Frank Heppe, Postmaster Over 22 Years to Retire on Dec. 31 Served Longer Than Any Other Postmaster Here

POST OFFICE ADVANCED FROM 3RD TO 1ST CLASS DURING HIS YEARS OF SERVICE

After serving 22 years and 7 months as postmaster of Kewaskum, Frank Heppe has announced he will retire under optional retirement on Dec. 31. This is the longest period of time any postmaster has served Kewaskum. He has been eligible for retirement since 1950. Appointed May 26, 1934, Frank served under three presidents — Roosevelt, Truman and Eisenhower.

During his years of service it was necessary for him to handle assignments other than the usual routine duties. When the social security act was passed, all employers received their account numbers at the post office. In 1936 veterans of World War I received bonus bonds. These were also handled in the post office, as well as the first sale of U. S. Savings bonds and savings stamps in 1936.

Kewaskum was a 3rd class office until 1944 when it was advanced to second class. It remained in second class until 1948 when increased postal receipts moved it to 1st class. After three years, the office was relegated to 2nd class and remained so through 1951, 52 and 53. In 1954 it was again advanced to 1st class and has been such ever since. The all time high in postal receipts was in 1949 when they reached \$99,000.00.

Postmaster Heppe served as president of the Washington County Postmaster's association for three years, held the office of district director for four years and is a member of the Wisconsin Chapter of the National Association of Postmasters.

In none of his 22 years as postmaster did Frank take an extended vacation and he leaves the postal service with a total of 185 days of unused sick leave.

An acting postmaster will be appointed until an examination is held and a permanent appointment is made.

Frank has served the public well, ever ready to oblige and accommodate the patrons of his office. He had a personal interest in seeing that mails were expediently handled and carried out his many duties in a conscientious manner. The many accommodations and kindnesses shown by him to the public will long be remembered. He leaves the service with the good wishes of all the patrons of his office.

Jewelry Peddlers Make Rounds Here

Two jewelry peddlers from Milwaukee, selling inferior products, visited local taverns and other business places last Friday evening trying to sell jewelry items to the customers.

According to Chief of Police Roland Pledl these "sharpies" mark the jewelry way up on the price tag and then sell the item for much less than the list price. The jewelry is well polished and appears expensive but is not even worth the cheap price they sell it for.

The village has an ordinance requiring such peddlers to pay a transient license of \$50 per day to sell their merchandise here. The aim of this ordinance is to keep peddlers out of town. As the pair from Milwaukee did not have such a license they were ordered to leave the village by the police chief.

Chief Pledl reports that these peddlers do most of their selling around Christmas time and warns residents to be on the lookout for them. If you are approached by any such persons the police should be notified. Don't fall for their line or their merchandise.

Train No. 151 Now Stops in Village

Chicago and North Western Railway's early afternoon train to Green Bay No. 151 now makes a regular stop at Kewaskum at 12:34 p. m. since Monday, Dec. 3, according to an announcement from the railway.

Additional stops are being added to the northbound train following an order by the Wisconsin Public Service Commission authorizing the railway to discontinue the operation of train No. 149 between Milwaukee and Green Bay. Starting Dec. 3 stops were added to No. 151 at Rockfield, Jackson, Barton, Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Eden, Winnebago and Wrightstown.

Leaving Milwaukee at 11:30 a. m., daily except Sunday, No. 151 will arrive Green Bay at 3:10 p. m. under the revised schedule.

Increase of \$2.50 Over Last Year Is Adopted By Board

A tax rate of \$22.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation has been adopted by the village board for 1956. This is an increase of \$2.50 per thousand over the 1955 tax rate of \$20.00 per thousand.

The assessment for 1955 was \$6,977,980.00 as compared to \$7,214,570.00 for 1956, an increase of \$236,590.00. The assessment ratio to equalized value is 99.98%.

The big reason for the \$2.50 increase is the school taxes which are \$2.12 higher than last year. The state taxes are the same, the county taxes up 3 cents, village taxes up 52 cents and dept retirement and interest down 17 cents. But the school taxes jumped from \$10.21 per thousand to \$12.33 per thousand.

The 1955 rates and amounts levied were as follows: State taxes, \$1,396.33—20c per thousand; county taxes, \$30,253.61—\$4.35 per thousand; school taxes, \$71,326.74—\$10.21 per thousand; village taxes, \$27,121.07—\$3.88 per thousand; dept retirement and interest, \$9,483.75—\$1.36 per thousand; total \$129,568.47—\$20.00 per thousand.

The 1956 rates and amounts levied are: State, \$1,482.59—20c per thousand (same as last year); county, \$31,635.73—\$4.38 per thousand (increase of 3c); school, \$88,921.73—\$12.33 per thousand (increase of \$2.12); village, \$31,710.77—\$4.40 per thousand (increase of 52c); dept retirement and interest, \$8,576.68—\$1.19 per thousand (decrease of 17c); total, \$162,327.65—\$22.50 per thousand.

Bob Becker Tops Vo-ag Corn Project

RESULTS PRODUCE NEW HIGH
OF 131.4 BUSHELS PER ACRE
IN HIGH SCHOOL PROJECTS

The 1956 corn yield results produced a new high for vocational agricultural students' projects at Kewaskum high school, it was announced this week by O. E. Behnke, vocational agriculture instructor. Bob Becker, son of William Becker, R. 2, Kewaskum, was on top of a total of 65 yield test plots with an average yield of 131.4 bushels per acre.

The average production of all the corn varieties was 74.4 bushels per acre, and the average moisture content of the corn at the time the corn was weighed was 27.4 per cent. The average corn yield per acre in the state of Wisconsin last year was approximately 58 bushels.

Other vo-ag students producing more than 100 bushels of corn per acre were Harvey Weigand, 107.1 bushels; Russell Kempf, 106.5 bushels; Bob Becker, with another variety yield of 103.3 bushels; Roger Meyer, 100.9 bushels, and Ralph Trapp, 100.7 bushels per acre.

The yield results were pulled down considerably when three boys produced less than 30 bushels per acre with the low yield of 26.2 bushels per acre.

Varieties of corn grown were Pioneer 377A and Pioneer 371, DeKalb 236, DeKalb 63, and Wisconsin 525A. These varieties of hybrid seed corn are given to the vo-ag students who want to participate in

corn projects each year. Each company donates enough hybrid seed per student to plant at least one and one-half acres. Some boys had all three varieties.

For further information on the yield results stop in at the vocational agriculture room in the high school.

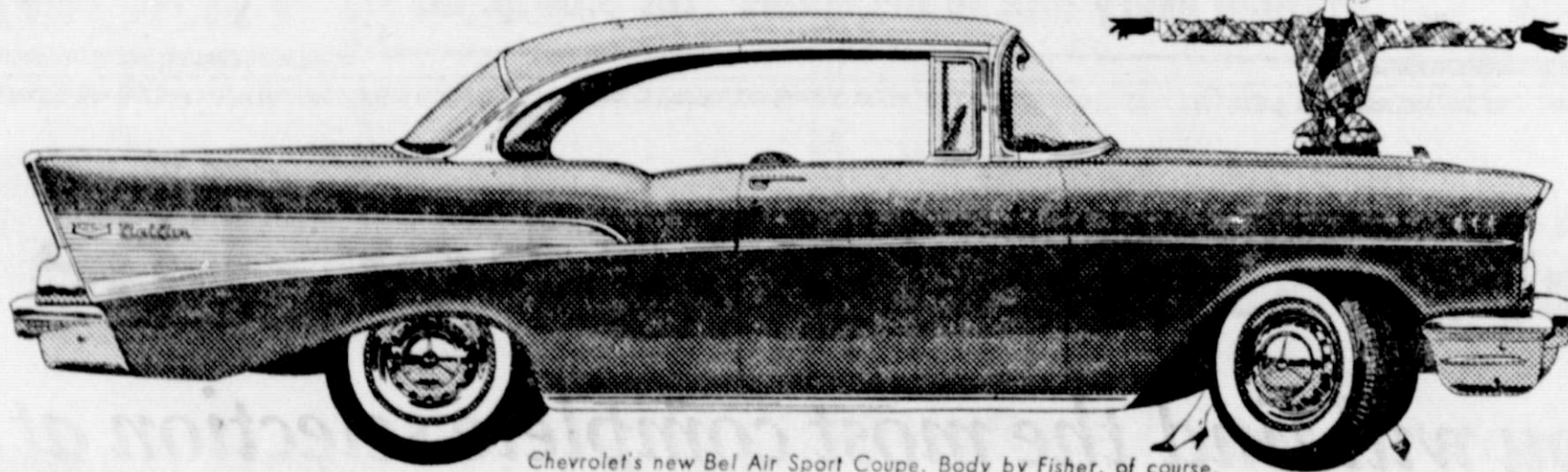

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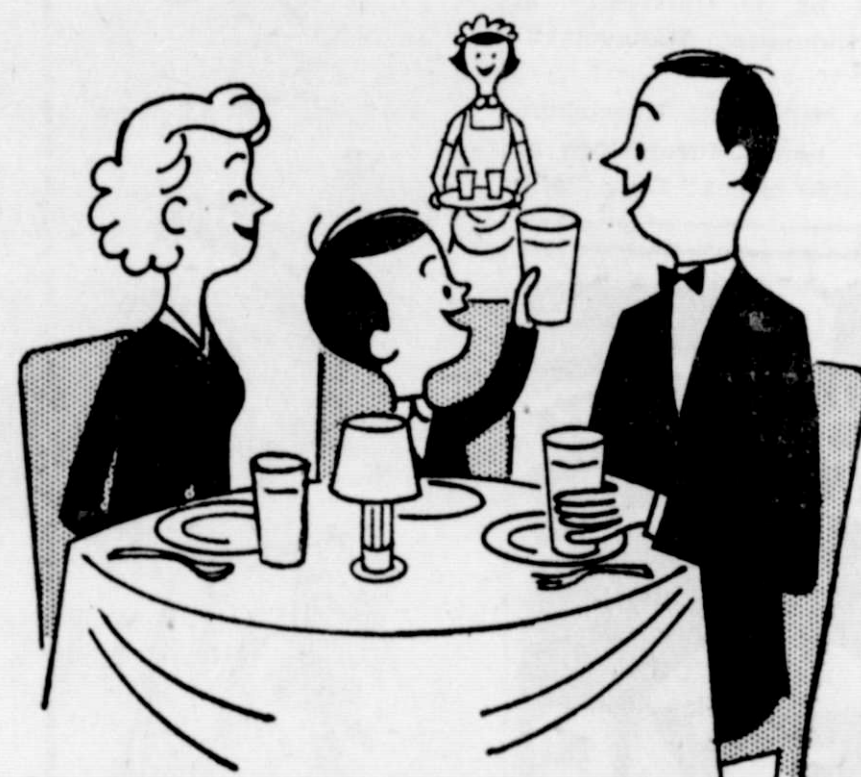
