3 Kewaskum Youths, Dotyville Woman Killed in Head-On Crash

Three Others Critically Injured; 2 of Victims Lakes Basketball Players Returning from Game

Cars Collide In Dotyville Early Sunday

Three Kewaskum youths were killed and two others critically injured and a rural route Fond du Lac woman also was killed and her husband critically injured in a head-on crash between two cars in Dotyville early Sunday morning.

The tragic mishap, Fond du Lac county's worst highway crash in years, occurred at 1:30 a. m. at the T-intersection of County Trunks W and T in the rural community located in the east-central section of the county.

The dead are:

MISS MARY BINGEN, 19, KEWASKUM.

GORDON WIEMAN, 22, R. 1, KEWASKUM.

WALTER ALBRECHT, 22, R. 1, KEWASKUM.

MRS. HILDA JOHNSON, 38, R. 3, FOND DU LAC.

Critically injured were:

Miss Darlene Backhaus, 19, Kewaskum.

Russell Rodenkirch, 21, R. 1, Kewaskum.

Gordon Johnson, 40, R. 3, Fond du Lac.

All of the injured suffered skull fractures and were in serious condition at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, after the crash. Miss Backhaus also suffered a fractured leg, severe forehead laceration and other injuries. Rodenkirch had one ear severed and other injuries, and Johnson suffered a fractured back among other injuries. Rodenkirch was reported to be unconscious for a couple of days following the mishap but all of the injured were reported to be improved and in fair condition on Wednesday.

Albrecht and Miss Bingen died almost instantly after the crash. Wieman died shortly after being taken to the hospital and Mrs. Johnson also died later in the hospital.

Coroner Frank Decker and Traffic Officers Lloyd D. Hatch, Irving E. Gauthier and Miles S. Rahn of the Fond du Lac county police department investigated the tragedy. Officer Rahn made two trips to the scene with the county ambulance, transporting three of the victims to the hospital on each trip. The Fond du Lac city ambulance took one of the injured to the hospital.

The crash is still being investigated. According to officers' findings, Johnson was driving one car and Rodenkirch the other. Johnson was traveling north on W and Rodenkirch was heading south. It is believed Johnson attempted to make

a left turn off W onto T in front of the Rodenkirch vehicle when the autos crashed head-on. The Johnson machine was at a slight angle when the vehicles crashed.

So forceful was the impact that all occupants of both cars were wedged in the autos. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, who reside one mile west of Dotyville on a town road, were alone in their 1957 Chevrolet, and the others were in Rodenkirch's 1953 Ford.

Johnson, an insurance agent, and Mrs. Johnson had visited friends to discuss a planned vacation trip. They have five children. The Kewaskum group had been at Howards Grove earlier Saturday night where the Kewaskum Chevrolets basketball team defeated a Sheboygan team in the class "A" invitational basketball tournament. Following the game a large group of team members and their wives and friends went to Mt. Calvary to eat chicken and Rodenkirch and his passengers were enroute home from there when the crash occurred.

After winning the first two tournament games, the Kewaskum team was scheduled to play in the semifinals Sunday afternoon and again Sunday night but withdrew from the meet because of the tragedy. Wieman and Rodenkirch played in the tournament. Wieman had played during part of the season when he could get home from college. Rodenkirch was a member of the Kewaskum Land o' Rivers team during the season but was added to the Lakes squad for the tourney because of an injury to another player, Ellie Ramthun.

The deaths raised Fond du Lac county's highway toll for the year to six. Coroner Decker was awaiting the outcome of the investigation to determine whether an inquest hearing would be held.

Miss Bingen and Rodenkirch were engaged and planned to be married in June. Albrecht and his friend, Miss Backhaus, accompanied them to the game. Wieman, a close friend, had gone to Howards Grove in another car but decided to ride home from Mt. Calvary with Rodenkirch. Misses Bingen and Backhaus and Albrecht all were employees at Regal Ware, Inc., the former two in the office and Albrecht as a factory worker.

The cars, which were demolished, were removed to Fond du Lac by a wrecking service where they were viewed by many hundreds of persons on Sunday many of them from the Kewaskum area.

The accident was one of three fatal ones in the state which claimed 10 lives over the week end. Five other persons were killed in a

two-car collision near the Racine-Kenosha county line and the 10th life was snuffed out when a car driven by a New Auburn youth missed a curve, hit a ditch and overturned. Week end deaths raised the state highway toll to 155 for 1957 or four more than on the same date in 1956.

Village Officers To Be Unopposed In Apr. 2 Election

Friday, Mar. 15, was the deadline for filing nomination papers for the various village offices to be voted on in the spring election on Apr. 2. Only the incumbent officials filed papers and will be unopposed for re-election.

There is no candidate for village assessor to succeed Ed. A. Bartelt, who will not run for re-election. Other incumbents who will be unopposed are: Village President James D. Reigle, Trustees Joe Eberle, John G. Stellpflug and Wayland Tessar, and Supervisor E. M. Romaine. The three remaining trustees hold over in office for another year.

However, Justice of the Peace K. Wm. Haebig will be opposed by Eugene "Mike" Gnacinski.

Voters will also cast referendum ballots on the daylight saving time issue. On the state level voting will be done for a supreme court justice with George R. Currie, incumbent since 1951, the only candidate and a state superintendent of schools with George E. Watson, present superintendent, opposed by William T. Sullivan. On the county level Harry D. Sheski is up for re-election as county superintendent of schools and is the sole candidate.

Woman's Club Learns of Life in England from Girl Exchange Student

PRESENT OFFICERS OF CLUB UNANIMOUSLY RE-ELECTED

A brown haired girl with sparkling brown eyes and a big smile told the members of the Kewaskum Woman's club a little of life in England. She is Miss Kathleen Norfolk of Leeds, who was a guest of the club on Saturday, Mar. 16. She was introduced by Mrs. O. Loefler, the West Bend representative to the American Field Service.

Kathleen gave a brief history of the Field Service explaining that boys and girls between the ages of 16 and 18 are eligible to come as an exchange student and are selected on their intellectual ability and adaptability. She is one of 700 foreign students from 29 countries in the United States this year under the exchange plan. She attends West Bend High school as a senior and earlier that day had won an "A" rating in forensics in the Little 10 conference.

Kathleen cited the differences in the educational systems. In England emphasis is placed on academic studies, with almost no social education. The accepted age for leaving school to go to work is 15. She added teen agers do not drive cars in her country. Radio is still more popular than television, she says. She plans to continue her education in an English university, probably majoring in social studies. She will remain in West Bend living with the R. D. Bart family until the end of June, when she will leave on a 3 weeks' bus tour of the United States and will arrive home the early part of August.

Miss Bingen, the daughter of Clarence Bingen, Milwaukee, and Mrs. Margaret Hill, Redwood City, Calif., was born Feb. 22, 1938, in the town of Kewaskum. An office worker at Regal Ware, Inc., she was a resident of Kewaskum nearly all of her life.

She attended Holy Trinity Catholic school for her elementary studies. She was a freshman at St. Mary's Springs academy, Fond du Lac, a sophomore at Kewaskum High school, a junior at Lincoln High school, San Francisco, Calif., and a senior at the Kewaskum school where she was graduated in 1955.

Miss Bingen, who made her home with Mr. and Mrs. Roman "Jimmy" Miller here, is survived, in addition to her parents, by three brothers, Dennis, with the armed forces, Kenneth, until lately a resident of Kewaskum, and Michael, both of Redwood City; one sister, Diane, Redwood City, and her grandmother, Mrs. Peter Strupp, West Bend.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Wednesday until the time of services at 9:30 a. m. Thursday at Holy Trinity church. The Rev. F. C. La Buwi officiated and burial took place in the Catholic cemetery at St. Lawrence. Father Weber officiated at the grave.

In addition to his parents, who just returned from a trip to Florida the day of the accident, Wierman is survived by three brothers, Donald and Roger, Milwaukee, and Douglas, a student at Wisconsin State college, La Crosse; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Wierman, Boltonville, one sister-in-law, two nieces, one nephew, and other relatives.

The body was in state at Miller's funeral home from 2 p. m. Tuesday until the time of services at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday which were conducted at St. John of God Catholic church near Boltonville. The Rev. Mathew Urban read the requiem high mass and Father Robert Carson of Green Bay, a close friend of the family, preached the sermon. Burial was in the new Holy Trinity parish cemetery, Kewaskum.

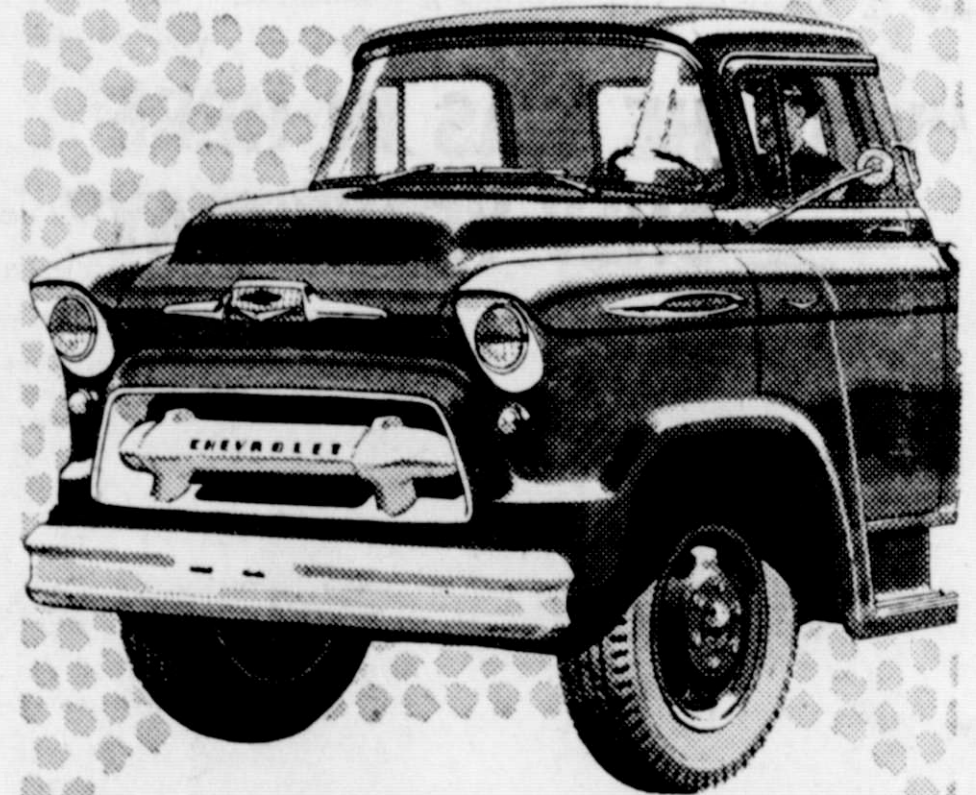

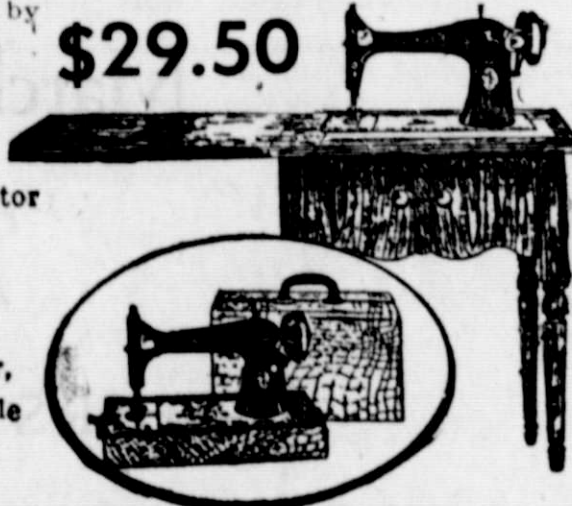

INCOME TAX FACTS No. 6

Medical Deductions and Widow Benefits

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. These articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants, and the Wisconsin Society of Certified Public Accountants in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

Uncle Sam realizes family doctor bills and dentist bills can add up; so he permits you to itemize and deduct all medical expenses beyond 3 percent of your adjusted gross income.

Sick Benefits are not counted as income. Here is what you can receive free of tax from your employer or his insurance company:

- (1) Payment for medical expenses
- (2) Payment for permanent injury (not based on time absent from work)
- (3) Damages for injury or sickness
- (4) Payments under Workmen's Compensation Act
- (5) Payment up to \$100 per week for loss of wages while you are absent due to injury or sickness, except that the first week's pay is taxable unless you are absent due to an injury or are hospitalized for at least one day.

Sick Pay Benefits

If "sick pay" payments from your employer are included in the wages shown on your withholding slips, you should subtract the proper amount from your income in the place provided on the first page of the tax return (Form 1040). Attach an explanation as described in the instruction book. You are entitled to exclude this amount even if you do not itemize deductions.

You are allowed a deduction for medical expenses beyond 3 percent of your adjusted gross income, but if you (or your husband or wife) are 65 or over, the 3 percent rule does not apply to your own medical expenses. It does apply, however, to any medical expenses you pay for your dependents.

Among the items to include in your list of medical expenses are fees of doctors, dentists, hospitals and nurses. You can also deduct premiums for health, accident, hospitalization and medical insurance, but you must reduce your medical expenses by the amount of any benefits received from insurance.

Medicines Are Also Deductible

Your total deduction is limited to a maximum amount for the year, as explained in the instruction book, and medicines and drugs may be included in your medical expenses only to the extent they exceed 1 percent of your gross income.

Widows and Widowers

The federal tax code contains several provisions of special interest to widows and widowers:

- (1) You may file a joint return with a husband or wife who died during the tax year if no separate return is filed.
- (2) If you have not remarried and have in your household a dependent child or stepchild, you are entitled for the next two years to use the same tax computation (with income-splitting privileges) as you have been entitled to on a joint return.
- (3) When life insurance proceeds are taken as an annuity or in installments, widows and widowers are allowed up to \$1000 per year of tax free payments in addition to a pro rata amount of the principal.
- (4) You may be entitled to a deduction for child-care expenses.
- (5) You may be entitled to retirement income credit if your deceased husband or wife would have qualified.

The instruction book which comes with your tax forms gives further information. Help is also available by telephone or at offices of the Internal Revenue Service. The Revenue Service urges you to consult a properly qualified advisor if you decide to seek outside help.

Let's All Go To Our Local Show - Boost Kewaskum

Chevs Reach Semi-Finals in Tournament, Then Withdraw Following Tragedy in Which One Team Member Is Killed

TEAM THEY DEFEATED PLAYS FOR THEM AND WINS THIRD

A tragic accident early Sunday morning caused the Kewaskum Chevrolets, Land o' Lakes league champions, to withdraw from further participation in the Howards Grove Class 'A' Invitational basketball tournament. One member of the team was among four persons killed and another member was one of three others critically injured in the crash.

The Chevs, who had a record of 17-2 for the season, also won their first two games of the Howards Grove tourney. They defeated St. Peter's A. C., 57-49, in the opening round and nosed out the Kuhlman Insurance team of Sheboygan, 71-69, Saturday night. The team was to meet Kiel in the semi-finals Sunday afternoon and then play for the championship or third place in the evening, depending on the outcome of the afternoon tilt. But because of the tragedy, which reduced the tournament to insignificance, the Chevs withdrew from the meet out of respect to the players killed and injured.

It was while returning from the Howards Grove tourney, after stopping at Mt. Calvary to eat, that the accident occurred. Killed was Gordon Wierman, 22, and injured was Russell Rodenkirch, 21, who was brought up from the Rivers' team for the rugged tournament play (three games in two days). Wierman played a fine game Saturday night and scored a key basket late in the game that broke a 67-67 tie that enabled Kewaskum to edge the Sheboygan team.

The contest was a real nip and tuck tussle that was close right down to the wire. Kewaskum was ahead most of the time but never by more than a few points. The halftime score was 30-28 in Sheboygan's favor. The Land o' Lakes leading scorer, John Tessar, paved the way for his team's victory with 30 points, followed by George Hanrahan with 17. Top scorers for She-

boygan were Folz with 20 points and Grohskopf, with 17. Manager "Cisco" Backhaus said after the game that the Kuhlman team was the toughest his boys faced all season. Tessar was placed on the all-tournament team for which he received an award.

Learning of the tragic accident involving Kewaskum's players and of the team's withdrawing from the tournament, the Kuhlman Insurance team which the Chevs shaded Saturday night and eliminated from the meet made a wonderful gesture and showed outstanding sportsmanship by taking Kewaskum's place and finishing the tournament for them. They rounded up their team in a hurry Sunday morning and played the two games for the Chevs, losing to Kiel in the afternoon but beating Howards Grove in the evening to cop third place. Their team was dead tired after the two hard games but before they took the floor they resolved to give whatever trophy they won to Kewaskum. They played their hearts out Sunday night determined to get third for the Chevs. Hats off to a real bunch of sports.

In a letter to Manager Backhaus this week the Sheboygan team's manager wrote as follows:

Dear Myron:

I was shocked when I heard about the deaths that occurred to your player and followers. On behalf of my players and myself, we would like to have you express our deepest sympathy to their relatives.

We were asked to take your place and took third place, losing Sunday afternoon, 96-84, to Kiel (took first) and winning in the evening, 63-59, against Howards Grove in an overtime. My boys were really beat (tired) after that afternoon game but we were determined to get the third place trophy for you.

Before we started Sunday after-

noon the team made out that whatever trophy we won, we wanted your team to have. I'll be going to Madison in a week or so and at that time I'll bring the trophy to either you or your sponsor. I also have one for John Tessar, as he was placed on the all-tourney team.

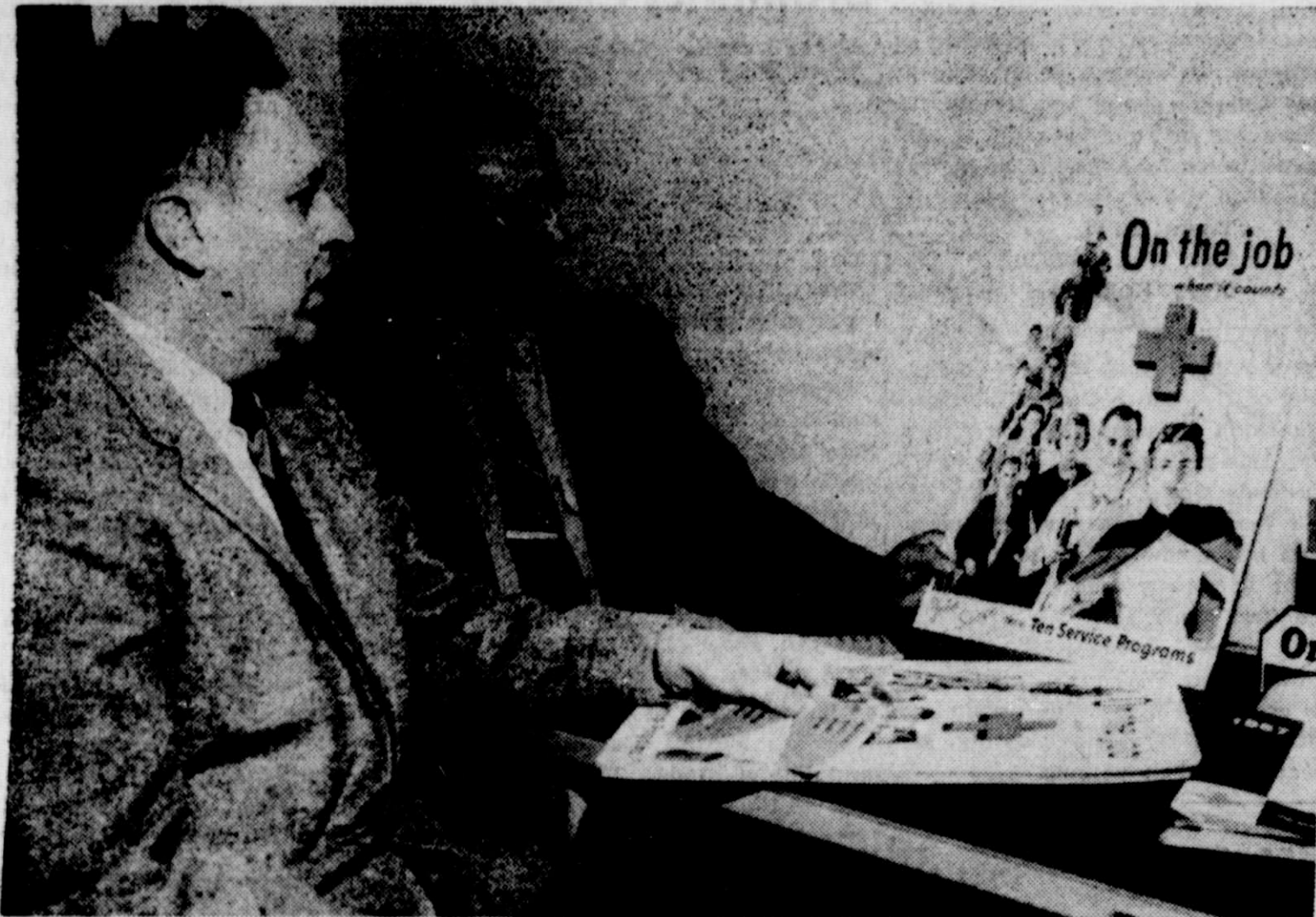

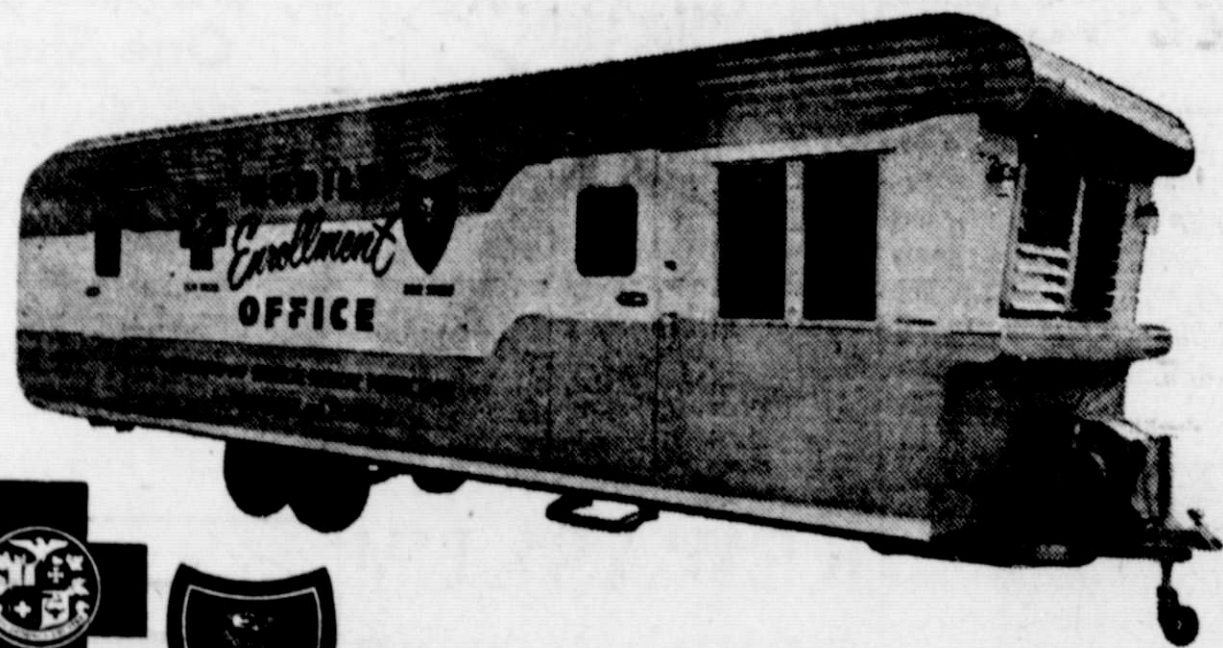
