Refugee Family Which Fleed Communist Zone in Germany Arrives in Village to Live

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Lache and son Peter, refugees from the Communist controlled Eastern Zone in Germany, have arrived in Kewaskum and are now making their home with Mrs. Lache's brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Helmut "Hans" Prause.

Mr. and Mrs. Lache and son fled the Eastern Zone in Germany last Aug. 8 without any possessions except the clothing they were wearing. They had to travel empty handed to avoid any suspicion on the part of the Communists.

The refugees made it to Berlin and waited in that city until obtaining their visa in January. They left Berlin by plane on Jan. 27 and flew to Frankfurt, then to London, England, and Shannon, Ireland, before arriving in the United States at Detroit Mich. on Jan. 28. From Detroit they flew to Chicago where they were met by Mr. and Mrs. Prause.

The plane trip from Germany to this country took only a day. They left there on Jan. 27 and were in Chicago the next day. Mr. and Mrs. Lache and Peter accompanied the Prauses to Kewaskum and are now residing with them here. They will live with them until Mr. Lache finds employment and then hope to obtain a place of residence of their own in this community.

Mrs. Prause's niece and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Guenther Uhlig and their two sons, Carl Heinz and Peter, accompanied the Lache family from Germany to this country but they remained in Chicago to make their home with another sister of Mrs. Prause.

Urge Immunization Of County Children

SPECIAL SPRING CLINICS AT COUNTY SCHOOLS PLANNED

Many thousands of babies and children are safe from certain serious diseases—diphtheria, smallpox, lockjaw and whooping cough—because parents have them immunized. Children should receive this protection as soon after birth as the family doctor recommends. If you have a pre-school child who has not been immunized, make plans with your doctor right away.

Children also need to have additional or booster shots at regular intervals to keep up their defenses against these diseases.

Washington county grade school children will have a chance to "boost" their protection during the immunization clinics to be held throughout the county during March, April and May.

The State Board of Health recommends booster shots for diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus at 3 to 4 year intervals after the child has entered school. Also, children should be re-vaccinated against smallpox at 5 to 7 year intervals. Check your records to see what protection your children may need. If you are not sure, your doctor is the best person to guide you.

County Hog Breeders To Meet in Kewaskum

Washington county swine producers are going to conduct two meetings during the month of February to help the producers understand more about the material and equipment available to them to do a good job of producing hogs. During the last year a good many questions have come up concerning the equipment and so forth, and to properly acquaint as many people as possible with the new developments and equipment, the county agent has called meetings:

Monday afternoon, Feb. 18—Hartford City Hall, 1:30 p. m. (room 10). Monday evening, Feb. 18—Kewaskum High School (agricultural room) at 8:00 p. m.

At this time the problem of what equipment is necessary to do the job of producing good hogs in Washington county will be gone into. A few other items will also be considered and questions will be taken up that may come up from the people who attend. Program will be about the same at both meetings and will also include a discussion as to whether or not Washington county swine breeders would like to organize a swine breeders organization. The purpose of this organization would be to conduct a sale of gilts, promote hogs, and to inform all members with new ideas in producing hogs.

Indians Nip Hustisford In Overtime, Clinch 3rd

The Kewaskum Indians were forced into overtime in order to nose out Hustisford there Friday night, 42-39, in an exciting battle. The victory was the high-flying Indians' fifth in succession and clinched at least a tie for third place in the final Tri-County conference standings.

Kewaskum has only one game left against last place Lomira this Friday on the home court. If they win and second-place Brandon loses their finale, the Indians would tie for second. If both win Kewaskum will cop undisputed third place.

North Fondy, with the title clinched, won its 13th game in a row Friday but was given a big scare in beating Oakfield by only 3 points. Lomira won its first contest of the season from Rosendale.

The Kewaskum-Hustisford tussle was a real nip and tuck affair all the way. The Indians were ahead 12-11 at the end of the quarter and at halftime it was tied at 16-all. This was one of the lowest half-time scores in a long time. The Mitchellmen scored only 4 points and Hustisford 5 in the second stanza.

Kewaskum slipped in the third period and trailed 32-26 but rallied very well in the final quarter, scoring 13 points to their opponents' 7, and tying the score when the tilt ended. In the overtime period the Indians came through with 3 points and held Hustisford scoreless.

Dave Mertzig was top scorer for Coach Mitchell's squad with 17 points. Opgenorth added 11 and Pickler 9. Ken Mueller posted 14 for the losers and Schlicht 11.

Next week Kewaskum will compete in the district tournament at Campbellsport.

CHAPTER XIX

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A CIVIL DEFENSE ORGANIZATION AND FOR PROTECTION AND PROMOTION OF PUBLIC SAFETY, HEALTH, AND WELFARE IN THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM DURING CIVIL DEFENSE EMERGENCIES

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

19.01 POLICY AND PURPOSE.

(a) "Civil Defense" shall mean the preparation for and the carrying out of all emergency functions, other than functions for which the military forces are primarily responsible, to minimize and repair injury and damage resulting from disaster caused by enemy attack, sabotage, or other hostile action, or by fire, flood or other natural causes.

19.02 CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR.

(a) Appointment.

The office of director of civil defense is hereby created. The director shall be appointed by the Village President subject to confirmation by the Village Board and shall receive such salary as may be authorized by the Village Board. He shall take and file an official oath.

Deputy and assistant directors may be appointed by the director, subject to the approval of the civil defense commission, as may be deemed necessary, and such appointees shall receive such compensation as may be determined by the Village Board.

(b) Duties and Authority of Director.

(1) The director shall be the executive head of the civil defense organization and shall have direct responsibility for the organization, administration and operation of the civil defense organization subject to the direction and control of the Village President and the Village Board. He shall coordinate all activities for civil defense within the Village and shall maintain liaison and cooperate with civil defense agencies and organizations of other political subdivisions and of the state and federal government, and shall participate in county and state civil defense activities upon request, and shall have such additional authority, duties, and responsibilities as are authorized by this ordinance and as may from time to time be required by the Village Board.

(2) The director shall prepare a comprehensive general plan for the civil defense of the Village and shall present such plan to the Village Board for its approval. When

the Village Board has approved the plan by resolution, it shall be the duty of all municipal agencies and all civil defense forces of the Village to perform the duties and functions assigned by the plan as approved. The plan may be modified in like manner.

19.03 UTILIZATION OF EXISTING SERVICES AND FACILITIES.

In preparing and executing the civil defense plan, the director shall utilize the services, equipment, supplies and facilities of the existing departments and agencies of the Village to the maximum extent practicable; and the officers and personnel of all such departments and agencies are directed to cooperate with and extend such services and facilities to the director.

19.04 EMERGENCY REGULATIONS.

Whenever necessary to meet a civil defense emergency for which adequate regulations have not been adopted by the Village Board, the Village President and in his absence, the director of civil defense, may by proclamation promulgate and enforce such orders, rules and regulations relating to the conduct of persons and the use of property as shall be necessary to protect the public peace, health and safety, and preserve lives and property and to insure the cooperation necessary in civil defense activities. Such proclamations shall be posted in three public places and may be rescinded by the Village Board by resolution at any time.

19.05 DECLARATION OF EMERGENCIES.

Upon the declaration by the governor, by the Village President or the civil defense director in the absence of the Village President, or by the Village Board of a state of emergency, the director of civil defense shall issue all necessary proclamations as to the existence of such state of emergency and shall issue such disaster warnings or alerts as shall be required in the civil defense plan.

The civil defense organization shall take action in accordance with the civil defense plan only after the declaration of an emergency and the issuance of official disaster warnings. Such state of emergency shall continue until terminated by the issuing authority, provided that any such declaration not issued by the governor may be terminated at the discretion of the Village Board.

19.06 PENALTIES.

It shall be unlawful for any person wilfully to obstruct, hinder or delay any member of the civil defense organization in the enforcement of any order, rule, regulation, or plan issued pursuant to this ordinance, or to do any act forbidden by any order, rule, regulation, or plan issued pursuant to the authority contained in this ordinance. For a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance he shall forfeit not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, and in default of payment thereof, shall be imprisoned in the county jail for a period not exceeding 90 days.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication. Passed and adopted Jan. 7, 1957. Published Feb. 15, 1957.







Chevs Blast Hartford, 89-66; Still Unbeaten

FOX LAKE AND FILLMORE HERE THIS SUNDAY

The Kewaskum Chevrolets took another long stride towards the second half crown in the Lakes circuit by blasting the Hartford Stampers on their own floor Saturday night, 89-66. The victory was the team's fifth in succession in this half without a loss and they stand alone in first place, a game ahead of Mayville.

The win was Kewaskum's third this season over Hartford. Previously they beat them in the first outing here and again in the play-off for the first half championship at Horicon. Mayville remained right on Kewaskum's tail with a win over Green Lake. The Chevs still must play at Mayville on Saturday, Feb. 23, and this contest could settle the second half race. Another obstacle still in the team's path is West Bend (here on Mar. 3). Other remaining games are Fox Lake and Horicon here.

In getting the feel of the big floor at Hartford the Chevs started out on the short end of the score, trailing at the quarter 25-20. They passed up the Stampers in the second period with 22 points to 14 and owned a small 42-39 advantage at halftime. Then came Kewaskum's favorite, big third quarter again in which they tallied 22 to only 10 for the opposition. This gave the win-

ners a comfortable 64-9 lead going into the final stanza. Coach Cisco's boys outscored the Stampers again in the last period, 25-17, making the finale 89-66. Kewaskum sank 31 free throws to Hartford's 16.

John Tessar was most of the show as usual and easily copped scoring honors with a huge 36 point total. He is now way ahead in the league's individual scoring race. Second best was the Hanrahans' little boy George with 17. Talajkowski with 18 and Renzaglia with 16 points paced Hartford. Both also fouled out.





Co. Anti-Litter Group Meets, Plans Drive to Keep Highways Clean

The Washington County Anti-Litter organization held its second meeting in the court house at West Bend on Thursday, Feb. 7, for the purpose of more completely organizing to carry out in detail the forthcoming campaign to keep the highways of this county clean and beautiful.

The group unanimously agreed that the program has two initial goals:
