ABSENTEE ELECTION BALLOTS AVAILABLE

Absentee primary election ballots have been distributed to the various community clerks throughout Washington county and are now available for all persons who wish to cast absentee ballots, County Clerk Anton P. Staral revealed.

Persons who cannot go to the polls on election day should apply for their absentee ballots either in person or in writing. Applicants can vote up until the day before the primary. If ballots are requested by mail they can be obtained up until three days before the election. Relatives of servicemen can obtain ballots for them.

Westons Get 4 Year Terms for Check Passing

Judge Milton Meister last Thursday sentenced Burke and Donna Weston, 18 year old couple from R. 1, Belgium, to two year terms in prison on charges of passing worthless checks and forgery. They were sentenced in county court.

Mrs. Weston was sentenced to serve a maximum of two years at the Wisconsin Home for Women at Taycheedah and Weston was sentenced to serve two years at the state reformatory at Green Bay.

The Westons also received another term of not more than two years at Green Bay reformatory and Taycheedah women's prison when arraigned in Ozaukee county court Monday morning. The sentences will run concurrently with the terms imposed upon them in Washington county last week.

The couple was arrested on Aug. 7 after passing a series of checks in Washington and Ozaukee counties totaling approximately \$1,000. Two of the bad checks were passed at Kewaskum stores. Judge Meister pointed out that the incidents became serious because forgery was involved rather than merely passing worthless checks or overdrawing an account.

Judge Meister reported that the couple was sentenced under the new state criminal code which permits setting a maximum penalty without a minimum sentence. He stated that if they adjust themselves and behave properly they can become eligible for parole within 10 months to a year on each count.

The Westons' two sons, six weeks and 13 months, were placed in the temporary custody of Weston's parents. Final care of the children during their parents' stay in prison will be determined later.

In sentencing the couple it was brought out that they had been in difficulty before and the community overlooked it and that the most recent offenses ranged over a two month period. Judge Meister ruled out probation for the couple on the grounds that they would be placed in a position which might steadily become more serious. He said the escapade of passing worthless checks became such an easy method of securing money that Weston quit his job and the couple hired a baby sitter and went fishing and made the rounds of taverns. An investigation of the case was held before sentence was passed.

Two Fires Damage Truck and Lean-To

The Kewaskum fire department answered a call to the John Metz farm in the town of Kewaskum, about 1 1/2 miles north of the village on County Trunk V at about 10:45 p. m. Monday. A lean-to built against the house caught fire resulting in damage to the roof and one wall of the small structure as well as smoke damage to the house itself. It is believed that the blaze was caused by faulty wiring in an extension cord running from the living room of the home, through a doorway, and out to the lean-to.

At about 7:30 p. m. Monday, Aug. 18, firemen were summoned to the Jerome Mayer farm in the town of Wayne, located on Kewaskum rural route on Hwy. 28, when a pickup truck caught fire in a shed. The truck was damaged and there was also slight damage to the shed. The truck had been pulled out of the shed before firemen arrived.

RACE RESULTS Stork Loses Again

The old stork is getting along in years and just hasn't got the speed and get-away it had in earlier races. It's timing also is way off.

This was proven again at about 9:45 a. m. Tuesday when the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance squad was called upon for another race with the stork to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. This was the squad's third race with the big bird and Tuesday's victory was by an even wider margin than in the one last week. A week ago Sunday the ambulance crew beat the stork as far as the elevator in the hospital but in the latest race they beat it all the way to the delivery room.

Tuesday morning Mrs. Ralph Strasbourg of Campbellsport was rushed to the hospital and gave birth to a 5 pound, 5 1/2 ounce baby girl at 10 a. m. Mrs. Strasbourg, mother of four other children, stopped at Dr. R. G. Edwards' office that morning and the doctor, seeing there was little time to spare called the ambulance squad to transport the expectant mother to the hospital. The infant was born prematurely and the hospital was reached just in time. Dr. Edwards accompanied Mrs. Strasbourg in the ambulance just in case the race would be lost.

Getting to be a regular occurrence, we found that one of the ambulance attendants had nonchalantly written across the ambulance report, "D— it, another girl."

SIX YEAR OLD GIRL TOPPLES INTO CREEK AT REGNER PARK IN WEST BEND

Another drowning at Regner park in West Bend was averted by quick action on the part of a 12 year old Barton youth when Roman Breit, Jr. of Barton pulled his six year old cousin, Roseann Breit of St. Michaels, from the stream at the park Tuesday morning when she tumbled over backwards into the water at the dam.

Roseann was watching her cousins, Romy Breit and his brother, Gerald, 9, who had been fishing at the fish pond and were wrapping up their fishing gear preparatory to leaving the park. Suddenly she toppled backwards into the stream, Romy rushed to the girl's assistance. The water was over her head and she swallowed quite a bit of it but otherwise was apparently uninjured.

Bill Jaeckels, a park employee, took the children to the Romy Breit home in Barton where the Breit boys and Roseann are being cared for by Agnes Breit, 17, during the absence of the Breit parents, who are vacationing up north. Roseann and Agnes are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. John Breit of St. Michaels. John and Romy Breit are brothers.

Roseann was wrapped in a blanket by park employees before she was taken to the Breit home at Barton.

Our food committee for next month is Beverly Kuehl and Robert Kroncke. The game committee is the same.


Our next meeting was planned for August 12 and our meeting was adjourned at 9:15 p. m.

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Chevs Lose 16-Inning Battle at Germantown

Although not scheduled, the Kewaskum Lakes team almost played a doubleheader at Germantown before finally being nosed out, 6-5, in a 16-inning heartbreaker Sunday. The win was Germantown's fifth in succession without a defeat in the second half and kept them in a tie for first place with Cedarburg, each having won 5 and lost 0.

Only a week ago Sunday the Chevs were shaded in a 15-inning game by Plymouth, 5-3, under the lights here. So they played a total of 31 innings in the last two contests, enough for nearly three and one-half ordinary tilts. The tough part of it was after all that work they still lost both games.

Kewaskum outhit Germantown in Sunday's marathon, 13 to 9, but ball games are won on runs. The teams battled to a 3-3 tie in the regulation nine innings. What made it extra hard for the Chevs to lose was that they broke the ice twice with runs in the extra frames, only to have Germantown come right back to tie and finally win the con-

test. The Chevs broke the deadlock in the 13th inning with a big run. But the winners also scored in their half of the same stanza to make it 4-4 and force the game into more extra frames. In the 16th the Chevs scored again when John Tessar led off with a triple. But a victory wasn't to be as two walks followed by two hits gave Germantown the tying and winning buttons in the last of the 16th.

Doug Wierman hurled the first 11 innings for the losers and then "Hefty" Backhaus came in to finish up. He was the losing pitcher. Ehlike worked the full 16 frames for Germantown, striking out 12 and walking only two batters. Wierman and Backhaus passed 10 and whiffed 10.

Gordie Wierman, Tessar, Dick Edwards, Don Meisenheimer, Bud Korth and Doug Wierman each collected two hits for the Chevs. E. Suelflow paced Germantown with 3 while H. Suelflow and pitcher Ehlike chipped in 2 each.

This Sunday Kewaskum travels to Cedarburg to meet the other undefeated team that shares first place with Germantown.

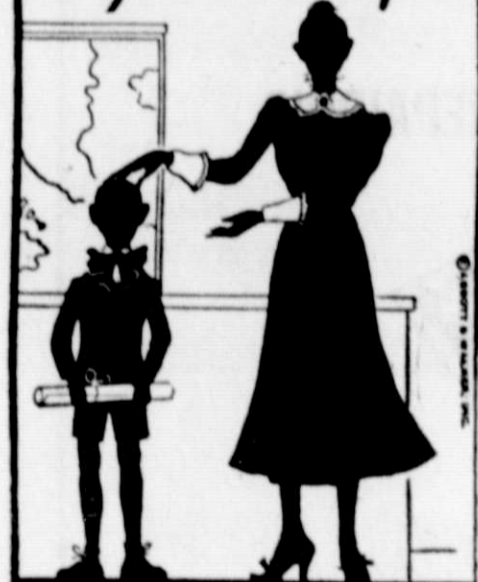

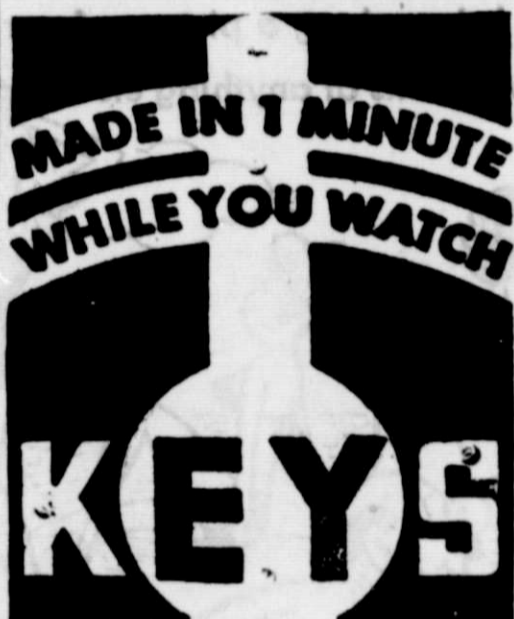

Annual Meeting of County DHIA Aug. 27

Washington county dairy farmers continue to find a need for more information on their dairy herds. Today the cost price squeeze is being felt more than at any previous time. Improved dairy herds is one answer to the squeeze.

In 1955 the Washington County Dairy Herd Improvement association (DHIA) listed 14 herds with over 400 lbs. butterfat per cow. The highest was 474 lbs. butterfat. This herd milk production was approximately 13,000 lbs. per cow.

The average cow produces 260 lbs. butterfat and 7,000 lbs. milk. With this in mind we soon realize the importance of testing the herd, and of knowing what each cow produces. Then we know which cow to breed, and which one to cull.

The Washington county DHIA is an organization owned and operated for dairymen of the county. The members who use these services know exactly which cows are profitable and which are boarders. They know that a cow producing 480 lbs. of butterfat annually returns the same income as two 240 lb. producers. They also know that one cow requires one-half the feed of two cows. Likewise, the cost of housing and care of one cow is half the cost for two. They know that testing pays—it does not cost.

The annual meeting of Washington county DHIA will be Monday evening, August 27, at the court house, West Bend, at 8:00 p. m. The program will consist of:

- "Getting and using production information on our dairy herds" by Marlowe Nelson, extension dairyman, College of Agriculture.

Herbert Lepien, "How I make best use of records;" Royal Clausen, "Tracing testing history of the Clausen Guernseys, and what is the result today;" Norbert Dettmann, "How to use the new owner sampler system;" Gilbert Stoffel, "What sold me on testing;" Orval Behnke, "How herd testing affects the boys in the FFA."

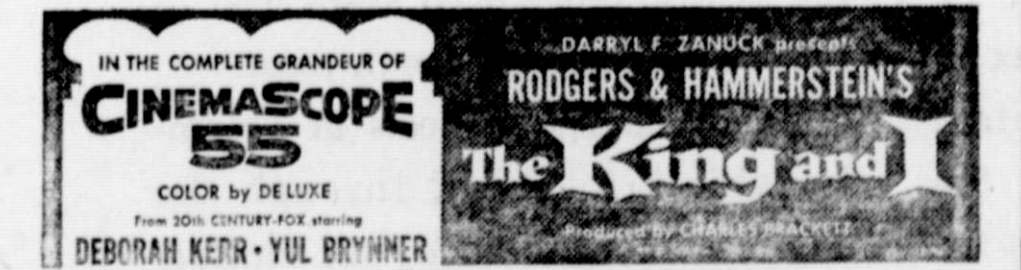

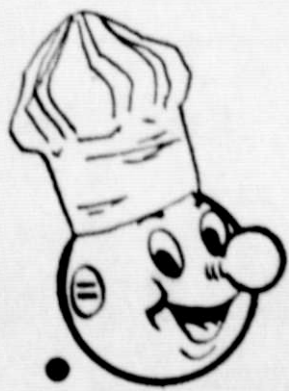
