Call Is Made for Residents to Take First Aid Course

TRAINING BEING OFFERED BY MARVIN MARTIN, CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

A call is being made for at least one person in each family in the Kewaskum area to be trained in first aid. A first aid course is being offered in Kewaskum under the direction of Marvin Martin, Civil Defense director. Classes will meet Thursdays at 8:00 p. m. in the Municipal Building, and will last about two hours. The course is completed in ten weeks. The next scheduled meeting will be Thursday, Oct. 18. There is no charge.

Why is this important? In view of the world situation today, Kewaskum has organized a civil defense program in this community of which the first aid course is an extremely important part. Unlike previous wars where battles were fought on foreign soil, we all know a war at the present time would also include America as a battleground. It would take only hours, not days, for enemy planes loaded with atomic and thermo-nuclear weapons to cross the oceans. Lest we here in Kewaskum develop a feeling of false security, military advisors in Washington have warned that these attacks would be directed at small cities and RURAL AREAS, as well as our large cities.

Of course, communities must also be prepared and trained for catastrophes and chaos created by vicious tornadoes and epidemics.

Because in an emergency there will be demands on professional medical people to care for casualties, the rest of the people will have to depend upon non-professionals to look after their minor ills and injuries. Therefore, try to have at least one member of your family take this course now — it could very well spell the difference between death and survival sometime in the future.

A number of members of the Campbellsport Fire Department are being given the first aid course in conjunction with the local classes.

Over 5,000 People Attend Turkey Shoot

MORE THAN 300 TURKEYS ARE BAGGED BY 2700 SHOOTERS; MOST SUCCESSFUL HELD

The annual live turkey shoot at the Bar-N dude ranch northeast of Kewaskum Sunday, sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club, attracted more than 5,000 persons and was by far the largest and most successful held to date. Officials of the Kiwanis club said that the attendance figure of 5,000 is a conservative estimate.

More than 300 turkeys were shot or won at this fourth annual shoot. Throughout the day a total of about 2,700 shooters stepped up to the lanes to try their marksmanship at bagging a turkey. Of this number more than 260 "Davey Crocketts" were successful in getting their bird. Besides the 260 turkeys bagged on the lanes, the rest were won in the cross bow shoot, deer shoot, skeet shoot or trap shoot. In addition, a number of geese and ducks also went to the sportsmen in the other shoots.

All told over 3,000 marksmen tried their skill in the various shooting events. There was also a popgun stand, fish pond and other games for the children. The food and refreshment stand operated by the Kiwanians' wives, children and other volunteers took in over \$500 alone.

Late in the afternoon the club ran out of turkeys and cardboard turkey heads were substituted in the pits to allow all remaining marksmen who had not used up their tickets to get in their shooting before it was too dark. Duebills good for turkeys were given to the winners.

All available parking space around the Bar-N ranch was jammed and many hundreds of persons drove away without stopping because of a lack of parking space. Although it was windy, the Kiwanians were lucky in that it was a beautiful, sunny fall day. Those who do not shoot, women and children enjoyed themselves at the other games and in just watching the marksmen try their skill.

The annual turkey shoot is getting bigger and increasing in popularity each year. It is developing not only into a Kiwanis project but a community affair. The shoot attracts marksmen and spectators from throughout the area as well as many distant points, even other states. It gives Kewaskum a great deal of publicity, more than any other event held during the year. The event is publicized in newspapers, on radio and television.

The Kewaskum Frozen Foods locker remained open all day Sunday to dress and draw turkeys won at the shoot. Birds could be taken along or frozen and stored for the future. The locker was piled high with birds and the several workers at the plant labored late into the night dressing all the turkeys.

Proceeds of the turkey shoot go to the Kewaskum Youth Benefit and Community Benefit funds.

Mrs. Prost and Mrs. Kohler attended the funeral on Tuesday.

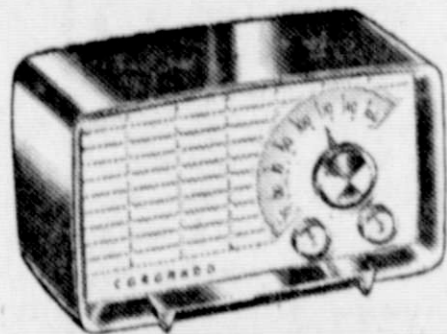
MRS. LENA FOOTE

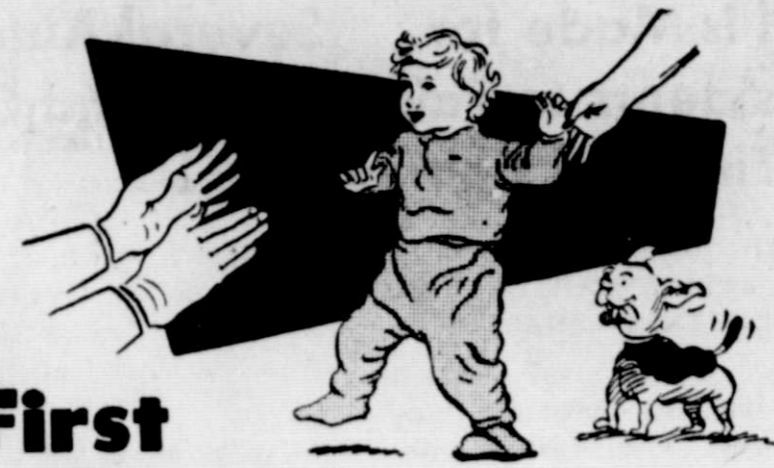

County Oil Dealers to Meet, Elect Officers

A meeting of the Washington County Petroleum Industries committee will be held on Thursday, Oct. 18, at the court house in West Bend, starting at 8:00 p. m., it was announced this week.

Milton Becker of West Bend, chairman of the committee, said all oil dealers in the county are invited to attend this meeting and participate in the election of officers.

A feature of the program, he added, will be an illustrated talk "You Write the Headlines," presented by F. M. Elliott of Madison, executive secretary of the Wisconsin Petroleum Industries committee. This will include an explanation of how the recently enacted federal highway program will affect gasoline marketing in Washington county.

Becker said: "There will be no fees or collections at this meeting. It is being held for just one purpose: To give oil men information they need for their business. Their problems in the field of government relations will be discussed, and they will receive some practical pointers on what they, as individuals, can do to meet these problems."

As an example of oil men's problems, he mentioned the gasoline tax. Increases in both the state and federal rates have brought this tax up to 39 per cent of the retail price of gasoline in Wisconsin, he said.

"Businessmen who bear a tax of that size on their principal product should take a keen interest in

government relations and trends just for the sake of survival," he declared.

The wrestling is sponsored by good old West Bend Lithia beer every Thursday from 9 to 10 p. m.

We hit our turkey on the 7th shot on lane 7 and a fine bird it is. Lucky we didn't shoot on lane 29. Must remember that number 7.

Now that the hectic pennant race and World Series is all over finally some thought can be devoted to other important things like football, hunting (the upland bird season opens a week from Saturday) and soon ice fishing. It wouldn't
