The season on ruffed grouse, pheasants and Hungarian partridge opens at noon Saturday and continues through Nov. 11. The season on rabbits and squirrels also starts Saturday but will continue until Jan. 31. The raccoon season runs from Oct. 27 to Dec. 31.

The bag limit on pheasants is two (cocks only), grouse five, partridge five, gray and fox squirrels five, and cottontail rabbits four.


