Driver Involved In Two Mishaps Only Days Apart

The same bakery truck driver was involved in two mishaps in the village only five days apart during the past week, one involving the striking of a pedestrian and the other running into the rear of another truck. Chief of Police Roland Fledt reported.

The truck, driven by Orville J. Backus, 20, of 550 Van Dyne road, Fond du Lac, was owned by Service Bakeries of that city. At 4:10 p. m. on Wednesday, Jan. 9, Backus' truck struck Myron Heberer, 15, of New Fane, a Kewaskum High school student, on Main st. in front of the bank. The truck was westbound on Main st. when the Heberer youth ran from the curb into the street and into the path of Backus' truck. The boy was struck by the left front light and bumper, knocking him to the pavement. Heberer suffered an injury to his right arm and was treated by a focal physician.

Then at 2:45 p. m. on Monday, Jan. 14, on East Main st., Backus ran into the rear of another truck driven by Earl F. Schlenvoght, 36, of R. 1, Port Washington. Both the Schlenvoght and Backus trucks were westbound on East Main near the cemetery. Schlenvoght was making a right turn into a driveway, about 100 feet east of Stark st., when the Backus vehicle ran into the rear of his truck. The directional light control on Schlenvoght's truck was still set for a right turn when police arrived. Schlenvoght sustained a bump on the head and damage to the vehicles was estimated at \$400.

Indians Rap Hustisford, 63-33, in Major Upset; Also Trim Lomira 68-50

The biggest upset of the season was posted in the Tri-County conference last Friday night as the Kewaskum Indians, who had won only one loop game before, swamped previously unbeaten Hustisford by a one-sided 63-33 score. Hustisford had won five in a row and was tied for first place. The surprise setback gave North Fondy sole possession of the lead. Hustisford lost their second tilt to North Fondy on Tuesday of this week.

In defeating Hustisford by almost a 2 to 1 margin, the red-hot Indians grabbed a 19-10 lead at the quarter and were way ahead, 36-17, at half-time. Just beating Hustisford was a big upset alone but doing it by 30 points was beyond the expectations of everyone. After playing the visitors off their feet in the first half Kewaskum continued to roll in the third period, scoring 19 points to their opponents' 9. This put the Indians ahead by 29 points, 55-6.

Gerry Oppenorth was the big scorer for the winners with 19 points, followed by Bob Sparks with 14, Rodenkirch 13, and Dave Mertaig 12. Zubke was high for Hustisford with 10 tallies.

The Indians moved into a 3-way tie for fourth place by winning another game at Lomira Tuesday night, trimming the last place Lions by a 68-50 score. The setback was Lomira's 7th in succession and gave Kewaskum a 3 and 4 record.

After a fairly close first half the Indians pulled away from the Lions in the second half. The Mitchellmen led at the quarter, 17-14, and 31-24 at the intermission. They went on to outscore their opponents, 16-10, in the third period and 21-16 in the final stanza.

Top point makers for the winners were Mertzig with 26, Fickler with 13 and D. Oppenorth with 12. Bob Kietzer was high for Lomira with 14 and Schwefel added 12.

On Friday evening of this week the Indians will be hosts to the league leading unbeaten North Fondy Orioles here and will have

another upset in mind. Then next Tuesday the strong, second place Brandon cagers come here.

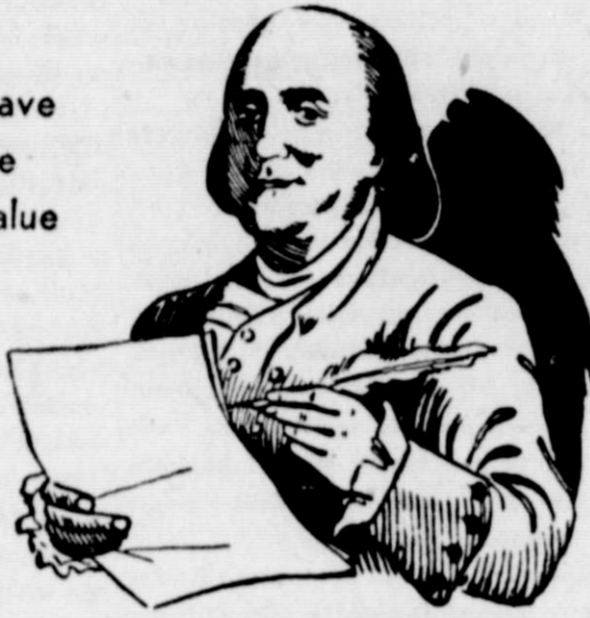

way department foremen are also expected to attend.

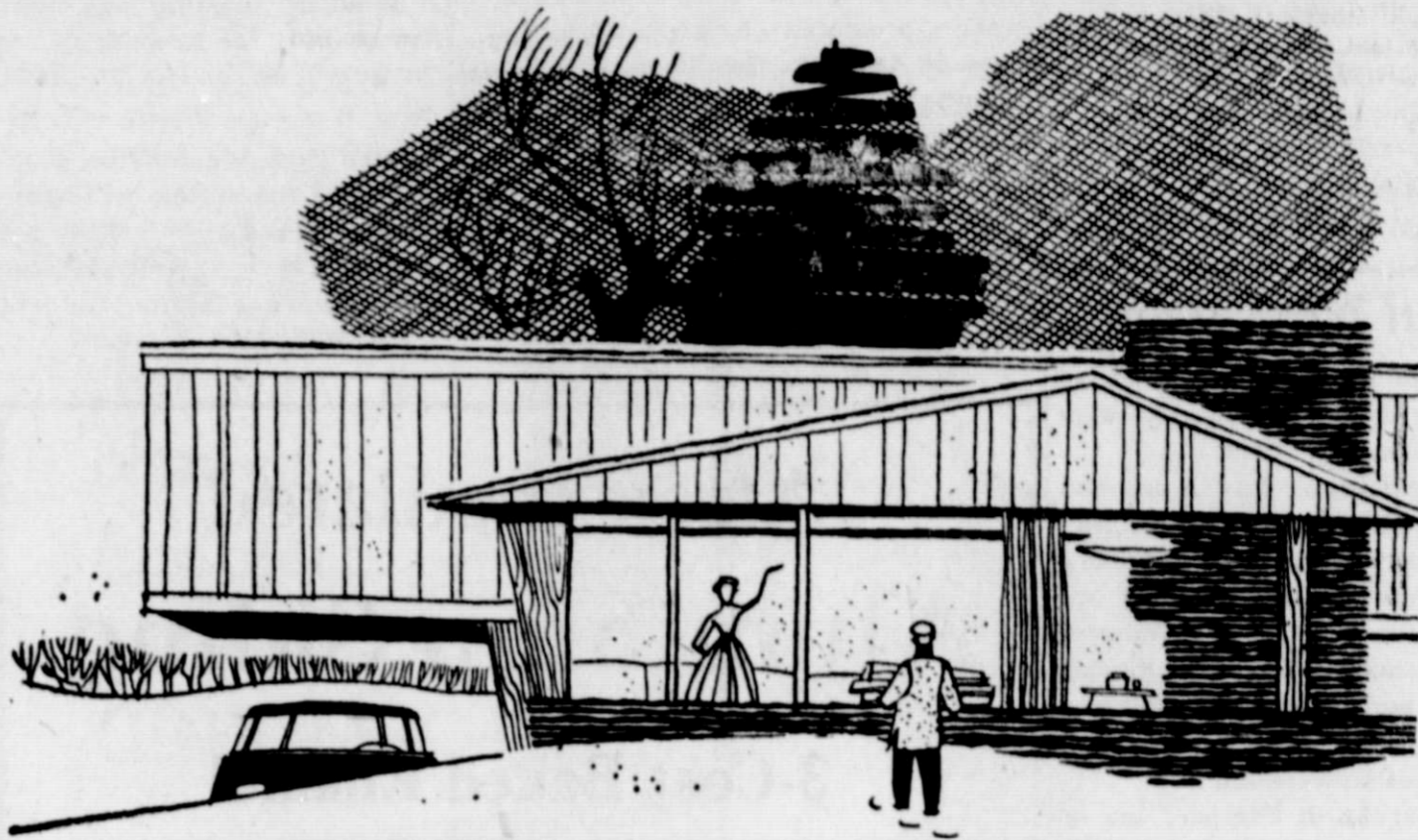

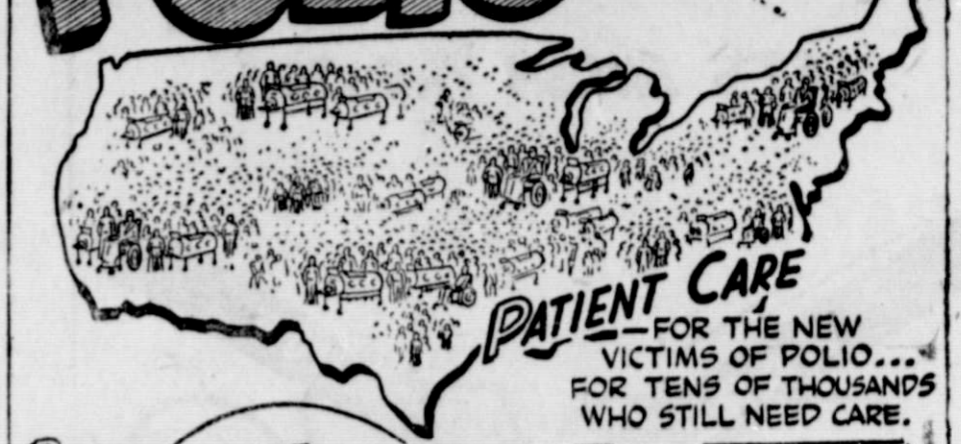

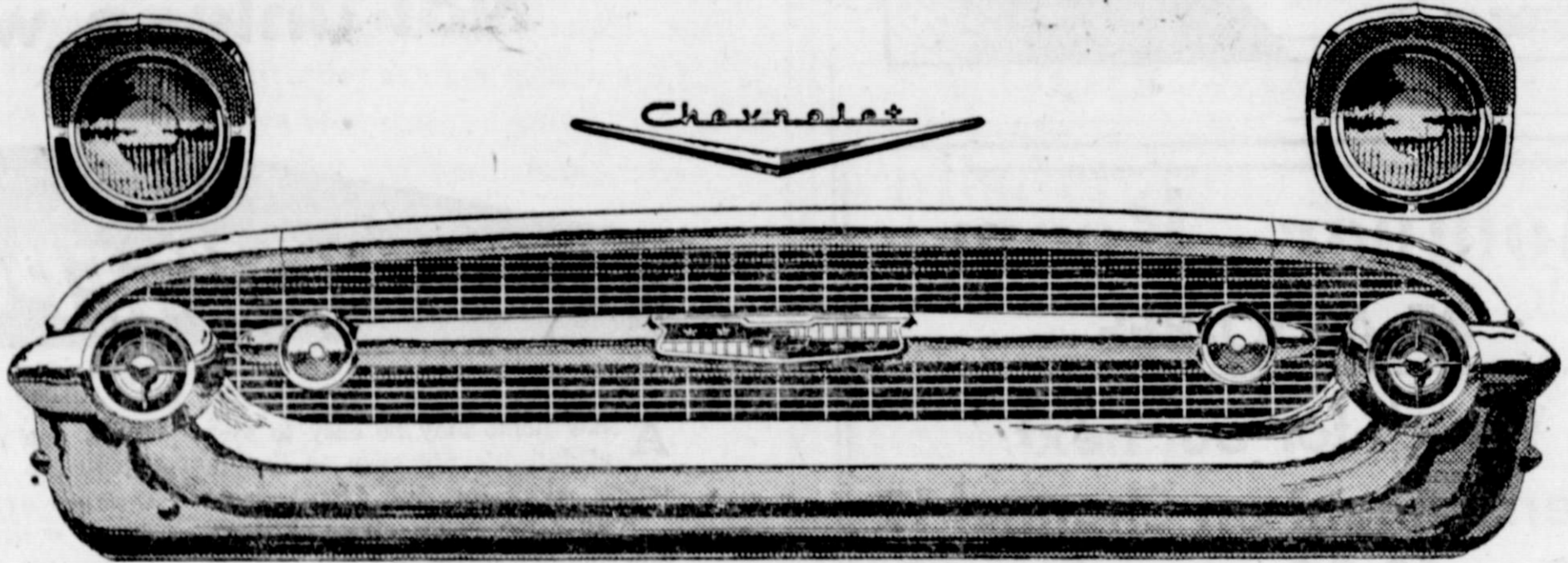

But whatever our future course, the 1957 March of Dimes must be successful. We must have every dollar of our estimated needs for \$46,900,000 to help finish our battle.

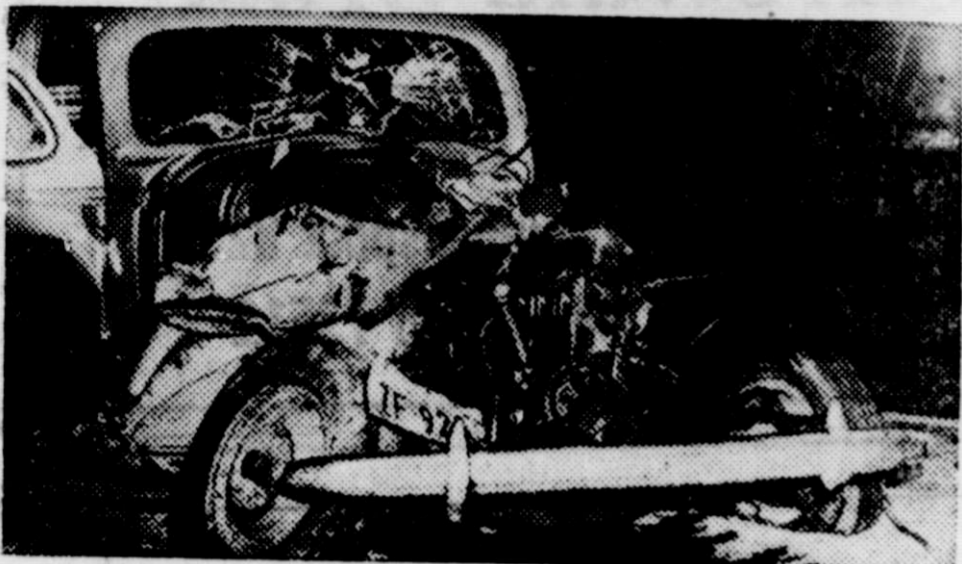

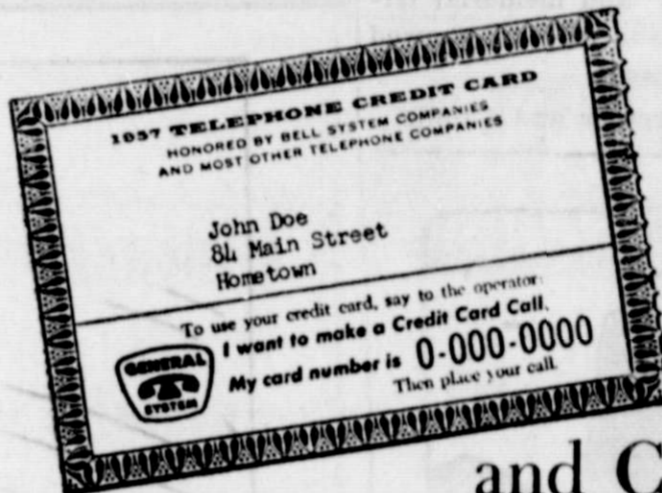

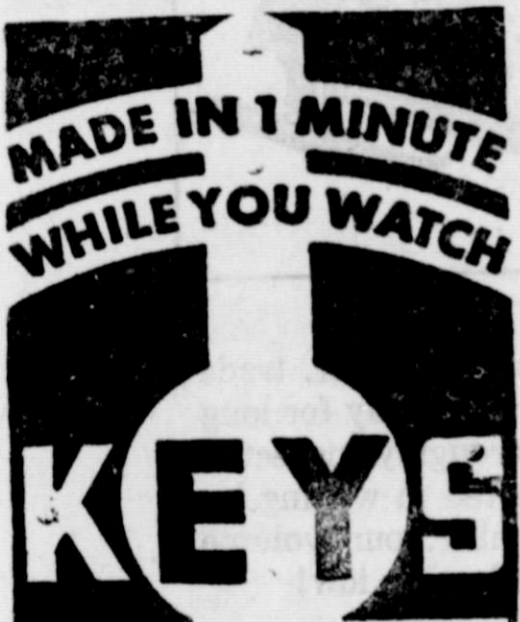
