Kewaskum Chevs Win Third Straight Lakes Championship

Title Is 6th in 8 Years; Tessar Individual Champ

BEAT HORICON 94-72 IN FINAL GAME TO POST 17-1 MARK; SET GREAT RECORD

The Kewaskum Chevrolets, perennial leaders in the Land o' Lakes league, who are making a habit of winning championships, have done it again. For the third straight year they wrapped up the northern division title and closed an outstandingly successful season by beating Horicon in the final game here Sunday night, 94-72.

The Chevs, managed by "Cisco" Backhaus, and sponsored by "Killy" Honeck, have won six championships in the last eight seasons, even though representing one of the smaller villages in the league. The team, was runnerup one other year, has been composed entirely of local talent. Honeck has sponsored Kewaskum basketball teams since 1948 and baseball clubs since 1946. He also played on the teams and managed them until three years ago.

Kewaskum, "hotbed of amateur basketball" in this area, has one of the finest home talent teams in the state. And not one member played college basketball, although some of them, especially John Tessar, most likely would have made the teams had they gone on to school.

The team has established an outstanding won-lost record for the past seven years, winning 100 and losing only 19 games. This does not include the records of the 1949-50 championship team or the 1948-49 second place team. Nor does it include the 1945-46 Legion team that won the Lakes Major championship. That terrific team had three members finishing one-two-three in scoring, namely Paul Kral, Killy Honeck and Wayland Tessar.

The Chevrolets captured both the first and second half titles in the season just closed on record of 17-2. They had identical 8-1 records in each half and also won a first half playoff game from Hartford. Only West Bend and Mayville eked out narrow upsets over the Chevs by two and one point margins. The team averaged 89 points per game while holding the opposition to 69. They pushed in an amazing total of 1,591 points during the season.

Kewaskum's phenomenal veteran, six-foot Tessar, who can outjump most 6-4 players, rolled up a terrific 540 point total for the season for a high average of 28-4 per contest. Tessar, who can hook with either hand and is one of the best jump shooters, was far ahead in the individual scoring race. This "soft-shooting" star always has full control of the ball when he gets his magic hands on it and is deadly anywhere near the basket. John could have made most college teams and with a few more inches could probably be playing pro ball now.

But Kewaskum by no means is a

one-man team, but a smooth, balanced, fast-moving squad with plenty of height. George Hanrahan (6-4) who won the scoring title in the Tri-County conference several years ago, scored 268 points this season. Don Meisenheimer is 6-3, Leroy Keller 6-2 and Augie Bilgo and Frankie Krueger each about 6-foot. Following Hanrahan in scoring were Bilgo with 175 points, Meisenheimer 171, Krueger 149, Bob Dreher 99, Ellie Ramthun, 80, Dick Edwards 74 and Gordie Wierman 49. Wierman played in only six games.

Bilgo is mainly a standout defensive player and rebound man. In a game with Beaver Dam recently he held their scoring ace, Fred Miller, former University of Wisconsin star, to 10 points. This enabled Tessar to take a more commanding lead in the scoring race over Miller, who ended up second. Other members of the team also have special attributes which make them consistent winners.

Kewaskum's champs posted a 17-2 record in 1951-52, an 18-3 record in 1952-53, 11-2 in 1954-55, 15-2 in 1955-56, and lastly a 17-2 mark this season.

In sewing up the title by beating Horicon Sunday the Chevs practically had it clinched in the first half when they enjoyed a well-padded 51-31 lead. They were well ahead all the way and outscored Horicon in every period but the third. High scorers for the winners were Hanrahan with 23 points, Tessar with 20, Krueger 14 and Wierman 13. R. Wrucke paced the visitors with 24, followed by Taylor with 18 and E. Baerwald with 12.

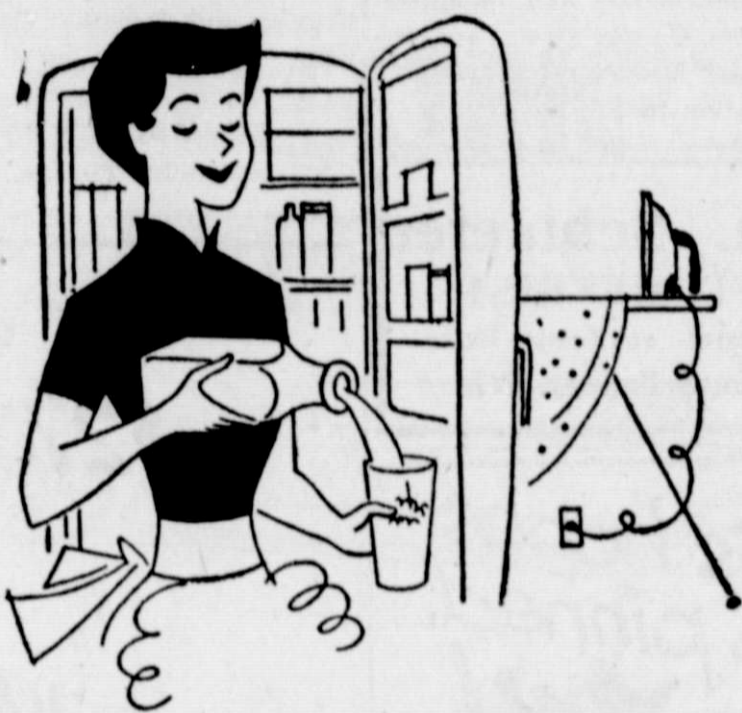
In the second round of play this Saturday evening at 7 p. m. Kewaskum meets the Kuhlmann Insurance

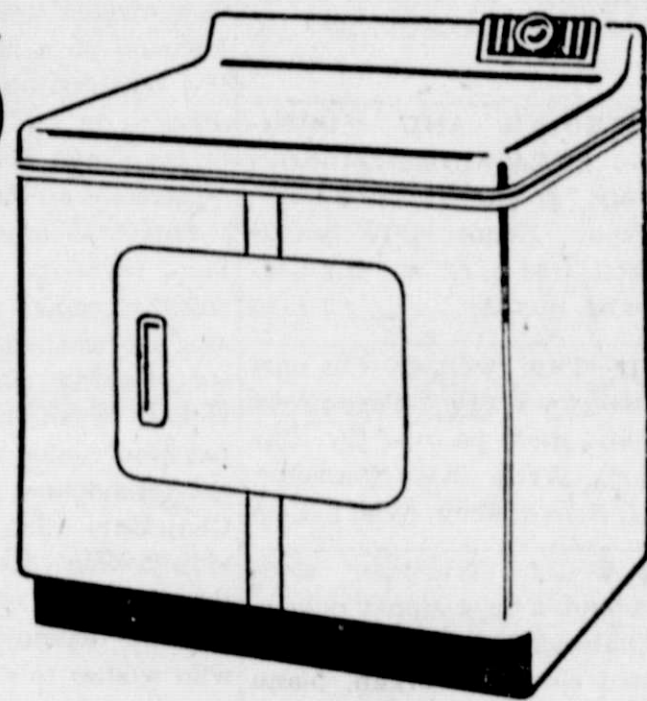

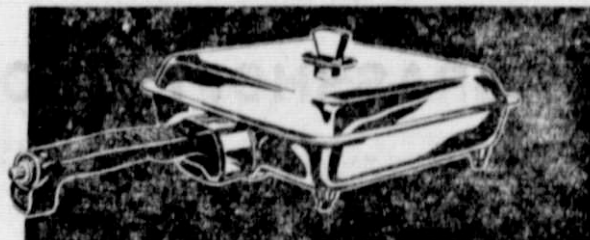

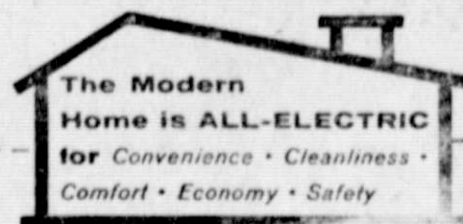

19 Clubs Make Window Displays for 4-H Week

Nineteen 4-H clubs made window displays throughout the county during National 4-H Club Week, March 2-9. All of these displays were on some phase of safety, because safety is the main activity of Washington county 4-H clubs in 1957.

Most of the displays were very good, having some catchy titles, and showing some very good safety hints or practices that we should follow. For instance, the Badger Boosters had a display with the title "Please Safely Drive—So All of You Will Arrive." The Jackson Happy Hour club had a display entitled, "Passing on a Hill—Your Life May Be the Bill." The Kohlsville Pioneers display was entitled, "Don't Be a Heel—Behind the Wheel."

The Plat Friendly 4-H'ers had a very good display, "Do Your Stairs Tempt Fate?" which pointed out three very important things which can be done; namely, to keep the stairs free of objects so people don't stumble over them, keep the stairway lighted and have a railing on the stairway. The St. Michaels 4-H club had a display showing the difference between Mister Tumble-down and Mister Fixit. They showed the importance of fixing up steps or other broken things around the farm and home and picking up objects such as boards with nails or anything such as that which could cause accidents. The "ABC of Safety—Always Be Careful," was the

theme of the Welcome club display. They urged that when you are cooking, the handles of the cooking utensils be turned away so children could not reach them and pull them down.

The Slinger Happy Workers club showed how careless use of electricity can cause fires, especially by having extension cords under carpets where they will be walked on and the insulation rubbed off. The Thompson Irish Settlers had a display which showed the proper ways of making a right and left turn, in other words, signaling before you turn and looking both ways to make sure no other cars are coming.

In general, the displays were very good and showed a lot of sound thinking on how to make our living much safer. I'm sure that it would be well worth while for everyone to heed the suggestions that these displays showed.

All of the displays were judged and given awards by the 4-H Leaders association. The clubs getting a blue rating and a \$3 award were the Badger Boosters, Jackson Happy Hour, Kewaskum 4-H'ers, Kohlsville Pioneers, Plat Friendly 4-H'ers, and St. Michaels 4-H club.

Receiving red ratings and a \$2 award were the Good Luck 4-H club, Hillside Hustlers, Kirchayn Trotters, Myraneers, Thompson Irish Settlers, Tretonaires, and Welcome 4-H clubs.

INCOME TAX FACTS No. 5

Personal Deductions May Cut Your Tax Bill

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. These articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants, and the Wisconsin Society of Certified Public Accountants in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

When you use the "short form" in filing your income tax return, or take the standard deduction on the "long form," you are allowed a deduction of about 10 percent to cover such personal expenses as interest, state and local taxes, contributions and medical expenses.

If you are sure that your personal deductions are less than 10 percent standard deduction, there is no need to itemize them. But it is worth the effort of calculating your tax on both forms. Here are some deductions you should be careful not to overlook:

Interest on Loans

The interest you pay on loans is deductible. This includes mortgages, automobile, appliance, home improvement or personal loans you may have. The part of "carrying charges" representing interest on installment purchases is deductible. Evidence such as a statement from the seller should be obtained to show the amount of interest you paid during the year.

State and Local Taxes

Most taxes, other than federal taxes, are deductible. These include state and local real estate, personal property, income, retail sales, poll taxes and, in all but a few states, gasoline taxes. You can also deduct auto licenses and registration fees, but not dog or hunting licenses.

Charitable Contributions

Another type of deduction you can take if you itemize your deductions is your contributions to any "religious, charitable, educational, scientific or literary" organizations. These contributions are deductible up to 20 percent of your income, and up to 30 percent if at least 10 percent of your income was paid as gifts to religious organizations, schools or hospitals.

In adding up your contributions, don't forget that gifts of property can be deducted at their fair market value as of the time they were donated. Suppose, for example, you contributed to your church a share of stock which had doubled in value while you had it. You can deduct, as a contribution, the full value of the stock at the time of the gift, even though you only paid half that much for it. At the same time you escape paying the tax on the capital gain which would have been realized if you had sold the stock instead of contributing it.

An individual is not permitted

to deduct a contribution which he has pledged but not paid during the tax year. Contributions of services are not deductible, and blood donations are construed as a service.

Transportation Expenses

An employee is permitted to deduct, in determining adjusted gross income, all his transportation expenses incurred in connection with his employer's business if they are not reimbursed. These include fares, automobile expenses, and (if in connection with over-night travel) meals and lodging. Other expenses paid in accordance with an expense allowance arrangement with the employer may also be deducted for this purpose.

An employee's expenses other than these can only be deducted if the standard deduction or tax table is not used. The expense of commuting between home and place of work is not deductible at all.

An "outside salesman" (one who usually works away from his employer's business) can deduct all business expenses before arriving at adjusted gross income, just as if he were in business for himself.

Miscellaneous Deductions

If you had certain expenses connected with your employment (other than travel or reimbursed expenses) you can claim them as miscellaneous deductions. Examples would be tools, uniforms, union dues and employment agency fees.

Other miscellaneous deductions include the fee for preparation of your tax return, some alimony and a share of interest and real estate taxes paid by a cooperative apartment corporation of which you are a tenant stockholder.

The instruction book which comes with your tax forms gives further information. Help is also available by telephone or at offices of the Internal Revenue Service. The Revenue Service urges you to consult a properly qualified advisor if you decide to seek outside help.
