SCHOOLS CLOSE FOR EASTER VACATION

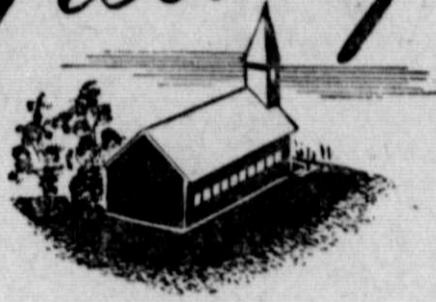

Two Miss Death When Train Rams Car at Crossing

A R. 3, Campbellsport mother and daughter narrowly escaped death Friday afternoon when their auto was struck by a speeding Chicago and North Western railway passenger train at a town of Auburn crossing between County Trunk V and Lake Bernice several miles northwest of Kewaskum.

Mrs. Ruth Elizabeth Scheid was driving a 1953 model car easterly on the town road and was traveling an estimated 25 miles an hour when she suddenly heard her daughter, Darlene, 13, scream just as the Diesel locomotive horn was sounded, she told Traffic Officer Miles S. Rahn of the Fond du Lac county police department.

Mrs. Scheid braked her car and it skidded 27 feet toward the tracks, coming to a stop about two feet from the nearest rail, the officer reported. The left wheel was nearest the train. This section of the car was struck by the engine and pushed sideways for eight feet.

The front of the car was damaged. Mrs. Scheid was shaken and her daughter received a head bruise. She was examined and treated by a Campbellsport physician.

Officer Rahn reported the train had left Kewaskum for Fond du Lac at about 12:42 p. m. and the collision occurred shortly after. The train, No. 151, arrived in Fond du Lac at 1:23 p. m. It was due there at 1:05 p. m. The Diesel was not damaged.

While the girls did not meet the goal of 50,000 boxes, they did sell 13,000 boxes more than they did a year ago.

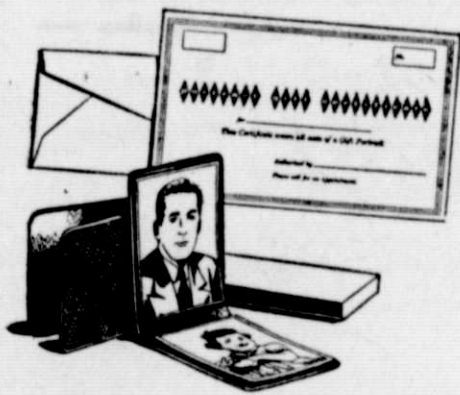

This course is designed to answer questions on love, personalities, money, the home and the church, practical planning, etc.

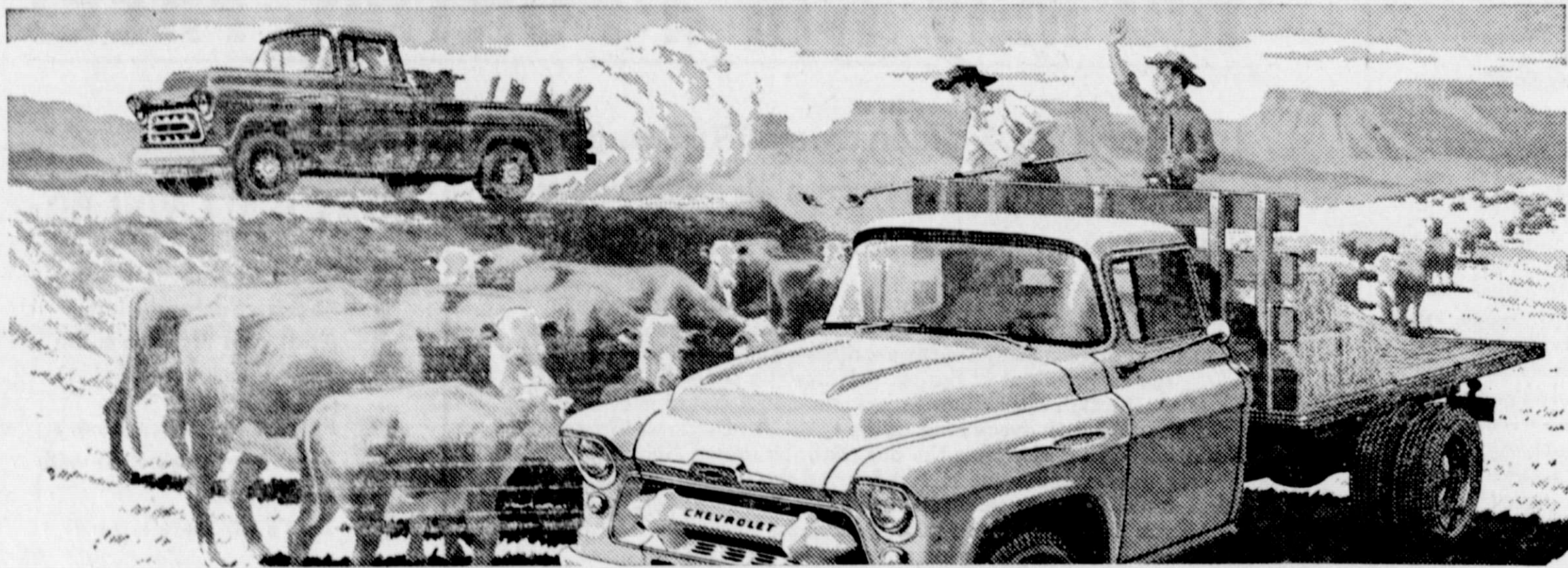
Parents of engaged couples are invited to attend a special conference at the last session, May 8.

Dutch Elm Disease Control Program Is Organized in County

KEWASKUM WARDENS SELECTED ARE O. E. BEHNKE, ALBERT HRON, JR. AND WALTER WESENBERG

Will Dutch Elm disease be found in Washington county in 1957? No one knows. But we do know some facts about Dutch Elm disease that make it important for everybody to become aware of the problem. Dutch Elm disease has killed 63 known trees in 7 southeastern Wisconsin counties. It has progressed through three counties from south to north and was in Waukesha county in 1956. Therefore, we need to be alert in Washington county to help fight the disease.

The State Department of Agriculture and Agriculture Extension Service have designated the county agricultural agent as coordinator of the Dutch Elm disease control. The coordinator attempts to keep local volunteer wardens informed on the program. The wardens selected thus far are: Town of West Bend—Art Lonergan; town of Hartford—Frank Zuern; town of Germantown—Ervin Patzan, Carl Balsiger, and Walter Steffen; town of Jackson—Clarence Becker and Rueben Schmahl; town of Erin—H. E. Lindemann and Emmett Burg; village of Kewaskum—Orville Behnke, Walter Wesenberg and Albert Hron Jr.; village of Barton—Wm. Landrath; city of West Bend—the city engineer, Milton Schnafer, Walter Puestow and Wm. Molter, and the city of Hartford—Gordon Finck.

The duties of these wardens are: 1. Become acquainted with Dutch Elm disease. 2. Plan ahead on an elm census when and if you and others feel it's needed. Cities and villages—location of each elm tree, location of special high value elms.

Townships—Location of elm concentrations, location of exceptionally high value trees, cemeteries, land marks, etc.

3. Locate and be aware of locations of dead elms and work with local authorities or property owners to remove or destroy the dead elm wood.

4. When a suspected Dutch Elm diseased living tree is reported, work with the owner to get samples and send them to the state laboratory.

5. When and if meetings in local municipalities are needed on Dutch Elm disease, plan with county agricultural agent in conducting the meeting.

Any person in Washington county having a suspected tree should con-

tact his warden for service on the tree. The warden has information which will indicate that the tree may or may not have Dutch Elm disease. If he feels the tree is infected, he will collect samples to be checked through the state laboratory.

Each property owner also has a responsibility on this problem. Dutch Elm disease is carried by either European or American elm bark beetles. These beetles feed on live elms, and breed in dead elms. Complete elimination of dead elm-wood will break the cycle of Dutch Elm disease.

The places needing clean-up are: 1. wood piles; 2. logs; 3. dumps; 4. brush piles.

There are other places also. Each

person who eliminates a piece of dead elm wood also eliminates a breeding grounds.

Watch your local paper for news on symptoms and control.

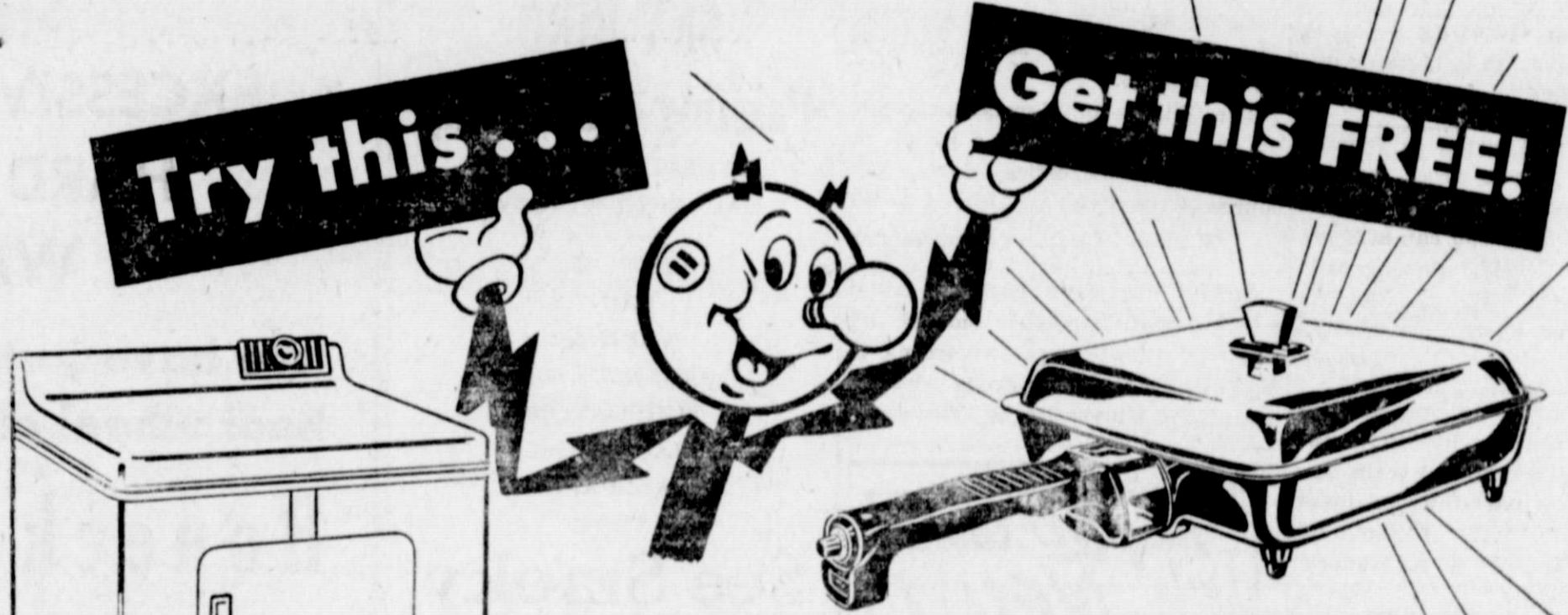

Tips on Starting a New Lawn

An attractive lawn is something to be proud of, and it's half the battle in creating a pleasing site for your home.

Let's start off with the grade or slope which is important for good appearance and drainage. For drainage the slope must take the water away from the foundation of the house, because grass is injured if covered with water even for short periods. So proper grading to care for run-off is important. For appearance the slope should not be noticeable; your house should look as if it settled into the landscape. To make the slope only great enough to take care of run-off water a drop of three to four inches per ten feet is sufficient, but if the lawn area is large enough, a gently rolling contour is more pleasing with the water being drained to one side.

The ideal soil is a fertile loam, neutral or slightly acid with plenty of humus and a well-drained sub-soil. Of course, all soils don't meet these conditions, but you can add materials to improve them.

A heavy and compact soil can be loosened by mixing sand into the

top four or five inches is enough, depending on the original condition of the soil. At this rate it would take about three to four cubic yards per 1,000 square feet.

If the soil is very sandy, add humus. This greatly increases the water holding capacity of the soil. Use

a well-rotted manure, commercial peat or leaf mold to condition the soil for grass planting, or in the spring plant a green manure crop such as a fast-growing grain and plow it under in early summer. This will condition the soil for fall grass planting.

Getting a good seedbed is the last step in preparing the lawn soil. The proper seedbed has a fine, shallow layer of surface soil free from hollows, with a firm but not compact soil immediately beneath it.

A rake may be sufficient in heavier soil, or you may have to roll or tamp the soil if it is light to get the needed firmness.

You will probably need to apply some fertilizer before sowing the grass seed. A soil test will tell you how much commercial fertilizer to apply. Stop in at the vocational agriculture room or call me at my home about getting a test of the soil made.

If you use manure, you'll need to add less commercial fertilizer. In general, you fertilize according to the soil. A sandy soil manured may take about 15-20 pounds of 3-12-12, not manured from 30 to 40 pounds of 3-12-12.

A heavy soil manured may need about 15 to 20 pounds of 2-12-6, not manured about 30 to 40 pounds of 2-12-6.

Distribute the fertilizer evenly over the soil, working it into the top three to five inches about a week before sowing.

Don't add lime to your soil unless you have had a soil test made showing how much is needed. If lime is needed, work it into the soil along with the fertilizer.

Check the Statesman next week for recommended seed mixtures, seeding time, watering and mowing.
