Kewaskum Public Schools To Open Tuesday, Sept. 4

Teaching Staff Of 22 Includes Five New Ones

The Kewaskum Public schools will open Tuesday, September 4. High school classes will resume at 8:25 a. m., grades 1-8 at 8:45 a. m. and the kindergarten at 9:00 a. m. Because of increased enrollments classes will be held in the following buildings until classrooms will be available in the new high school building:

Kindergarten — Municipal building.

First grade — Lutheran church basement.

Second grade — Legion house. Busses will again transport grade and high school pupils from the rural areas. The routes and time schedules will be the same as those in effect during the first half of the 1955-1956 year.

The last place Kewaskum Chevrolets pulled the upset of the season Sunday at Cedarburg when they spanked the first place Mercurys by a whopping 9-1 score. It was only the Chevs second victory in the second half and raised them out of a tie for the cellar with Grafton.

Thanks to the unexpected assist from Kewaskum, Germantown, which was tied for first with Cedarburg, took a commanding game and a half over the Mercurys. Germantown needs only one more win over Cedarburg Sunday to clinch the second half crown. Germantown won two tilts over the week end, beating West Bend Saturday and Newburg Sunday.

Surprisingly, the Chevs went on their biggest batting spree of the campaign in upsetting the topnotch Cedarburg nine. They collected 15 safeties off of three Mercury hurlers, Koehler, Moerschel and Langlois. Mixed in with the numerous hits were three walks. The three Cedarburg twirlers struck out 12 Kewaskum batters in between hits.

John Tessar went all the way on the mound for the winners and pitched a brilliant game. Cedarburg's hitters were helpless against him and he had an easy time of it all the way except in the seventh frame when they got their only run on two hits. Tessar whiffed 10 men and passed only four.

Kewaskum led the game in one big inning, the sixth, scoring six runs. They had been held scoreless up to that time. The winners added three more insurance markers in the eighth.

Facing the Chevs' 15-hit onslaught were Dick Edwards and Don Meisenheimer. Edwards pounded out four hits, all singles, in five trips to the plate, while big Don connected for three in five trips. G. Rathke and J. Reznitz each got two bingles for the losers.

Kewaskum's last scheduled game of the season was played under the lights here Thursday night with Saukville furnishing the opposition.



PROPERTY OWNERS APPEAR TO DISCUSS ELIMINATION OF STAGNANT SURFACE WATER

Regular Meeting
August 6, 1956

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by J. Stellpflug, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried.

Here followed a general discussion on the problem of eliminating the stagnant surface water in the area bounded by Main Street, Kewaskum Street, Habeck Street and Stark Street. Mr. & Mrs. Schmidt-bauer, Mrs. Luedtke and Mrs. Kleinke appeared as interested abutting property owners. Myron Belger appeared on behalf of Mrs. Lena Belger. Mr. Belger agreed verbally to pay one half the cost of pumping the area. It was finally agreed by all parties that no action should be taken until the board receives its report from the State District Sanitary Engineer, Mr. Egner.

Mr. Bishop of the McMahon Engineering Co. presented to and discussed with the board a working sketch on the Fond du Lac Ave. improvement project. He also advised the board that no storm sewers should be installed on this street until the spring of 1957.

Police Chief Pledl reported on a recent demonstration of the Speed Watch Electric Traffic Control Device.

Dr. Koehler presented information and statistics to the board regarding the fluoridation of municipal water supplies.

The application of Helen Thom, Meta Heimermann, Stephen Sekeres, and Leo John Lichtensteiger for operators' licenses were presented to the board. Motion was made by J. Stellpflug, seconded by J. Eberle that these applications be approved. An amendment was offered to this motion by C. Schaefer, seconded by W. Tessar that these applications be voted upon separately. Upon roll call vote, the amendment was defeated by a vote of 4 to 3. Roll call vote on the original motion carried by a margin of 4 to 3 and the commissioner was authorized to issue the proper license upon pay-

ment of the required fee.

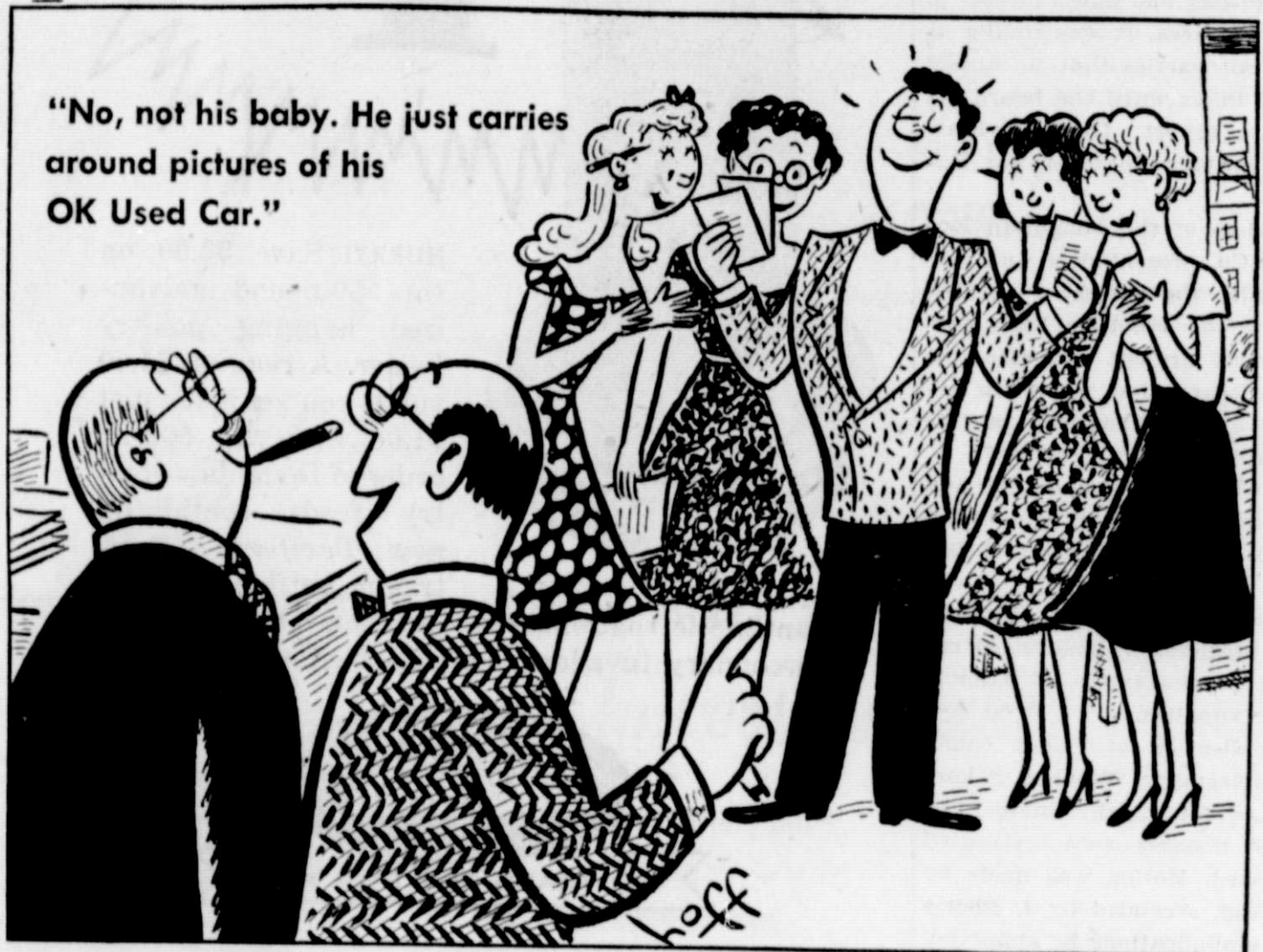

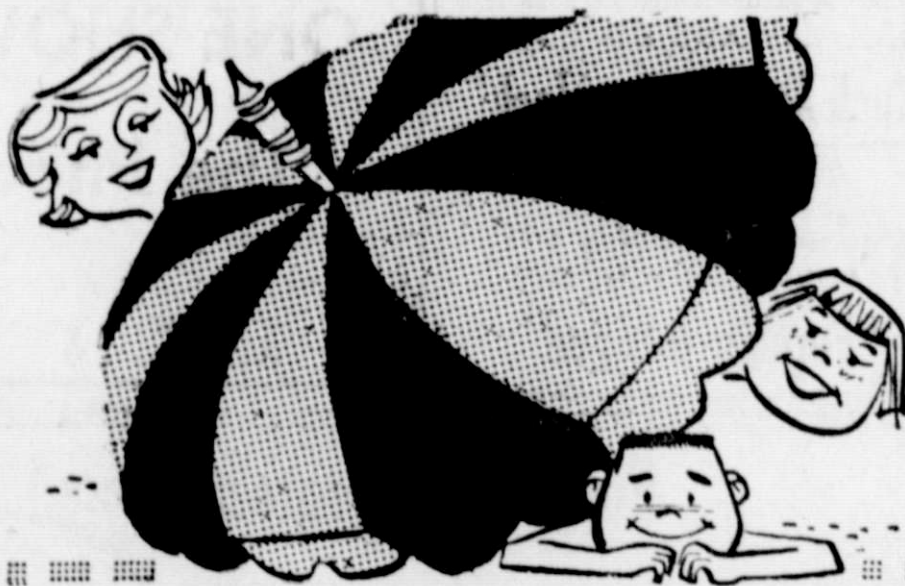
