### **Gasoline in Well Causes Explosion At Rahn Station**

NUMBER 20

An explosion was caused last Friday by gasoline which leaked from a tank into a well at the Louis Vorpahl property adjacent to a filling station operated by Steve and Mary Rahn at the intersection of Hwys. 45 and 28 just beyond the north village limits. The blast, which occurred at about 12:25 p. m. rocked the area.

The explosion occurred when the well pump started, apparently throwing a spark which ignited gasoline in the well, Windows and doors in the filling station and Vorpahl residence were shattered and light fixtures in both buildings were loosened by the blast. Fortunately there was no fire following the explosion.

Rahn was standing nearby when the blast occurred and luckily escaped serious injury although he was stunned momentarily and suffered from shock. The heavy lid from the well was blown high in the air and narrowly missed Rahn when it came down. Debris flew all around him but did not strike him. About a week earlier representatives of the gasoline company pumped out the gasoline tank when it was learned it was seeping out ... Members of the local fire department then filled the tank with water as a precautionary measure. The concrete lid was blown from the well in a smaller blast a week before when the gas tank was emptied but there was no other damage.
