Fire at Legge **Home Causes Much Damage**

MRS. LEGGE IS TREATED AT HOSPITAL AFTER INHALING TOO MUCH SMOKE

A roof and attic fire at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Legge in the town of Kewaskum, located at the intersection of Hwy. H and Kettle Moraine drive southeast of the village, caused damage estimated at several thousand dollars last Wednesday evening.

The Kewaskum fire department was called to the scene at 8:15 p. m. The blaze had a good start before it was noticed and when the firemen arrived flames were shooting out of one end of the roof and the entire attic of the south section of the L-shaped home was enveloped in flames.

After extinguishing what flames they could reach, firemen began tearing off parts of the roof to get at the sources of the blaze between a double roof and in the attic. Much of the roof had to be torn off to reach all the flames and firemen worked deliberately for about an hour and a half before getting the blaze completely out. Considering the limited supply of water they did a very good job in snuffing the flames and saving the home, which appeared as though it might be destroyed when the firemen arrived.

Along with the damage resulting from the fire other damage was caused to the living quarters on the first story by smoke and water, although the firemen held this to a minimum. Much of the furniture was removed to an adjoining garage by the Legges and bystanders. The blaze started in the attic from a short in the wiring of a junction

Mrs. Legge was taken ill from inhaling too much smoke while removing * furniture from her home and spent the next two days in the hospital for medical care. During the night the fire started burning again in one place on the roof and Legge doused it with a bucket of water.

The firemen answered another call Thursday afternoon to the George Strohmeyer farm on Hwy. 28 in the town of Kewaskum, located several miles west of the village. The Strohmeyers were burning grass and brush in an orchard when the flames got out of control and spread toward the house. The firemen extinguished the fire in a short time.

The last mobile unit for the Community Donor club was held in West Bend in February when an outstanding turnout reached well over the quota of 200 donors.



WASHINGTON COUNTY IN MEMORY of the Honorable EDWARD J. GEHL. late Justice of the Supreme Court

News of the sudden passing of Justice Edward J. Gehl, of the Supreme Court of Wisconsin, brought both shock and sorrow to the people of the whole State, and especially to those of Washington County — his home. Here he was born—in the City of Hartford, on January 26th, 1890, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter L. Gehl. He attended and graduated from the local elementary school and high school and entered the College of Law of the University of Wisconsin, where he was graduated in 1913 receiving the degree of Bachelor of Laws. In 1915, he came to West Bend and began the practice of his profession — associating himself with F. W. Bucklin. He volunteered in the military service in 1917 and served in Europe with the 127th Infantry of the famous 32nd Division. He was awarded the Purple Heart and Silver Star. Entering the service as a lieutenant, he attained the rank of captain. After World War I.

Company, has determined to erect an additional wigwag signal and modernization of the present signal located at the County Trunk Highway "D" crossing in the vicinity of Allenton in Washington as he took in his stride, duties and great responsibilities as he found them. His career as a lawyer was interrupted by war. He was a battle casualty and suffered — no one knows how much — nor to what extent the tragedy may have shortened his life.

While in the service, his father has passed away and he returned to Hartford and soon thereafter became a partner of Mr. E. W. Sawyer in the practice of law. He soon gained distinction and his reputation as a successful trial lawyer spread rapidly. In 1922 he became United States Attorney for the Eastern District of

Mr. Gehl entered upon his judicial career in 1940 when he was elected Judge of the 13th Judicial Circuit — one of the busiest circuits in the State. It was the first time in the history of the Circuit that anyone not from Dodge County had attained that office. He continued as Circuit Judge until 1949 when he was elected to the Supreme Court for a term of ten years — which would have expired in 1960, and at which time he had hoped to retire to his home County of Washington to spend the rest of his life. He died on August 28th, 1956 at Madison. He brought to the

Supreme Court a wealth of experience and understanding. Always happy in the thought that he was a friend of all people, he saw the good in all and good-naturedly ignored any shortcomings any of them may have had. He was always frank and open in all things and never sought to dodge responsibilities by double-talk or any pretense whatever. According to his wish, he was buried in his native County by

those he loved and who dearly loved him — with no pomp or ceremony not accorded a plain, common man. Besides his widow, Jessica (nee Colburn); his daughter, Mary Louise (Mrs. John Mc Collow) of Lake Geneva; two grandchildren; three brothers, William J. and Norman of Hartford and Walter J. (Fritz) Gehl of West Bend; and a sister, Mrs. Vina Brumm of Hartford great host of other relatives and friends throughout the State to mourn his passing

BOILER EXPLOSION

All boilers and compressed air tanks are insured in the amount of \$100,000 for damage to County property and the property of others, and for personal injury to the public, excluding employees who are covered under Workmen's Compensation.

AUTOMOBILES AND TRUCKS

The County's investment in passenger cars is covered for full value under the comprehensive form. Trucks are fully covered against loss by fire only. Windstorm and Hail damage may be added, if desired, at a rate of 10c per \$100. This coverage applies regardless of where the loss occurs. The total insurance on the automobiles and trucks of the County is in the amount of \$248,350.00.

OTHER HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT This equipment is fully covered under a floater policy against loss by fire, lightning, windstorm, flood, collapse of bridges, collision, etc. regardless of location. This equipment is insured for \$440,900.00. Theft is covered subject to a \$25.00 Deductible Clause.

RADIO EQUIPMENT ON CARS, GUNS, CAMERAS There is a floater policy covering radio equipment in the amount of \$6,000 on sheriff's and police cars for full value, substantially as

above. There is also a floater policy covering guns of the sheriff's department in the amount of \$600.00. Camera equipment of the sheriff's department is insured for \$385.00 under a floater policy.

Bonds for County officials and employees are properly filed for the statutory amounts.

REPORT NO. 23a
Roy Gonnering, Superintendent of the Hospital and Home appeared before the Board and explained in detail the various accounts of the County Hospital, County Home and County Farm. He stated that because the State average per week per patient cost is approximately \$6.00 above the actual cost to Washington County, a surplus had been realized. It was his suggestion that the Board adopt a former resolution presented at the September meeting giving the Trustees the authority to invest this money in bonds and to be marked for future needs of the Hospital Home and Farm. He was informed that some of this surplus had already been invested by Washington County and it would mean that present bonds would have to be redeemed to provide available cash. Supervisor Schroeder stated that Washington County had on numerous occasions in pre-vious years, advanced sums of money for improvements and these sums should be refunded before any surplus is invested. He also stated that investing surplus money would not solve the problem as stated by Mr. Gonring. What is the Washington - Ozaukee Child Guidance Center? This Center was brought about through the interest and participation of citizens of both counties. At least six years were spent in active preparation by the local communities. The Wisconsin State Health provides a Clinical Psychologist and a Psychiatric Social Worker for a least a two-year period. The Washington and Ozaukee County Boards provide quarters, secretarial help, and the services of a psychiatrist. An Advisory Committee of citizens of both counties serves the Center in helping to reach the wider community. A Statutory Committee, composed of members of the Health Committees of both counties, assumes responsibility

for the actual operation of the Center. A Child Guidance Center is a place where a team of specialists, trained to work with emotional health problems, work together to assist parents, churches, schools, and other agencies in helping the child with his problems by getting at their cause and by working out effective ways of handling and solving them. They also help to promote mental health for all members of the community through service to other agencies and by working with local committees on mental health planning.

What service has been provided by the Center? This report will atempt to answer briefly some of the questions

you may have about what has been done during the Center's first year of operation. The period covered by the report is May 15, 1955 through June 15, 1956. Numbers and totals do not give a complete picture of the effort involved in helping people with their problems of adjustment, but the statistics presented here will give some idea of where these efforts have been directed and how the service has been used by the community.

How many children have been referred and received service? Girls Active cases 17 Closed cases 74

The word "case" is used rather than "individual" or "child" because the service given in most instances is to the child and one or both of his parents. "Case", in other words, means the child and

The 35 active cases are receiving service on the basis of weekly the various accounts for the Washington County Public Welfare interviews or less frequently by mutual arrangement of the staff and the individual.


The cases designated closed have ended contact with the Center temporarily or permanently for reasons which include: mutual agreement between the patient and staff that the original problem has been relieved or that sufficient help has been given so the patient can work out the problem on his own; mutual agreement that more appropriate service is offered elsewhere; inability to come in to the Center; and, in some cases, inability to accept the kind of treatment offered.

How many interviews were used in giving direct service to children and parents?

Total You may be surprised to see how many more interviews there were with parents than with children. There are several reasons for this. In some cases the staff may feel the parents can profit from help and work out the problem or concern without bringing the child to the Center. In most cases both child and parent will be interviewed on a regular basis in a fully staffed clinic. Because we have not had a full-time psychiatric social worker on the staff, we have had to decide whether it is more important to provide treatment for the parent or the child. Unfortunately, the same staff member cannot work with both because doing so would interfere with the effectiveness of treatment. When we have a complete staff of psychiatrist, psychologist and full-time social worker, the number of interviews with children should more nearly equal the number

This table indicates the source of the suggestion to the parents that the service of the Center might be helpful to their child. The school teacher, doctor, minister or nurse may be the first to tell the parents of the professional help available to them in understanding and working out the child's problems of adjustment, but, in every case, the parent must make the initial request for an appointment. We cannot help a child without congretation from his parents. ment. We cannot help a child without cooperation from his parents because the Center has no magic methods of bringing about change in the behavior of children. The child guidance counselor can only help the individual to make use of his own desire for change to achieve greater self-understanding and improved parent-child rela-

tionships How was service used by both counties? Other Diagnosis and Treatment Services Washington County Ozaukee County 17 86

This is a service for both counties and it can be seen from the above figures that there has been a fairly even use of the services by both counties. The category of "other services" includes largely the requests from the Washington County Juvenile Court and Department of Public Welfare.

It is always possible that the above figures will vary and perhaps reverse themselves since requests are made through need and not necessarily from the areas of greatest population. Perhaps the next annual report will indicate that Ozaukee County has made more referrals than Washington County. Both rural and urban areas have been represented in these figures and it is not possible to predict where future referrals will come from.

The Center does not reduce or assume the responsibility of family, church, school or any other social institution for promoting mental health, but it serves by strengthening their own abilities to prevent emotional health problems and relieve distress when they occur. During the past several legistlative sessions your County Super-intendent labored to bring about a change in certain statutes. The flurry of accidents on the sports fields, some of which resulted in most serious injury, disclosed the need for insurance protection. Accordingly, in 1953, at my request, Mr. Hutnik, chairman of the Assembly Education Committee, introduced a bill, which met no opposition, and passed unanimously, thereby giving school districts the discretionary authority to purchase protective accident. tricts the discretionary authority to purchase protective accident insurance for its pupils. Most districts carry such insurance.

In 1953 a bill was introduced to give certain districts incentive aids if they met the standards of the so-called incentive type of integrated district. This bill failed to pass. The same bill was introduced by Senator Panzer in 1955, passed both branches of the legislature unanimously and has become law. This new change has brought about \$4,000 in additional school aids to this county. I have received approval from Senator Clark, Chairman of the Legislative Council Committee on Education to use his name in drafting a bill which would change Section 39.20 (10) of the statutes, thus enabling the county office to offer supervisory service to the county high schools and thereby give this county added state aids for the second supervising teacher.

Weight Control

GENERAL COMMENT

In order that all readers understand the facts and requests presented herein, I wish to explain that the suggestions, if carried returns to the county all monies spent on the County Supervising Teacher, and would continue to do so if the law were changed and a second one is added next year.

Also, the state returns to the county about 80% of the salary of each Speech Therapist. The state law reads that all such monies should be refunded to the county, but the growth of this service has caused a pro-rating of the subsidy. The rate for 1956 for the municipality (Washington County) was 3.17% for prior service credits, plus 3% for Wisconsin Retirement plus 2% for Federal Social Security, a total of 8.17%. The employee's and official's contribution was 3% for the Wisconsin Retirement and 2% for Federal Social Security, a total of 5%.

During 1957 the rate for the municipality will be 3.06% for prior service credits, plus the 3% for Wisconsin Retirement plus 2.25% for the Federal Social Security, a total of 8.31%. The employee's and official's contribution will be 3% for the Wisconsin Retirement and 2.25% for Federal Social Security, a total of 5.25%. The County Judge, as per state statutes is included in a separate

lassification. Under this plan, the County Judge contributes the maximum to Social Security which is \$94.50 in 1957. When the maximum to Social Security is reached, the County Judge continues to contribute the full 7.25% of his salary to retirement. The county does not make any contributions for the County Judge. The Traffic Police and the Radio Operators likewise have

elected to make additional contributions which have been approved by the County Board. Under their plan, the contribute 5% instead of 3% to Retirement. They also make a contribution of 2.25% to Social Security

AGRICULTURE—To take care of the agricultural activities and 4-H Club activities of Washington County; to consist of five

PUBLIC PROPERTY—To have the supervision of the court house and jail of Washington County and the equipment therein, and the printing of Washington County; to consist of five members.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE—To handle all the insurance of Washington County; to consist of the following five members: chairman of the County Board, chairman of the finance and budget committee, chairman of the highway committee, chairman of county institutions committee, and chairman of the county fairs committee.

SHERIFF'S COMMITTEE—To set hours of work, vacations, duties and general rules of employment of traffic patrolmen.

THE HIGHWAY COMMITTEE shall be elected as provided by the Wisconsin Statutes, shall consist of three members and shall fix the salary of all employees of the County Highway Department, shall have charge of the supervision and maintenance of all county highway buildings and shall have such further duties and powers as provided by law.

No person shall be appointed to standing committees of the County Board except members of the County Board unless where the law provides that certain other persons shall be appointed.

Section 19. No rule shall be suspended or amended without con-currence of two-thirds of the members present.

Any members of the County Board elected to the highway committee shall as soon as he becomes a member of such highway committee be ineligible to act on any other committee; his position on such other committee shall be automatically vacated and the chairman of the County Board shall immediately appoint successors to such vacated positions on the various committees; except for members of the insurance committee, when the Board meets as a committee of the whole, or as otherwise designated by the rules of order.

Section 21. No petition shall be considered by the County Board of Washington County unless such petition be sponsored by and signed by a member of such Board. No petitions for the construction or repair of roads or bridges in Washington County shall be considered by the County Board of Washington County unless such petition shall be signed by a majority of the members of the town, village or city board or boards where such construction or repair is to be done.

Section 22. After the minutes of the preceding day have been read and opportunity has been given to correct the following order of business shall be followed:

- 1. Resolutions may be offered and considered.
- 2. Reports of committees.
- 3. Memorials and other documents.
- After one hour has passed, then the unfinished business on the chairman's table may be taken up and considered.

Section 23. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Robert's Rules of Orders shall govern this Board in all cases in which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the rules and orders made by this Board.

Section 24. The date for the elections by the members of the County Board of Supervisors shall be fixed on the opening day of the November session of said board except as otherwise provided by law.

The following procedure shall be followed for the election of all members of the highway committee and other elections by the County Board of Supervisors. Under this procedure only one office will be filled on one series of ballots.

Nomination shall be made by written ballot. The three men receiving the highest number of votes on such nominating ballot shall be declared nominated and no other names shall be considered or recognized in such election as a candidate.

In the event of a tie, nominees tied shall be declared nominated. In the event of a tie, nominees tied shall be declared nominated. If one member receives a majority of all votes cast in the nominating ballot, provided such ballot was a written ballot, he shall be declared elected; if no member receives a majority, a ballot shall next be taken for the election of first committee member, and if one of the three nominees receives more than one-half of all votes he shall be declared elected. In the event that no nominee receives more than

Section 25. Instead of adjourning at noon, the Board shall recess to a definite hour in the afternoon and any member, not answering to roll call, may ask unanimous consent of the Board to be marked present and the Board may grant such request if just cause is shown.

Tips on Starting a **New Lawn**

Let's start this off with "what kind of seed should we sow?" There is no best kind of grass or combination of grasses. The soil, shade, tree competition, soil moisture, and the amount of care you're willing to give the lawn should influence your choice of seed.

The following are recommended mixtures for various conditions (parts by weight).

For average soil with sunshine: four parts Kentucky Bluegrass, one part fancy Red Top, one part Rye grass for quick coverage, one part Colonial Bent grass for general purposes and one-eighth part Dutch white clover. Seed this at the rate of one and one-half pounds per 1,000 square feet. At this rate, each part would equal about three and one-half ounces.

For shade and with tree competition: four to five parts of Chewings Fescue, one to two parts of rough stalked Meadow grass and one part of Red Top. Sow this at the rate of about three pounds per 1,000 square

For sandy or poor soil with sunshine: mix four parts Chewings Fescue, one part Colonial Bent Grass and one part Red Top at the rate of three pounds per 1,000





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State Fire Departments Petition for Approval Of Fire Training Bills

Wisconsin fire departments, 276 of them, volunteer and paid, have sent petitions to their senators and assemblymen asking approval of the Wisconsin Firemen's Training Bills 205 S and 297 A, according to local Fire Chief Harry J. Schaefer.

The bills were drawn by firemen for firemen, with the guidance of state officials. They follow the path of successful instruction in other states.

Wisconsin is now eighth state from the bottom of the list in the number of firemen taking state and provincial training. Wisconsin with 365 barely nosed out Saskatchewan. Iowa had 4,310, Arkansas 4,497, Georgia 5,661, and Washington 12,717.

The appropriation of \$100,000 asked for the next biennium will be needed for the adequate training of part-time instructors in firemanship, and for their expenses in giving evening instruction in the local fire stations.

The instructors will be qualified firemen, strengthened by the addition of 30 hours of teacher training to make their schools of approximately 20 hours interesting and effective to the members of the local fire departments.

Industry and retail centers are moving from the cities into the villages and rural areas. Country-wide, over 50% of the large fires (over \$250,000 loss) were in the territories of volunteer departments. Studies show farm fires have a far higher probability of total loss than those in villages and towns.

In Wisconsin there are less than 30 paid departments and over 600 volunteer departments.

The training bills are backed by the Wisconsin Council of Firemen's Associations, the Wisconsin State Fire Chiefs, league of Wisconsin Municipalities, the Wisconsin Association of Town Mutual Insurance Companies, and other insurance, municipal, and farm groups.




