Kewaskum Youth, Clayton Kohn Jr., 19, Killed When Car Strikes Tree in Village

Clayton Kohn, Jr., 19, of Kewaskum was fatally injured at about 1:15 a. m. Saturday, Aug. 11, when the new car he was driving went out of control on North Fond du Lac ave. (Hwy. 45) in the village and struck a large tree in front of the Henry Rosenheimer home. He died of his injuries at 4:20 a. m. at St. Joseph's hospital in West Bend.

According to witnesses, Kohn was driving his 1956 car which he had just purchased recently southward on Fond du Lac ave. He passed another car, cut in sharply and apparently lost control of his vehicle. The auto swerved to the left, then to the right and careened into the tree, first scraping a pole.

Authorities reported that the car traveled about 40 feet down the highway throwing Kohn out of the machine. He fell either out of the right front door which had opened or through the windshield which sprung out and landed across the street some distance away. The auto went about 23 feet further before coming to a halt with the rear end between trees and the front end on the edge of the highway. Kohn landed directly on the center of the road when he was thrown clear of the car, which was badly wrecked.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl and two county traffic officers, Forest Brown and David Backhaus, arrived at the scene and a local physician and the firemen's rescue squad ambulance were summoned. After being given necessary medical attention at the scene the injured youth was rushed to the hospital in the ambulance.

Kohn was reported to have suffered a severe flesh wound and fracture of the right leg, a fractured jaw, and numerous other injuries. He also suffered from a heavy loss of blood and severe shock. He was in a semi-conscious, hysterical condition when other motorists stopped and tried to calm him down until the physician arrived. The noise from the crash woke up residents of the neighborhood and many other spectators were attracted to the scene.

The death of Kohn was the 15th highway death in Washington county this year. Raymond Schultz, 7, of Saukville, who was killed when he was struck by a car in Newburg Saturday afternoon, was the county's 16th fatality, compared to a total of 17 for the entire year in 1955.

Kohn was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Kohn, Sr. His father is a supervisor at Regal Ware, Inc., where young Kohn was also employed.

Clayton Lester Kohn was born May 27, 1937 at Campbellsport, R. R. and moved to Kewaskum with his parents in 1938. Surviving in addition to his parents are a sister, Janis Ann, his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Mike T. Kohn, Kewaskum, uncles and aunts and other relatives.

Federal Allocation Of Polio Vaccine Terminated Aug. 1

The director of the State Poliomyelitis Vaccination division, Dr. Milton Feig, Madison, Wis., has just announced that the federal allocation of poliomyelitis vaccine on a state-by-state basis was terminated on August 1, 1956. Dr. Feig further states that of the estimated eligible (6-19 & pregnant women) group of 1,366,689 persons, \$19,410 had been given two injections each during the past nine months.

All vaccine now being produced will be available to doctors through regular commercial channels. All people who desire protection by the polio vaccine should apply directly to their family doctor for the 3rd or booster dose (7 months after the 2nd dose) or also for the first two doses.

Current reports indicate that polio vaccination yields better than 90% protection against paralysis in those persons having had all three injections, whereas the first injection alone affords about 75% protection. It is not known how long this immunity will last at present, but it appears that it may protect for a few years.

Busy Surveying Hwy. 45 Here; Work Progressing

Workers are busy surveying Highway 45 from Kewaskum to Barton in preparation for construction work on this highway. Work on Hwy. 45 south of Kewaskum will not get under way until next year, however, it was disclosed by County Highway Commissioner Al Rettler.

There has been considerable discussion relative to construction work on Hwy. 45 between Kewaskum and Barton. Edward J. Konkel of the Wisconsin Good Roads association, indicated some time ago in a talk to West Bend and Kewaskum businessmen that the state would probably insist on relocating or undertaking a major construction project on this part of the highway.

Rettler also revealed that work on preparing Hwys. 45 and 145 from West Bend to Germantown for repaving is progressing steadily and it is expected that resurfacing of the highways will begin with a short time.

Ambulance Beats Stork in Race

The Kewaskum firemen's rescue squad ambulance had its second race with the stork on Sunday morning and came out the winner, with quite a commotion resulting.

It happened while the Gerald Tierneys of 1586 S. Union st., Milwaukee, were returning from a vacation trip. While the couple was passing through Kewaskum, Mrs. Tierney began suffering labor pains.

The Tierneys contacted Chief of Police Roland Pledl who escorted them to the office of Dr. R. G. Edwards. The doctor was attending church services at the time, so the chief had him called out of church and gave him a speedy ride back to his office with the siren blaring on the squad car. Dr. Edwards, seeing that there was little time to spare, called the ambulance which sped to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. The doctor accompanied the expectant mother in the ambulance—just in case.

The ambulance got to the hospital before the stork arrived, but a 6 pound, 6 ounce baby girl arrived in the elevator as Mrs. Tierney was being taken upstairs to the delivery room. Dr. Edwards was with Mrs. Tierney to give the stork an assist.

Mrs. Tierney and the baby, Chief Pledl, the doctor and ambulance attendants are all doing fine. The Tierneys have two older children.

He was born April 9, 1890 at Marlon, Wis. and lived on a farm near Elmore a number of years. Thirteen years ago he bought a farm near Wayne where he had lived since. His marriage to Viola Scholt took place on Sept. 29, 1915 at Elmore. Mr. Koepke's parents were the late Franz and Amella Koepke.

Check Forgers Plead Guilty; Probe Ordered

Mr. and Mrs. Burke Weston, 18 year old Belgium couple held by Washington county authorities on charges of forgery and passing worthless checks, were arraigned before Judge Milton Meister in county court last Friday afternoon.

The Westons, parents of two children, were arrested last week Tuesday in connection with the passing of a series of worthless checks in Washington and Ozaukee counties, two of which they cashed in Kewaskum stores. They admitted the thefts, stating financial difficulties led to their check passing venture.

In court both pleaded guilty. Because of the many problems involved in the case, however, including the couple's age, their two young children and a complete listing of all the checks passed and the amount involved, which was estimated as about \$1,000, Judge Meister adjourned the case until later this week and ordered a pre-trial investigation of the matter before passing sentence.

Judge Meister appointed Atty. Steven O'Meara of West Bend to defend the Westons and requested Darrell Langmann, Washington county child welfare worker, to conduct a pre-sentence investigation. Atty. O'Meara and Dist. Atty. L. J. Goring were also requested to obtain all the facts and available information to be presented to the court before sentence is passed.

The county judge fixed bond at \$2,500 each. As they were unable to furnish bond, the couple was returned to the custody of the sheriff to be held in county jail. Mrs. Weston will be held in the Ozaukee county jail as no quarters meeting state requirements are available in the Washington county jail.

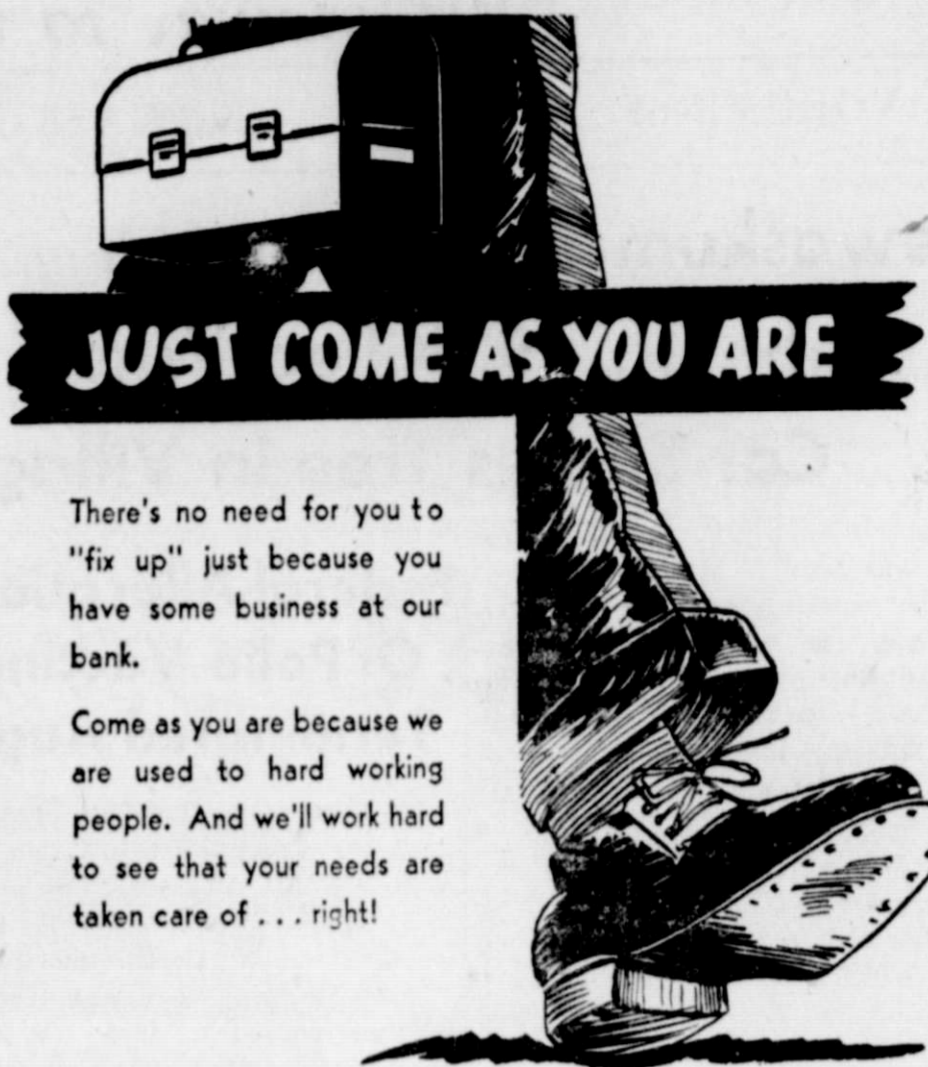

Chevs Lose 15-Inning Battle to Plymouth, Shut Out By Port

The Kewaskum Chevrolets dropped into a three-way tie for the cellar in the Lakes race by losing two games over the week end. In a make-up game under the lights here Sunday night "Hefty" Backhaus and Holzschuh of Plymouth engaged in a 15-inning pitchers duel that lasted until almost midnight before Plymouth pushed over three big runs in the 15th to win, 5-3. In another home night game last Thursday Kewaskum was white-washed by Port Washington, 10-0.

Sunday night's extra inning battle was a beautifully pitched game between Backhaus and Holzschuh. With the score tied at 2-2 after five innings both pitchers hurled nine consecutive scoreless frames before a run was scored. Holzschuh went the entire route and Backhaus worked until the 15th before being relieved by Killy Honeck. "Hefty," a very tired man after his long grind on the hill, filled the bases in the top of the 15th and forced in a run on a walk. Honeck came in and forced over two more on consecutive walks before retiring the side. This made the score 5-2 in Plymouth's favor but the Chevs scored a consolation button in their half of the 15th on a single by Bob Staehler and a booming triple by Honeck over the center fielder's head.

Holzschuh and Backhaus each gave up 12 hits in the marathon. "Hefty" struck out 10 batters and walked 8. Honeck added another strikeout. Holzschuh whiffed 16 Chevs and passed only 5 in the 15 frames. Leading hitters for the losers were Gordie Wierman and Staehler, each with 3 for 7. Wierman's blows included a triple and double. Rogers set the pace for Plymouth with 3 for 6, one a three-bagger.

Pitcher F. Busch handcuffed the Chevs in Thursday's arclight tilt here as Port shut out the Chevs by a surprising 10-0 margin. Busch

held Kewaskum to three scattered hits while his mates pounded three Chev twirlers for 13 safeties. Busch fanned 15 Kewaskum swingers and walked only three in his outstanding mound performance. Doug Wierman toiled the first seven innings for the losers with Honeck hurling the 8th and Backhaus the 9th innings. Between them they struck out 8 and walked five.

Port was ahead 3-0 and it was still a good game until the 8th inning when Wierman went to pieces and they scored 6 runs on 5 hits, a walk, error and a couple of wild pitches. As if this wasn't enough they added 1 more in the 9th. Busch retired the side in order in four innings and struck out the side in the 7th stanza. Kewaskum came closest to scoring in the 3rd and 9th innings when they got two men on base.

Gordie Wierman was the only Chev with 2 hits, both singles. The guys who caused Kewaskum all the trouble were Doug Ritchie and Mike Monahan who collected 7 hits between them. Ritchie had 4 for 6, including a triple, and Monahan got 3 for 6.

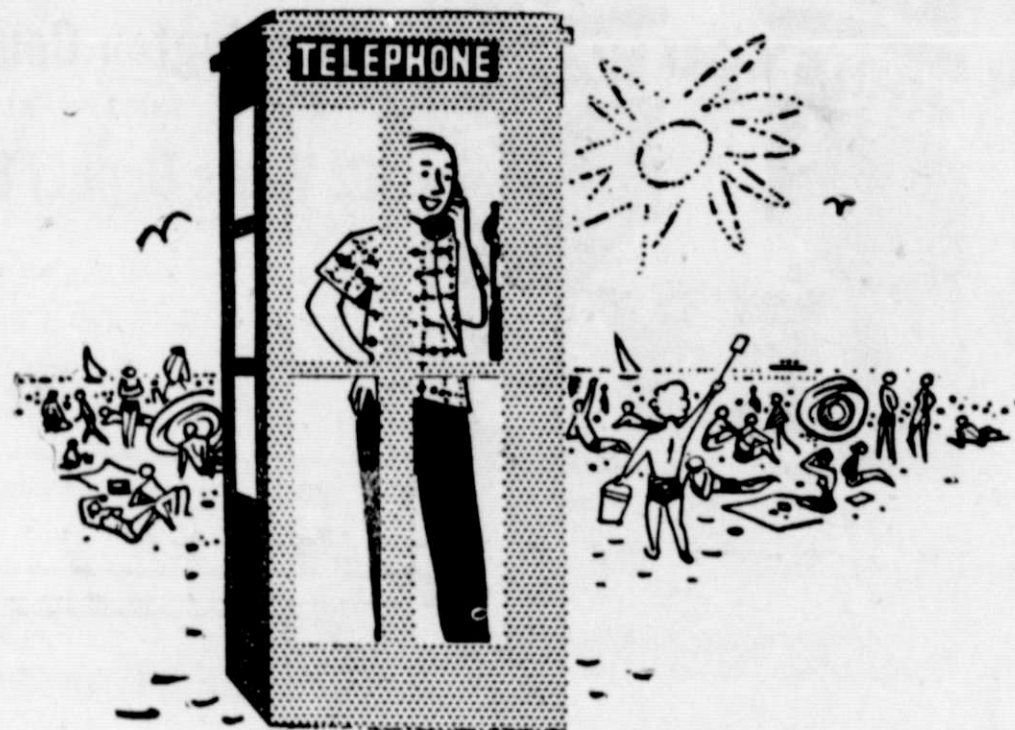

Street Improvements Authorized By Board

MEETING CALLED TO DISCUSS ANNEXATION TO VILLAGE OF AREA SOUTH OF LIMITS ON HWY. 45

Adjourned Meeting
July 30, 1956

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in an adjourned meeting with President Reigle presiding and all board members present except Trustee Stelplflug.

President Reigle gave a report on the recent trial of Heinemann vs. the Village of Kewaskum.

The board discussed the problem of surface water and sewage waste in the Belger addition. It was decided that the storm sewer on Habek Street should be extended eastward to Stark Street and possibly onto Kewaskum Street with the necessary plans and recommendations to be made by the McMahon Engineering Co.

The board decided that sidewalk and curbing shall be installed on Midland Ave. between Forest Ave. and South Street with the necessary grades to be established by the McMahon Engineering Co.

The Supt. of Public Works was authorized to improve Clinton Street, west of South Street so as to make it passable to auto traffic.

The board ordered the replacement of the broken sidewalk blocks fronting the Lee Rose and the Roy Zuehlke property.

Supt. Oppermann reported that the Washington County Highway Commission had been contacted regarding the low spot in the highway at the west end of the Main Street bridge.

Construction of a sidewalk on the east side of South Street, south of Clinton, was scheduled as one of the first projects for the spring of 1957.

A meeting was scheduled for Thursday, August 8th, with the re-

sidents along Highway 45 south of the village limits to discuss the question of annexation.

Upon motion made, seconded, and duly carried, the board adjourned subject to call.

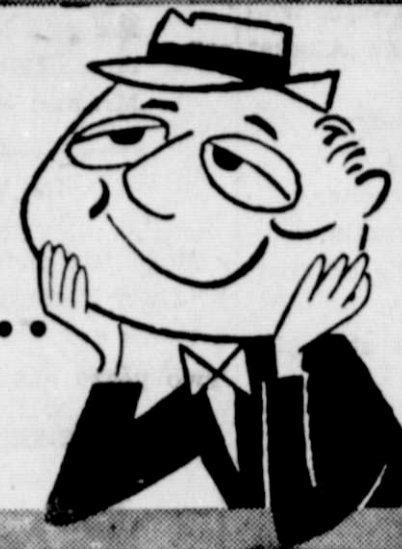
