Only two lettermen are back to help the team try and defend their conference championship. But the coaches have been working the past three weeks with a group of 25 to 30 candidates and the 10-man varsity squad has been pretty well decided.

One of the two lettermen back is Dave Mertzig, 6 foot senior forward, who starred on the football team this fall with his powerful and shifty running. The other is Jerry Opgenorth, junior guard. Gone from last season's title winning team are such aces as Tom Peterson, the league's top scorer; Curtis Yahr and Bob Stenman, who ranked second and third in team scoring, and Doug Wierman.

The varsity team, in addition to Mertzig and Opgenorth, will probably be composed of Dave Fickler and Eugene Laatsch, centers; Dave Opgenorth, Mark Rodenkirch, Norman Hirsig and Bill Boegel, forwards, and Bob Sparks, Roger Garbisch and John Rosenheimer, guards.

Coach Mitchell predicts that North Fondy and Campbellsport will most likely be the teams to beat this year.

## 14 Deer Reported Bagged in County

Fourteen deer were reported killed in Washington county early this week during the county's third annual deer hunting season. More may have been shot that were not yet reported and others were probably killed during the week. The season continues through Sunday.

Eleven of the bucks were shot on the opening week end and three more were reported the early part of the week. Last year only eight were shot on the opening week end.

Kewaskum hunters were among those who were successful in the Theresa marsh in the town of Wayne. The first deer reported shot in the marsh was by Ronald Wolf, 12-year-old West Bend hunter. He got his buck at about 7:30 a. m. Saturday. Others registering deer killed in Theresa marsh on opening day were Paul J. Schmitt of R. 3, Kewaskum and John J. Martin, Kewaskum.

George Benike, R. 3, West Bend, got a buck in the Wayne swamp. Additional deer were shot in the Theresa marsh by other hunters. Several were bagged in the Rockfield swamp, others in the town of Erin and Jackson swamps and town of Addison.

Lawrence Groth, R. 1, Kewaskum, bagged a forked horn buck in the Green Lake swamp area.

Many local hunters were successful in the north woods according to word around town but none of them had reported their luck at the time of this writing.

## Dr. Landmann Honored By South Dakota State Medical Association

### NAMED PRACTITIONER OF YEAR, PROPOSED FOR NATIONAL RECOGNITION

Many Kewaskum and Wisconsin friends of Dr. G. A. Landmann, Scotland, South Dakota, will be pleased to know that he has been named general practitioner of the year for South Dakota by the South Dakota State Medical Association.

Announcement of the selection of Dr. Landmann was made at the same time as his name is being proposed by the doctors of South Dakota for national recognition at the mid-year meeting of the American Medical Association in Seattle the last week in November.

Supporting Dr. Landmann's nomination to the AMA were letters from Governor Foss and Senator Mundt.

Governor Foss made tribute by saying, "Dr. Landmann's record as a South Dakota country doctor is outstanding. A man of great capabilities, he has been a devoted servant to his community and state, and one who is dearly beloved by professionals and laymen alike."

Senator Mundt added: "Dr. Landmann has been a 'horse and buggy' doctor making calls on his patients. He has continued to expand his knowledge of medicine, keeping in step with all new developments so that he could ably care for the people of his community."

He graduated from the University of Illinois Medical school. In 1904 he went to Parkston to practice and a short time later went to Marquette college in Milwaukee where he was an instructor. In 1912 he returned to Scotland to practice and in 1922 built the Scotland Clinic which he later sold.

He married Belinda Rosenheimer of Kewaskum in 1905 and there are two sons Paul N. of Kewaskum and Dr. Gus. Jr. of Tomah and one daughter Mrs. Ruth Frost of Stillwater, Minnesota, as well as eleven grandchildren.

During World War I Dr. Landmann was in the medical corps.

Dr. Landmann served as mayor of Scotland for over 18 years, is a charter member of the American Legion and a past commander, a Past Master of the Masonic lodge, a charter member of the Rotary club and has been very active in the work for the preservation of wild life in the state of South Dakota.

## Safe Stolen from Hirsig Home Found

A 200-pound safe stolen from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Hirsig on Highway 45, about three miles north of Kewaskum, Sunday night, Oct. 28, was found by a Milwaukee hunter last Thursday near a town road about two miles southwest of the village. The man, who was hunting in the area when he came across the safe, reported to authorities who recovered the stolen property.

The safe was removed when burglars broke into the Hirsig home while the family was away. It contained \$2,100 worth of government bonds and \$21 in cash. The bonds were still in the safe when it was discovered last week but other papers and the cash had been stolen before the burglars abandoned the safe by dumping it off the road.

The burglars gained entry through a rear door sometime between 4 and 10 p. m. The house was ransacked by the intruders in their search for money. So far no trace of the burglars has been found.

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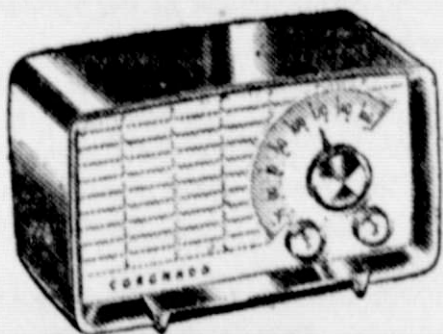

### Chevs Trim Cedarburg, 87-54; Tied for First

The Honeck Chevrolets made it two wins in a row by spanking Cedarburg in the home opener Sunday night, 87 to 54. The victory moved the team into a first place tie with Mayville in the Land o' Lakes league. Both teams have won 2 and lost 0.

The Chevs gained their 33-point margin over Cedarburg mainly as a result of the scoring spree put on by big George Hanrahan and Center John Tessar, offensive aces of the team. Hanrahan took top honors with 26 points and Tessar stayed right with him with 24. George scored 16 of his points in the first half and Tessar dumped in 16 in the second half. Best scorer for Cedarburg was Koehler, who had only 12. D. Fisher added 9.

Kewaskum got off to a real hot first quarter in which they took a commanding lead and Cedarburg never even got close. The period ended 24-7. Although outscored by a very slight margin in the second stanza, the Chevs still possessed a 15-point, 42-27 advantage at the intermission.

The Chevs again found the range regularly in the third period, tallying 21 points to the visitors' 12, and increased their advantage to a sizable 63-39 margin going into the final 10 minutes. The winners outscored Cedarburg 24-15 in the last quarter to bring the final count to 87-54.

Kewaskum bested their opponents from the free throw line, 23 to 16. But Cedarburg had 25 personals called on them while the Chevs had only 19. The visitors lost one player on fouls while the Chevs lost none.

This coming Sunday Kewaskum plays an afternoon tilt at Rosendale and can expect real rugged competition. The Dalers showed their strength by knocking off the strong, experienced Beaver Dam cagers last Sunday in a surprise.

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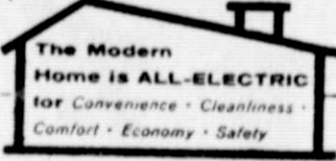

The work of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association includes chest x-ray clinics, tuberculin testing, rehabilitation and medical social services to patients and their families, and research.

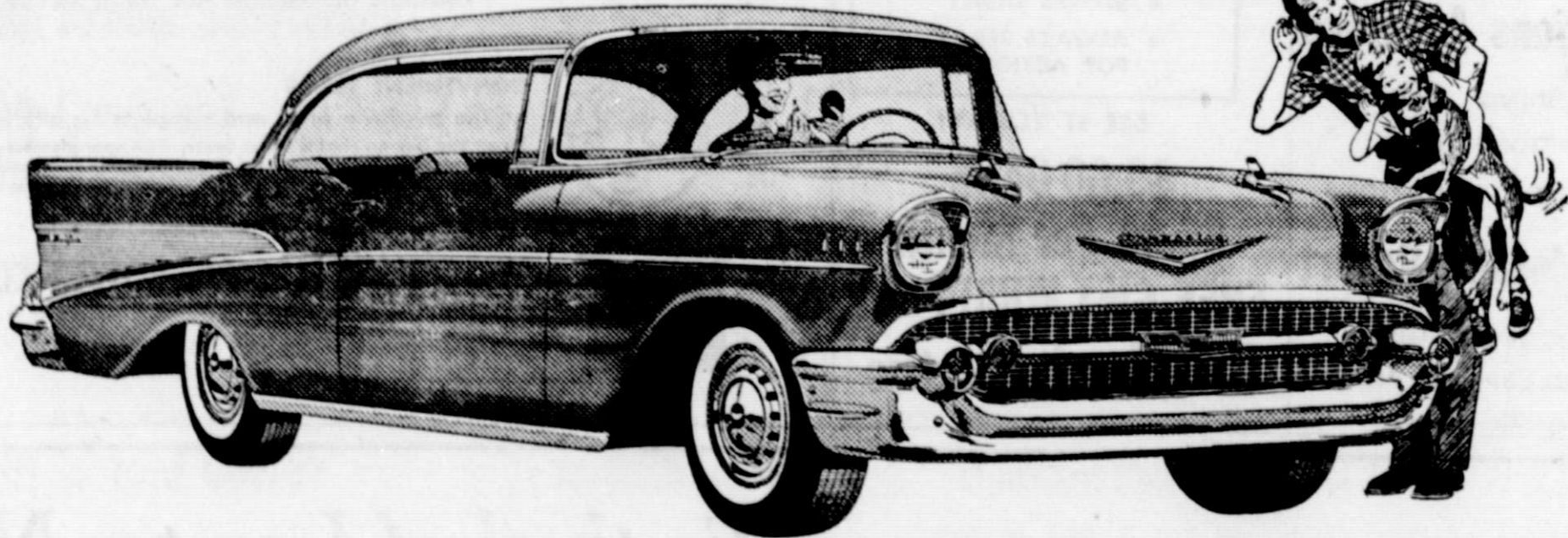



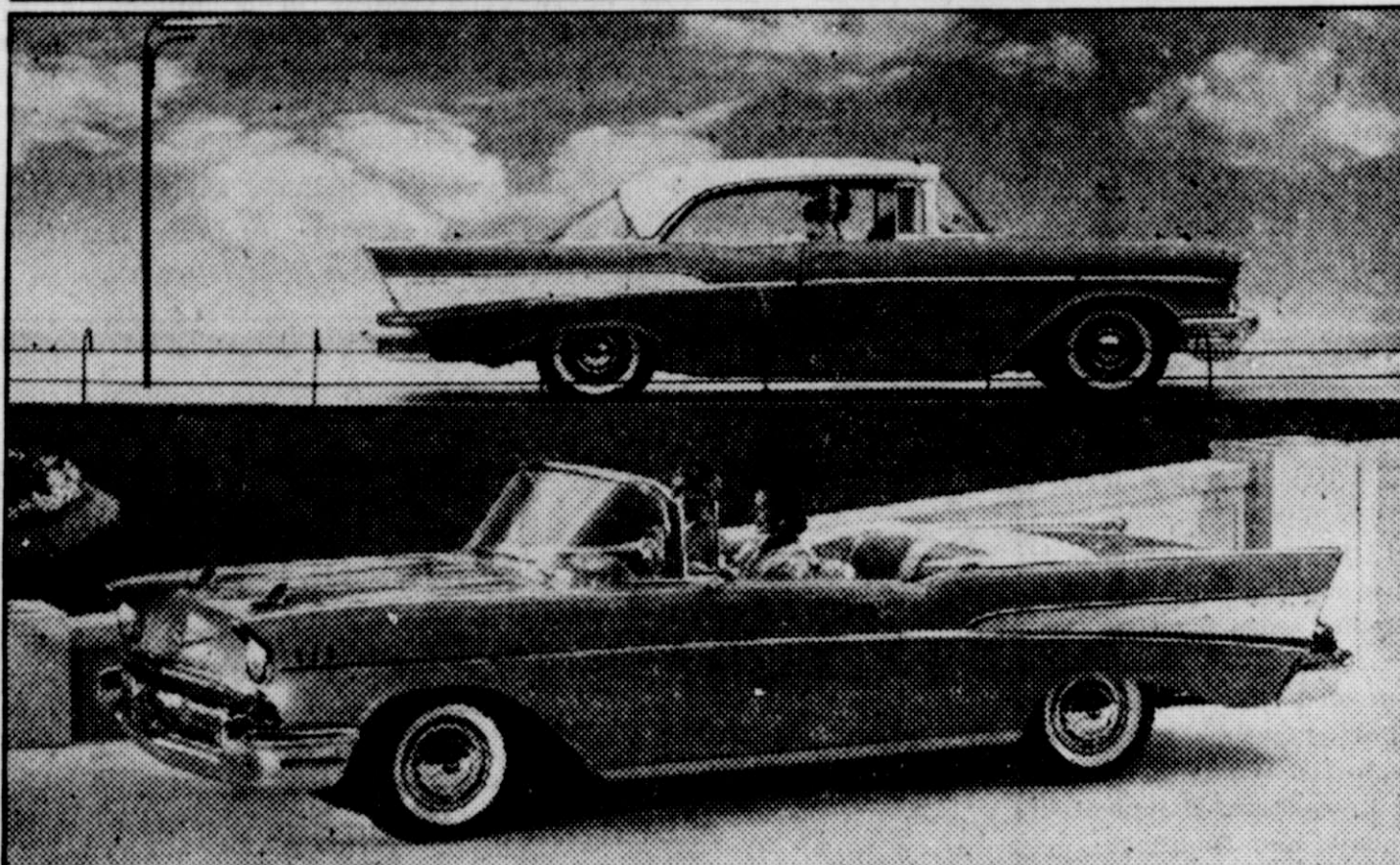

### Important Notice to All Residents of Area Clip and Save!

At a meeting of the Civil Defense Organization in Kewaskum, it was decided that the following regulations would be in effect in the event of any type of disaster in our vicinity. This applies to impending danger from natural sources such as tornadoes, unusually severe storms, etc., as well as enemy attacks:

1. Warning will be given by the fire siren blowing continuously.
2. All persons in the danger areas are to go to the Kewaskum Municipal Building where shelter will be arranged. If this building has already been demolished, the Incinerator Plant on Highway 55 has been established as the second headquarters. The Pumping Station located at the entrance to the village park is to be used if the first two buildings mentioned are no longer usable.

DO NOT GO TO THE ACTUAL DISASTER AREA.

The Civil Defense Organization is also trying to set up plans for an emergency hospital in Kewaskum; however, it will be necessary to have a number of trained personnel to staff this hospital. Any person in Kewaskum or the surrounding communities who has had nursing training should contact Mrs. R. Pledl, Kewaskum, Phone No. 160R at once, so that arrangements for this hospital can be made.

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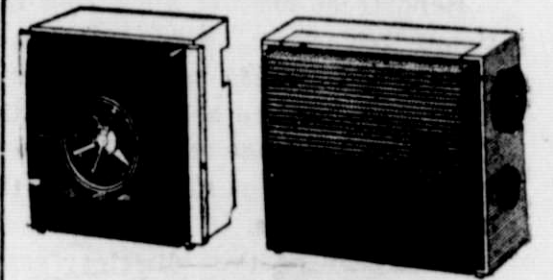
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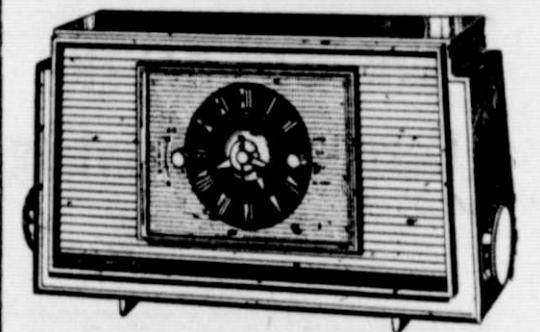
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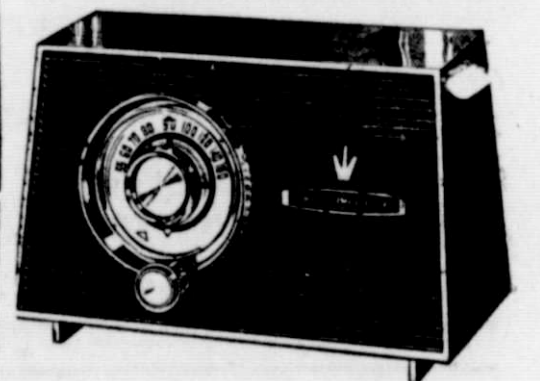
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
