## Henry Techtmann Robbed, Tortured By Armed Bandits

TOWN OF BARTON FARMER IS TIED UP, BEATEN BY TRIO; ROBBERY NETS \$250

Three young bandits forced their way into the home of Henry Techtmann, town of Barton bachelor farmer, residing west of Lighthouse Lanes several miles southwest of Kewaskum, tied him up to a chair, and escaped with over \$250 Monday night during a stay of an hour and a half.

The trio wore rubber gloves, carried large flashlights and at least one revolver during the robbery which took place shortly after 10 p. m. They drove a black car. Techtmann was forced into a chair, tied up with ropes and had his eyes covered with white tape at gun point.

The bandits directed bright flashlight beams into Techtmann's eyes before covering them with the tape. However, the man was able to give the sheriff a detailed description of one of the men. According to Sheriff George Brugger, torture tactics were used in an effort to make Techtmann reveal where his money was hid.

One member of the trio lit matches under Techtmann's feet and also struck him on the head with his fist and then his revolver. The farmer refused to talk and the men finally ransacked the house. Pillows and quilts were slashed, grease cans were tipped over on the floor and drawers and cupboards were searched. The bandits succeeded in locating about \$200 in gold pieces and at least \$50 in silver and folding money. They also stole a .22 cal. 7-shot nickel-plated revolver and a .32 cal. 5-shot revolver with a box of shells. The intruders at first took Techtmann's gold watch but then tossed it under the bed, believing apparently that it might be too easy to trace.

The robbers remained until about 11:30 p. m. About 45 minutes after that Techtmann loosened his bonds and made his way to a neighbor's home where John Knop called the sheriff's office for him. Upon questioning Techtmann, the sheriff obtained a good description of the apparent leader of the gang. A second man was also described but a description of the third man could not be given. Other clues were also obtained the following morning.

## Six Injured in Three Accidents

Six persons sustained minor injuries in three traffic accidents involving local people the past week.

Three of them were hurt last Thursday in a Hwy. 45 crash about two miles south of Kewaskum. The accident involved a car driven by Gerald Zimmer, 19, West Bend, and Jaeger Excavating Co. trucks driven by Art. Moritz, 63, West Bend, and Gerald Krueger, 24, R. 1, Thiensville.

Zimmer was driving south on 45 and the two trucks were traveling north, getting ready to make a left turn into the Jaeger driveway. As Zimmer came over the hill, Moritz was pulling across the southbound lane, with Krueger right behind him. The Zimmer car sideswiped the first truck in the west lane and then hit the other truck in the east lane. The auto was badly damaged.

Injured were: Moritz, minor lumps and bruises; Krueger, head injury, and Thomas Tessar, 18, Kewaskum, cuts on forehead and arm.

Two Kewaskum youths suffered cuts and bruises early Monday in an accident on a town road, about one mile southwest of Kewaskum. Rosemary June Kirchner, 17, R. 2, Kewaskum, was driving south on the gravel road, losing control of the vehicle as it came over a hill at the Gilbert Reindl farm. The car ran into a ditch, struck a stump and skidded around, striking an embankment. A passenger, Lloyd Butzlaff, 20, R. 2, Kewaskum, also received bumps and lacerations.

Gerald M. Schmidt, 26, Kewaskum, was involved in a collision Saturday night on the overhead bridge near the intersection of Hwy. 45 and County Trunk V just north of the village. Schmidt's car collided with one driven by Lloyd Plank, 50, of Taycheedah. Schmidt failed to stop for the accident and was later picked up. He suffered a cut on his left elbow.

#### SPRAY GUIDES AVAILABLE AT CO. EXTENSION OFFICE

In the Extension office, in the post office building, West Bend, there are available a great many spray guides to be used in all kinds of spray programs. If you have a spray program or a disease or insect problem on any of the normal crops you are raising on your farm, in your orchard, or in your home, you are urged to contact the extension office and get a copy of this spray program. They can give you a bit of information on how to spray such things as spur blight and anthracnose on raspberries, the cane borer and the red-necked borer in raspberries, stawberry spittle bug, white grubs, red-steel disease, etc.

In the orchards they can give you some information on controlling the codling moth, the railroad worm, scab, etc.

Even in the home flowers there are usually some spray programs that some flower gardeners wish to follow through. If you would like a copy of any of these spray programs, drop a card to the extension office and they will be glad to send you a copy of this spray program which you may use. We have available a great many different sprays today and all of these sprays will do a good job where they are supposed to be used. We, however, have to be careful on where we use these sprays in some instances.

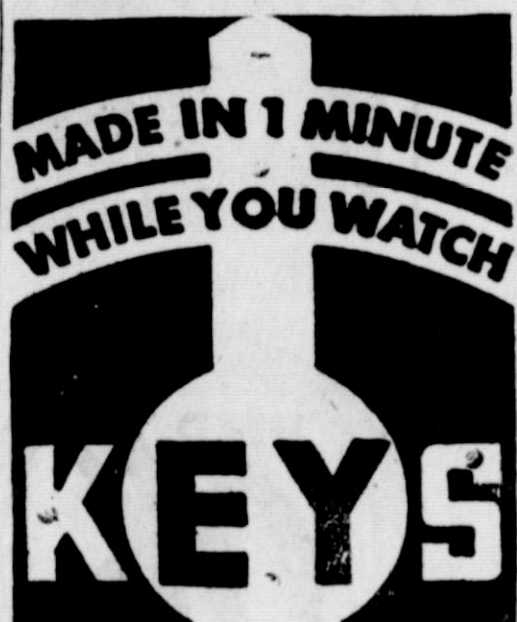

## Civil Defense Has Key Role in Peace

Natural disasters can strike anytime, anywhere.

From pioneer days to the present, neighbors have always helped each other in times of distress. But often, the power of a great hurricane, flood or tornado completely outmatched the valiant but disorganized efforts of untrained volunteers.

TODAY THE UNITED STATES has a form of disaster insurance—civil defense. Like any other insurance, it doesn't guarantee that disaster won't occur.

But by executive order, the Federal Civil Defense Administration does have the responsibility for coordinating all disaster relief efforts of the Federal Government under Public Law 875. This guarantees that the resources of the entire nation can be marshalled against nature on the rampage as required.

It's a job which requires the skills of many specialists, such as the Army Corps of Engineers, the National Guard and the American Red Cross. Trained civil defense workers in the general disaster area put their rescue, traffic control, first aid and other skills to practical use.

Mrs. Harold Fischer, R. N., authorized Red Cross instructor, will be in charge of the class.

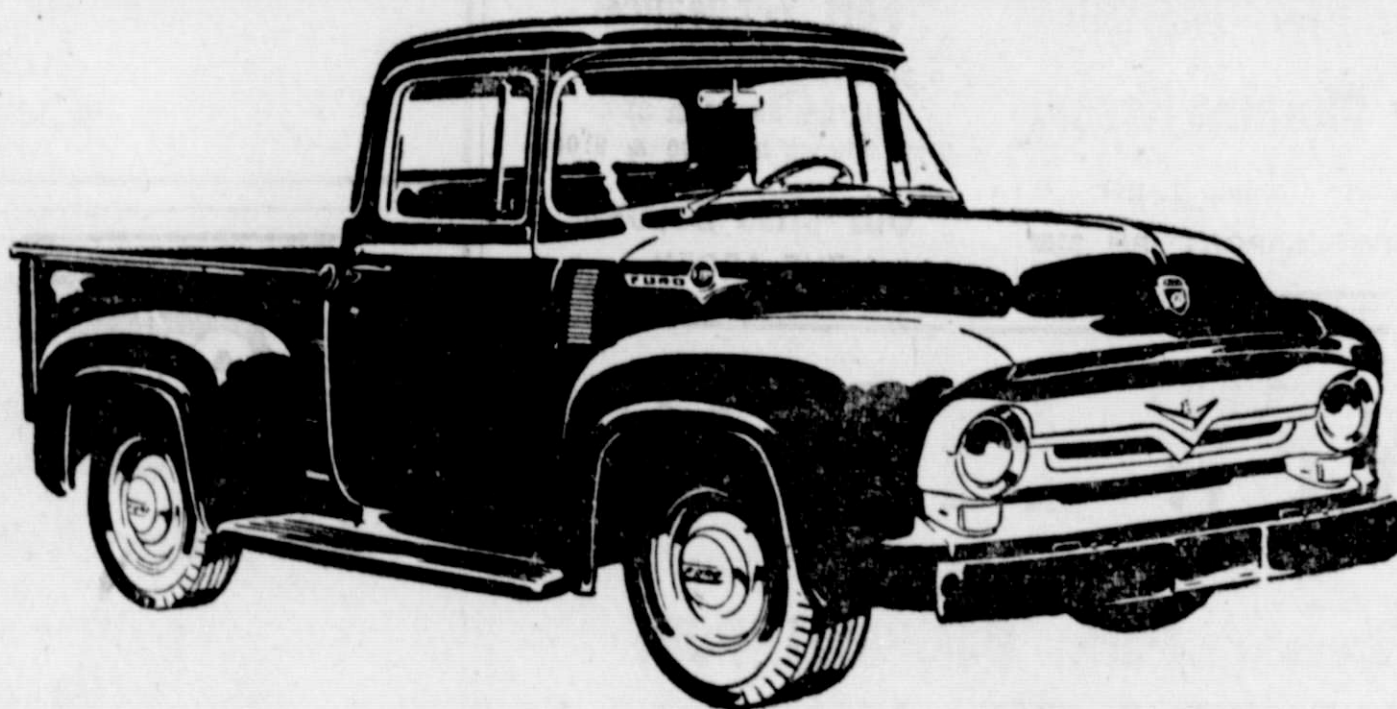
