## Residents Told Of Plans for Hwy. 45 Reconstruction

**BOARD MEETS WITH CITIZENS  
TO DISCUSS REBUILDING  
OF FOND DU LAC AVE.**

The village board of Kewaskum met in open public meeting with interested local citizens recently to review and discuss the proposed plans for the reconstruction of Highway 45 (Fond du Lac ave.) within the village. Public notice of such meeting had been published previously in this paper.

Besides all the board members, 19 interested citizens were present at this meeting. Work on the reconstruction of Hwy. 45 through the village is expected to be done this coming summer.

Paul Bishop of the McMahon Engineering Co. explained the plans for the new highway to those present.

The important point stressed at this meeting was the fact that the original recording in 1836 establishing the roadway which is now Highway 45 and Fond du Lac ave. calls for a sixty-six (66) feet right-of-way. Bishop explained that the present plans are being prepared using this original recording as the basis for their plans.

## Three Local Young Men Enter Service

Richard Romaine of 709 Rogers st., Madison, a son of Elwyn M. Romaine of Kewaskum, has resigned as chief announcer at radio station WMFM, Madison, to enter the U. S. Army. He was inducted into the service and left from Hartford on Wednesday to begin active training at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

A 1956 graduate of the University of Wisconsin, where he majored in speech and radio, Romaine has been with WMFM for three years. He has become widely known for his commentary on the station's programs of serious music. He has also been handling color and statistics on football and basketball broadcasts, according to a Madison newspaper, which also carried a picture of Romaine.

## Home Broken Into And Burglarized

The downstairs apartment occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Brunner in the Mrs. Frank Bohn home a half mile south of Kewaskum on Hwy. 45 was broken into and burglarized sometime between 1:30 and 8:45 p. m. Sunday while the Brunners were away.

The Brunners have occupied the apartment only about two months. They moved here from Elaine, Wis. about four months ago and resided in the village before moving into the Bohn home, formerly occupied by the Francis Bohn family. When Francis Bohn purchased the Mrs. Lydia Leonard property on South Fond du Lac ave. a short time ago, his family exchanged residences with the Brunners. Brunner is employed by the Electric company.

The burglars gained entrance to the home by removing a kitchen storm window and then breaking the inside window glass and raising the window. They apparently were more intent on committing vandalism than burglary. The home was ransacked and most of the vandalism was done to ladies' clothing and toiletries. Ladies' clothing was placed on a pile and then the vandals poured perfume, hand lotion, toilet water and other liquids over it. The only articles stolen were two ladies' slips.

Before departing the vandals left a sign on the kitchen door printed with crayon which read, "Get out or it will be worse."

The Washington county sheriff's department and local officers are investigating the burglary.

## Polio Fund Drive Underway; Koehn Village Chairman

"Let's finish the job!"

This is the theme announced by March of Dimes headquarters at West Bend for the 1957 polio fund drive which got underway in Washington county on Wednesday, Jan. 2. The campaign will continue through January.

A majority of township, village and city chairmen have already been appointed by Herbert P. Matenaer, Barton, county drive chairman, and others will be named in the very near future.

To assist him in conducting the 1957 appeal for funds throughout the county Matenaer announced the appointment of the following area chairmen:

Townships—Louis Kuhaupt, Addison; Carl Plaum, Farmington; Barney Strobel, Wayne; John Van Beck, Barton; Cyril Presson, Richfield; Franklin Thierfelder, Germantown, and Philip Frey and George Nehrbass, south half of the town of Polk.

Villages—Mrs. Frances Mueller, Barton; Kurt Westenberger, Germantown; Clem Mayer, Jackson; Jack Koehn, Kewaskum, and Charles Westphal, Jr., Newburg.

West Bend city school contributions will be under the direction of Fred Holt, city superintendent, while Harry Sheski, county superintendent, will be in charge of county school collections.

The 1957 March of Dimes coin collectors have been and are being distributed in all business establishments except taverns by the Washington County council of the American Legion. The Washington County Tavern league is distributing the collectors to taverns under its jurisdiction.

In announcing the beginning of this year's drive, Matenaer also revealed that the first contribution has already been received. The union of the West Bend Equipment Co. has already forwarded its contribution. Matenaer explained that the purpose of the theme, "Let's finish the job!" is two-fold; to raise funds for repair of the damage that polio has done to thousands of Americans in the past, and to prevent the disease from crippling more thousands in the future.

March of Dimes spokesmen explain that an estimated 80,000 persons have been left handicapped by polio, throughout the length and breadth of the United States; and they point out that the job of conquering the disease cannot be considered finished until these patients have been helped to regain normal and productive lives.

The second objective of the campaign is to promote the widest possible use of the Salk vaccine, which was developed under March of Dimes sponsorship, and which has been proven safe and effective many millions of times over.

Commenting on the 16,000 cases of polio reported in 1956, Basil O'Connor, president of the March of Dimes organization, said:

## Undersheriff and Deputies Named By New Sheriff

Washington county sheriff-elect Al Schmidt has announced the appointment of former sheriff George Brugger to serve as his undersheriff during the next two years while Schmidt is sheriff. Schmidt also disclosed the appointment of his deputies for his term, which officially began on Monday, Jan. 7.

Schmidt was elected sheriff of the county in the Nov. 6 election. Brugger has served two terms as sheriff, the limit on the office set by state law.

Sheriff-elect Schmidt was sworn in during December with the other county officers by County Judge Milton Meister at special ceremonies. County Clerk Anton P. Staral administered the oath of office to the undersheriff and the deputies on Wednesday, Jan. 2.

County Highway Commissioner Al Rettler and members of the county highway committee, Adolph Lofy, Reuben Schmah and Edwin Helm took the oath of office for their new terms as county officials of the highway department last Thursday.

Other county deputies will be administered the oath of office upon appointment.

### Millers Attend Home Furnishings Market

Furniture buyers were in Chicago this week to attend the semi-annual wholesale home furnishings market which opened Monday. Miller's of Kewaskum was represented by Mr. and Mrs. Edw. E. Miller, Joe Miller, Miss Joan Miller and Edward Miller, Jr.

They joined some 25,000 other buyers in touring the two huge exhibition buildings—the Merchandise Mart and the American Furniture Mart—where most of the new designs are displayed. Home furnishings introduced at this market will begin to appear at Miller's in the next three or four months.

New furniture trends continued include softer lines, more decorative touches for contemporary furniture, lightness in both weight and appearance for upholstered and wood furniture, and more of the "high, narrow look," which helps give needed height interest to a room full of long, low furniture. Tall cabinet pieces also furnish needed storage space in small homes.

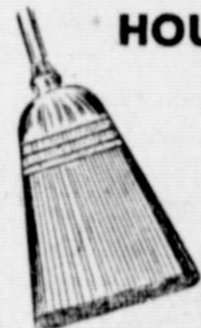

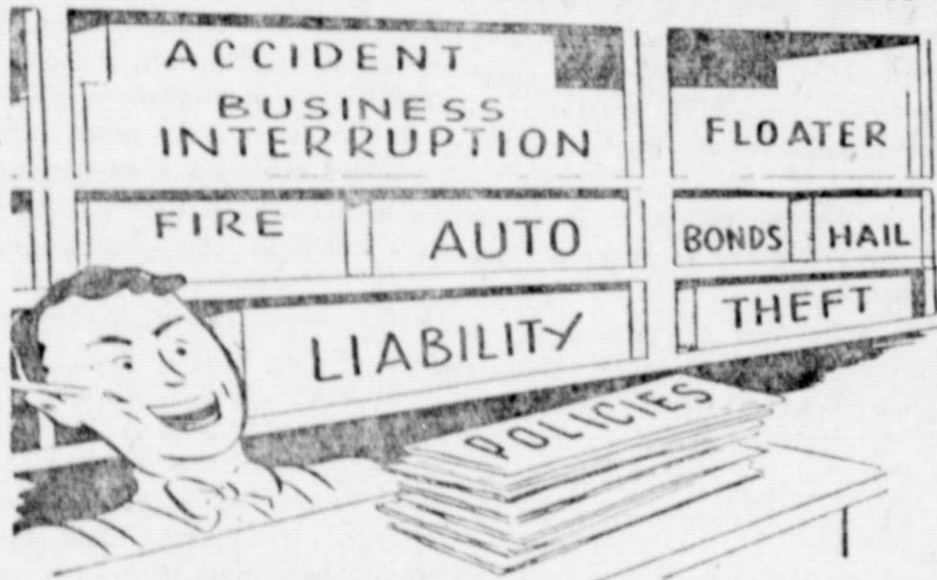

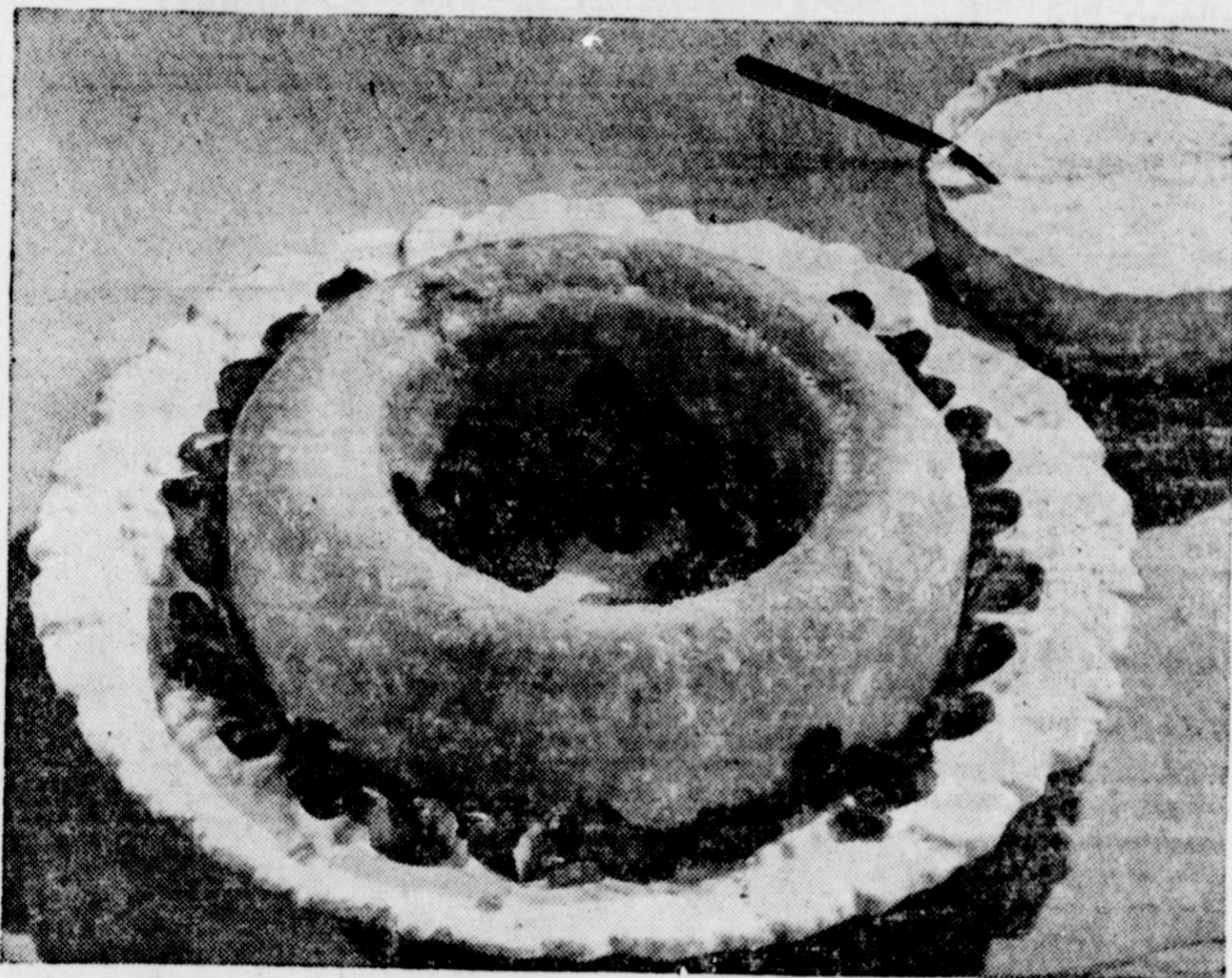

Much of cottage cheese's popularity derives from the fact that it goes well with ever so many foods. It enters into many famous dishes. The ways cottage cheese can be used range from

appetizers, soups, main dishes, salads, salad dressings, to desserts.

This dairy product might be called a solid form of pure milk or a semi-cheese. Being chiefly the coagulated protein of milk, cottage cheese is a favorite for reducing diets. It has high protein value and low calorie content.

Unlike other cheeses, the fresher the better is the rule for cottage cheese. It should be used within a day or two after purchase. Keep it tightly covered and store in the refrigerator.

**PINEAPPLE COTTAGE CHEESE SALAD**  
6 servings  
5-cup ring mold

1 package lemon flavored gelatin

1 package lime flavored gelatin  
1 cup boiling water

2/3 cup of liquid (pineapple juice plus water if necessary)

1/2 cup milk

1 12-oz. carton cream style cottage cheese

1-1-lb. 4-oz. can crushed pineapple

Place lemon and lime gelatin in a bowl and dissolve in the boiling water. Add the 2/3 cup of liquid. Cool until of a jelly like consistency. Fold in milk, cottage cheese, and pineapple. Pour into lightly oiled mold and chill until firm. Unmold onto greens and serve with a mayonnaise and sour cream dressing.

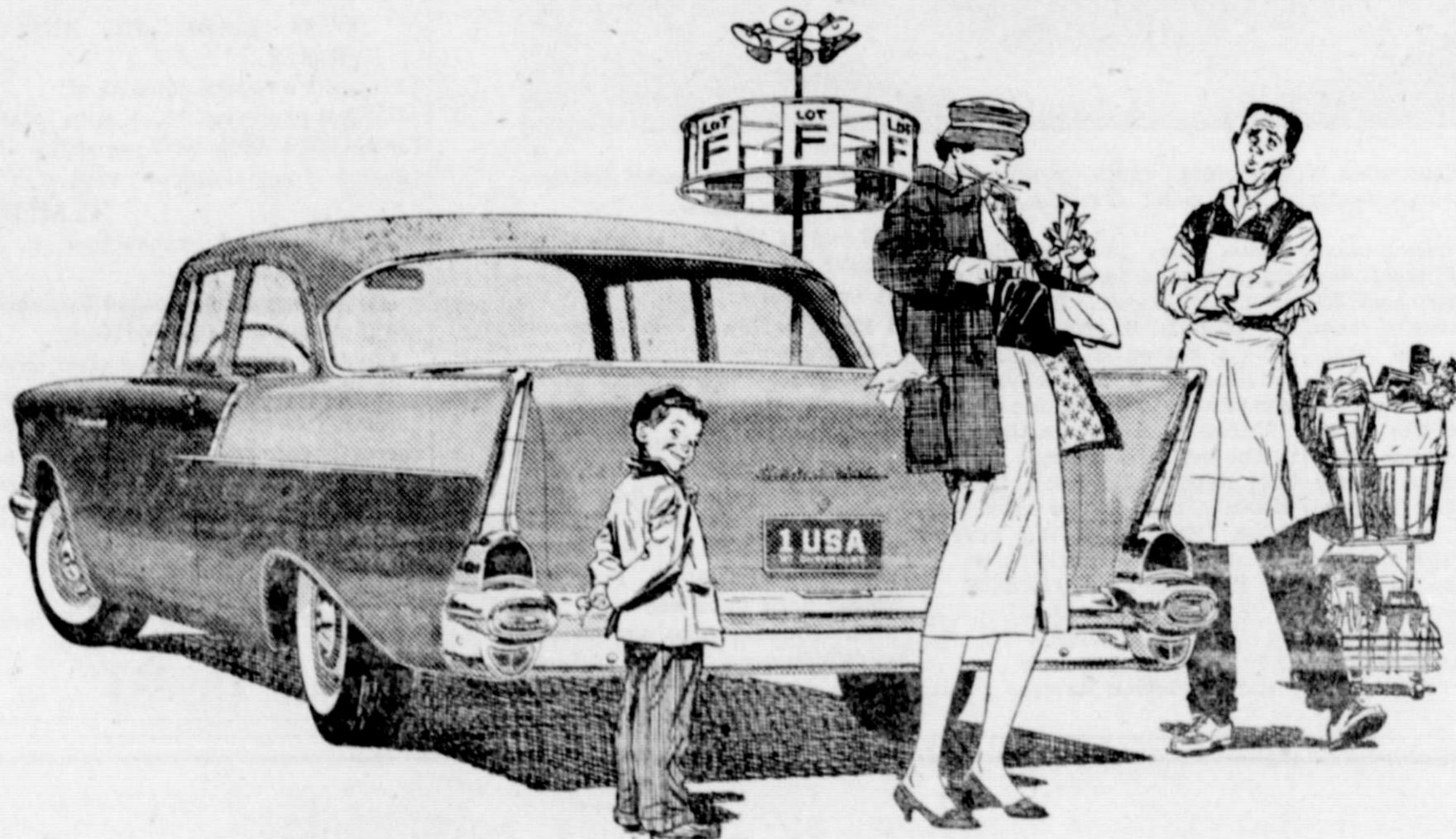

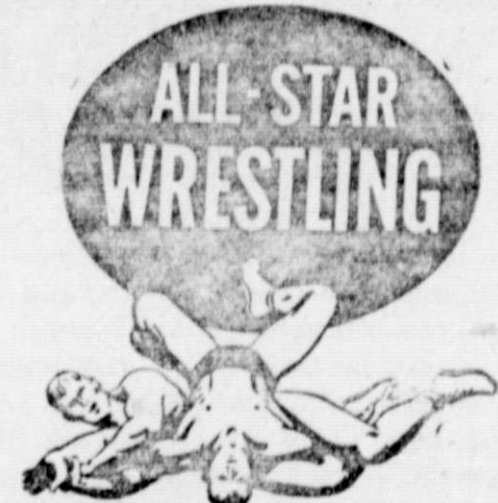

## Telegrapher Joe Oppenorth Retires

After 48½ years of service, Joe Oppenorth, a native son of Kewaskum, is retiring and put in his last day on the job as telegrapher at the West Bend railroad station on Tuesday. The veteran telegrapher will be 72 years old in April.

Born in Kewaskum, Joe attended parochial and public schools here before starting to work for the railroad. His first job for the Chicago and North Western Railroad was in 1904 when he was a young man. Later he gave up the work for a while but was called back during the first World War because of the manpower shortage and has been on the job ever since. In those days Joe worked a 12-hour day compared to the present 8-hour shifts.

Oppenorth began working for the railroad at Eden. He also worked at Campbellsport and many other places while on the "extra" list during his early career. He later went to West Bend and has been stationed there for 38½ years.

Joe was married in 1911 to Adelaide Straub of St. Killian. The couple has three children, two boys, Cyril A. Oppenorth of the West Bend Aluminum Co. and Lloyd, who is in the life insurance business in West Bend, and a daughter, Sister Mary John Boseco, who is a member of the Notre Dame order and is stationed in Milwaukee. The Oppenorths lived in Kewaskum before moving to West Bend.

Railroading has been an important part of Joe's life. His eyes light up when railroading is the topic of conversation and his many friends wonder whether he can stay

away from the work. Although Joe has spent almost a half century with the railroad he is still young in appearance and talk and keenly interested in railroading. He will now devote his time to the insurance business.

Oppenorth recalls the early days when steam locomotives were the only power but during the past year they have become a thing of the past on the line, giving way to the diesels. Joe still visits his many friends in Kewaskum very frequently.

## MARRIAGE LICENSES UP, BUILDING PERMITS DOWN IN COUNTY DURING 1956

According to statistics released this week by Anton P. Staral, county clerk, the total number of marriage license issued at the Washington county court house in West Bend during the year 1956 numbered 292 for an increase of 29 over the previous year of 1955 when 263 were issued.

Staral reports that this is a good healthy condition and the increase in marriage license applications should hold true as long as the population of the county continues to increase.

Building permits in the county for 1956 declined but this was attributed to permits being issued elsewhere although building in the county did not decrease apparently.

The decrease was attributed to the fact that the town of Richfield has set up its own zoning ordinance and now issues its own building permits in the township.

Dance hall licenses for 1956 also dropped from 14 to 13 and dance permits showed a drop for the year from 90 to 86. The drop in the number of dance hall permits and licenses was attributed to the annexation of the West Park ballroom to the city of West Bend. The county does not issue dance permits for that hall any longer.
