School District No. 1 Budget Hearing, Annual Meet Held \$50,000.00 Tax Levy Approved

STAUTZ, MARTIN ELECTED TO BOARD OF EDUCATION. SALE OF TWO SCHOOL PROPERTIES AUTHORIZED

The budget hearing for Joint School District No. 1 of the Village of Kewaskum, Towns of Kewaskum, Barton and Wayne, all in Washington county, and Towns of Ashford and Auburn, Fond du Lac county, was called to order by President Henry Rosenheimer at 7:20 p. m. Monday, July 9, 1956, there being 9 electors present.

It was moved by August Koch and seconded by Raymond Schaefer to unanimously elect Henry Rosenheimer chairman of the meeting. This was carried.

It was moved by Marvin Martin and seconded by Walter Wesenberg to approve the tax levy of \$50,000.00 and recommend this figure to the electors for their approval. This was carried.

It was moved by Clifford Stautz and seconded by Marvin Martin to adjourn the budget hearing. Carried.

The annual meeting of the electors of Joint School District No. 1 of the Village of Kewaskum, Towns of Kewaskum, Barton and Wayne, all in Washington county, and Towns of Ashford and Auburn, Fond du Lac county, was called to order by President Henry Rosenheimer at 8:00 p. m. Monday, July 9, 1956, there being 27 electors present.

Upon motion by Paul Landmann and a second by Marvin Martin, Henry Rosenheimer was unanimously elected chairman. The minutes of the 1955 regular annual meeting and the adjourned meeting were read by the clerk and upon motion by Marvin Martin and a second by August Koch were approved as read.

The auditor's report was read by Ralph Marx and on motion by Walter Wesenberg and a second by Ray Schaefer the auditor's report was accepted. This was carried. The printed clerk's and treasurer's reports were accepted.

Henry Rosenheimer refused to allow his name to be placed on the ballot for re-election. A rising vote of thanks for Mr. Rosenheimer's service to the Board of Education was given him by the electors.

Clifford Stautz and Marvin Martin were unanimously elected to the Board of Education for three year terms.

The following resolutions were adopted:

RESOLUTION NO. 1

"Be it resolved by the electors of Jt. School District No. 1 that a tax be levied on all the taxable property of the district for operating expenses for the year commencing in 1956 and ending in 1957 in the amount of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00)."

Post Office to Be Moved Into Koch Building

Postmaster Frank Heppe received notice on Saturday from the real estate manager of the Post Office Department that the lease for post office quarters for Kewaskum has been given to A. G. Koch, Inc.

The east portion of the Koch store building will be remodeled according to Post Office Department specifications and upon completion of alterations to the building, the post office will be moved there. New furniture and equipment will be furnished by the Post Office Department.

The post office has been located in the present building owned by Postmaster and Mrs. Heppe on Main st. for the past 19 years. It was also located in the Koch building prior to that but in the west portion of the building.

Further details concerning the change will be announced at a later time when the moving will take place.

Sportsmen to Join West Bend-Barton

At a meeting of the Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's association of Kewaskum held at the Woodman hall Monday evening members unanimously voted to consolidate with the West Bend-Barton Sportsmen's club.

Due to a lack of interest in the local club and poor attendance at meetings, it was decided to join the West Bend-Barton group. This club is a large one, is well fixed financially, and is very active. They have their own clubhouse and sponsor a trapshooting league. By joining a larger, sounder organization it was felt that more progress can be made in a conservation way.

A meeting of the West Bend-Barton club will be held next Monday evening at 8 p. m. at the clubhouse located just west of the Friendly Farmer tavern. All members of the Kewaskum club are invited to attend this meet. Trapshooting is held Tuesday nights and the league has two Kewaskum teams entered.

The local club will maintain its land and pheasant raising pens at the north village limits where 700 birds are now being raised and will be released later in the summer.

The name of the West Bend-Barton club will probably be changed to West Bend-Barton-Kewaskum club and later it is possible that it will take the local club's name of Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's association.

Accidental Death Of Ed. Krewald

Edwin Krewald, 62, town of Auburn farmer, was found dead on Wednesday evening, July 11, about one-fourth mile west of his farm home. Krewald was hauling hay and was pulling a load with a tractor when the vehicle ran off the road, through a ditch and into a marsh.

It was not determined whether the man suffered a heart attack or dizzy spell, rendering him unconscious and causing the tractor to run off of the road, or whether he died of head injuries he sustained when he was thrown from the machine. The Fond du Lac county coroner believed that Krewald suffered an attack and the accident followed. There were no signs of any other vehicle forcing him off of the road nor were there any witnesses.

He is survived by his wife and two sisters.

Mr. Haug was vice-president of the Kewaskum Mutual Insurance company, a director of the Bank of Kewaskum, and vice-president of the Hutson Braun Wholesale Supply Co. of Jefferson, Wis.

He was also a member of several organizations and societies, including Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post 384 of Kewaskum, the West Bend Knights of Columbus Council, Holy Name society of Holy Trinity parish, and the Turner society. He was a World War I veteran.

A son of the late Christ and Christina Haug, he was born on April 19, 1888 in Kewaskum. His marriage to the former Rose Ockenfels took place on Aug. 19, 1918 in Kewaskum.

Survivors include his widow, a daughter Rosemary (Mrs. George Goetz) of Park Ridge, Ill., a son Carroll of Kewaskum, who is associated with him in the roofing business; five grandchildren, and two brothers, Frank and Math, Haug, both of Campbellsport.

The body will be in state at Miller's Funeral home after 2 p. m. Friday. The rosary will be recited at the funeral home at 8 p. m. Friday. The family requests that in lieu of flowers memorial tributes be sent to the decorating fund of Holy Trinity church.

ties of the Washington county fair.

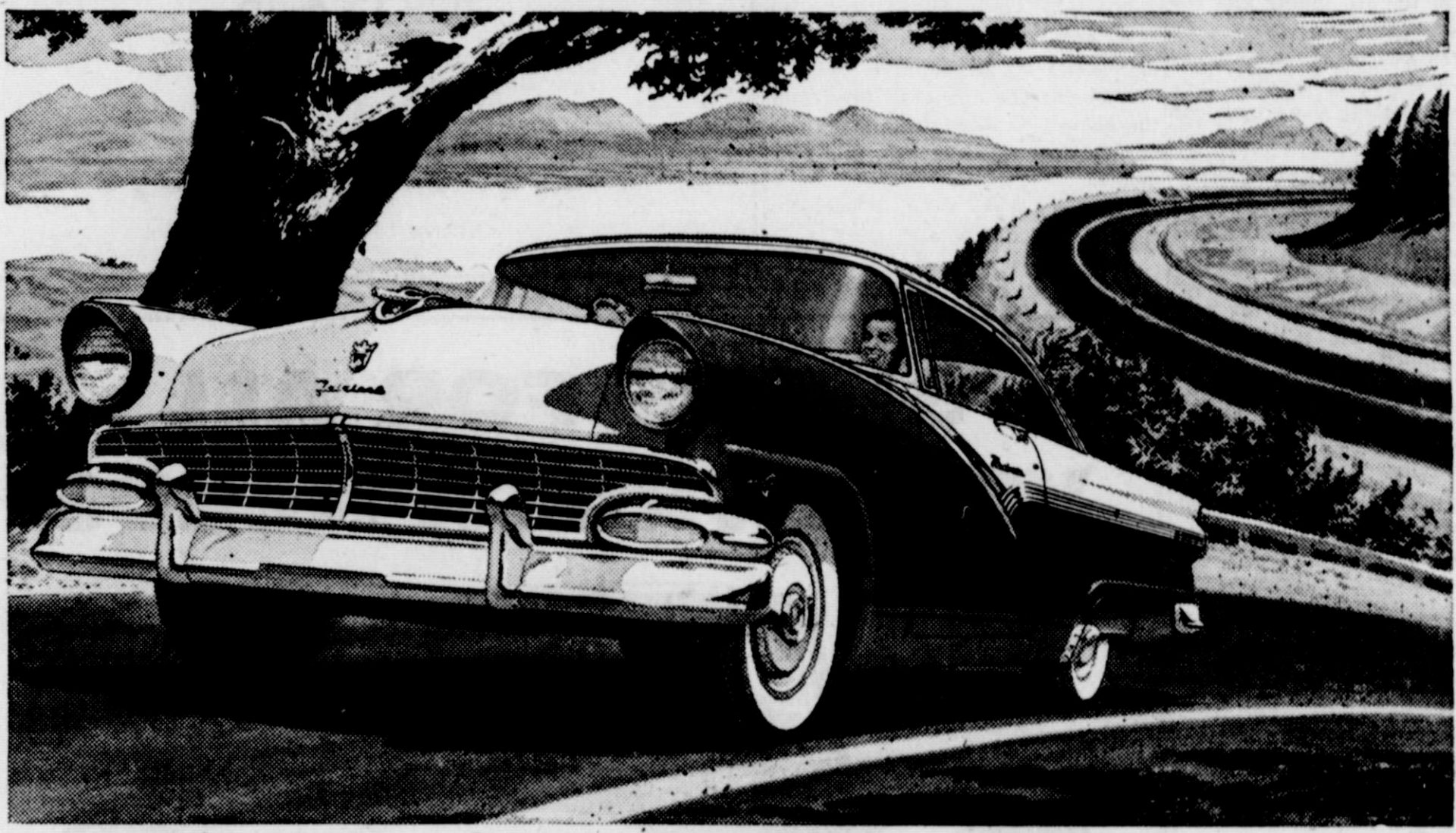

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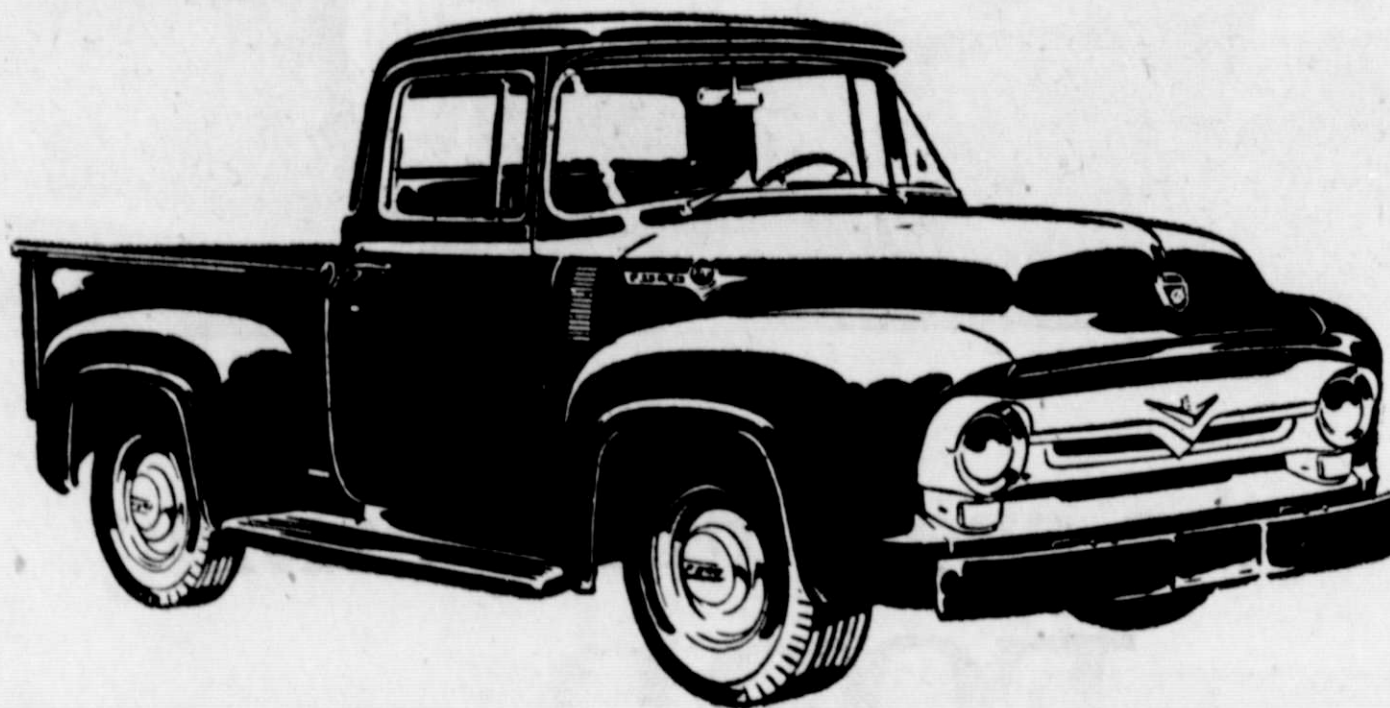
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
