted them at the outskirts of town on the River road and followed them into the village. On Main st. near the intersection with Fond du Lac ave. (Hwy. 45), he drove in front of the cycles to halt them. When he ordered them off of their machines they took off in all different directions. He succeeded in nabbing two of the drivers, then radioed Washington county police to set up a road block. Two more of the cyclists were picked up later by West Bend police. Chief Pledl also obtained the license numbers of four of the other motorcycles and called the drivers in Milwaukee, informing them to appear in court here Tuesday evening. It was reported that one of the cyclists drove into the river here when he cut through an alley in his attempt to escape officers.

Eight members of the group were ordered to appear in Kewaskum justice court Tuesday evening with Judge Herbert Matenaer of Barton presiding. Five of them were fined \$16.50 and one was fined \$35.00 on two offenses. The other two excused themselves, one claiming he was sick and the other that he had to work. They will appear at a later date.

5 Persons Hurt in Car, Truck Mishap

In an accident which occurred at about 5:15 p. m. on Tuesday on Hwy. 41 about a block north of the junction with County Trunk Y, five persons were injured when a car and truck "hooked bumpers," upsetting both vehicles.

The mishap happened when Miss Judith Matthews, 18, of R. 1, Hartford, passed a truck driven by Clifford N. Rook, 30, of R. 3, Kewaskum. Both machines were traveling north on Hwy. 41. As Miss Matthews cut in ahead of the truck, the right rear bumper of her car "hooked onto" the left front bumper of the truck. The Matthews car landed in the ditch on the left side of the road, tipping over, and the truck rolled over on its top on the right side of the highway.

Robert E. Matthews, father of Judith, suffered injuries to both his ankles and cuts and bruises on his face. Judy incurred serious injuries to her right ankle and body bruises. The driver and passengers in the truck were pinned in the cab. They included Rook, who apparently suffered head injuries; his son Robert, 4, whose injuries were not immediately determined, and Walter Rook, 55, the grandfather, of Mundelein, Ill., who also suffered a possible head injury.

The Matthews were taken to St. Joseph's hospital Hartford, and the Rooks to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend.

Lyle E. Martin, 24, R. 3, Kewaskum, sustained a sprained back early Friday when the vehicle he was driving left a town road about a half mile west of Boltonville, severing several guard rail posts.

Dale J. Gadbar, Milwaukee, was shaken when his car left a Hwy. 45 curve in the town of Auburn at 5:15 p. m. Sunday and rammed into an embankment, bouncing off, and coming to a stop. Officers reported that the car traveled 180 feet out of control.

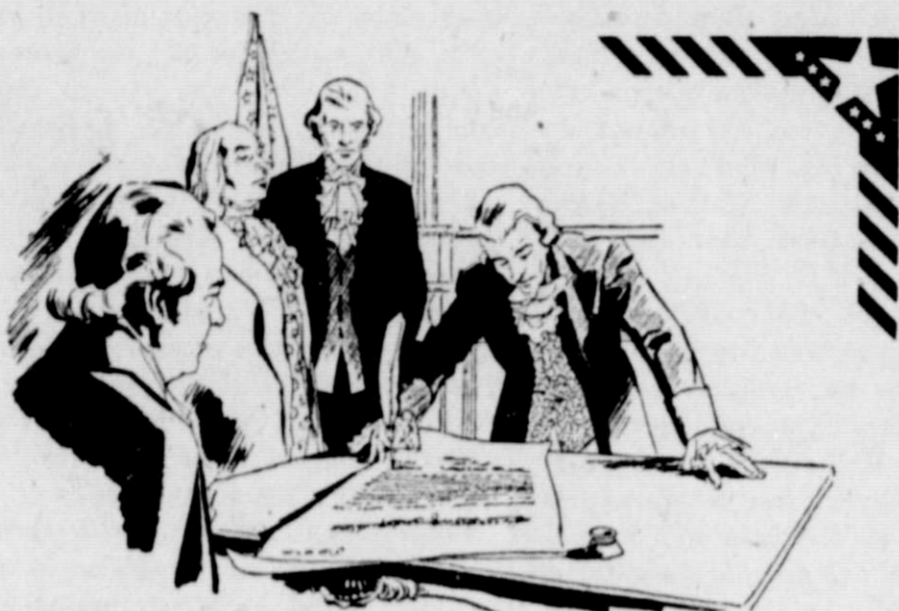

Break Ground Sunday For New Co. Home for Aged at Big Cedar Lake

PEACE CHURCH A CAPELLA CHOIR OF KEWASKUM TO SING AT SERVICE, MRS. HENRY ROSENHEIMER TO DIRECT

On Sunday, July 1, at 3:00 p. m., William Koehl, aged resident of Washington county, will turn the first shovel of earth at a groundbreaking service marking the erection of a home for the aged at Big Cedar lake.

The site for the home is a part of a 99-acre farm bordering Cedar lake (near West Bend) on Highway Z which Mr. Koehl donated to the Benevolent Society of the Evangelical and Reformed Church of the South Wisconsin Synod three years ago. Lay people of various congregations have already turned the old farm and blacksmith shop into an attractive over-night retreat headquarters for family groups, youth, women's and men's groups. Also, other portions of the farm are in the process of being developed as swimming, picnicking, hardwood and evergreen forest areas.

The Benevolent society, at the annual meeting on May 14, 1956, voted a \$187,500 budget to build and begin operation of the home which will be the first home for the aged erected by the Evangelical & Reformed church in Wisconsin. William P. Wenzler of Milwaukee is the architect for the society, and Mrs. Harry Baumer of West Bend is chairman of the building committee. The following comments have been made by Wisconsin state officials about the home: Phillip Dreifuss, public health engineer for the state of Wisconsin, "This office feels that you have done an excellent job in the planning of this home for the aged." Miss W. Martin, State Board of Health, district nurses, "We are extremely pleased to see the type of facilities that you are providing for the aged. It is one of the very best in the entire state of Wisconsin."

Guest speakers for the service will be the president of the synod, the Rev. Wilson Bixler, of Sauk City, and the newly elected full-time president of the synod who assumes his duties in August of this year, the Rev. Paul Kehle of Monroe. Also taking part in the ground breaking ceremony will be the board of directors of the society headed by the Rev. Warner Siebert, president, of Hartford, and other dignitaries of the church and County.
