## Mrs. Carl Meilahn, Chas. Krueger Die

Mrs. Carl Meilahn, Sr., 81 nee Amanda Kuecker, a resident of the village of Kewaskum for the past 15 years, passed away on Friday morning, Sept. 21, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, following an illness of six days with acute peritonitis.

A native of Milwaukee, where she was born on March 13, 1875, Mrs. Meilahn was married to Mr. Meilahn on May 6, 1905 in Milwaukee. Following their marriage the couple moved onto a farm in the town of Kewaskum located northeast of the village, which they operated until retiring and moving to the village in January of 1941. Mrs. Meilahn was a daughter of the late Henry and Johanna Kuecker.

Mrs. Meilahn is survived by her husband, three daughters and a son, Alpha, (Mrs. Bernard Novotny) of Sheboygan Falls, Carl Meilahn, Jr., on the farm in the town of Kewaskum, Agnes (Mrs. Ray Schaefer) of the town of Kewaskum and Amanda (Mrs. Lester Firme) of Adell; 12 grandchildren, one daughter-in-law, three sons-in-law, a sister, Alma (Mrs. Arthur Borchorst) of Wauwatosa, and a brother, Alex Boethling of Milwaukee. One son Henry died at the age of 4½ years and a daughter Erna also predeceased her mother at the age of 1½ years.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 1:30 p. m. Sunday until 11 a. m. Monday and at St. Lucas Ev. Lutheran church from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. on Monday. The Rev. Gerhard Kanless officiated at the last rites and burial took place in the parish cemetery.

### CHARLES KRUEGER

Charles Krueger, 62, town of Auburn farmer, died early Tuesday morning, Sept. 25, following an illness of several months with leukemia.

Mr. Krueger served for nine years as a trustee on the church board of St. John's Lutheran church at New Fane. He was a veteran of World War I, during which he served with the U. S. Army overseas.

A son of the late Carl and Amelia Krueger, he was born on April 15, 1894 at Kewaskum. His marriage to the former Ozella Strack took place on Oct. 25, 1922 at Trinity Lutheran church in Dundee. The couple came to their present home near New Fane in 1933.

Mr. Krueger was the father of five children, two sons having died in infancy. Surviving together with the widow are two daughters and a son, Joyce (Mrs. Jerome Goeden) of West Bend, Robert of New Fane, and Audrey (Mrs. Robert Fellenz) of West Bend; three grandsons, three sisters, Mrs. Lena Ernst of West Bend, Martha (Mrs. William Krahn) of Milwaukee, and Mrs. Clara Krahn of the town of Scott, and three brothers, Herman Krueger of Milwaukee, William and Albert Krueger of the town of Auburn.

### FIRE CHIEF SCHAEFER HEADS DRIVE AGAINST MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY

Fire Chief Harry J. Schaefer has accepted appointment as chairman of the 1956 "March Against Muscular Dystrophy" in Kewaskum, Fred W. Voigt, executive secretary of the Muscular Dystrophy association announced this week.

MDA is a national, non-profit organization which, through public contributions, supports a wide program of research, patient services and clinical care.

More than 80 research projects are presently being supported by MDA in scientific institutions here and abroad, and the organization is establishing a \$3,000,000 Muscle Research Center which will be adjacent to the New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center. The new institution will be a major base for research into muscular dystrophy and related diseases which afflict three to five million Americans. MDA supports five research projects and a clinic at the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

The campaign will be conducted during November.

### SOMETHING NEW ADDED AT THE POST OFFICE

Gone are the squeaky, scratchy post office pens, for many years the object of many jokes. In their place are smooth writing ball point pens which require no blotters. Postmaster Frank Heppel received the new pens last week and they were immediately put into use. The pens, dark green in color, inscribed "Property of U. S. Post Office" are attached to the writing desk by a chain to prevent their being carried away by the user.

Outside the post office, the collection box has been attractively painted blue and red with white lettering. All collection boxes throughout the United States have been so painted in accordance with a new Post Office Department regulation.

### RADIO INSTALLED IN FIREMEN'S AMBULANCE

A two-way police radio, purchased by the Kewaskum Fire Department, has been installed in the firemen's rescue squad ambulance and was put into service on Monday of this week. By means of the radio the ambulance attendants will have direct contact with the county sheriff's department and police cars. In this way they can provide better service and the radio will assist them in locating the scene of accidents and securing a proper escort in emergency cases.

## Kiwanis Live Turkey Shoot Sunday, Oct. 7

FOURTH ANNUAL EVENT TO BE HELD AT BAR-N RANCH

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its fourth annual Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday, Oct. 7, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, 7 miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, from 9 a. m. to sundown.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become outstandingly popular. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators. The turkey shoot is handled as follows:

Large line tom turkeys are placed in protected crates at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots (four shots on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

Other events include trap and deer rifle target shooting. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events bring their own shotguns and rifles. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Food and refreshments will be served.

The shoot is sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club and all profits go to the Kewaskum Youth Benefit and Community Benefit funds.

### Dutch Elm Disease

In recent years a disease known as Dutch Elm disease has caused heavy losses in many shade trees in this country. Although present in Illinois and neighboring states for several years, the first case found in Wisconsin was in July of this year at Beloit and since has been traced as far north as Milwaukee.

Early symptoms of the disease may be recognized by wilting, curling and yellowing of elm leaves on one or more branches. Leaf-fall usually takes place followed by death of the wilted branches. On some trees a few affected branches wilt at one time, and such trees may die slowly over a period of a year or more. On other trees nearly all of the branches wilt simultaneously, causing death of the tree within a period of a few weeks.

It is known that the disease is a fungus infection carried from tree to tree primarily by the European elm bark beetle. Therefore one way of controlling the disease is to control the beetle which can be done by spraying a DDT emulsion preferably before leafing in spring and after leaf-fall in autumn. Also all dead limbs should be pruned from the tree immediately and destroyed by burning.

The bark beetle breeds in weakened, dying and dead elms, in elm logs, stumps and wood piles. To destroy such breeding places, any accumulation of dead elm material should be cleaned up and destroyed by burning.

If any resident of Kewaskum has any tree suspected of being infected, may we suggest that you call the municipal building so that we may send a sample of such infected tree to the State Dept. of Agriculture for analysis and thereby do our part in trying to control this disease. There is no charge for this service.

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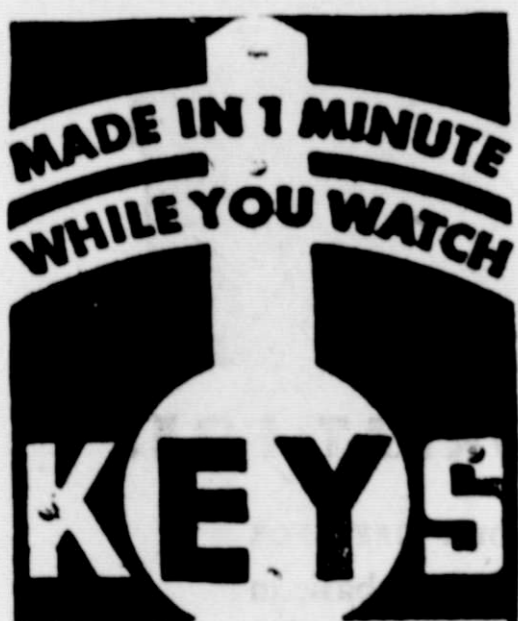



### Indians Are Upset By North Fondy, 14-7, In Football Opener

Pushing over a touchdown in the final three minutes of play, the North Fond du Lac Orioles upset Kewaskum, 14-7, in the Fox Valley Tri-County conference opener Friday night before an estimated 400 fans at the newly lighted North Fondy field.

It was the first time in three seasons that the Orioles were able to win over the Indians, defending champions in the circuit. North Fondy was buried by Kewaskum, 57-6, in 1954 and bowed to them last year, 33-21.

Both North Fondy touchdowns were scored in the second half by Halfback Norman Arenz, the first TD coming on a pass play and the second on a 25-yard run. The Indians held a 7-0 lead the entire first half but it appeared the Orioles improved as the game went on.

Big halfback Dave Mertzig, one of 10 lettermen on Coach Ernie Mitchell's team, broke the ice in the opening quarter when he scored the Indians' lone TD on a short running play. He also made good the extra point try. The teams battled up and down the field the second quarter but went scoreless.

The Orioles struck pay dirt for the first time midway in the third period when Quarterback Ron Andrews faded back and uncorked a perfect pass to Arenz, the play starting from the Kewaskum 30-yard stripe. A pass from Arenz to Andrews netted Fondy the extra point and the score was tied at 7-

all. Half way through the final period, the Orioles got down to the Indians' three-yard line, only to be stopped by the Kewaskum forward wall. The Orioles lost possession of the ball with goal-to-go when they lacked but a foot for a first down.

N. Fondy fought back again and after stopping Kewaskum on a series of plays, started to roll. Grinding out yardage on the ground, they got to the Indian 25 yard marker when Andrews handed off to Arenz who went around his own right end for the game-winning touchdown. Andrews scored the extra point on a quarterback sneak.

Kewaskum had other good scoring opportunities but failed to cash in on them. On one occasion a receiver was in the clear on a pass play that would have scored a TD but the receiver dropped the ball. The Indians had the bigger team and also looked like the better team on the field but that old fight and drive for which Kewaskum teams have been noted the past couple of seasons seemed to be lacking.

This Friday the Indians again play away from home, traveling to Brandon. They will have their work cut out for them as the big Brandon team trounced Oakfield last week, 32-24. Brandon still has giant Jon Mollien, who ran wild over the Oaks. Kewaskum's first home game will be played next Friday night, Oct. 5, against Random Lake.
