DiMaggio, 3rd Gang Member Sought in Rosenheimer Store Burglary, Surrenders to Police

Freed Thursday With Tarantino On \$5,000 Bond

ALIOTA, THIRD MEMBER OF GANG RELEASED ON \$10,000 BOND

The third member of a gang sought by Kewaskum, Washington county and Milwaukee police in connection with the attempted burglary of the L. Rosenheimer store in Kewaskum Sunday, Feb. 17, Samuel Salvatore (Sam) DiMaggio, 40 surrendered to Milwaukee police Tuesday.

DiMaggio was turned over to Sheriff Clemens Michalski and Capt. Edwin Purcell of the sheriff's department in the office of his attorney, Dominic Frinzi, 759 N. Milwaukee st., Milwaukee.

One other member of the gang, Nick P. Tarantino, 27, of Milwaukee, was picked up in Kewaskum shortly after the break-in at the Rosenheimer store. He was captured by police hiding behind a house about a block from the store. A third member, Frank P. Aliota, 25, also of Milwaukee, gave himself up to Milwaukee police last week Tuesday.

Aliota and Tarantino were held in jail—Tarantino in Washington county and Aliota in Ozaukee county to offset possible trouble and a possible attempted jail break—under bond. Aliota was released from jail last Wednesday evening when a property bond of \$10,000 was provided to obtain his freedom.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl of Kewaskum and County Sheriff Al Schmidt went to Milwaukee Wednesday evening to pick up DiMaggio on a burglary warrant. He was held in jail until Thursday when he appeared before Justice of the Peace Herb Matenaer to set bond and arrange a date for the appearance of the three men in court on a charge of breaking into the Rosenheimer store with the intention of committing burglary. Both DiMaggio and Tarantino were released Thursday on \$5,000 bond which was furnished.

Chief Pledl, who fired several shots at the fleeing men, believed that he hit one of the men, thought to be DiMaggio. DiMaggio's attorney said, "he was not hit, so I'm certain that they have the wrong man." No shot wounds were found by a physician who examined DiMaggio Tuesday morning. DiMaggio's attorney refused to disclose where his client had been. "He was away from the Milwaukee area—on vacation—and out of contact with the newspapers and radio," Frinzi said. The attorney claimed DiMaggio did not know authorities were looking for him until he phoned his father, Carlo, Monday.

While Chief Pledl and county police officials did not think it advisable to divulge further information in connection with the case at this time, it was reliably reported that additional evidence secured during the investigation should have a definite bearing on the case. Mayville Edges Chevs, 86-85, on Last Second Free Throw; First Loss

WEST BEND LITHIAS HERE ON SUNDAY IN LAKES FEATURE

After six straight wins in the second half and with an overall record of 15 victories and only one loss for the season, the Kewaskum Chevs finally suffered their second setback at Mayville Saturday night in a very close battle. The Chevrolets were nosed out by just one point, 86-85, on a last second free throw. The defeat cut Kewaskum's lead to one game over Mayville and Beaver Dam, which teams are tied for second with 5 and 2.

The Chevs trailed Mayville by a narrow margin through most of the game, then staged a great rally in the closing seconds to knot the score at 85-85 with only two seconds left. With a tie game assured John Tessar tried to steal the ball from Mayville in an attempt to sink the winning basket but in doing so he bumped forward Harvey and a foul was called. Harvey proceeded to sink the winning free throw with only a couple of seconds left and Kewaskum didn't have another chance to shoot.

Had the Chevs settled for a tie they no doubt would have beaten

Mayville in overtime as that team had lost four players on fouls and Kewaskum was outplaying them by far at the end of the game. The Chevrolets also lost three men on fouls.

Kewaskum took a big lead at the start of the game but Mayville closed the gap and trailed by only one point, 20-19, at the quarter. The winners were ahead by five points at the half, 41-36, and five at the end of the third period, 62-57. They outscored the Chevs 27-16 in the second stanza and the scoring was even at 21 apiece in the third quarter. Kewaskum dropped in 28 points in the final period to Mayville's 24 but it wasn't quite enough.

Tessar, the league leading scorer with an average of 34.8 was "held" to 23 points, one of his lowest totals of the campaign. Still he copped scoring honors for the evening. Close behind him were Augie Bilgo with 21, George Hanrahan with 17 and Don Meisenheimer with 16. Tessar was held scoreless in the last quarter, something that doesn't happen often, but already had his high total before that. Genzmer paced Mayville with 20 points, followed by Griepentrog with 18 and Harvey 12. Harvey sank five straight free throws in the final few minutes to win the game for his team.

This Sunday Kewaskum plays host to the West Bend Lithias in the feature attraction in the Lakes.

West Bend was the only team to upset the Chevs in the first half (by two points) and the locals will be gunning for revenge as well as to clinch at least a tie for the second half title. The tilt will start at 8:30 p. m. following the West Bend-Kewaskum Rivers contest. The Chevs' only game after Sunday is with Horicon here a week later.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in adjourned meeting with President Reigle presiding and trustees Carl Schaefer, Joe Eberle, Arvin Merwin, and Marvin Schaefer being present. Trustees John Stellpflug and Wayland Tessar were absent.

The following resolution was introduced by Trustee Joe Eberle:

RESOLUTION NO. 57-1

Whereas the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin has authorized the improvement to Fond du Lac Ave. in the Village of Kewaskum, as proposed in project T O 27-1(12) of the State of Wisconsin Highway Commission and,

Whereas said project T O 27-1(12) requires that the Village of Kewaskum obtain and let bids and pay for storm sewer extension and linking of certain sanitary sewers and water lateral curb shut offs and relocating of hydrants.

Now therefore, be it resolved by the Village of Kewaskum, by its Village Board that the clerk of this village is hereby directed and authorized to advertise for bids for the construction of storm sewers, sanitary sewers, water lateral curb shut off, relocating hydrants and related work necessary in connection with State Highway Commission project T O 27-1(12).

Be it further resolved that said bids be advertised in such manner that said bids can be opened and considered for acceptance on or before March 11, 1957 at 8:00 p. m.

Motion was made by Marvin Schaefer and seconded by Carl Schaefer that said resolution shall be adopted. Upon roll call vote, all members present voting "aye," said resolution was so adopted.

Whereas said project T O 27-1(12) requires the relocation of utility poles and wires of the Wisconsin Electric Power Co. and the General Telephone Co. of Wisconsin located on and along Fond du Lac Ave. in the Village of Kewaskum.

Now therefore, be it resolved that the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin hereby requests the Wisconsin Electric Power Co. and the General Telephone Co. of Wisconsin to relocate utility poles and wires located along Fond du Lac Ave. which interfere with project T O 27-1(12) of the Wisconsin Highway Department.

Indians Win Sub-District Tournament, Advance to District Meet at DeForest

PLAY WATERLOO IN TOURNEY
OPENER FRIDAY NIGHT;
COMPETITION TOUGH

The Kewaskum High school Indians, who easily trimmed Lomira in the opening game of the WIAA sub-district tournament at Campbellsport last week Tuesday, 56-36, went on to win the sub-district title by shading Oakfield in the meet finals Friday night, 34-29.

Kewaskum now advances to play in the district tourney at DeForest, which is located north and a little east of Madison. Other teams in the DeForest tournament are Sauk City, Waterloo and Slinger. Opening games will be played Friday night with Slinger meeting Sauk City and Kewaskum facing Waterloo. Finals will be held Saturday night. Competition will be very tough at DeForest. Sauk City was rated the No. 3 team in the state this season among the Little 16 teams and reached the state finals at Madison last year. Waterloo placed third in the Madison Suburban conference this season. Slinger beat Hustisford and Juneau in the sub-district meet to advance to DeForest, although Kewaskum defeated them in an exhibition game earlier in the season. The Indians placed third in the Tri-County loop.

The Indians and Oaks had a real see-saw battle in the sub-district finals at Campbellsport, with Oakfield holding a slim lead for three quarters, only to have the Indians pull out in front for good with three successive baskets in the closing minutes. In the consolation finals Campbellsport took Lomira, 75-58.

Both the Oaks and Indians tightened up under the pressure and low scoring was the result. Oakfield led, 6-5, at the quarter, 15-11 at half-time, and 23-20 at the end of the third period. Kewaskum then outscored them 14-6 in the final stanza to win the title.

Dave Mertzig was top scorer for the Indians with 11 points, followed by Dave Fickler with 9. Jerry Shady and Mike Conrad led Oakfield with 10 and 8 points respectively.

The Indians will stay overnight Friday for the DeForest meet. A busload of students will also make the trip to attend Friday's game.

Chairman Tells Reasons To Support Heart Drive

Three good reasons why he is asking residents of Kewaskum to support the 1957 drive for funds of the Wisconsin Heart association were given this week by R. G. Edwards, who heads the campaign here. They are:

1. In 1955, the latest year for which vital statistics are available, diseases of the heart and circulation were responsible for 810,200 deaths, or approximately 53% of all deaths at all ages. In Washington county, of a total number of deaths, 180 were attributed to heart and circulation diseases.

2. In the United States approximately 10,000,000 persons (1 out of 16) suffer from some form of heart or circulatory disease, including 500,000 children of school age. Heart diseases are not necessarily associated with advanced age. Of those who died of cardiovascular disease in 1955, about 232,000, or 29% were under the so-called retirement age of 65.

3. Diseases of the heart and circulation cause an annual economic loss of \$2 1/2 billion. They rob industry and government of trained men during their most useful years.

They deplete our manpower of skilled employees and are responsible for tremendous labor turnover and time-loss.

Dr. Edwards also said that the Heart association reports that, "though records indicate more progress had been made against heart disease in the past thirty years than in the previous thirty centuries, we are still only on the periphery of many of the problems. Progress toward the center of those problems will undoubtedly be slow and painstaking, but steady, if sufficient funds are available for research work."
