Public Schools Open With Record Enrollment of 533; 92 Freshmen Set New High

286 in Hi School & 247 in Grades; Many Transfers

The Kewaskum Community High and grade schools opened on Tuesday with record enrollments all the way around. Setting all-time high records were the total enrollment of 533 pupils, the high school enrollment of 286 students, the grade school enrollment of 247 pupils, and the freshman class enrollment of 92 students.

Last year the enrollment on the first day totaled 478 pupils, 55 less than that of this term. This is a very sizable increase in one year's time. There were 268 in high school last year compared to 286 this fall, an increase of 19. There were 211 in the grades last year compared to 247 this term, an increase of 36. And there were only 67 freshmen in high school last time compared to a big 92 this term, a substantial increase of 25 freshmen. It will be noted by the above figures that the large increase in the grades and freshman class account for the new all-time record.

As one informant from high school put it, "the school is so loaded they are bulging out of the windows." It is too bad that the new school now under construction could not have been completed a year sooner to take care of the overflow. Had there been less wrangling over the location of the new school and earlier construction it might have been ready for this year's opening.

The enrollment figure would even be about 20 pupils higher but for the fact that first year (four-year-old) kindergarten was discontinued this year because of lack of room.

Forty-four children started kindergarten this year compared to 33 last term. Only 11 children started the first grade last year while this year there are 28. There are many new students in the local schools this term who are transfers from other institutions, some of them from distant states.

Otto Meinecke of Village Passes On

Otto Meinecke, 76, a self-employed resident of Kewaskum most of his life, died early Monday morning, Sept. 3, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, following a three week illness with leukemia.

A son of the late Carl and Bertha Meinecke, he was born in Germany on Feb. 19, 1880. He came to this country with his parents at the age of 1½ years and they settled in Milwaukee. After residing there a short time, the family moved to a farm near Cecil, Wis., where they lived for a few years and then came to Kewaskum.

Mr. Meinecke's marriage to Ida Stern took place on Aug. 11, 1906, in the Peace E and R church. His widow survives together with two sons, Edwin C. Meinecke of Milwaukee and Eldon of Kewaskum; three grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Ella Stegler of Neenah, and six brothers, Charles of Kewaskum, Fred of Milwaukee, William of Iron Mountain Mich., Adolph of Milwaukee, Alfred of West Allis and John of Neenah. One daughter, Adeline, preceded her father in death in 1927.

The body was in state at Miller's funeral home from 2 p. m. Tuesday until 11 a. m. Wednesday when it was removed to the Peace E and R church to lie in state from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 o'clock. The Rev. F. L. Rodenbeck presided and burial was in the parish cemetery.

250 Enrollment At Holy Trinity Sets New High

Holy Trinity Parochial school opened on Wednesday morning with another record breaking enrollment of 250 pupils, a slight increase of four over last year's total of 246.

Thirty children started school in the first grade, a drop of 10 from last year's large class of 40. There are also 10 transfers to Holy Trinity school in the higher grades. They are transfers from other schools.

A lay teacher has been added to the staff of five school sisters at the school this year. She is Mrs. Ervin R. Fellenz of Kewaskum.

The 250 pupils at Holy Trinity school and 533 enrolled in the Kewaskum public schools makes a total of 783 children attending school in the village this year.

State Beagle Trial Here Largest Held; 150 Dogs Entered

The 34th annual American Kennel club licensed championship field trial of the Wisconsin Beagle club was held over the Labor Day week end at Kewaskum. This year's event was by far the largest ever held.

The largest entry on record, a total of 150 dogs, competed in the trial. This number was far ahead of the 115 beagle hounds entered last year. Dogs were entered from other states including Illinois, Indiana and as far as Washington.

According to host Joe Eberle of Kewaskum, who serves as president of the club, this year's event was held earlier than usual, over the Labor Day week end, so that more dog owners could get away for the trial. As a result there were so many entries that the event could hardly be completed in four days over the week end, Friday through Monday, with the amount of cotton-tail rabbits available in this area to run the events.

No bench show was held in conjunction with the trial this year. Trophies, ribbons and points toward championship were awarded the winning beagles. All told the trial was one of the most successful ever held.

INTEREST IN SHERIFF AND SENATE RACES EXPECTED TO BRING OUT VOTE

Interest picked up this week for the general election next Tuesday, Sept. 11, as the day for balloting draws near and a good turnout of voters is expected for the September primary. Voting in the village will again take place in the municipal building. Polls here and throughout the county will be open from 9 a. m. to 5:30 p. m.

cascade of yellow mums with aqua chard Schultz, cousin of the bride, was ringbearer.

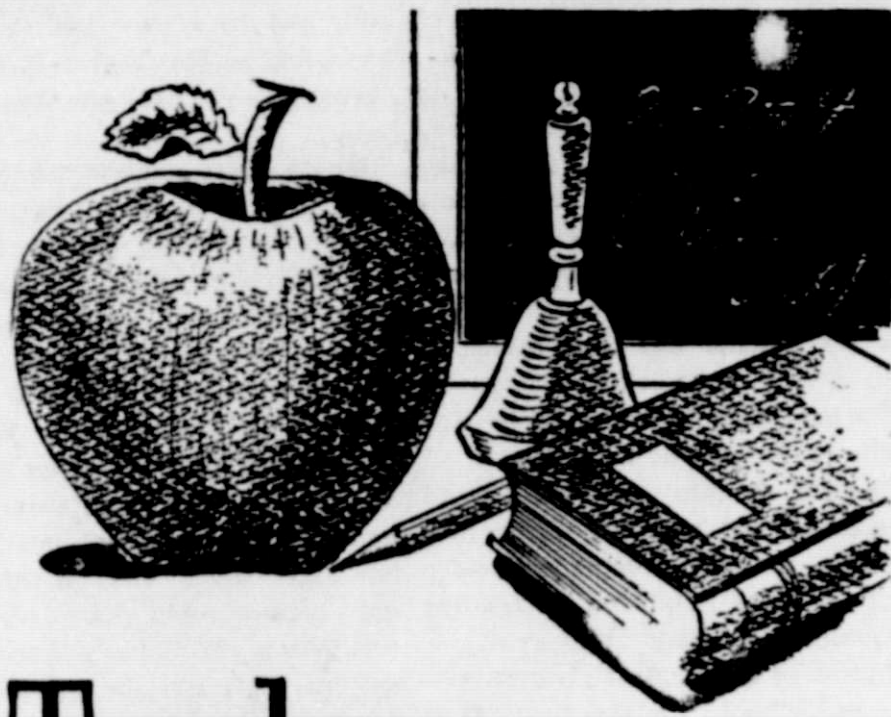

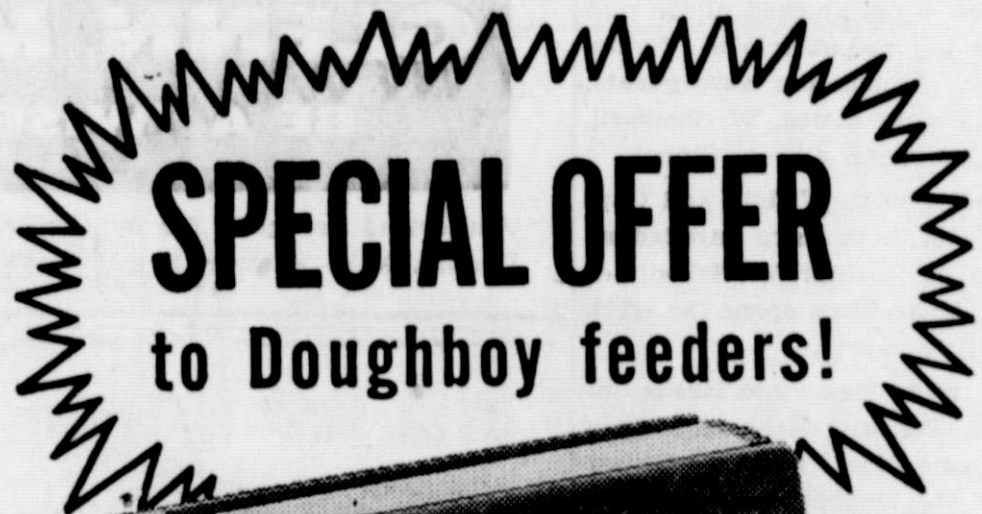

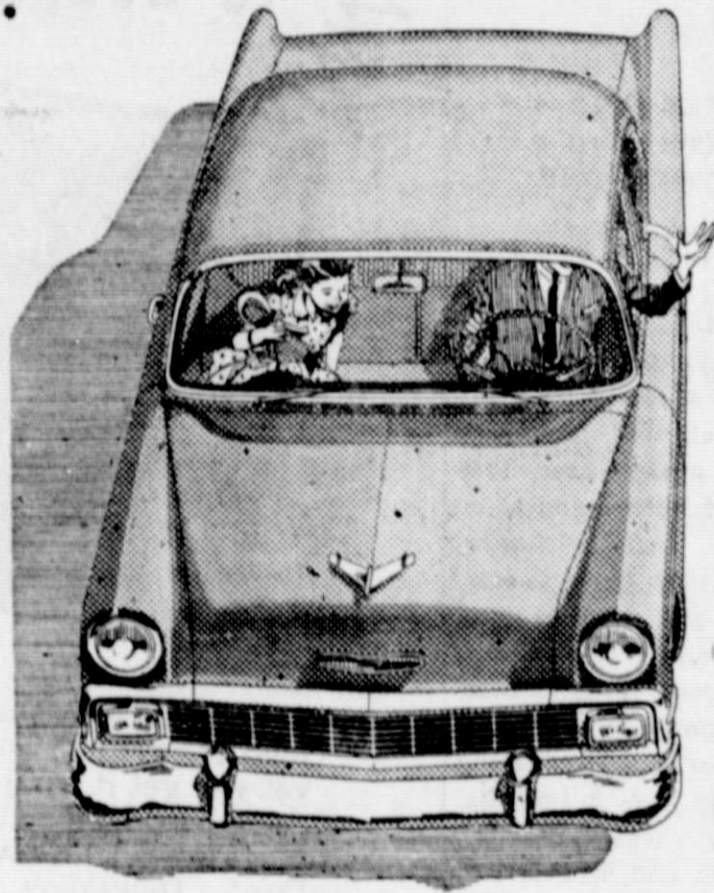

Area Plowing Contest To Be Held in County, 7 Counties Included

Washington county is all set with the area plowing contest according to the county extension office at West Bend. Contestants are registering and demonstrational machinery is all lined up. Highlight of the program is the 4 plowing contests which begin at 12:00 o'clock noon, Saturday, Sept. 8, at the Wilfred Knuth and Milton Schreiber farms, located on Highway 143, 4 miles east of the intersection of Highways 143 & 45 in Washington county. Counties include Washington, Ozaukee, Milwaukee, Waukesha, Racine, Kenosha and Walworth.

Forenoon hours will be spent by plowmen practicing, scouring, and adjusting plows. At 10:30 a. m. plowmen will receive instructions and will line up at areas chosen. Sharply at 12:00 o'clock plowing begins. Immediately after plowing is finished the judging will begin. Judging in this contest will adhere to state rules.

The judges are Norman Jennings, Fond du Lac; Duaine Traeder, Sheboygan; Ernest Kueffner, Ray Bast, Alfred Rode and Edgar Miske, all of Washington county.

At 1:00 o'clock other machinery will get in operation. Dealers will be exhibiting machinery. A grader will be building a terrace and waterway, and a county owned Le Tournean dozer will be burying a stone fence. The dozer is a wheeled machine. It weighs 33,000 lbs. and operates on 4 tires, each 5 feet high.

Farmers in Washington county have been interested in Dalapon spray to kill quackgrass. These farmers have already applied the dalapon and more of it will be applied during the program.

Waukesha Lime Co. will have a load of lime, and the Farm Bureau will have a load of commercial fertilizer, both on a bulk spreader.

During the program the machinery will build terraces, waterways, bury stone fences, establish contour strips and dig soil. All of these items are involved in a conservation program.

The program as planned follows:
9:30 a. m.—Practice for plowmen.
10:30 — Instructions to plowmen.
12:00 — Plowing contest begins.
1:00—Judging begins, also construction of terrace and waterway, burying stone fence, bulk lime and fertilizer spreaders at work, control of quackgrass. 3:20—Announce winners of plowing contests.

The plowing contest 4 divisions are: adult level, adult contour, youth level, and youth contour. To

qualify as an adult, contestants must be 21 years as of Sept. 1, 1956, and youth ages are 16-20 years as of Sept. 1, 1956.

Winners of the contests will be eligible to participate in the state plowing contest held in conjunction with the State Farm Progress Field Days at Fort Atkinson, Sept. 25-26. Lunch will be available on the grounds.

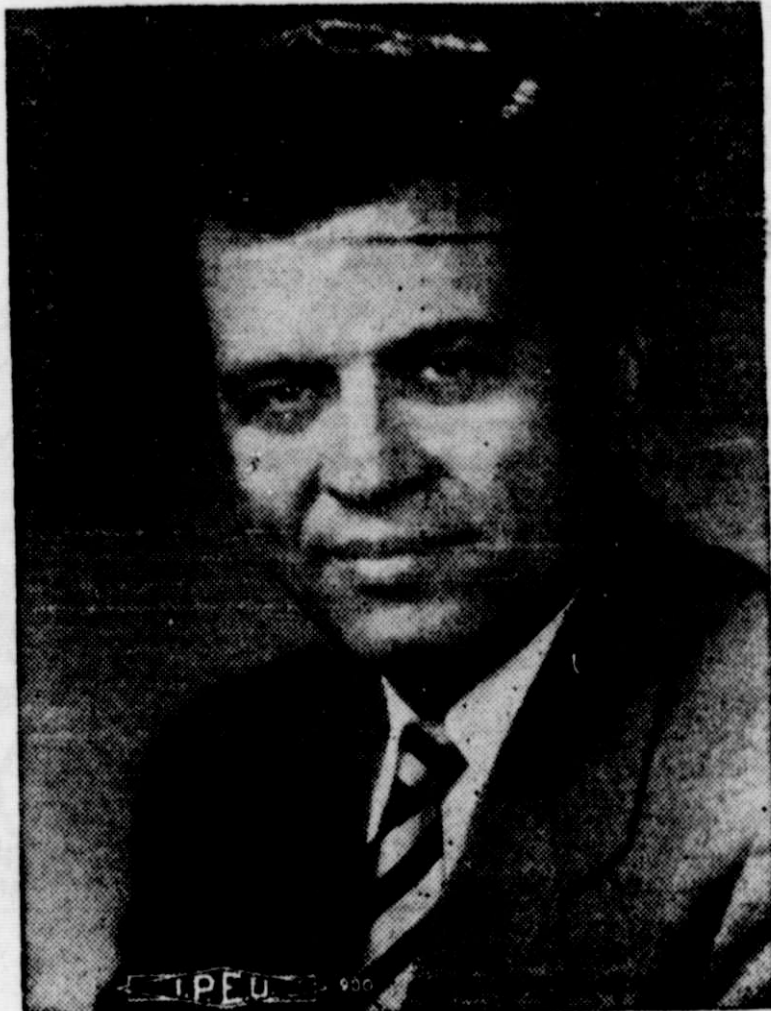

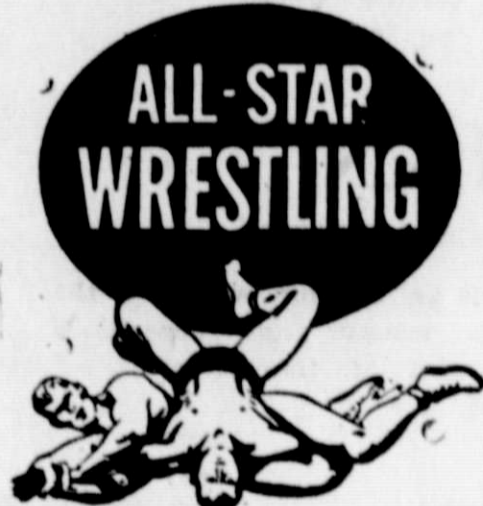
