Budget for 1957 Adopted By Board

SEEK QUOTATIONS, BIDS ON NEW FURNACE AND TRUCK

Regular Meeting December 3, 1956
The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session. In the absence of President Reigle, Trustee Stelplflug was selected to act as acting president. All trustee members were present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved upon motion by C. Schaefer, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried.

Since there were no objections to the proposed budget for 1957, the following resolution was introduced by Trustee C. Schaefer.

RESOLUTION NO. 56-5

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that there be and hereby are levied the following taxes for the year ending December 31, 1956, upon all real and personal property, according to the assessment roll of the current year:

STATE TAXES, \$1,482.59 at the rate of \$9.2055 per thousand.

COUNTY TAXES, \$31,635.88 at the rate of \$4.385 per thousand.

SCHOOL TAXES, DIST NO. 1 & NO. 2, \$88,921.73 at the rate of \$12.3253 per thousand.

VIL TAXES, \$31,710.77 at the rate of \$4.3954 per thousand.

DEBT RETIREMENT & INTEREST, \$8,576.68 at the rate of \$1.1888 per thousand.

TOTAL TAX LEVY, \$162,327.65 at the rate of \$22.50 per thousand.

Motion by M. Schaefer, seconded by J. Eberle that resolution 56-5 shall be adopted. Upon roll call, all members present voting "AYE," said resolution was so adopted.

The following resolution was introduced by Trustee C. Schaefer.

RESOLUTION NO. 56-6

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that the commissioner shall place upon the present tax roll for collection all village accounts, Municipal Water Dept. accounts and Dept. of Sanitation accounts which are unpaid as of December 31, 1956.

Motion by M. Schaefer, seconded by A. Merwin that Resolution 56-6 shall be adopted. Upon roll call, all members present voting "AYE," said resolution was so adopted.

As a matter of record, the commissioner reported that the Heine-mann Dairy Plant had been re-connected to the village sanitary sewage system on November 29th.

Motion by W. Tessar, seconded by C. Schaefer and carried that the board shall appropriate fifty (\$50.00) dollars prize money for the annual home Christmas decoration program.

The commissioner was instructed to obtain quotations on a new forced air, oil burning furnace and fuel tank for the village garage.

Motion by M. Schaefer, seconded by C. Schaefer and duly carried that the salary of the sewage plant operator shall be increased to \$290.00 per month as of December 1, 1956.

County Clerk Anton P. Stal reported this week that the number of deer licenses sold in Washington county this year showed a gain of 24 over those issued in 1955. In 1955 a total of 675 licenses were sold in the county while 1,899 were issued this year.

Deer licenses sold in the county do not necessarily indicate that more county residents purchased licenses as many are sold to out-of-county residents, the county clerk reported. But it was believed that more licenses were also issued to county residents this year as a steady increase in the number of hunters from the county and elsewhere has been noted.

The hunters did not all hunt in the county. Most of them went up north.
