## BILL TO RECOVER TUITION COSTS IS INTRODUCED BY ASSEMBLYMAN SCHOWALTER

Assemblyman Elmer Schowalter has introduced a bill to permit school districts to recover tuition costs for children placed in foster homes within the district. This bill (401-A) had a public hearing before the Assembly Education Committee. There was no one in opposition to the bill. At the present time, the law permits such recovery for high school children in foster homes.

Attorney Deane Bascom appeared for the bill upon request of the county office. The county superintendent of schools, Harry Sheski, could not appear because of the county teachers meeting.

The bill was introduced by request of the county office and the County School Board association.

DRAW PLANS FOR ORNAMENTAL STREET LIGHTING SYSTEM ON FOND DU LAC AVE.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by J. Stellpflug, seconded by A. Merwin and duly carried.

Mr. Goshaw and Mr. LeMohieu were present and explained to the board what the Electric Co. had to offer in the way of street lighting on a rental basis.

Mr. Alfred Siewert, architect for the construction of the Municipal Building, appeared to present certificates for final payment of the balance still due on the construction of said building. After due consideration and because all construction defects had now been corrected, the board, upon motion by C. Schaefer, seconded by J. Stellpflug and duly carried, authorized the commissioner to issue checks in payment of the balances due the Piette Construction Co. and Mr. Siewert.

The board went on record as being opposed to the burning of dead animals or household pets in the village incinerator.

The board instructed its engineering firm to draw plans and specifications for an ornamental street lighting system on Fond du Lac Ave.

Upon motion by A. Merwin, seconded by J. Eberle, all bills and wages, as recommended and approved by the Finance Committee, were allowed for payment.

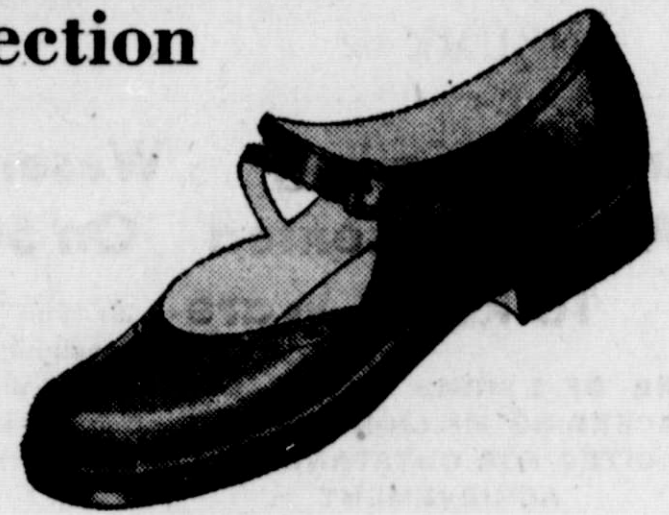

## 1,647 Exams Are Given Drivers at Kewaskum, 3 Other Test Stations

State driver license examiners in the 10-county area comprising District No. 2 conducted 13,838 tests on traffic law knowledge and vision efficiency and gave 13,360 road tests during the last six months of 1956, Commissioner Melvin Larson of the state motor vehicle department announced.

Supervising examiner for the district is Al Sapia, whose headquarters are at West Bend. Counties included in this district are Calumet, Fond du Lac, Kenosha, Manitowoc, Ozaukee, Racine, Sheboygan, Washington, Waukesha and Winnebago.

Examiners Owen Beyer and William Smerz, who conduct examinations at four test station communities, conducted 789 written and vision tests and 858 road tests during the last half of 1956.

This team of examiners makes regular visits to the following communities: Waupun, Fond du Lac, Kewaskum and Omro.

Statewide figures show that Wisconsin's 85 license examiners gave 78,864 written and vision examinations during the last half of last year, with 12% failed on their first attempt. The examiners conducted 66,418 road tests, with 26.2% failing to pass on their first attempt.

## INCOME TAX FACTS No. 8

### Start Now to Plan Next Year's Tax

Here are some possibilities for reducing your tax which you can't do anything about after the end of the tax year, but which might reduce next year's tax return:

(1) If you are providing nearly half the support of someone who might qualify as a dependent, consider providing more than half so you will be entitled to the \$600 exemption. The extra amount you contribute may be less than the tax savings.

(2) Remember that unless a dependent is under 19 or a full-time student, you will lose the exemption if his income is \$600 or more. Be sure to check the income of everyone you expect to claim as a dependent.

(3) If you are planning to be married, a wedding before midnight December 31, 1957, will give you the privilege of filing a joint return for 1957. This probably would result in substantial tax saving.

(4) A baby born before midnight, December 31, qualifies as an exemption for the full year.

(5) If your medical expenses are likely to be over 3% of your income this year and you expect them to be less next year, pay as many medical bills as possible before the end of the year, up to the maximum allowable deduction. If you borrow to do this, remember that you can also deduct the interest.

(6) If your medical expenses are over the maximum deduction, perhaps you can defer part of the payment until after the end of the year.

(7) Borrowing to pay your taxes can sometimes let you take the deduction a year earlier.

(8) If you sell your home at a profit, remember that you do not have to pay a capital gains tax if you pay more for a new home within a year than the price you get for the old one.

(9) When investing money, remember that stock in a domestic corporation offers the possibility of dividend exclusion and credit.

(10) If you sell securities or other "capital assets" at a profit, it is usually better to wait until you have held them at least six months so that the profit will be taxed at the capital gains rate instead of as ordinary income.

(11) When buying bonds, consider not only the interest rate but the fact that interest on state and municipal bonds is exempt from federal income tax.

If any of these points is likely to make a substantial difference in your tax, it will probably pay you to discuss your problems with the Internal Revenue Service, or to seek professional tax advice. Anything you pay for assistance in preparing your tax return is deductible from your taxable income.

But beware of any "tax expert" who claims he can cut your tax below the amount you really owe. It's a good idea to pick someone who has had experience in dealing with the Internal Revenue Service, just in case the government should raise some question about your return.
