## County Has 24th Traffic Fatality, Other Accidents

FOUR OTHERS LOST LIVES IN HOLIDAY MISHAPS JUST OUTSIDE OF COUNTY

Washington county recorded its 24th traffic fatality of the year Saturday when an Oshkosh resident, Ray W. Wynen, 52, was killed in a two car collision on new Hwy. 41 about two and a quarter miles south of Hwy. 33. Wynen was a passenger in a car driven by Edgar Zentner, 53, also of Oshkosh, when it collided with one driven by Melvin Frandeen, 34, Hartford. Both of the other men were injured.

Three persons were killed and eight injured in a headon collision on the same Hwy. 41 at about 6:15 p. m. Christmas day about a quarter mile north of Hwy. 28 west of Kewaskum and just over the Washington county line in Dodge county. The dead are Irene Fischer, 41, Cudahy; Mrs. Pauline Schmidt, 75, New London, and Betty Ann Gardiner, 26, Milwaukee.

Injured were Harvey Fischer, 46, and his three children, Richard, 17, the driver of one car, and Gerald, 15, and Mary Lynn, 11. All are from Milwaukee. Others hurt were Douglas Haas, 20, Milwaukee, driver of the other car, and Mary Haas, 16, Milwaukee, and Mrs. Mary Jaske and Edward Jaske, 60, Milwaukee.

According to Dodge county authorities the Fischer car was traveling south on Hwy. 41 and apparently was passing other cars when he lost control and the auto plunged into the ditch. The machine traveled 462 feet along the ditch before Fischer brought it back onto the highway where it collided head-on with the Haas car. Hwy. 41 was quite slippery and slushy over the week end.

Another fatality just over the Washington county line in Dodge county occurred Monday in a car-truck collision on the same Hwy. 41. Fatally injured was Walter A. Huber, 24, Milwaukee. He was the driver of a car which collided with a truck driven by Clair W. Zimmerman, 24, Fond du Lac. Zimmerman was trapped in the cab of his truck but was not seriously hurt.

Many other accidents were reported in the county over the week end due to the icy condition of the roads, three of them involving local residents.

Two cars and a school bus were involved in an accident on Hwy. 28 one mile west of Kewaskum at 4 p. m. last Friday, Dec. 21. The cars were driven by Elmer H. Miller, 63, Sheboygan, and Richard Roesel, 18, Kewaskum, and the Johnson school bus was driven by Wm. Becker, R. 2, Kewaskum. The bus and Roesel car were westbound on 28 when Roesel attempted to pass the bus. As he was doing so the Miller auto approached from the opposite direction. Getting over as far as he could to avoid a collision with the oncoming Miller vehicle Roesel sideswiped the bus, forcing Miller into the ditch on the south side of the road. Miller suffered bruises and a passenger, Wayne Evans, 14, sustained cuts and bruises. Both were treated at a local physician's office. All three vehicles were damaged.

### Chevs Tip Mayville to Take Over First Place; Near First Half Title

**TESSAR SCORES 38 AS TEAM WINS 7TH STRAIGHT; PLAY AT WEST BEND SUNDAY**

The Kewaskum Chevrolets won the big one Sunday when they defeated Mayville here in grand style, 89-78. The win was the seventh straight without a defeat for the Chevs who passed up Mayville and took over undisputed first place in the standings. Kewaskum can clinch at least a tie for the first half title by beating West Bend this Sunday night. The team winds up the first half card at Horicon the following Sunday.

Mayville had won seven in succession without a setback before bumping into the Chevs. They led Kewaskum all season by a half game by virtue of having played one more encounter. But Manager "Cisco" Backhaus' charges took care of the matter Sunday by administering Mayville's first defeat and replacing them at the top of the heap. Mayville will be idle this week end and a win at West Bend Sunday night will give the Chevs a full game lead. Mayville must still meet the strong third place Hartford club the following week while Kewaskum has sixth place Horicon to contend with. The defending champion Chevrolets are now the only unbeaten team in both the Land o' Lakes and Rivers northern division circuits.

Sunday's howling crowd was the largest of the season at a local tilt and they enjoyed every minute of it. Quite a few Mayville partisans were also on hand to cheer for their favorites but naturally they were not pleased. The gym was filled for this very crucial battle.

Johnny Tessar was sensational as he scored 38 points in leading his team to its important victory. Again there was no stopping Johnny as he dropped in 12 field goals and 14 free throws. Mayville fouled him frequently in an effort to hold him down and this hurt them as he sank 14 of 18 free toss attempts. Tessar's total was his highest of the season and would have been tops in the entire league were it not for a new high set by Fred Miller of Beaver Dam the same afternoon. Miller set a scoring mark for the season by pumping in 54 points against Fox Lake Sunday afternoon. Fred, former UW ace, attended the game here in the evening.

The chips were down in Sunday's important contest and both teams knew it. They played very hard and

on one or two occasions tempers flared but nothing came of it. Probably trying a little too hard in the first half Kewaskum had trouble getting rolling. With Don Meisenheimer, George Hanrahan and Tessar paving the way Chevs gained a 29-24 advantage in the first quarter. But their scoring machine sputtered out in the second period as Mayville held them to 13 points while making 20 themselves. This gave the visitors a 44-42 halftime lead and Kewaskum had their work cut out for them. Forward Harvey paced his team with 10 points to put his team ahead.

Then the Chevs bounced back like the champions they are in the second half with the old pros, Tessar and Augie Bilgo really going to work by scoring 11 and 9 points respectively (all but 4 of their team's total) the Chevs swished in 24 markers in the stanza while checking Mayville with only 12. This gave Kewaskum a comfortable 66-56 advantage for the first time. In the final quarter with Tessar contributing 13 more points and reserves seeing most of the action, the scoring was quite even again with the Chevs making 23 and Mayville 22. This brought the final margin to 11 points. With the victory assured Tessar was removed late in the final period and received a fine ovation from the fans.

A total of 48 fouls were called as the teams fought it out, 27 on the visitors and 21 on the home club. Kewaskum sank 29 free throws out of 46 tries while Mayville made good on 26 out of 36 for a great average. The losers sank 14 out of 18 in the first half and these were responsible for giving them the

half-time lead.

Besides Tessar, other top scorers for the Chevs were Bilgo with 14 points, Meisenheimer with 13 and Hanrahan with 12. Forward Genzmer was the big scorer for Mayville with 20 points. Harvey chipped in 16. G. Heim 15 and Griepentrog 14.

This coming Sunday's contest at West Bend will begin at 8:30 p. m. following the Kewaskum - West Bend Rivers game. The Lithias hold down fourth place in the league and may prove tough to beat. Although their record is 3 and 4 to date they always are up for Kewaskum and will be out to play the role of spoiler.

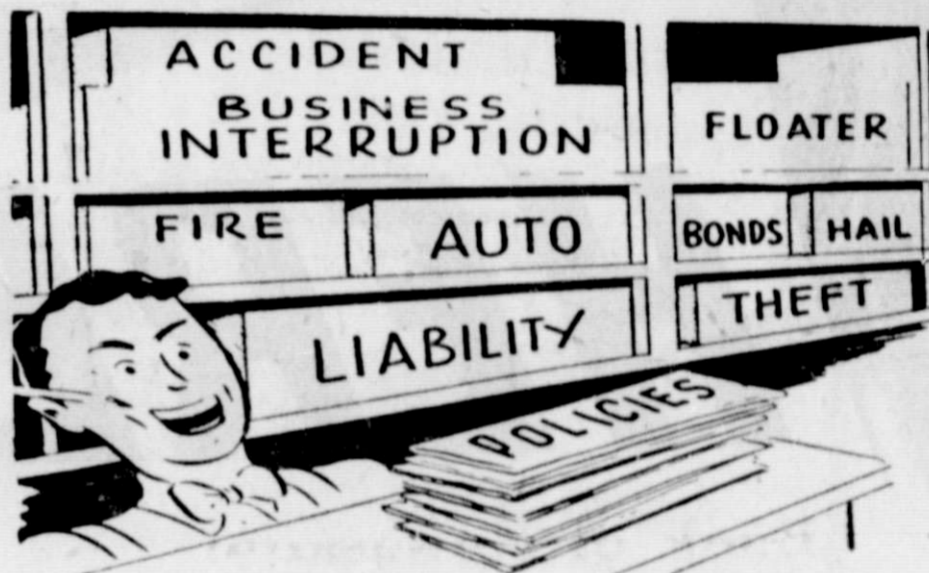

Persons who have already ordered trees from the conservation department nurseries for planting on conservation reserve lands and whose orders have been accepted by the nurseries need take no further action at this time Hoffman stated.

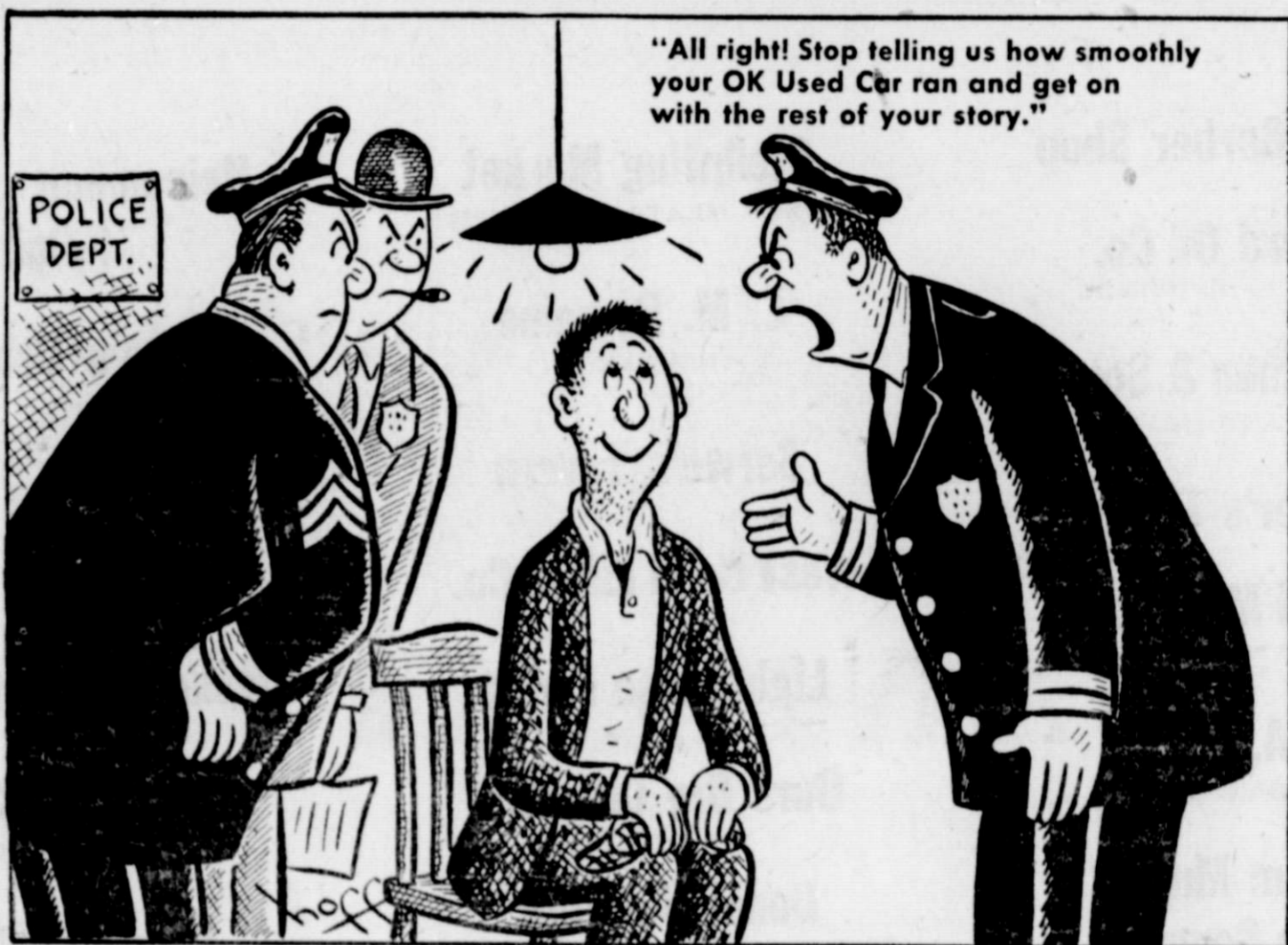

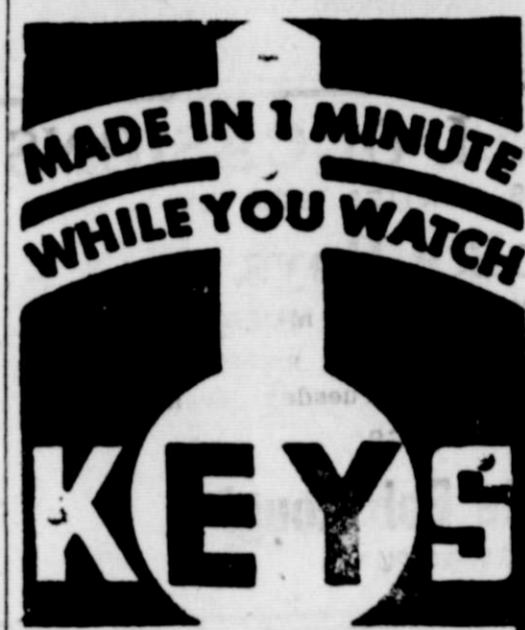
A 1,500-acre tent city is being prepared at historic Valley Forge in Pennsylvania. It will have its own water supply, electricity, telephone service, post office, and other services for
