Woman's Club to Hold Scholarship Ball for Funds

The Kewaskum High school gymnasium has been chosen for the place and Saturday evening, Nov. 3, the date for the Kewaskum Woman's club scholarship ball. Each year the club awards a \$100 scholarship to a Kewaskum High school senior who desires to become an elementary school teacher and each year the club must raise that amount of money.

Dancing will be from 9 to 1 to the music of the Blue Tones who are sure to please all dancing tastes. Four door prizes will be given. To be eligible for a door prize the ticket holder need not be present but the ticket must be deposited at the dance that night. Tickets are available from any Woman's club member at \$2.00 per couple. Student tickets are being sold at \$1.50 a couple. Light refreshments will be served.

The scholarship award was first made in 1955. In that year and in 1956 it was awarded to Miss Rosemary Struebing of Wayne, who is continuing her education at the Dodge County Normal at Mayville. It is awarded to the same student each year until his or her education is complete. Funds are raised in a different manner each year and the Ways and Means committee for the 1956-57 season chose the scholarship ball as their means.

Catholic Church Being Decorated

Work has been started on the decorating and renovating of Holy Trinity Catholic church in Kewaskum. The entire interior of the church will be repainted and re-decorated and the altars, stations of the cross, confessionals, communion rail and other fixtures will be replaced.

The decorating is expected to be completed by Christmas time. Members of the parish have been donating toward a decorating fund with special monthly collections for the past couple of years to pay the cost of the painting and decorating.

Individual donations have also been received for the wood carved stations of the cross, the two new confessionals, wood carved cross and corpora for the high altar, the high altar itself, canopy for the high altar, Blessed Virgin Mary and St. Joseph's side altars, communion rail, Holy Thursday repository, Holy Oil safe, floor coverings and a few other smaller items.

The interior of the church will appear almost completely new and will be very beautiful and modernistic when the work is completed.

While the work is in progress the scaffolding may cause some inconvenience to church goers, who may have to stand in the aisle during specially crowded masses. However, this will not be for long and parishioners are asked to be patient. They will be rewarded for any inconvenience when the decorating is finished.

Weekday masses are being read in the church hall while the work is going on.

Merchants Warned Of Check Forger

A series of check forgeries has taken place the past week in West Bend, Barton and Kewaskum and merchants are warned to be on the lookout for the forger. Chief of Police Roland Piedl also reminds merchants to be extremely careful in cashing checks for strangers and to be sure to demand adequate identification and credentials.

West Bend police picked up a suspect this week in connection with the forgeries but he was later released. County police are continuing their investigation of the case.

Chief Piedl describes the forger as being about 22 to 35 years of age, 5 feet, 6 inches tall, weighing about 150 pounds, having dark hair and complexion. He has front upper teeth missing and was wearing a black sweater and blue overall pants. He forged the checks under the names of Larson, Neilson and Costello.

Local FFA Team Wins State Land Judging Contest

The Kewaskum F.F.A. chapter's Land Judging team won the third annual State Land Judging contest held at Slinger Tuesday, Oct. 23, it was announced on Wednesday by O. E. Behnke, vocational agriculture instructor at Kewaskum Community High school.

A four man team consisting of Harvey Weigand, Paul Schaub, Maurice Gahlman and Roger Dobke placed first over fifteen other teams with a total of 1,335 points out of a possible 1,600 points.

Other schools competing in the contest and listed according to their placings are: Wisconsin Dells, Slinger, Rosendale, Coleman, Hartford, Kewaunee, Denmark, Racine County Aggies, West Bend, Fall River, Hartland, Jefferson, Waukesha, New Holstein, and Bear Creek.

In the previous state contests, Kewaskum placed third both times with Slinger and West Bend taking first and second each time.

Each team member could get a possible score of 400. Three boys were tied for first with 350 points, and Harvey Weigand took second in the individual scoring with 349 points. All four Kewaskum team members scored well over 300 points.

Fire Damages New Fane Shed

A combination shed and garage on the Fred Dickman and late Henry Dickman property in New Fane was badly damaged by fire last Friday evening. The home on the property is occupied by Mrs. Amelia Gessner, her daughter and grandson.

The Kewaskum firemen were summoned to the scene at about 7 p. m. and fought the blaze for about two hours extinguishing the flames, removing burned items, and watching surrounding buildings. The two-story building was saved but the interior was damaged almost beyond repair.

There was no automobile kept in the shed. It was used mainly to store household furniture and other items. Some furniture which was stored upstairs and most other contents was damaged. Cause of the blaze was not determined. It started in an upstairs corner where wiring leads into the building.

The shed-garage was not covered by insurance.

The 1956 cancer campaign for Washington county is being conducted from Oct. 15 to 29, according to D. J. Kenny, Washington county chairman. Already the Community Chests of West Bend-Barton and Hartford have made generous contributions to this worthy cause. Therefore, letters were sent to all Washington county residents with the exception of those living in West Bend, Hartford and Barton. These letters were sent by the individual cancer chairmen of all of the villages and townships in the county.

Kenny said the campaign is being conducted entirely on a voluntary basis again this year since this type of drive has proved successful in the past. 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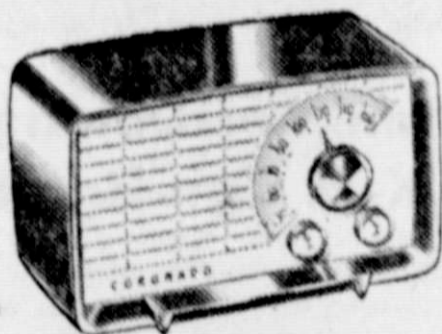
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UNITED NATIONS DAY, 1956 A Proclamation

The Indians will bring the season to a close with a home game under the lights on Tuesday night, Oct. 30, with Lomira.

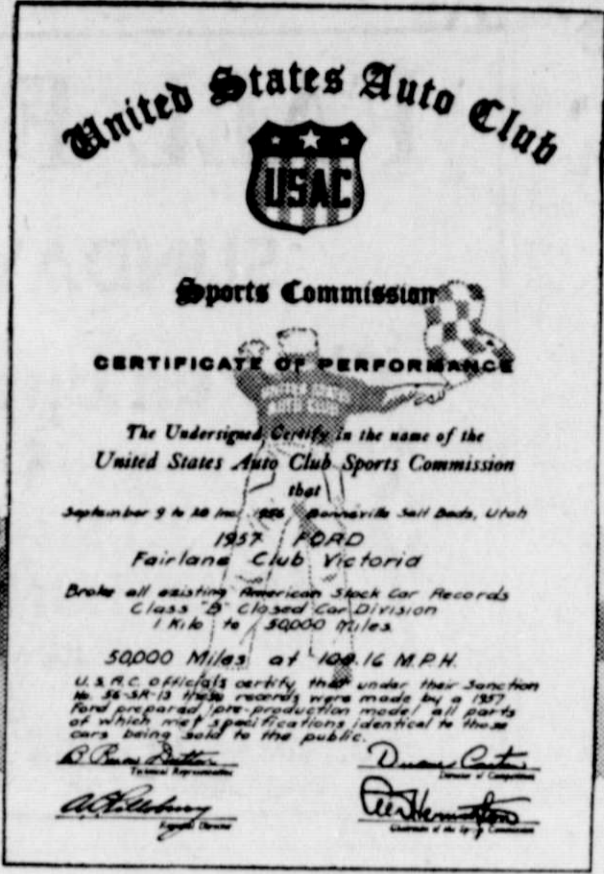

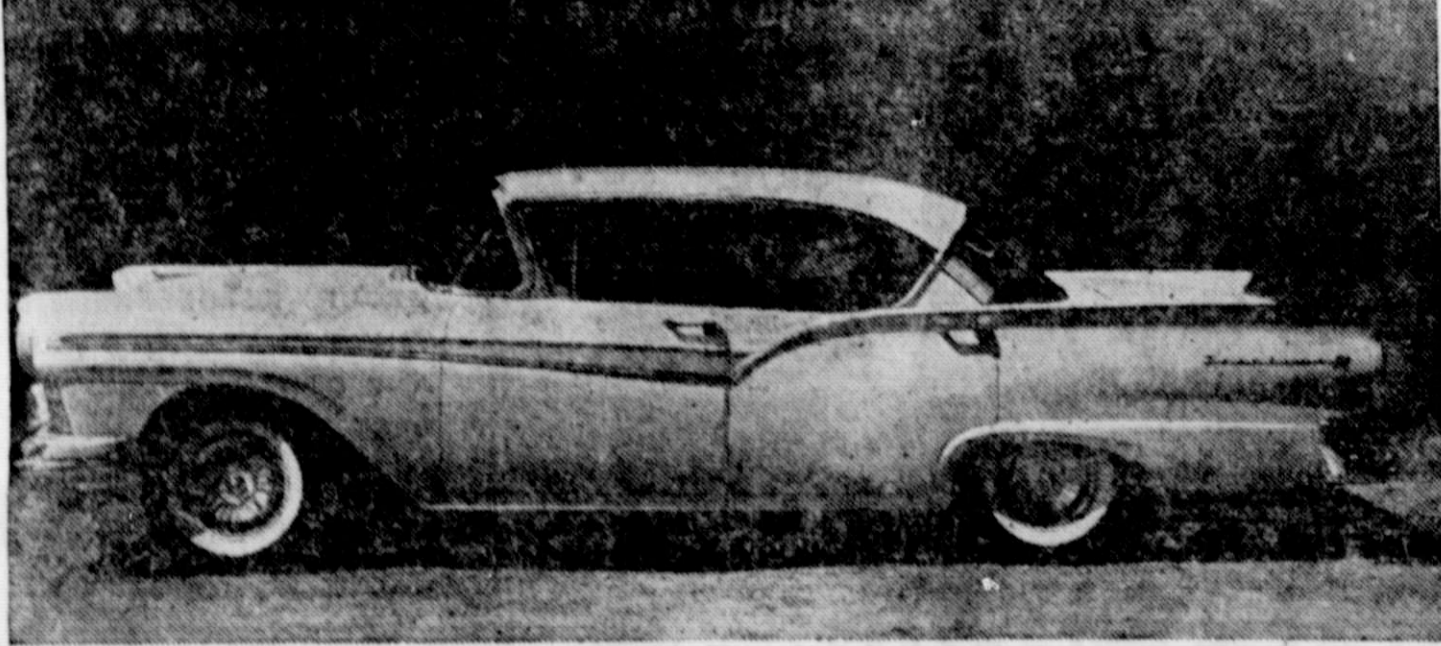
