## Cloudburst, Severe Electric and Windstorm Do Much Damage

### Lightning Strikes, Home Is Damaged, Basements Flooded

One of the severest electric and windstorms to strike in this area, accompanied by the worst cloudburst in many years, caused widespread damage last Thursday evening. At West Bend a total of 4.63 inches of rainfall were recorded, the heaviest downpour since 1924, a period of 32 years.

The storm hit at about 5:15 p. m. here. The electric storm and wind continued for a good half hour and the rain fell almost continuously until about 11 p. m. The lightning was very severe and was followed almost immediately by ear-splitting claps of thunder. Lightning struck at two or three places in the village and on many spots throughout the community. Power and light was off for a good two hours here.

Winds of hurricane proportions accompanied the storm and caused much damage. During the storm hail also fell at times. The storm seemed to pass over the village from the north, then the wind shifted and it came right back from the south just as severe as the first time. A short time later a storm of less velocity circled over town from the east as the wind apparently was moving in circles.

Most of the damage locally was caused by the heavy downpour. Scores of basements were flooded, some of them having four to five feet of water in them. Many streets, yards and gardens were completely under water as small lakes quickly formed on low spots. Storm sewers couldn't take the water and backed up, forcing the water over sidewalks and yards, down alleys and into basements. Water seeped down chimneys, through cracks, windows and other openings, causing interior damage in homes and business places.

The storm seemed to center on the block where our office is located and for a time we didn't know what to expect. Except for some water damage, a fuse blowing out and the power failure keeping our machinery idle we were fortunate. A window was blown out above Serwe's Tap next door. Across the street, a cord on the organ and a fuse in the church clock was burned out at Holy Trinity church. In the sister's home a four-way switch on a wall was knocked out. On this block lightning struck a large tree at the rear of the Remmel Mfg. Co., breaking it in half and toppling it to the ground. A tree was also struck by lightning or blew over on the Mrs. Minnie Merdes lawn on the same block. Another tree was split on the high school campus.

Smaller branches were blown off of numerous trees throughout the village. Objects were tossed about by the wind, garbage cans were seen rolling about and other objects went floating by. Topsoil washed away from many fields, gardens, driveways and yards. The storm damaged a gable, knocking a hole in the ceiling at the Edwin

### Rites Held for Edwin Kreawald

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Sunday in St. John's Lutheran church, New Fane, for Edwin Kreawald, 62, lifelong resident of the town of Auburn, who died accidentally at 5:30 p. m. Wednesday, July 11. The Rev. E. J. Zanow officiated at the rite and burial was in the parish cemetery.

Mr. Kreawald apparently died of a heart attack while hauling hay about one-fourth mile west of his farm home. He was going after a load of hay when he suffered the attack. The tractor he was driving left the road, ran through a ditch and into a field. The victim was thrown off of the tractor and dragged into a marsh.

The deceased was born Oct. 31, 1893 in the town of Auburn and lived on the same farm all of his life. He was married to Caroline Kreawald on May 30, 1917 in St. John's Lutheran church. He was a son of the late Charles and Louisa Kreawald.

Surviving are the widow, two sisters, Adela (Mrs. William Wunder) of New Fane and Eleanor (Mrs. William Trapp) of Town Scott; two sisters-in-law, four brothers-in-law, nieces and nephews. His mother predeceased him on Aug. 18, 1955.

Mr. Kreawald was very active in church affairs. He served for 12 years as an officer of St. John's Lutheran church.

Prior to the funeral the body was in state at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, from 3 p. m. Saturday until 12 noon on Sunday and at the church from 1 p. m. to the time of services at 2:30.

### FINED FOR DISCHARGING FIRECRACKERS IN VILLAGE

A Campbellsport youth was fined in justice court here Tuesday evening for discharging firecrackers and throwing them among the spectators during a ball game at the high school athletic field on Tuesday night, July 10.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl issues a warning that a village ordinance prohibits anyone from discharging firecrackers at any time within the village limits.

A similar ordinance also prohibits the discharging of firearms including BB guns, within the village limits.

### CITIZENSHIP PAPERS ARE AWARDED LOCAL RESIDENTS

Circuit Judge William C. O'Connell administered the oath of allegiance and awarded citizenship papers to 14 applicants recently at the Washington county court house. Judge O'Connell and County Judge Milton L. Meister addressed the group.

New citizens who received their papers included Tatjana Rauch and Zinaida Sadownikowa of Kewaskum. The American Legion Auxiliary of West Bend and representatives of the Dodge County Federation of Women's Clubs also participated in the program.

## Extend Age Group For Polio Vaccine Through 19 Years

Village Health Officer Dr. R. G. Edwards announced this week that effective Monday, July 16, the state board of health has authorized polio injections for children in the age group of 0 through 19 years of age. Previously only children in the age group of 0 through 14 years of age were eligible for the injections.

An increase in the state's supply of Salk polio vaccine has made possible the advancement in the age group eligible to receive the vaccine. Pregnant women are also eligible to receive the vaccine.

Two cc. of vaccine will be sent for each eligible person properly listed on the request forms, enough to give each person the first two injections. The state board of health must receive the name, age and address of each person for whom vaccine is distributed on request to physicians. No vaccine will be supplied for use as "boosters" in persons who have already received two injections. There is still not enough of the vaccine available to permit the administration of three polio "shots."

## Local Grain Plot Ready for Viewing

The demonstrational grain plot planted on the Earl Etta farm one and one-half miles north of Kewaskum on County Trunk G is open to farmers who are interested in viewing the plot at any time.

Maurice Hovland, Washington county agent, and O. E. Behnke, vocational agriculture instructor at Kewaskum, will discuss these plots at 7 p. m., a twilight affair on Monday, July 23.

Ten varieties of oats—Clinton, Beedee, Clintland, Nemaha, Rodney, Sauk, Fayette, Ajax, Branch and Vickland—and four varieties of barley—Montealm, Kindred, Fax and Oderbrucker—can be viewed at the Etta farm.

## West Bend-Barton Sportsmen's Club Admits Kewaskum

UNIT VOTES UNANIMOUSLY TO UNITE THREE GROUPS INTO ONE CLUB.

At a meeting of the West Bend-Barton Sportsmen's club held Monday night, the members voted unanimously to approve the admission of members of the Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's Association of Kewaskum into the West Bend-Barton club.

Mention was made in our last issue that members of the local club, at a meeting held last week, had voted to consolidate with the West Bend-Barton group. The action became official when that club accepted them at Monday's meeting.

The meeting was held at the clubhouse just west of the Friendly Farmer tavern. Lunch was served and refreshments were enjoyed following the meeting, which was very largely attended. About a dozen members of the Kewaskum club were in attendance.

After a discussion by officers and members of the West Bend-Barton group they voted 100 per cent to admit Kewaskum to their organization. Officers said that it was a move they had been hoping for and praised the Kewaskum group for taking the action to join. This was followed by a round of applause for the Kewaskum members, who were welcomed to the club.

Under terms of the arrangement it is planned to turn over holdings of the local club to the West Bend-Barton organization. The Kewaskum club owns about two acres of land, has pheasant pens for raising approximately 700 birds, the number now being raised, and will have a cash sum of about \$100 left in the treasury after the pheasants are fed and released.

The local organization has 140 members but only about 50 of them are active and will be absorbed by the West Bend-Barton club. Consolidation with that group was prompted by a lack of attendance at the meetings and an interest in participation in an active sports program such as advocated by the West Bend-Barton group.

Kewaskum sportsmen have two teams entered in the weekly trapshooting league of the newly joined club and have taken an active interest in other undertakings of that organization. It is intended that an increased interest in these activities will be taken in the future.

Affiliation of the two clubs will give the West Bend-Barton club a membership of around 350 active members. Monday's meeting was presided over by President Gary Koenings. Fred Sager gave a report on the sale of dance tickets for the dance to be held at the Zivko-Gonnoring ballroom this Saturday night. Arnold Kumrow reported on the pheasant raising program and Helene Ruttan reported on the club and trapshooting progress. The club meets on the third Monday night each month.

A final meeting of the Kewaskum club has been planned for Wednesday night, Aug. 1. Further details will be published next week.

Village fire trucks and the equipment truck went out right after the storm and began pumping out basements. Village employees went to work opening up sewers to let the water run away. The railroad section crew went out to repair washouts. The firemen worked straight through until almost 2 a. m. pumping the water out of basements. Some of the firemen then started working again about 5:30 a. m. and continued to pump out water almost all day Friday.

Shortly before dark the firemen had to cease work temporarily when they received a fire call to the George Herman farm home on R. 3, Kewaskum, about five miles west of the village. Lightning burned off a cable on a stove causing a short. There was no fire damage. The firemen had to drive through water across the road at several places on the run. A burning electric pole was noted on the way.

Over half of the 4.63 inches of rainfall poured down in the first hour. The normal rainfall for the entire month of July is 3 inches.

Damage to power lines was heaviest in the northern part of the county, in the Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Boltonville and Wayne

areas. Falling trees and limbs caused scattered damage and four crews worked until about 1:30 a. m. in these sections. After returning home one of the crews was called out again about 1:30 a. m. to work on a burning pole northeast of the village. A live wire which fell in the Belger addition here caused much concern but luckily no damage resulted although it took some time before it was located by an electric crew.

Quick work of Chicago and North Western railroad crews in locating a washout on the main line between West Bend and Kewaskum averted an accident involving the crack 400 northbound streamliner. The track was repaired and the streamliner pulled into Fond du Lac one hour and 40 minutes late after being held up in Kewaskum for some time.

Railroad officials said the washout was discovered near Kewaskum and the crew of the 400 was notified in time. In the meantime a section crew of the road's Wisconsin division arrived at the scene and tamped fill underneath the track ties.

There was untold other damage, all of which cannot be mentioned.

Commercial feed sales in Wisconsin decreased 25,000 tons from 1954, according to the feed sales report issued this week by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture.

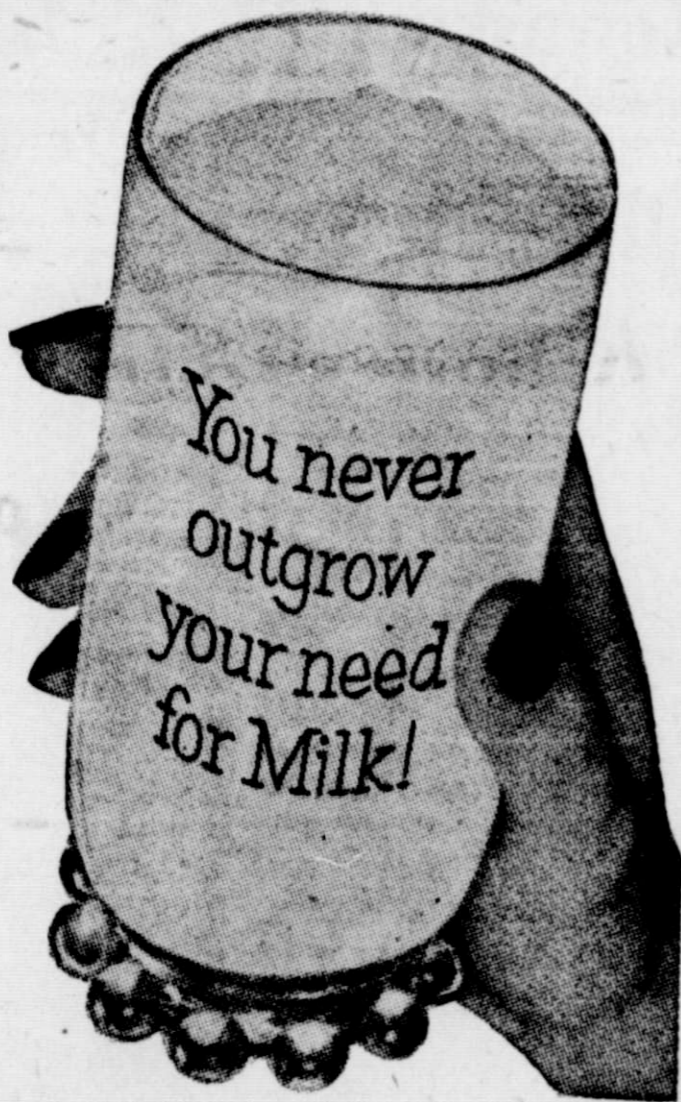

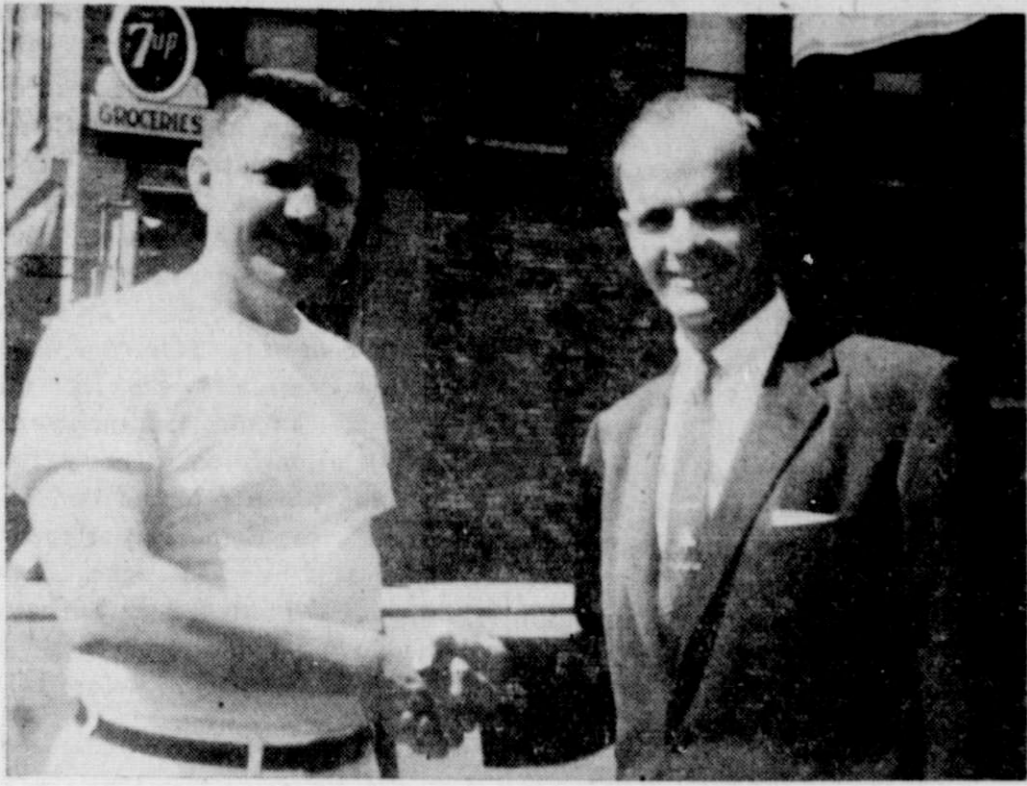

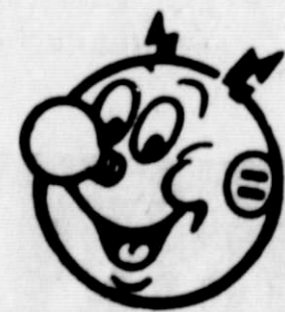

## Washington County Fair Will Open at Slinger Next Week

Washington county's 99th fair opens next week at Slinger, Thursday, July 26. Four big days of county fair activities are planned. These four days will include entering the various exhibits, installing the commercial exhibits, free entertainment, rides on the midway, judging and showing of the various exhibits. Washington county boasts one of the finest livestock fairs in the state of Wisconsin.

Thursday, July 26, is entry day. At this time all of the 4-H club members, FFA chapter members and FHA chapter members with other youth groups will bring to the fair their homemade and hand-made articles, plus cattle, beef, swine, sheep, poultry and will enter them in the county fair.

Thursday evening the big entertainment program will get under way with the Hartford American Legion band. They will be followed by the Washington County Young Adult Club program with a homemade minstrel show.

Friday, July 27, judging gets under way. At this time the foods, vegetables, flowers, grain, handicraft, clothing, swine, sheep, beef and dual purpose cattle, booths, and contests will all be judged.

Friday evening the Slinger Community School band will be on the program, followed by the second appearance of the Washington County Young Adult Club program and the county 4-H square dance group.

Friday has been designated by the fair committee as Children's Day. All rides on the midway will be at reduced prices for boys and girls who come to the fair.

Saturday, July 28, will be a continuation of the judging schedule. Dairy cattle, poultry, clothing and food preservation will be the main articles to be judged that day.

Entertainment on Saturday will get under way with a 4-H rhythm band organized in Washington county. In addition to the rhythm band, there will be a trampoline act

and a dog and pony act on the stage. The evening program will be the 4-H girls dress revue, followed by the Three Lenpatricks trampoline act and the dog and pony act. In addition the Saturday evening program will have the county 4-H chorus followed by organ music sponsored by one of the exhibitors on the fairgrounds.

Sunday, July 29, the judging program will consist of a continuation of the dairy cattle at 1:00 and will feature judging of the open classes of all livestock. Entertainment on Sunday will be highlighted by the Craig-Schlosser Post No. 31 American Legion Youth band. This band has been national champion two years and is going to Los Angeles in 1956 to protect their title. Also, there will be the trampoline act and the dog and pony act, as appeared on Saturday. The evening program on Sunday will be a second appearance by the Craig-Schlosser American Legion band, the trampoline act, and the dog and pony act. The entire fair is showing signs of being one of the finest conducted in Washington county and the entire public is invited. There is no admission charge, there is no parking charge, and there is no grandstand charge of any kind. You may come any time you like and stay as long as you like.

Bus service has been provided by the Johnson Bus Service and will start Friday evening, July 27. 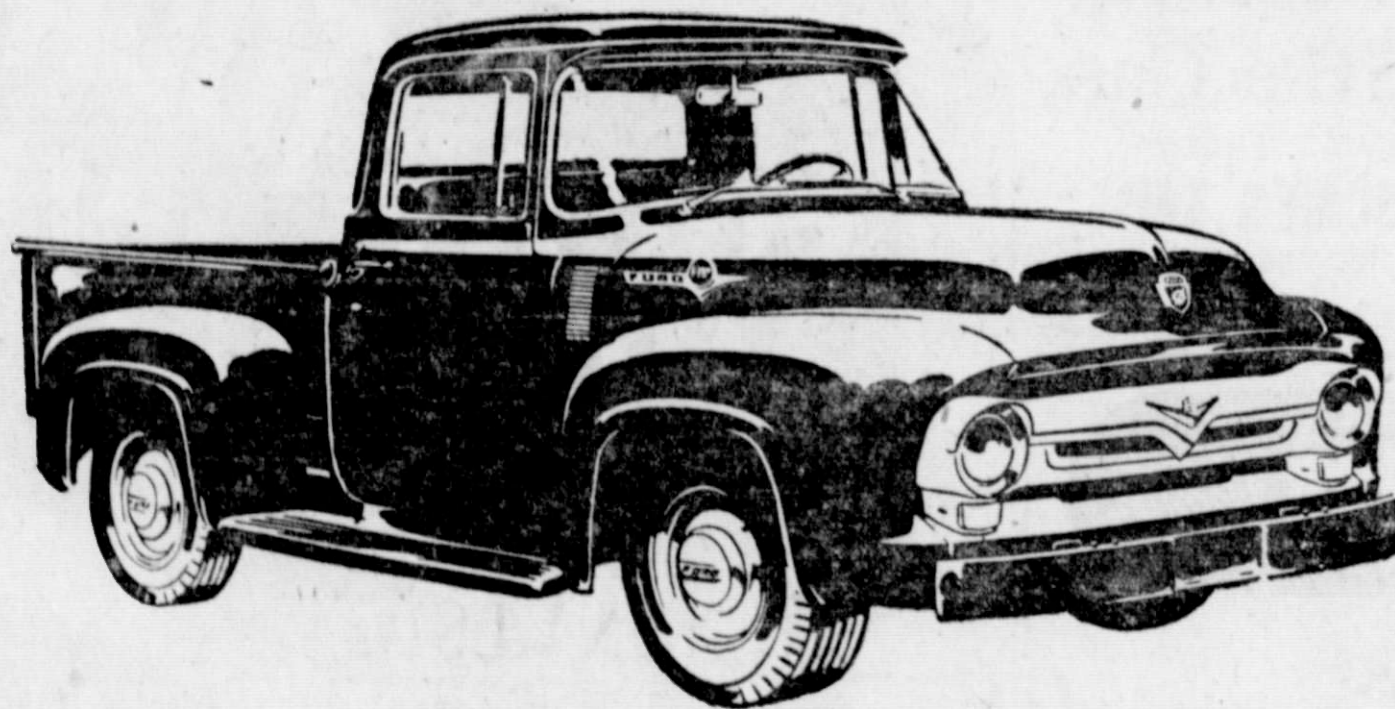
