## 678 Votes Cast in Village Tuesday Set New Record

### GOP Candidates Sweep to Victory In County, State

EISENHOWER, REPUBLICAN  
SLATE FAVORED BY 3-1  
MARGIN HERE

Voters of the village and town of Kewaskum followed the trend throughout the county, state and nation by giving the Republican candidates a clean sweep in Tuesday's presidential election. Along with President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Vice-President Richard Nixon's re-election, all of the GOP candidates for state and county offices were victorious.

A record vote was cast in the village when 678 persons went to the polls to mark their ballots. The vote in the last presidential election in 1952 totaled 624 in the vil-

Helping to get out a record vote in the village were the civics class of the high school, Cub Scouts and high school band. llege, 54 fewer votes than this time. Local voters favored Eisenhower by better than a 3 to 1 margin and also voted for Republican candidates for state and county offices by approximately a 3-1 margin.

The Kewaskum election board again had the honor of being the first in the state to report their presidential election returns and have them announced on the radio and television.

The town of Kewaskum registered a lower vote than in the 1952 election. There 322 votes were cast in comparison to 45 more or a total of 367 in '52. In 1948 the total vote was only 280. In the town Eisenhower was favored by almost a 5 to 1 margin, polling 260 votes to only 56 for Adlai E. Stevenson. The margin was smaller for county and state offices.

The overall vote in Washington county was below that in 1952. A total of 17,526 votes were cast in 1952 compared to 16,985 on Tuesday. Alvin L. Schmidt, who defeated Du Wayne Hasenfus for sheriff, is the only new county officer elected. He succeeds Sheriff George Brugger who has served two terms in office.

## Kiwanians Given Outline for New Swimming Pool

Herbert Westphal, secretary and treasurer of Paddock Pools, Inc. of Milwaukee, spoke to the Kiwanis club and showed a brief movie on the construction of swimming pools for both private and public purposes. The Kiwanians have a program underway at present for the construction of a swimming pool in Kewaskum.

Westphal pointed out that the selection of a suitable site was one of the first and most important jobs to be done. He suggested that many times a community will select the most undesirable or least valuable land in the community as a place to construct the pool. Two things should be kept in mind in selecting the site. First of all, ample parking facilities must be available and secondly the selected site should be on a relatively flat or level area so the hydrostatic pressures and other problems are not created. If such problems have to be overcome the original construction costs of the pool are proportionately higher. It is Westphal's opinion that a good pool contractor could do the job for private and public groups much more economically than could other people who might be contacted in jobs such as this.

As in the case with everything we purchase, when buying a swimming pool you get just what you pay for. It was pointed out that under no conditions is a swimming pool a cheap investment and that the money will be spent either in the original investment or in the up-keep. The size of the pool is determined by the purpose or purposes planned for it. The pool that is built to serve local people only would naturally be much smaller than one designed to attract people to the community and would therefore be serving a larger land area and population. It was estimated that a pool 35 feet wide and 75 feet long would be adequate for Kewaskum's local needs. A pool of this size would cost approximately \$30,000. This figure would include everything directly connected with the pool, including the filtering and recirculating systems, the lights, the edging tile, any necessary railings and stairs. The surrounding deck or platform and bath houses would be additional expense. A pool of this size constructed with the materials and methods used by Paddock, Inc. should last for at least fifty (50) years. There would be little or no upkeep except for mechanical equipment which would have to be repaired or replaced from time to time. Westphal pointed out that the type of construction they use was strong enough to allow the water to be left in the pool all winter long, frozen and used for an ice skating rink.

During the course of the program it was pointed out that odd shaped pools such as the letter "L," "T," or even wedge-shaped ones were becoming very popular. The main reason for these shapes in public pools is to separate the diving area from the more shallow, play, wading and paddling areas. The shallow areas, from 3 to 5 feet in depth, are used by far more people than the deeper, diving areas and therefore

## Backus Retires As Mail Carrier

Edwin "King" Backus, 62, retired on Nov. 1 as a rural letter carrier on Route 2 out of Kewaskum after completing 39 years in the government service. A lifelong resident of Kewaskum, he is a son of the late Henry and Alvina Backus.

Mr. Backus started his career on June 16, 1916 when he entered the army. He was with the machine gun battalion, 121st infantry, until he was discharged on March 16, 1919. He was discharged with the rank of sergeant. "King," as he was known by most people, then served as a substitute mail carrier for his father for four years and three months. He became regular carrier after that time and served in that position for 31 years and 9 months.

At the present Mr. Backus' route covers 52 miles. His son, Edwin, Jr., has been appointed substitute carrier in his place until a permanent carrier is appointed.

During his many years as rural mail carrier "King" did his work well. He made very many friends and was well liked. His patrons will miss him.
