## Al Schmidt Nominated for County Sheriff; Wiley Wins

### Late Vote Turns Tide; Only 287 Votes Cast Here

In a tight race which went to the final precinct before the outcome was determined, Alvin L. Schmidt, undersheriff of Washington county, won the GOP nomination for sheriff in Tuesday's primary election. Schmidt defeated both his opponents, William E. Johnson and former Sheriff Sylvester A. ("Fat") Naumann.

Schmidt's home township, the town of Trenton, which polled a record vote, turned the election in the undersheriff's favor and decided the outcome. Trenton was the final precinct in the county to report tabulations. Schmidt's victory margin, picked up in the town of Trenton, was 242 ballots. Before Trenton reported Johnson still held the lead in the three-way race. Schmidt

polled 446 votes compared to 36 for both Johnson and Naumann in the township.

Unofficial returns gave Schmidt a total vote of 2,853, Johnson 2,611, and Naumann 1,242. DuWayne R. Hasenfus, unopposed for the county Democratic nomination for sheriff, polled 951 votes. Schmidt carried 14 of the county's 28 precincts and Johnson getting 11 and Naumann 2. At one time, Johnson had a comfortable lead of more than 1,000 votes and appeared to be a certain winner. But then the Schmidt precincts began reporting and he gradually gained until the town of Trenton finally decided the outcome.

The total vote in the county was placed at 8,289. This was far from a record vote but was considered good for a primary. Only 287 votes were cast in Kewaskum which is about half the number of eligible voters in the village. Kewaskum was one of the few precincts in the county which favored Naumann. The former sheriff defeated Schmidt here 162 votes to 89. Johnson ran a weak third with 44 votes.

With 3,295 precincts of the state's 3,348 reporting, Senator Alexander Wiley held a big edge of nearly 10,000 votes over Glenn Davis, his nearest opponent for the Republican senatorial nomination. Howard Boyle, Jr. was far behind. Wiley had 217,402 votes, Davis 207,693.

## Car Kills Deer, Other Accidents

A large eight point buck was killed when it ran into a car driven by Marion Krueger of West Bend Monday morning at 6:58 a. m. on Hwy. 45 north of Hwy. H at the north end of the Kewaskum swamp. The Krueger car was badly damaged.

Richard Thiemer, 35, R. 3, Kewaskum, sustained a cut on the left knee at 8:10 p. m. Friday when his car left Hwy. 45 about 1 1/2 miles north of Barton. Thiemer said he lost control of his machine because of someone walking on the highway. His car left the highway on the left side and struck an electric pole.

Four young men from Marinette and Menominee, whose names were not obtained, suffered scratches and bruises and narrowly escaped drowning when their car left the road and turned over on Hwy. 45 at the north end of the Kewaskum swamp last Wednesday morning at about 11:30 a. m. There was about three to four feet of water in the ditch alongside the highway and the car came to rest on its top in the water. The occupants crawled out of the car through an open window and were soaked in the water. Their auto filled up with water. The group was enroute to Milwaukee to attend the Braves ball game. They were treated at a local physician's office and given dry clothes.

The 22-year-old soldier is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold J. Hawig, Route 3, Campbellsport.


**ST. KILIAN'S CHURCH PLANS CHICKEN AND HAM DINNER OCT. 21**

**Norman Jaeger's  
Brother Loses Life**

Waldemar J. "Buster" Jaeger, 46, of 307 Amory st., Fond du Lac, brother of Norman Jaeger of Kewaskum, was killed early Thursday morning, Sept. 6, when the semi-trailer he was driving went out of control and jackknifed around a tree about six miles west of Omro on Hwy. 21. Jaeger drove for the Steffke Freight company of Wausau.

Jaeger was traveling to Fond du Lac from St. Paul. He was proceeding east on the highway and may have failed to see signs and flares marking road excavation work. Investigating officers say that he may have been blinded by the rising sun.

Part of the highway was ripped up to a depth of nine inches. Jaeger's truck went through the excavated area, crossed the highway and hit a tree. He was taken by ambulance to Mercy hospital in Oshkosh.

Authorities said the excavated area was marked with a road repair sign, flare pots, a one-way traffic sign, and barricades for several hundred feet. Some tires on the vehicle probably exploded on the edge of the concrete. No skid marks were visible before the truck dropped into the excavated section.

Jaeger was born in the town of Ashford, a son of Mrs. Elizabeth Jaeger and the late Frank Jaeger. Surviving are his widow, the for-

mer Viola Lueloff of Fond du Lac; his mother, Fond du Lac; five children, John, Robert, Delores, Linda and Beverly, at home; five brothers besides Norman Jaeger here and five sisters.

Funeral services were held at 8:30 a. m. Monday from the Zacherl Funeral home, Fond du Lac, to St. Mary's church at 9 a. m. Burial was in Calvary cemetery there. Ke-

waskum residents were in attendance.





(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) and Boyle 20,292. In Kewaskum Wiley received 136 votes compared to 77 for Davis and 17 for Boyle.

The two Democratic opponents for nomination as candidates for the senate in 3,305 state precincts polled votes as follows: Henry Maier 154,554 and Elliot Walstead 71,370. In the contest for representative from the Sixth Congressional district on the Democratic ticket Rudolph J. Ploetz won over Donald E. Bonk. On the Democratic ballot for lieutenant governor William Schmidt was leading his rival, Edwin Larkin, by a margin of about 15,000 votes. Robert Sucher was about 13,000 votes ahead of Frank Nikolay for the Democratic nomination for attorney general. Robert Zimmerman won the GOP nomination for secretary of state, defeating Mrs. Glenn Wise by a vote of 176,265 to 120,344 in returns from 2,484 precincts. All other candidates on both tickets were unopposed.



### 4,900 Adults in County X-Rayed By Mobile Unit

#### WOMAN'S CLUB COMMENDED FOR WORKING WITH BUS IN KEWASKUM AREA

The State Board of Health chest x-ray survey of Washington county has been completed. During the five week tour of industries, public and closed centers, 4,900 adults were x-rayed.

The mobile unit x-rays large groups of apparently well adults in hopes of finding some chest conditions early. Early diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis and other lung and chest conditions are important steps in promoting better health for our communities.

The success of any program such as this is based upon understanding and cooperation. People must first of all recognize the value of regular chest x-rays and then make special efforts to avail themselves of the service.

Special efforts to create interest in this health project were made by many volunteer groups and individuals throughout the county. Health representatives of the homemakers groups assumed leadership for publicity and organization of volunteers in most of the townships and villages. The local Woman's club worked with the bus in the Kewaskum area. These women should be particularly commended for their spirit of community service.

Although the turnout was good, there still remain many individuals age 18 and over who have not had a recent chest x-ray or perhaps have never had one. They are urged to take advantage of the mobile unit's visit to the city of West Bend later in September.
