## Former Kewaskum Man Killed When Plane Crashes in Storm

### Edward Dettman Dies in Mishap At Manitowoc

**TWO WEST BEND MEN ALSO INJURED IN SAME CRASH OCCURRING DURING SEVERE WIND STORM**

Edward Paul Dettman, 38, a resident of Kewaskum until a few years ago when he went to work in Milwaukee, was killed and two West Bend residents, including his brother, were injured Sunday morning when the single engine, four passenger plane in which they were flying crashed in a field south of Manitowoc in a violent wind storm.

Critically injured were Dettman's brother, Andrew, 37, and Ray Knickelbein, 47, both of West Bend.

Authorities reported that all three men were on their way to Manitowoc to attend a steam engine derby. They left the airport at West Bend early Sunday morning and arrived over the Manitowoc airport at 10.08 a. m. at the height of a severe wind storm. An eyewitness to the tragedy said the plane tried to land at the airport, and, being unable to because of the violent wind, headed east toward Lake Michigan. A short time later it was seen headed back inland in an apparent attempt to land in a field south of the city. A strong gust of wind seemed to roll the plane in midair and it plummeted to the ground.

Owner of the plane, a Fairchild 24, was Andrew Dettman. It was believed that Edward, a more experienced pilot, was at the controls when the crash occurred. Andrew sustained a possible brain concussion and other injuries and was still in an unconscious state at Manitowoc Holy Family hospital early this week. Knickelbein was less seriously injured in the mishap. He suffered a broken jaw.

Witnesses also said that the pilot was flying low, apparently seeking a haven from the winds, which had gusts of 60 to 65 miles per hour. The plane crashed in a field on the Fritz Pautz farm. Pautz said the plane just missed his house before striking the field.

Edward was born in the town of Scott, Sheboygan county, on Aug. 20, 1917, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Dettman. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Lorena Dettman, a sister, LaVerne, Quincy Bratz) of West Bend, and two brothers, Andrew, West Bend, and Sylvester, Kewaskum.

Dettman served in World War II and after being discharged was employed at the Fonda Motor company as a mechanic.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at the Techtman-Myrhum Funeral home in West Bend, the Rev. R. W. Groth officiating. Burial was in Lutheran Memorial Park, Kewaskum. The body was in state after 2 p. m. Tuesday.

Mrs. Nicholas Schommer, 60, nee Alvina Catherine Rubin, of R. 1, Neosho, Wis., a former Kewaskum resident who has two sons and two daughters living here, died at 1:25 a. m. Sunday, July 1, at her home following a lengthy illness with diabetes.

The body was in state at the Matenaer Funeral home, Hartford. Funeral services were held at 9:30 a. m. Tuesday at St. John's church, Rubicon, with burial in the parish cemetery. Revs. F. E. Weiss and R. Enders officiated. The church choir and nuns sang the requiem mass.

To Kewaskum elementary district: All of the area of the above district which extended into Wayne township, and all of the area in Barton township that already is in the Kewaskum Union High School District.

To Barton village district: All of the remaining areas in Barton township are attached that extend into Addison township.

This order became effective as of July 1, 1956. So all electors of former District Jt. 6 must attend the annual district meeting in the school of the district to which their property was attached.
